



Cut steam slits in top. Sprinkle with sugar. Bake at 400 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes until crust is brown and apples tender.

2 sticks margarine 1/3 cup cocoa 2 cups sugar 1-1/2 cup flour

l teaspoon vanilla

4 eggs cup pecans

2 cups mini-marchmallows Melt margarine and add cocoa; blending well. Add sugar and beat. Add eggs one at a time beating after each. Add flour and vanilla. Mix well. Stir in pecans. Sexual harassment said continuing in workplace

COLLEGE STATION - Sexual harassment continues to be a problem in the workplace even though companies are starting to recognize it as an issue to be dealt with, says a Texas A&M University management

Ramona Paetzold, an assistant professor in the College of Business Administration and Graduate School of Business, has spent six years looking into the areas of sexual harassment, sexual discrimination and the use of statistical evidence in discrimination law. She has published 10 journal articles and a book, "The Statistics of Discrimination," in these fields.

Corporations take a reactionary approach to sexual harassment, she said. The corporate world has responded because it had to respond given the serious problem and the amount of litigation, she said.

Businesses react to the problem by setting up policies and procedures, which don't do anything to treat the causes of sexual harassment that make it easy for harassment to occur, she said.







Heart disease becoming big problem for women

NEW ORLEANS - Heart disease, a problem long thought to be exclusive to men, has quietly grown into a major

health problem for women. Since the beginning of the 20th century, more American women have died of heart disease than from any other cause. Today it is the major cause of death among women, causing almost 500,000 #

deaths each year. The physical and social factors that contribute to this are the topic of a presentation by Texas A&M University Health Professor Danny Ballard entitled 'Women's Health: Gender Issues in Heart Disease.

"Traditionally heart disease has been treated almost exclusively as a man's disease," said Ballard, whose specialization is women's health issues. "Men are much more likely to develop heart disease in their middle-age years, so much of the research has attempted to reduce the heart-related deaths of men that occur during their prime years."

Women, however, tend to develop heart disease 10 to 20 years later than men, usually after menopause. Between ages 45 and 65, one in nine women has a chance of developing heart disease. After age 65 that likelihood increases to one in

Former Deport native is nuts over pecans!

the Midland Reporter-Telegram. Reece is a Deport native, the son of Boyd and Opal Griffin Reese and the nephew of Ruth Griffin Skaggs of Deport.

The feature article is by Ed Todd who says "if you know Boyd Reece, you'd have to agree that he's a real Texas character and is wild about pecans"

The article deals with his "affair" with pecans. He is amazed by them and says that their cyclic resilience and seasonal affirmation of God's creation is wonderful.

He and his wife, Norman, have a 21-acre place called Reece's Pond. Reece loves taking care of 90 plus pecan trees, with 19 varities, including WEsern, Mohawk, Tejas, Burkett, Comanche, Mahan, Podsednick and

a new variety....named Reece. From root stock, there cropped up at Reece's Pond a new seedling variety that won statewide recognition. The Texas Agricultural Extension Service told Reece he could name the new variety and he opted for Reece.

Another pecan variety is named after a Texan, the "Cactus Jack", named after Red River county native who was vice president of the United States from 1933 to 1941.

Nuturing pecan trees is Reece's avocation and winning blue ribbons

Boyd Reece has been featured in at county, regional and state pecan shows has become somewhat of a passion, if not an obsession with him.

Reece said in the article "It's a hobby and I love it and I pursue it. If I playe doglf I'd be a fanatic"

Reece has won at least 100 ribbons, seven pecan-wood plaques and 10 rosettes. Since 1985, when pecan fanciers Morris and Lura Davis got him interested.

In 1997 he won 19 awards, including one for his Champion Native Pecan at the regional show in San

"I'm not bragging, but I did real well...Not I," he corrected himself, "but God and the trees"

reece just took care of the pecan trees and did the work to ensure their health despite weather setbacks, such as the drought and the late freeze.

Reece came to West Texas from Deport in an old Model LA Ford

For his work life, Reece was in the petroleum industry and ended up as a drilling superintendent.

In 1974 he and his wife started planting their pecan grove on two

Showing the pecans "makes you take optimum care of your pecans," Reece said. "I love to see the miracle of nature through the pecan trees. My wife loves to make pecan pies"
