## Fire Marshals Get Ready Annual Fire Safety Drive

County Junior Fire Marshal along with some 3,000 members of this fire prevention brigade are getting ready for the annual fire safety drive beginning October 1st with the National Fire Week.

Junior Fire Marshal program will emphasize fundamentals of fire in the home and at school to Hess Hartsfield Hartsfield Agency. The program locally in cooperation with the city's elementary schools and the Fire Department under Tom Watson.

Junior Fire Marshal program at kindergarten through grades is the largest and most effective fire safety program in the county," according to Mr. Watson.

"Created in 1947 by the Fire Insurance Group, the program already has trained more than 50 million boys in the fundamentals of fire safety — instilling in them the habits they will carry with them through life."

Hartsfield cited the importance of his public service for school children by the staggering loss of life last year. "In the United States alone more than 100,000 people died in fires in 1972."

"An estimated 100,000 persons lost their homes in fires last year, and one-third of them, under 14."

One of the program is the fire inspection report. As a Junior Fire Marshal, a youngster must make a hazard check of his home, complete the inspection report and return it to himself and a parent, teacher.

Some inspection reports in the fall issue of the "News," which will be by the Hartsfield Agency on October 8 to school here. Those who complete home reports fully and correctly will receive Junior Fire Marshal membership cards and shiny red helmets. Mr. Hartsfield at elementary grade teachers will receive

"Some 12,000 Americans die in fires every year," he pointed out. 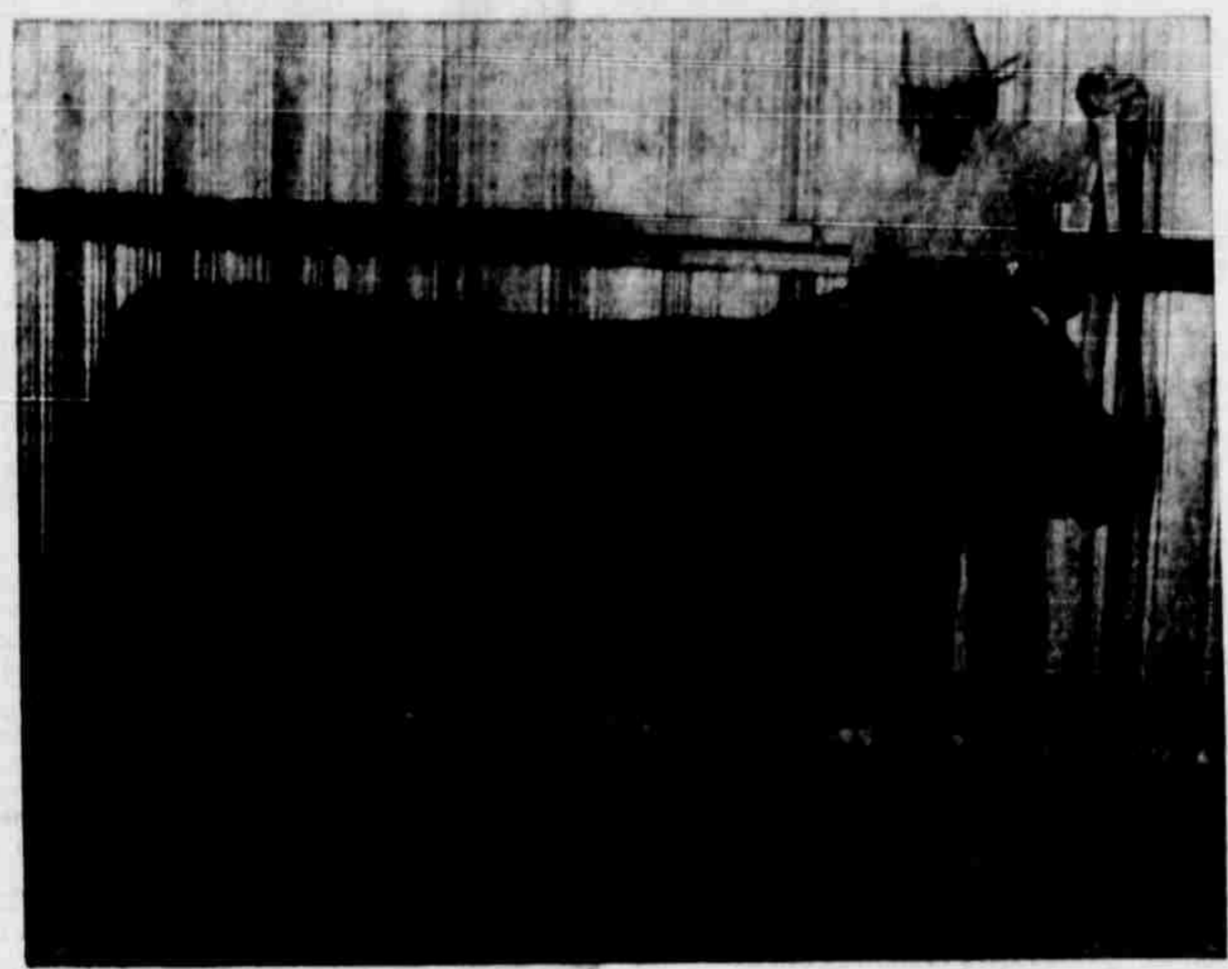
## Register Now For Defensive Driving

## Rule School To Sponsor Defense Driving Course

A defensive driving course will be offered at Rule High School beginning Monday night, Oct. 8, at 7:30 p. m., and will be taught each Monday night thereafter at the same time, on Oct. 15, 22 and 29. Classes will be held in the school library, and instructor will be Kyle Ehrig from Region 14 Education Service Center in Abilene.

All adults wishing to take the course will receive several benefits. If all four classes are completed, a 10 per cent reduction on your car insurance will be granted for the next 3 years. The classes are informative, instructive and interesting. They deal with safe driving, safe operation of your car, and give you tips on how to drive to make your car last longer. Persons wishing to take the course may register on the first night of classes, Oct. 8, at 7:30 p. m. at the Rule School Library.

## City Council Discusses Postal Service

A lengthy discussion on the Postal Service received by Haskell was one item on the agenda of the regular City Council meeting Tuesday night.

Citizens are unhappy with the continued deterioration of the service to and from Haskell, and complaints include the removal of several mail-gathering boxes in town, the closing of one window in the Post Office during many hours it is open, the discontinuance of any mail service on Sundays, and slow and undependable service. After all reports were heard, the Council instructed the secretary to write the Postmaster a letter inviting him to meet with the Council.

Councilman Jimmy Browning led the opening prayer for the meeting; minutes were read and approved, and Sheriff G. T. Garrett then gave a report on the new Council of Government law enforcement radio that is being installed this week at the jailhouse. The new radio will not replace the radios already in operation in the city, but is installed only for Law Enforcement.

The Council also decided to advertise for bids on all new office machines for the city office. Guy Kennedy reported the progress on resurfacing of city streets almost completed, and said they are doing a good job, and doing it as specified.

The annual audit was received and approved.

Lone Star Gas manager Bob Philpot met with the council to request a new ordinance permitting the use of polyethylene pipe to be used for yard lines, from the meters to the houses and to gas lights.

## Commissioners Court Discusses Nov. 6 Election

Haskell County Commissioners Court met in special session Sept. 25 with the main item on the agenda being the discussion of voting boxes, and the Constitution Amendment election that is to be held Nov. 6.

After minutes were read and approved, and bills were approved, the commissioners discussed Senate Bill No. 11, Article 2.04b of the Texas Election Code, which states that any voting box containing less than 100 voters must be abolished. This bill was effective Aug. 27, 1973, and as a result, the Plainview voting box No. 11 is hereby combined with the Sagerton voting box No. 10.

There will be four voting boxes for the Constitution Amendment election. The four will be at No. 1, Haskell National Bank Community Building; No. 2, in Tax Assessor-Collector Office; No. 3, in the County Clerk's Office; and No. 4, in County Superintendent's Office.

In other business the commissioners read and approved the food stamp contract, and discussed the 1974 county budget.

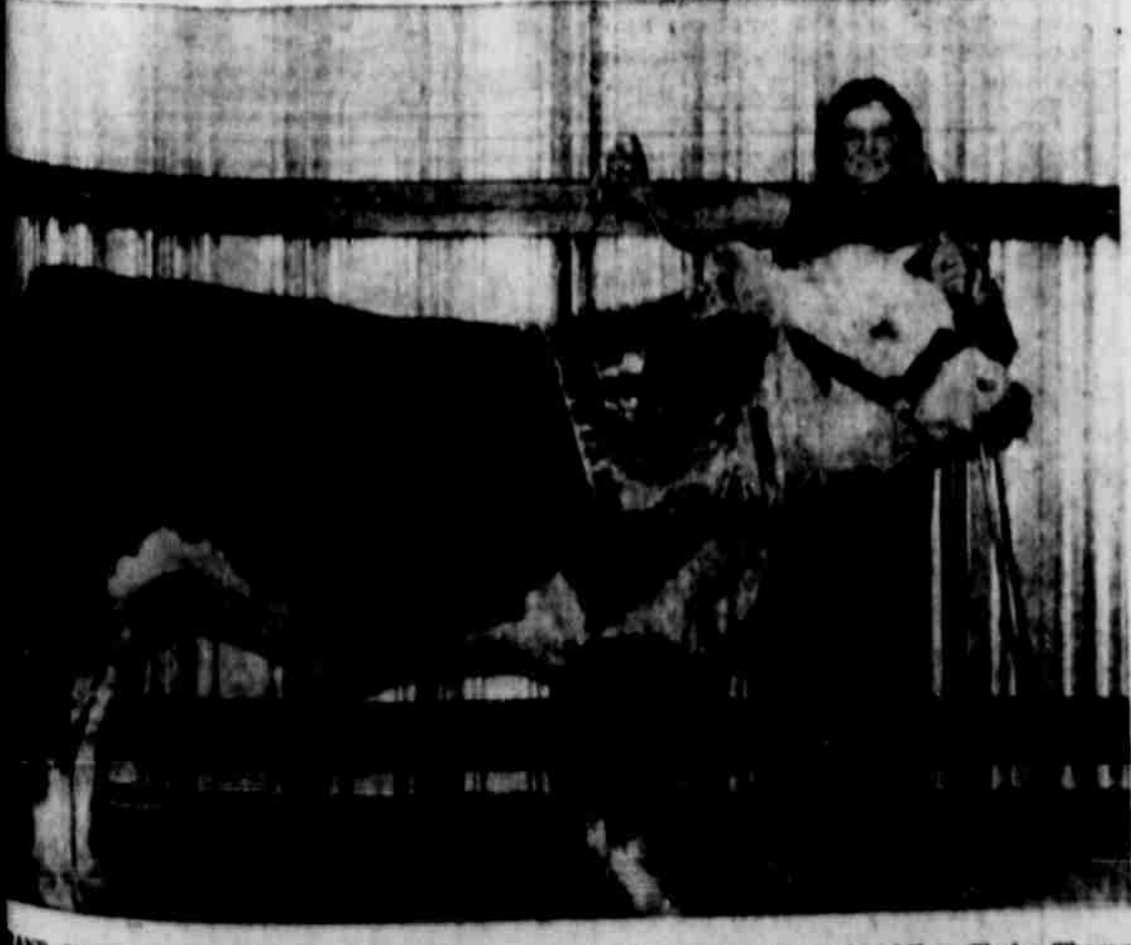

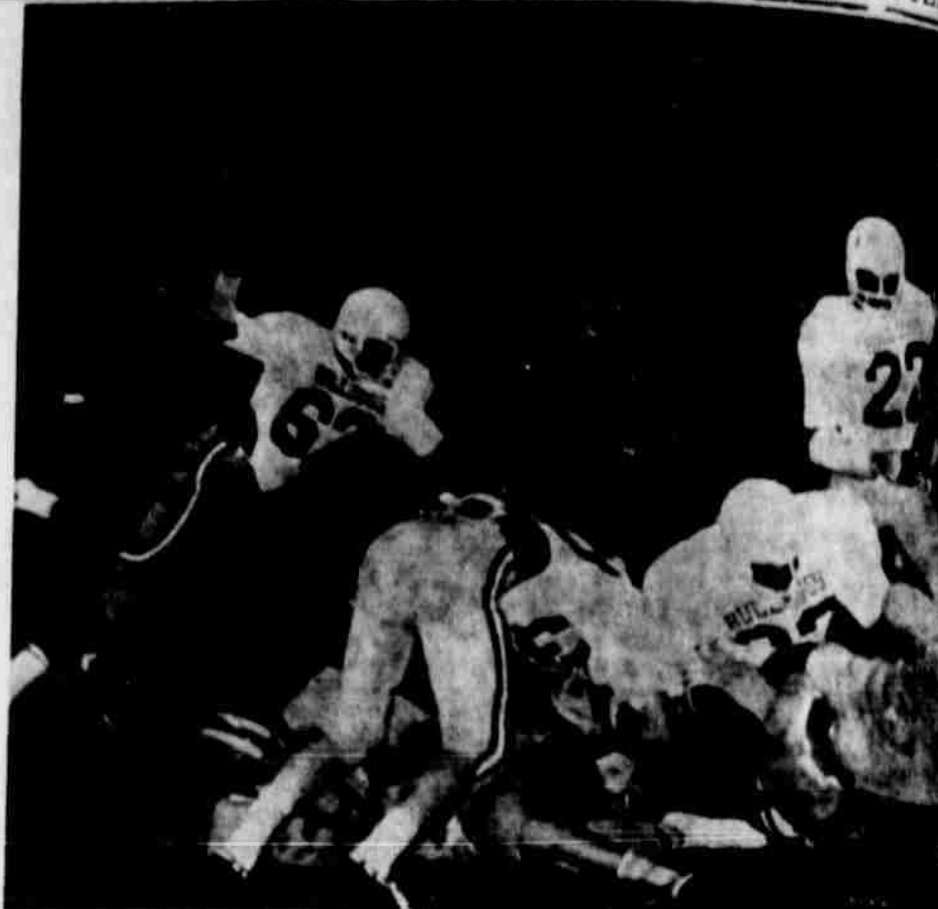

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May. Expensive and often short supplies of hay must be fed or else spring oats are pastured which tends to head and grazing soon tapers off. Mid-April sown temporary sorghum-sudan grass hybrid pastures are not ready for grazing until about June 1-15. Clearly, a "Pasture bridge" is needed at this time of the year.

Keith A. Lahr, research associate at the Chillicothe Rolling Plains Soil and Crops Research Station has presented the answer to this problem. Early March sown wheat remained green until July during a very dry spring suggested a means of filling this need.

Lahr experimented with 25 wheat, 15 oat, 10 rye, 8 barley varieties and various mixtures of each. Different maturities lengthen the grazing period. Seedings on Feb. 15 were ready for grazing by April 1. Rotation with native pastures and sorghum-sudan grass hybrids can be used during late May, June, early July and perhaps longer under irrigation.

Fertilizing and planting can be done on warm days following late January or February snow when labor requirements are minimal. Slightly higher rates of seeding than normal provide better stands in cold soil and furnish more early season grazing. Mixing can be done perhaps by local seed houses or on an individual basis.

Estimated savings on a 50 head basis from March 15 to July 1 can be as much as \$1500 to \$3000, including labor for haying, and not including supplement cost if non-legume hay is fed. This figure is quite dependent upon the condition a stockman desires for his herd and his rate of hay feeding. With such additional pasture source a herd can be maintained longer and calves sold when market price is more favorable than at March 15 "take-off" time.

1969-1970 forage data indicates a mixture of Agent plus Knox 62 wheat makes an excellent combination for sustained fall and winter grazing at a relatively high level through out the season. Many combinations of wheat, rye, oats, barley and triticale have been developed, and are available upon request.

We believe this will definitely give the stockman more bites per acre. Minimum or no-tillage farming fits into this type of planting. Late winter or spring planting of small grains offers many opportunities for no-tillage planting operations. Because of no-tillage planting greatly extends the planting period and is a moisture conservation operation there is no reason that spring planting of small grains, using no-tillage planting can not contribute significantly to forage production in our area.

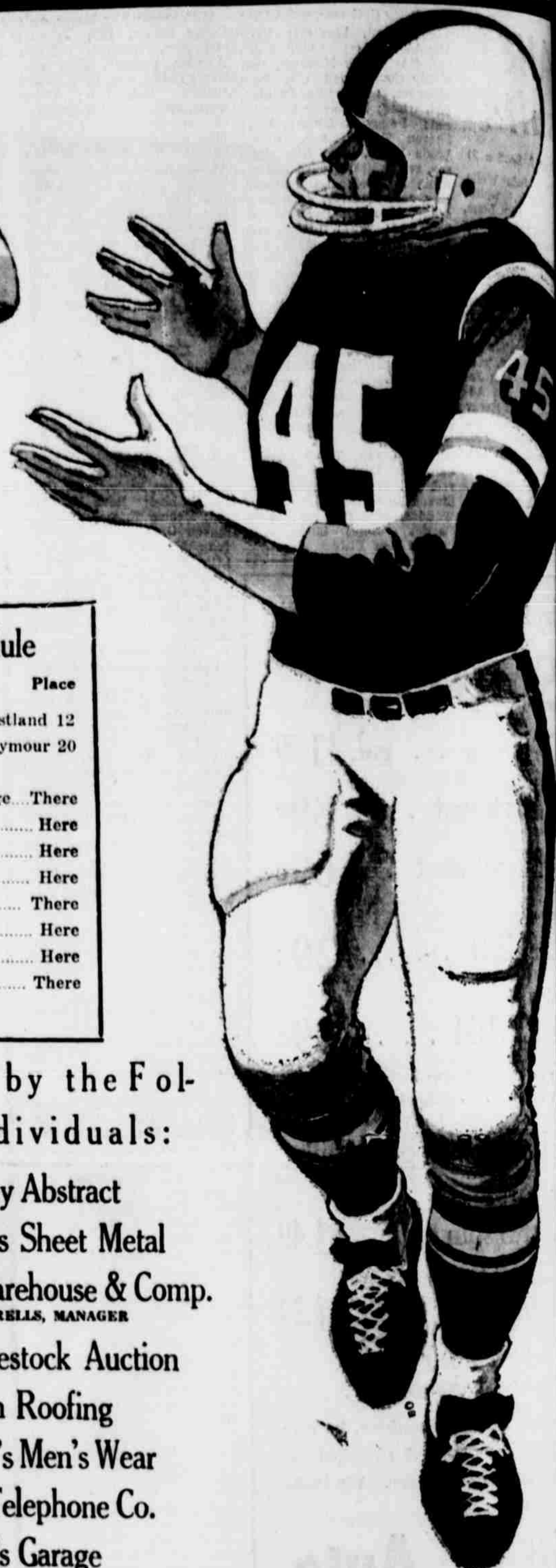
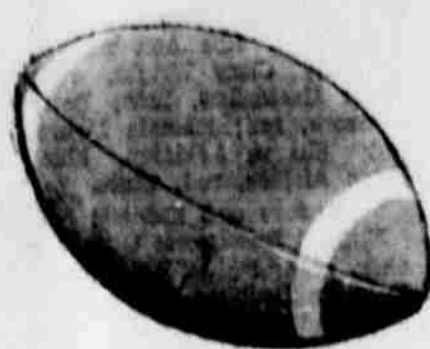
