VIP program aims to reduce Labor Day fatalities The Vehicle Injury Prevention
(VIP) program urges parents to "use be restrained in a car seal

* All children (VIP) program urges parents to "use * All children between ages 2 and restraint" this Labor Day. Labor Day, like other holidays,
means more traffic accidents result ing in serious injuries and death. Proper car seat and seat belt use cuts vehicle-related deaths in half, according to the VIP, a joint program
at Baylor College of Medicine and the Harris County Hospital District in Houston.
" It's one of those peak accident weekends when there is much needless injury and death," said Rick
Bailey, who heads the VIP a component of the Pediatric Injury Center at Baylor and HCHD. "If parents would only take the time to
make sure that kids are properly make sure that kids are properly
restrained, much heartbreak could be avoided." According to VIP, parents should
know the law regarding car safety restraints. The Mandatory Safety
Bell Use Law Belt Use Law requires that:
* All children age 2 or young must be restrained in a vehicle. 15 All children between ages 4 and front passenger seats. The VIP program is the first of its kind in Texas and is designed to use an interdisciplinary approach to re-
ducemotor vehicleinjury among children. seat belt use and car seat use among vened, and compared compliance vened, and compared compliance
with two schools with no VIP intervention. The study resulted in a 13 percent increase in safety restraint use at the two test schools, while a
decrease of 4 percent in restraint use decrease of 4 percent in restraint use
was seen at the two control sites. "Motor vehicle occupant injuries cause more childhood deaths than another type of injury. The VIP pro-

Health forum to help women preserve their family's lives
Designed for East Texas women
and set September 6 at the Stephen F.
Austin State University Austin State University campus in Nacogdoches, a forum "Smart Talk
for Smart Women" will be held to cover a wide range of women's health issues.
The idea behind the forum is that by adopting a few, easy preventive
measures, women may avertor avoid measures, women may avert or avoic
many catastrophic illnesses. Forum many calastrophic inesses. Forum
topics will include information on Alzheimer's disease, cancer preven tion, osteoporosis, managed health care, stress management, migraine awarene
therapy. Hormone replacement therapy is one example of how a relatively in expensive treatment can lower the odds of developing debilitating dis-
eases. Hormone replacement therapy replaces the estrogen and/or progesterone which the body no longer produces after menopause. Replacement therapy may help reduce or prevent
bone loss, hot flashes, moodiness,
insomnia and perspiration. It may
also lower the incidence of heart dis also lower the incidence of heart dis
ease in post-menopausal women. Diabetes awareness is another ex-
ample. Health care officials prediet ample. Health care officials predic that one in 15 Texans will be diag-
nosed with diabetes. From 1989 nosed with diabetes. From 1989 Texans yearly. It was responsible for 3,200 amputations per year in Texas. IN 1992 alone, diabetes cost Texas according to Texas Department of Health Statistics.
