And, I confess that my cousin, four of her friends and myself actually gave in to impulse and took a ride on the merry-go-round just a few months ago!

Somehow, I doubt we were as cute as we were back in our childhood, but it was fun.

So was watching the little children of today getting that same thrill on a contemporary carousel! My memories went round and round, right along with them!



A safe was also broken into at Paris Transit, making the burglaries appear to be related.



Web Tracks

For those who want to know more about the internet but don't know where to start!

Someone at GTE must have read one of my previous columns. We are getting fiber optics. Wonders never

On the 4th of July, when Mars Pathfinder enthusiasts (including myself) threatened to over whelm the Internet, traffic was channeled onto a special high-speed research network. There, the traffic swelled to more than triple the capacity of the normal network connection, though still only a fraction of what NASA's experimental Research and education Network (NREN) could carry. NREN is just one of several projects supporting continual innovation in Internet technology.

The very-high speed Backbone Network Service (vBNS), operated by MCI, upgraded to 622 megabits per second this last spring. That is 10 times faster than current Internet capacity and 22,000 faster than conventional modems. They hope to achieve 2,400 megabits per second in three years. The National Science Foundation is spending \$10 million a

year on this project.

The Internet 2 Project consists of 108 research universities and is developing a national network 100 time faster than today's Internet. An experimental network operating at 2,400 megabits per second recently started

service. The Clinton administration has pledged \$100 million annually for the Next Generation Internet (NGI) over the next 5 years. If funded, NASA, the Defense Department, , The Energy Department and several other agencies will meld their highspeed research networks into the vBNS network. Federal officials want to connect research groups at speeds 1,000 times faster than today's Internet with in 5 years.

In Europe, 16 national research networks, led by Dante, a nonprofit company in Cambridge, England, is spending \$45 million a year on the Ten-34 Project for private high-speed links of up to 622 megabits per second across national borders.

We have outgrown a lot of the original Internet Technology and part of the problem of designing for tomorrow's Internet is that no one understands what is going on in the one we have today.

At the San Diego Supercomputer Center, researchers are developing a new generation of measurement tools. New system monitors and flow meters could help answer the engineering mysteries posed by the accelerating complexity of Internet traffic patterns. (to be continued)

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
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

COLLEGE STATION - Around Texas A&M University these days, making jokes about taking your misbehaving pet to the kitty shrink is likely to land you in the doghouse.

Texas A&M's College of Veterinary Medicine has accepted the first resident in a new residency program intended to equip veterinarians to become veterinary clinical behaviorists.

Veterinarian Dr. Kathalyn Johnson. a 1987 graduate of the College of Veterinary Medicine, is the first person in the new three-year program.

Pets that misbehave or act oddly are anything but a joke to their owners, says Texas A&M veterinarian and clinical behaviorist Dr. Bonnie Beaver, who heads the new residency program. Two million dog bites are reported each year, and at least 10 million dogs and cats are left at animal shelters or abandoned each year because their behavior causes problems for their owners.

Thirty years ago, dogs and cats were primarily farm and ranch animals that lived outside," she says. "Owners didn't have a strong emotional attachment to them. Now they're essentially members of the family."





Kelseys adopt Mustangs

Dr. Sam Kelsey and his wife, Suzy of Deport are the proud owners of a wild Mustang mare and her colt. The pair were captured in January of this year in Nevada.

After their capture, the pair of Mustangs were moved to Oklahoma and then to a special adoption center in Mt. Pleasant in August where the Kelseys adopted them.

The popular view of the Mustang origin stretches back to the Conquistadors, but sources say only a small fraction of wild horses are descendants. Columbus and Hernando Cortez also brought horses to North America and burros were brought to the west by Jesuit missionaries and were later used extensively by miners. When mining camps failed, the burros were freed to roam the deserts.

In eleven western states, there are now approximately 46,000 wild

horses. The horses and burros are protected and managed by the Bureau of Land Management.

In December, 1971, Congress passed the Wild Free-Roaming Horse and Burro Act, providing a home for wild horses and burros. Between 6 and 8 thousand horses and from 500-1,000 burros are offered for adoption each year. The adoption fee is \$125.00 per head for the wild horses and \$75.00 per head for the wild burros. A qualified person can adopt up to four wild horses and burros within a 12-month period.

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Pecan crop looks good

The pecan crop in Lamar County generally looks good at this time on both native and improved varieties. Producers should now be scouting trees for the pecan weevil.

Adult weevils begin to emerge in late August and feed on nuts in the water stage, causing them to drop. After the pecan reaches the dough stage, it is susceptible to attack by the pecan weevil larvae.

Applications of Sevin may be needed to protect the pecans if weevils are found. One application followed by a second application 7-10

days later should provide good con-

Does the time of day you cut hay affect quality? USDA researchers have recently uncovered a surprising difference in hay cut at different times of the day. Hay was cut either in the morning or afternoon. Both cattle and sheep consumed about 50% more of the hay cut in the afternoon. It is known that carbohydrate production in plants peaks about mid-day, so livestock may select the more digest-
