A new insight into  
several old ideas

Last Thursday I attended a book club program on "Children with Learning Disabilities". The program featured a video that I think almost everyone should watch, whether they deal with a learning disabled child or not.

Called "How Difficult Can It Be", the video places adults into situations that make them feel much of the frustration, tension and fear children with learning disabilities feel.

Two things really caught my attention.

One was when the group was presented with a grainy, black and white photo. Not a single person could identify what the image was.

The "teacher" zeroed in on one particular student. "Carol" he roared! Look at the picture harder! Of course, she still couldn't identify the photo.

He reached into his pocket and produced a check for \$100.

"Everyone knows that all you have to do to motivate a student...right" he announced.

"Carol, if you can tell me what the photograph is I'll sign this \$100 over to you".

Of course, poor frustrated Carol couldn't tell him what the picture was of....it simply wasn't possible.

He began to snarl at her, insult her and threaten to take away her privileges if she didn't properly identify the photo.

None of it did a bit of good, of course, because Carol wasn't capable of doing the task set before her.

The man then put a clear plastic sheet with a brief outline sketched on it. Instantly a cow's face sprang into view. When the sheet was removed it was still simple to see the cow!

In other words, with the proper instructions and assistance, the problem became simple. But how many times have we all done the "try harder, if you'll do it I'll give you something...if you don't do it you'll be punished" routine? He pointed out that it doesn't take long before a child will cease to even try under these conditions.

And finally, he mentioned something that applies to every day life. He said "I don't want to hear a teacher say "I can't give that learning disabled student a lot of extra attention, it wouldn't be fair to the other children". It sounds reasonable. But the instructor pointed out that the REAL definition of fair is not "everyone gets equal" but that "everyone gets what they need".

Somewhere along the line we have come to think that fair does mean equal, but it doesn't. As an example, if I was not hungry and someone else was hungry, would it be fair for me to get the same amount of food? Of course not!

Both of these points I intend to take to heart in my personal life. Because if you think about them very long, it's evident that both of these little lessons can apply to everyday life, to all people, not just children who have learning disabilities.

Mrs. Garrett was employed as assistant manager to the food services, so she was involved with the planning and ordering of food for a large group.

They have three children, two daughters and a son. Wanda Bailey lives in Marshall and has two sons, James and Lance. Marla Fouse is married to Vick and they live in Texarkana. Glenn Shelby lives in Austin. His wife is Juanita and they have a daughter Stacy. They had a family reunion this past Saturday and everyone was able to come in for it.

Mr. and Mrs. Garrett are members of the Woodland United Methodist Church. They have seen the church grow from an attendance of only five to over fifty with five Sunday School classes.

**Mock German Chocolate Cookie Bars**- This recipe is a simple version of the favorite German Chocolate Cake.

**Asparagus Casserole**-sounds like an interesting recipe using English Peas, onions and asparagus.

**Meat Ball Sauce**-this tomato flavored sauce would be great over spaghetti on a cool autumn day.

**Sausage and Biscuit Tidbits**-- These tasty morsels would be just perfect as a halftime treat for a night of football watching on television.

**Sassafrass Jelly**-This recipe is actually made from the sassafrass root and Mrs. Garrett says that it is so clear that you can see right through it! Just boil the roots in water. It makes a nice spicy jelly that is very good with meats.

**Pecan Pie**-it is getting pie baking weather as the temperature drops and cool weather sets in. An old favorite using white Karo, butter, eggs, sugar and pecans.

**Homemade Soap**-This is the recipe Mrs. Garrett uses for her home-cooked homemade soap. It is so simple that anyone can make it.

**Red River County Roots**

This week's query is from Henry R. Kennedy of Rt. #1-Box 211 in Louisville, MS, 39339. He is searching for information on Captain J.N. Kennedy from Clarksville, TX. Captain Kennedy served in the Civil War, enlisting in October, 1861 at Clarksville. He was promoted from 1st Lieut. to Captain in Co. B, 9th Infantry (also called Young's Regiment, Maxey's Regiment or 8th TX Regiment).

Mr. Kennedy was born in 1835 in Georgia and by the 1860 he was residing in Red River County in the home of L.H. and Phoebe Norwood.

He married Nancy Foster, daughter of Edward Foster Kennedy of Louisville, MS and they had one son, Edward Foster born in 1867. Captain Kennedy apparently died prior to 1870. His widow is buried in Louisville. Does anyone have any information on this Kennedy family?

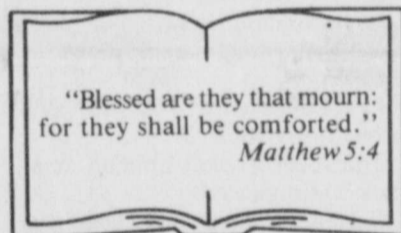

**Mock German Chocolate Cookie Bars**

96 single club crackers  
1 cup oleo  
1-1/2 cups brown sugar  
1 can Eagle Brand milk  
1 cup coconut  
1 cup graham cracker crumbs  
1/4 cup oleo  
1/4 cup milk  
1 cup sugar  
1/4 cup chocolate chips  
1 cup chopped pecans

Line a 15x10 jelly roll pan with half of the club crackers. In a 2-quart pan combine 1 cup oleo, brown sugar, eggs and Eagle Brand milk. Bring to a boil. Boil for three minutes until thick. Add coconut and graham cracker crumbs and pour over club crackers.

Bring to a boil 1/4 cup oleo and 1/4 cup milk along with 1 cup sugar and add chocolate chips. Stir until chips melt. Spread over crackers. Sprinkle with pecans and refrigerate until firm.

**Asparagus Casserole**

5-6 slices of white bread  
1 can little English peas w/pearl onions  
2 cans asparagus  
1 layer of cheese slices  
1 can mushroom soup

Layer in baking dish ingredients except bread and layer with cheese on top. Trim crust of bread slices, cutting each slice into three pieces. Dip bread into melted oleo. Cover tops of casserole with bread. Bake until bread browns.

**Meat Ball Sauce**

2 tablespoons celery salt  
2 cans tomato sauce  
1 cup water  
1/2 cup vinegar  
1 tablespoon chili powder  
1 small onion  
6 garlic toes

4 tablespoons sugar  
Cook in heavy pan on low heat about 1-1/2 hours. Have meatballs ready when you start sauce to cooking. Add to sauce. Let all cook slow for 1-1/2 hours.

**Sausage and Biscuit Tidbits**

2 cups Bisquick  
1 pound sausage  
1/2 cup grated cheese  
Mix well. Form into balls or roll out and cut into biscuits and bake.

**Sassafrass Jelly**

3 cups sassafrass tea  
1 package powdered pectin  
4 cups usgar  
Bring tea and pectin to a boil; stirring constantly. Boil for 1 minute. Add sugar and boil another 3-4 minutes. Pour into jars and seal. Make tea by boiling root in water.

**Pecan Pie**

4 eggs  
1 cup white Karo syrup  
1 cup pecans  
3/4 cup sugar  
1/2 stick oleo  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
Beat eggs well and add sugar and syrup. Then add butter and vanilla. Bake in unbaked pie shell at 350 degrees for about one hour or until done in center.

**Homemade Soap**

2 quarts clean grease  
1 cup ammonia  
3 tablespoons Borax  
1 quart water  
1 can lye  
Mix lye and water together in crock bowl; mix grease and borax and ammonia in small enamel dish pan. When lye and water is lukewarm; pour in grease. Mix very slowly and stir about 10 minutes and pour into shallow pan or mold. Cut into pieces before soap hardens.

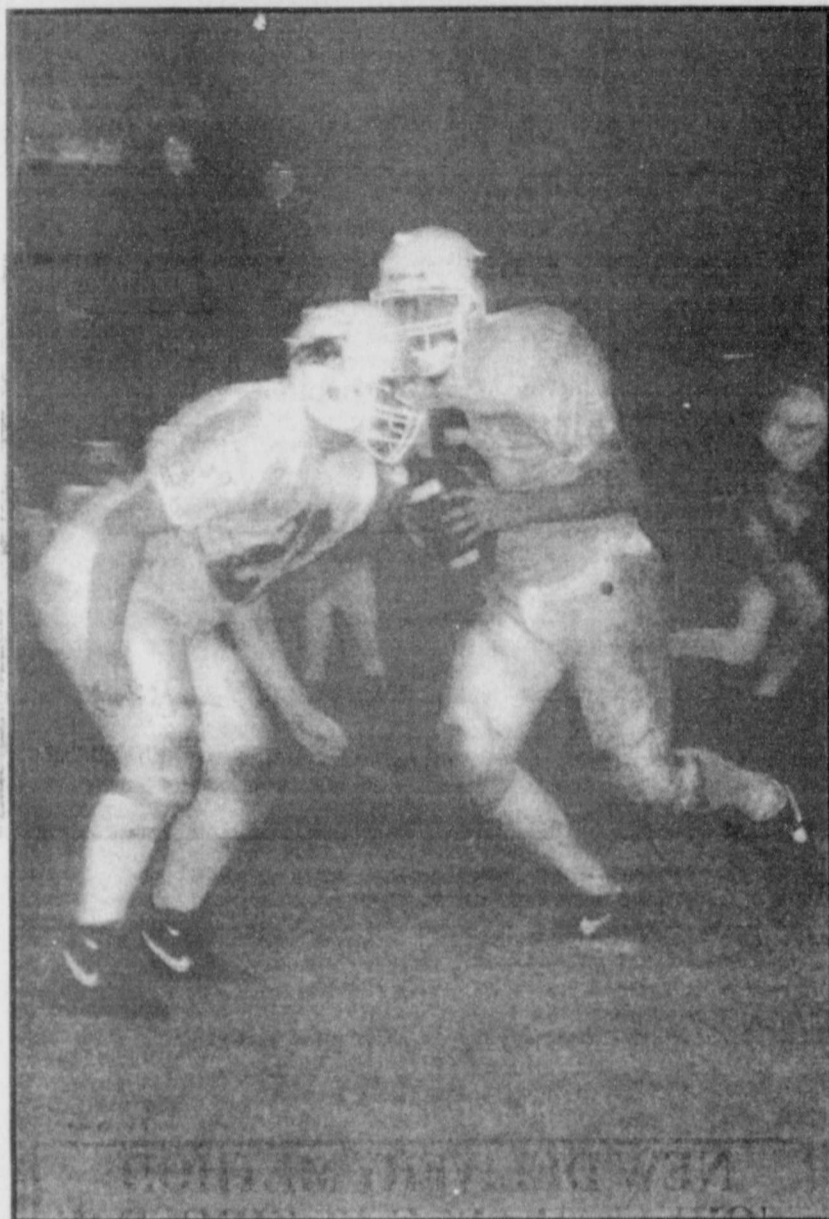

**Jennings homecoming cherishes memories**

The fifteenth Jennings community reunion was held Saturday, October 11, 1997 at the Clardy Community Center. Registration began at 2:00 p.m., followed with a period of visiting and picture taking. First-time visitors were Georgia Skidmore Getz and Sandy Skidmore Lassiter, both of Paris.

Of unique interest were two scrapbooks compiled by Mrs. Frank (Alva Weaver) Stone, teacher of the 3rd, 4th & 5th grades, during 1935-37. Other old pictures and scrapbooks containing school and community memorabilia were shared, along with pictures of road construction of FM 905 in 1951 between Jennings and Clardy showing several old homesites during that era.

Attention was given to two Paris News "Looking Back 50 Years" articles. One from Aug. 15, 1947 reads "Leasing activity near Jennings in the southeast section of Lamar Co. is underway by the oil crew of Biggs & Biggs of Tulsa, Ok., and a test well is understood to be scheduled for the area. Most of the activity is centered presently in the Thomas Hill and Caleb Woods Surveys". The other article is from Sept. 9, 1947 and reads: Surface is being set on Lamar County's newest oil development, the McCuiston No. 1 shallow oil test located on the estate of the late Dr. L.P. McCuiston, 8 miles southeast of Paris in the Marvin community."

A memorial was held for former community residents who have died since the 1996 reunion: Kent Poteet, Robbie Pomroy Skidmore, Willie May Hamby Eppler, Esie McFadden Nelson, Beatrice Gibson Collins, Clarence (Jim) Gage, Margaret Thoms McGee and Leo B. Dodd. After a period of silence Fred Skidmore voice a prayer for those deceased residents' influence on the community.

Special tribute was paid to Mr. Leo B. Dodd who died Oct. 2, 1997. Katy Allred presented a summary of his life with emphasis on the 1936-41 portion as he served as Superintendent, high school teacher and coach at Jennings. ### NOTICE OF RATE DECREASE REQUEST

On July 31, 1997, Texas-New Mexico Power Company ("TNMP") filed the TNMP Transition Plan in accordance with the regulations of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The proposed effective date of such change is January 1, 1998. The period of the TNMP Transition Plan is five years (the "Transition Period"), beginning on the proposed effective date and ending on December 31, 2002. All classes of customers receiving service from TNMP will be affected by said proposed rates. TNMP serves approximately 170,000 customers in Texas. The proposed rates for all of TNMP's Texas operations over the transition period will decrease gross revenues to the Company with respect to current revenues. The reductions will occur January 1, 1998, January 1, 2000 and January 1, 2002 in the approximate amounts of \$4.5 million, \$3.6 million and \$3.6 million, respectively. The total expected decrease over the five-year Transition Period is approximately \$11.7 million.

The purpose of this filing is to obtain approval for the TNMP Transition Plan which will achieve an orderly transition to competition in the electric utility industry. The TNMP Transition Plan has five primary components:

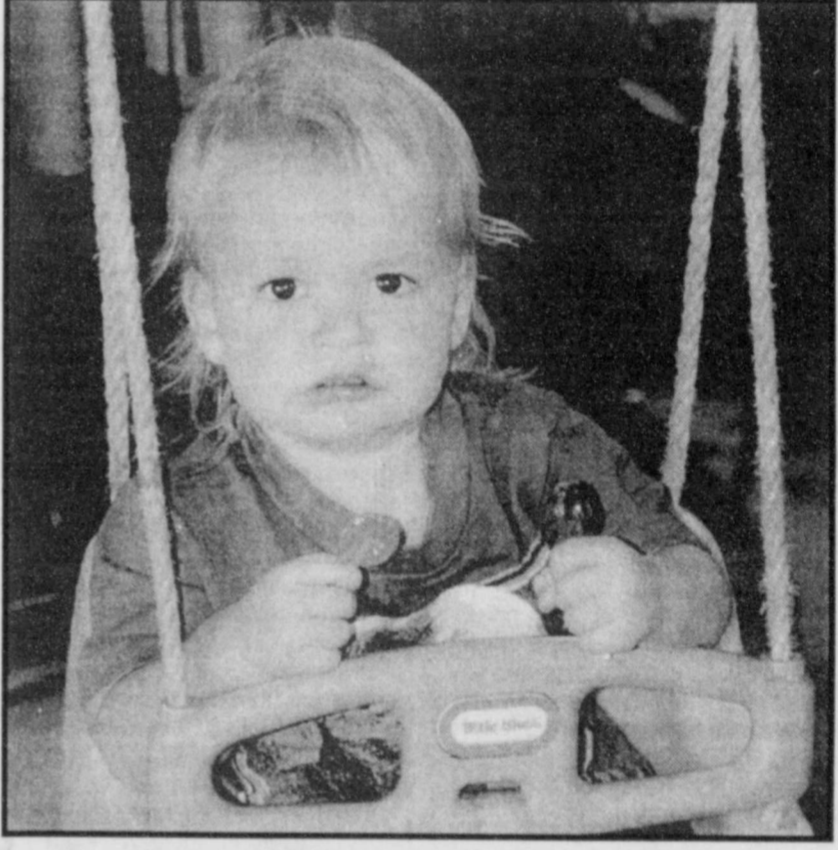
- (1) A five year Transition Period, beginning January 1, 1998.
- (2) Rate benefits to customers, including rate decreases for residential and commercial customer class, a rate freeze for industrial customers and the elimination of the Power Cost Recovery Factor (PCRF).
- (3) Recovery of Excess Costs Over Market (ECOM) through:
  - (a) accelerated depreciation and a lower rate of return on equity for TNP One ECOM;
  - (b) creating a regulatory asset by redirecting the recovery of depreciation on transmission and distribution assets to the depreciation of TNP One ECOM; and
  - (c) setting an earnings cap and applying any earnings in excess of the cap to the depreciation of TNP One ECOM.
- (4) Choice of electric energy suppliers, open access, and unbundled service prices by January 1, 2003.
- (5) Quantification of actual ECOM at the end of the Transition Period with either a refund of any over-recovery of ECOM or the implementation of a Competitive Transition Charge (CTC) to recover any remaining ECOM over a five-year period (Post-Transition Period).

During the Transition Period, TNMP will have a fair and reasonable opportunity to reduce expenses, mitigate its purchased power costs, and reduce the "stranded costs" associated with TNP One, TNMP's generating plant.

A complete copy of the requested rate filing package is on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas. You may inspect a copy of the filing during normal business hours at the business office of Texas-New Mexico Power Company in your area.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, P.O. Box 13326, Austin, Texas 78711-3326. Further information may also be obtained by calling the Public Utility Commission's Office of Consumer Affairs at (512) 936-7120. Hearing-and speech-impaired individuals with text telephones (TTY) may contact the commission at (512) 936-7136. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is 45 days after the date the application was filed with the commission.

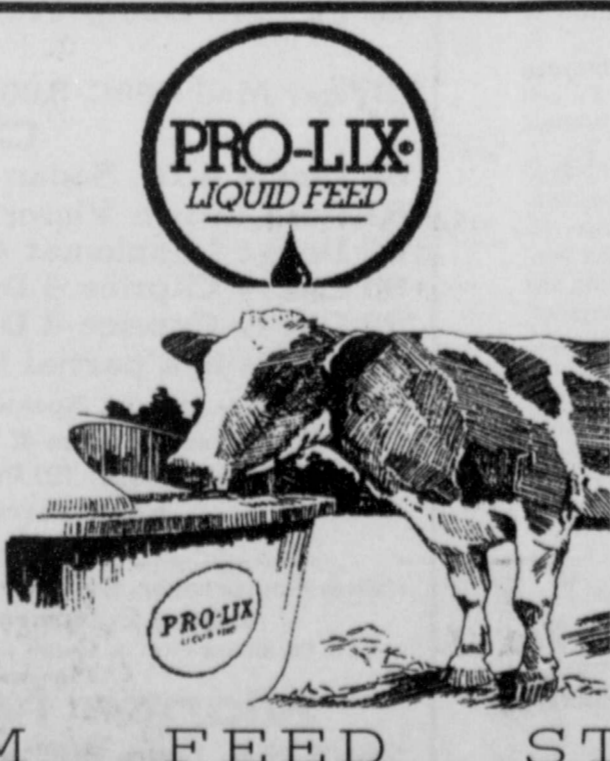

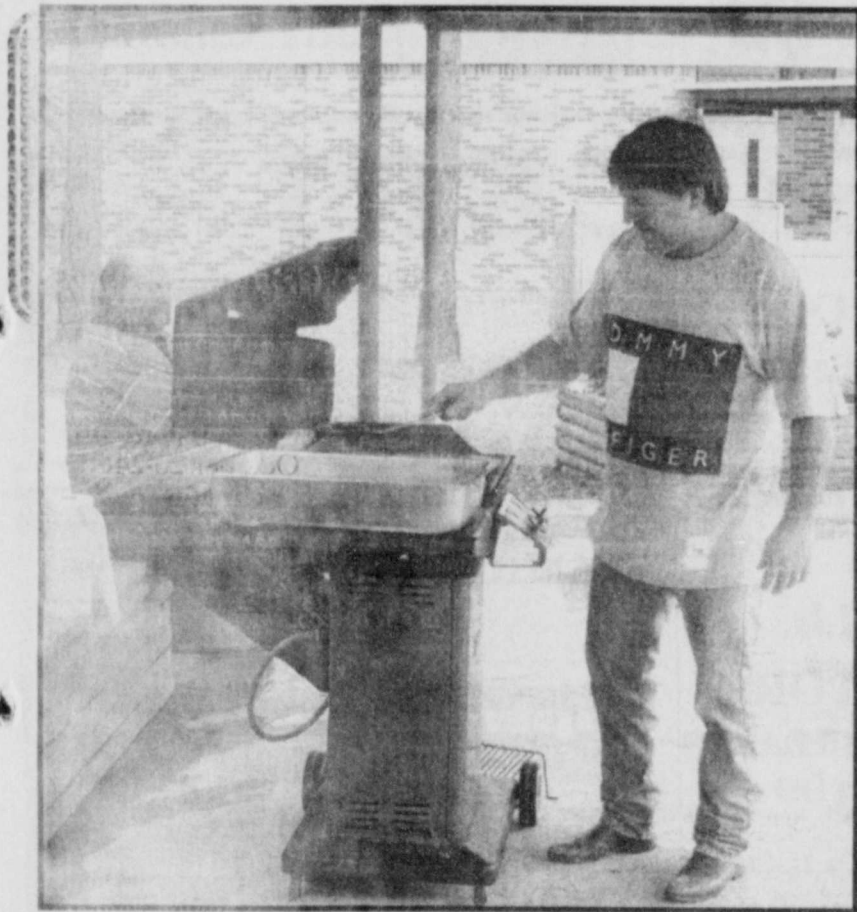

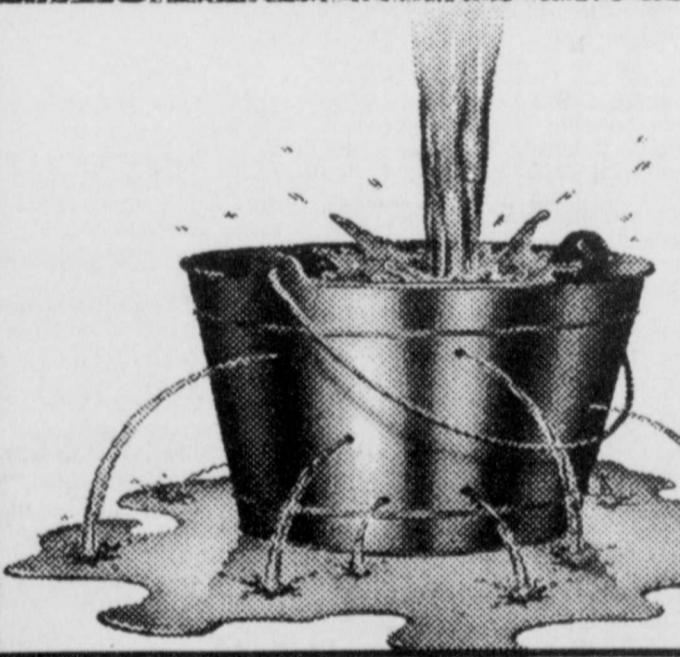
