They're dying in the streets and they love it! Gunfighters die in front of witnesses...live to fight again

The Good Guys verses the Bad
Guys makes for entertainment West-
ern Style. It's been a favorite of West-
ern movie and tv show watchers for
years. And doing it live (or dead) is
the formula for the service provided
by the Red River Valley Gunfighters
Association.

The association was founded by
Arlic Ebbs of Blossom. A couple of
years ago, Arlic was drinking coffee
at the Detroit Cafe just before Detroit's
Homecoming, when he was ap-
proached by a Detroit citizen about
an idea for some entertainment at
homecoming. Ebbs, a man with a
western look and past appearances
on the television show "Walker, Texas
Ranger" suggested a gunfight. The
crowd loved it.

The gunfighters appeared again at
this year's homecoming in Detroit,
but with an association membership
of 15 players from Blossom, Detroit,
Talco and the Paris area.

The Good Guys met the Bad Guys
in the middle of the street, and, as
it should be, the Bad Guys bit the dust
after a blazing gun battle with Colt
45s. Dust flies, people yell and fall,
and the crowd loved it again.

In fact, the association has started
taking bookings for their services and
this year performed at Octoberfest in
Clarksville with the crowd there de-
manding encore performances.

The players have expanded the
scenes that include Bad Guys being
shot out of outhouses and Bad Guys

biting eyeballs out of their victims!
Of course they are all decked out in
authentic western gear.

The players use no script. A scene
is worked up at one of the two meet-
ings held each month and while per-
forming the skit the players make up
their own lines as they go along. They
say with no lines to remember no one
forgets their lines and each per-
formance comes out different.

President of the association is
James Johnson of Blossom. He is a
Bad Guy, and even though he usually
dies he loves being a villain!

St. Joseph's Hospital announces plans for construction of senior center

St. Joseph's Hospital and Health
Care Center has initiated a campaign
to raise \$500,000 locally for con-
struction of a 20,000 square-foot com-
munity center designed exclusively
for seniors.

Campaign workers, headed by
Coach Gene Stallings, formerly
kicked off the campaign Tuesday
morning, November 4 during a meet-
ing at the hospital.

The multi-purpose center,
"PrimeTime Place," will include a
large central meeting room capable
of seating 200 as well as several
smaller all-purpose rooms where
seniors can socialize, play cards, do-
minos or bingo, exercise or attend
special classes. A craft room, com-
mercial kitchen and library area are
also planned.

The poverty rate among Lamar
County seniors stands at more than

20%, or double the state's average.
Donors are invited to make gifts in
honor or in memory of loved ones or
friends. Those contributing \$1,000
or more may have the name of their
friend or loved one engraved on a
permanent plaque. Thos emaking a
contribution of \$15,000 may have

either the library or an activity room
named in honor or memory of their
designee, and those making a \$25,000
donation may include the kitchen
area in their selections. A \$50,000
contribution is asked for the multi-
purpose room and for a donation of
\$150,000 or more, the facility will
be named in honor or memory of the
designated person.

Contributions of any amount are
welcome. Contributions may be made
by mail or in person to one of the
campaign volunteers. The drive is
expected to end January 15, 1998.

Pie Filling Salad

2 cans mandarin oranges (drained)
1 can Pineapple Tidbits (drained)
1 10 oz. pkg. strawberries (drained)
1 can Peach Pie Filling

Mix all ingredients together. Let it set overnight. Next morning add 2 sliced bananas.

Corn Salad

1 can French Cut Green Beans (drained)
1 can whole Kernel Corn (drained)
6 green onions
1 med. bell pepper
2 stalks celery
1 small jar pimento

Mix together, in a saucepan mix 1/3 cup oil, 1/2 Cup sugar, 1/4 cup water, 1/2 cup vinegar. Bring to a boil. Pour over vegetables. Chill before serving.

Milky Way Cake

8 Milky Ways
1/2 Cup Margarine
1 Cup chopped nuts
1 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
2 1/2 cup flour
1/2 tsp. soda
1/2 tsp salt
1 1/4 cup buttermilk
2 tsp vanilla

Combine candy and butter in saucepan over low heat and stir until melted. Add nuts. Stir until smooth. Cool. Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy, add eggs. Add cooled candy mixture. Combine flour, soda and salt, add alternately to creamed mixture with buttermilk. Add vanilla. Bake in 2 9 inch pans in 350 degree oven.

Marshmallow frosting

2 1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup margarine
1 cup evaporated milk
1 (7 oz.) jar marshmallow cream

Combine sugar, milk and margarine in sauce pan. Cook to 230 degrees. Remove from heat add marshmallow creme. Beat to spreading consistency.

Almond Joy Cake

Mix and bake one Swiss Chocolate cake mix as directed on package. Mix 1 cup evaporated milk

Squash Quiche

2 cups shredded squash
3 eggs beaten
1/3 cup oil
1 pkg cornbread mix (8 oz.)
1 chopped onion
1/2 cup grated cheese
salt and pepper to taste

Combine all ingredients. If too dry add a little milk. Bake in buttered 9X 12 pan or pie plate for 25 minutes at 350 degrees.

Chicken Casserole

1 chicken cooked and deboned
2 tubes of Ritz Crackers (crushed)
2 cans Cream of Chicken Soup
2 sticks margarine
1 8 ounce carton sour cream

Melt margarine, add crushed crackers and mix. Put 1/2 mixture in bottom of casserole dish. Mix chicken, soup and sour cream. Pour over crumb mixture and then top with remaining crumb mixture. Bake uncovered 45 minutes at 350.

Witches' Brew

1- 40 ounce bottle apple juice
2-3 inch cinnamon sticks
2-12 ounce cans lemon lime drinks
orange ice cubes (recipe follows)

In a small saucepan, combine 2 cups apple juice and cinnamon sticks. Bring to a boil, reduce heat and simmer covered for 5 minutes. Remove cinnamon sticks. Transfer to a large pitcher and refrigerate at least one hour. Stir in remaining apple juice and drinks. Add orange ice cubes, serve immediately.

Orange ice cubes
1 cup orange juice
1 cup water

Fresh orange slices cut into triangles

In a pitcher, combine orange juice and water. Pour into ice trays. Place an orange triangle in each cube. Freeze.

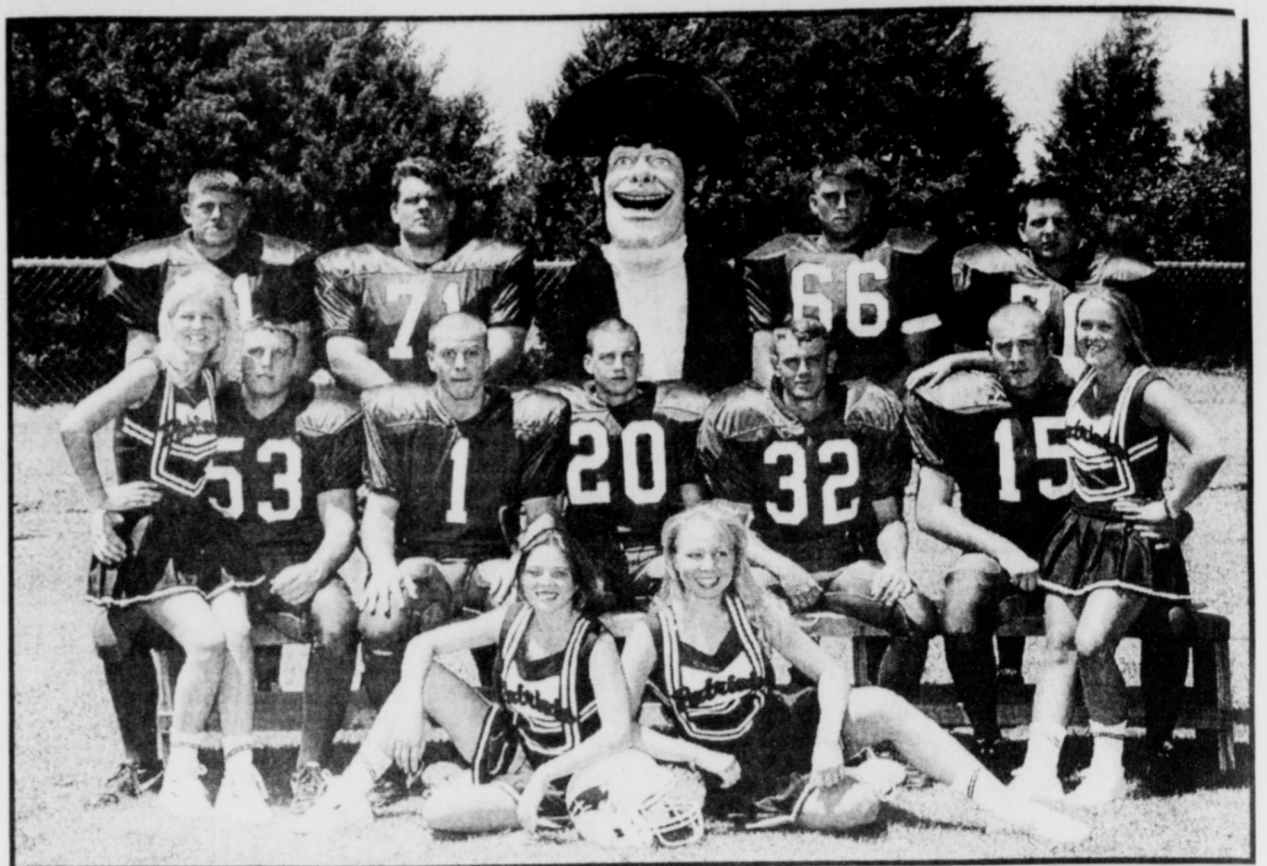

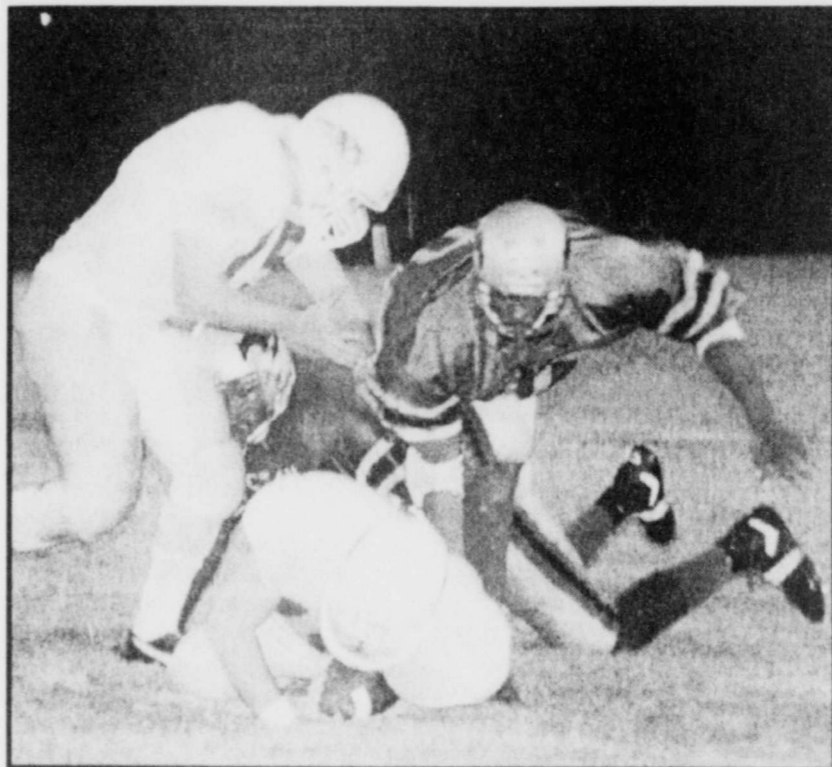
