Chasing the bright elusive butterfly for love

## Love of nature prompts man to help in study of Monarchs

According to Keener the Monarch population is down and entomolo-
gists are trying to find out why.
"I believe it's a combination of two things," Keener says sadly "we are diligently trying to eradicate milk-
weed, the Monarch's host plant, and
in Mexico, where they migrate, they are cutting down the fir trees the
butterflies roost in".
Monarchs only lay their eggs on
milkweed. The female deposits the eggs on the underside of milkweed
and when they hatch the worm eats the plant. This contains a mild poison
which keeps predators such as birds

Keener keeps a butterfly net with
him and catches the insects, carefully him and catches the insects, carefully
folding the wings shut, placing his tag and writing down all information such as date and location.
Texas Parks and Wildlife and the Texas Parks and Wildlife and the
University of Kansas are conducting this joint study. It costs $\$ \$ 10$ for a
"starter kil" to tag butterflies with, and $\$ 15$ for two hundred tags after
that. Individuals that. Individuals must pay for these supplies. Keener first became aware
of the program after watching a Na-
tional Geographic presentation. He tional Geographic presentation. He
called the toll free number. "There's also a program to record
information about hummingbirds" information about hummingbirds"
