Monarchs only lay their eggs on milkweed. The female deposits the

eggs on the underside of milkweed and when they hatch the worm eats the plant. This contains a mild poison which keeps predators such as birds from eating them. Later they enter their chrysalis stage, which hatches into the glorious orange and black butterfly that is currently migrating through our area.

Chasing the bright elusive butterfly for love

Love of nature prompts man to help in study of Monarchs

Texas Parks and Wildlife and the University of Kansas are conducting this joint study. It costs \$10 for a "starter kit" to tag butterflies with, and \$15 for two hundred tags after that. Individuals must pay for these supplies. Keener first became aware of the program after watching a National Geographic presentation. He called the toll free number.

'There's also a program to record information about hummingbirds' Keener says, "their numbers are down, too, and information from people with gardens and feeders is useful in helping to locate the problem"

A long-time nature lover, Keener enjoys hunting, and observing nature

He has been to Mexico to see the Monarch roosts, where huge fir trees are covered with solid masses of brilliant butterflies.

"It's unbelievable" he recalls.

He says that so many of the butterfly roost trees were being cut for firewood that Texas will now furnish the poverty-stricken villagers with propane and propane bottles to make it unnecessary for them to cut the trees.

The Monarch butterfly travels each fall from Canada down to Mexico.

Keener keeps a butterfly net with that Monarchs kept in the dark until noon and then let into the light flew west instead of south! This indicates that when the first light of day hits the butterfly's eye it guides the insect in the proper direction. Messing with that misguides them!

Keener's knowledge doesn't extend only to the Monarch. He is knowledgeable about Tiger Swallowtails, Swallowtails, Sulphurs and the myriad other varieties of butterflies that abound.

Why take the time and effort to capture, tag and record information on butterflies?

The people I work with at Texas Utilities think I'm crazy" he grins, "but I like doing this, and studying and learning more about nature.

One thing he has observed is that it was believed that all Monarchs lay their eggs on the undersides of milkweed leaves. But this past year, on a trip to Maui, Hawaii, Keener noted that there the eggs were laid on the top of the leaves instead! He has yet to find an entomologist that can explain that phenomenon.

Keener has one sad note to offer concerning the decline of both the Monarchs and the hummingbirds.

"It appears to me that man is killing himself, and the other natural things are dying first" he says sadly.

Thanks to people like Mickey Keener, though, there is hope ... hope that studies can help pinpoint problems, and perhaps these problems can be corrected.





Bill Roberts, son of Buck and Ann Roberts of Deport, retried to Asheville, North Carolina recently. Bill recalled that about a year ago I wrote about how we had never seen a bear in the wild in spite of our

efforts. He enclosed an article from the Asheville Citizen-Times by Tracy Davis.

It seems that the poor black bears in the region are being hit by cars in record numbers.

The article reports that a sow and two cubs were struck and killed at 3 a.m. on Sugar Hill Road in McDowell County, bringing the total to thirty one bears killed by vehicles this year.

It seems that much of the problem is the result of a poor acorn crop this year which has sent bears and squirrels traveling to look for food.

In the past few years good, hard "mast" crops (acorns and nuts) have resulted in the highest number of bears in decades. This year's poor crop means the bears must look further afield for their food.




Plans were made for food to be prepared and served as part of the events in Campus Ministry at PJC on October 31. Volunteers will assist with the serving of the food to the students.
