A walk in Highland Cemetery last Saturday with veterans such as James "Pinky" Griffin, Dan Barnard and Charles Foster, proved to be quite satisfying and informative for me.

Our goal was to place a small American Flag on a short wooden mast by the headstone of each veteran, no matter what branch of the military or what conflict they served in. This Memorial Day duty is performed by many civic minded volunteers each year, and most of the volunteers are veterans of this country's military services themselves. It is intended to show honor and respect to all veterans, but especially to those from this area whose final resting place is Highland Cemetery.

As we walked through the sections of the cemetery, looking at our printed maps and locating the numerous names of veterans on the various sized and shaped headstones, something else began to develop. The living veterans so respectfully placing the flags began to share their memories of the person on whose grave they were placing a flag.

"Pinky" Griffin at one time said "I remember old \_\_\_\_\_ \_, he made a landing in his B-17 with his engines all shot up and you wouldn't have thought the thing could have flown at all!'

Dan Barnard exclaimed (at different grave) "I served with this man at Ft.

Someone else would say "I remember him well, we left for the war together" or "Remember the story about it was such a shame. He was a Master Sergeant. He was in on a raid and after the whole battle was over, he and some of his guys were looking through the Japanese Camp for souvenirs when a Japanese soldier who was hiding shot and killed him"

So the morning went, as these veterans not only showed their respect, but for a few moments brought back to life the memories, stories and glories of other veterans who have found their final peace.

As I drove away from the cemetery it was with a new view, a new feeling....not of ghosts, but of treasured memories shared of special people by special people.

And another thought crossed my mind....that it would be a beautiful thing if these living veterans could make that same trip over the grassy graves with some youngsters, perhaps of elementary school age, and share their knowledge with yet another generation. This is not a morbid idea, not ghostly, but instead....history in it's most realistic form

### May 28, 1998 **Tina Williams Cornbread Casserole** 1 pound ground beef 2 cups shredded cheddar

1 can cream style corn 2 pkgs. cornbread mix jalapenos, seasoning salt, chili powder, onion and oregano

Sauté some onion, about 1/2, and oregano in a little bit of butter. Brown beef in same skillet, season with seasoning salt and chili powder. Mix cornbread as directed on pkg. Stir in beef mixture, cheddar. Pour into pan and bake.

### **Mini Meat loaves**

1 pound ground beef 1 pkg. bread crumbs (crackers) 2 c. cheddar cheese 2 small cans tomato sauce worchestershire sauce onion black pepper 2 eggs

Mix together shredded cheddar, 1 egg and enough crackers so it can be molded into 4 or 5-3 inch loaves. Set aside in pan. Mix together ground beef, crackers, 1 can of tomato sauce and other ingredients. Mold around cheddar loaves. Bake about 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Remove, cover with tomato sauce and bake 20 more minutes.

**Scalloped Potatoes** 5 or 6 medium potatoes 1 can mushroom soup 1 cup cheddar cheese onion oregano salt and pepper

Slice potatoes flat, enough to cover casserole pan. Sauté onions, oregano in butter. Mix together soup and other ingredients including onion and oregano. Pour over potatoes, cover with foil. Bake at 350 degrees, 30 minutes; remove foil, sprinkle with shredded cheddar. Bake 10 minutes more.
