We are, as most of you know, in the midst of one of the worst heat waves and droughts in recent history.

Whether you are involved in agriculture or not, this is going to effect you.

Have you seen the poor farmers baling their soy beans, trying to salvage something from the expenses they incurred in planting a crop that has produced nothing? Have you seen the long lines of cattle trailers at the sale barns as ranchers have to sell cattle at low prices because they are out of grass? Have you seen the hay meadows with half (or less) production? How about the scorched corn and headless milo and cotton in need of a rain? Have you noticed the truck farmers, vegetable and fruit growers, the plant nurseries and turf producers struggling to deal with this terrible situation?

If you live anywhere in the rural area of this part of Texas, it's a common sight.

And what does this mean to you as a consumer?

The first thing most people think of is "wow, I'll bet my food costs go up!" That's the least of it.

When farmers don't make crops they must reduce spending. They don't spend nearly the money on equipment, chemicals, vehicles, new housing, clothing, virtually anything that they usually do. They cut back on labor, and those employees have less money to spend too. And the equipment dealers, the chemical companies, anyone in Agri-Business has less money coming in, so they and their employees have less to spend too.

With less money being pumped into the area economy local businesses suffer. Some will have to raise their prices. Some will find this the "last straw" and go out of business.

Suffering businesses cut back on their operating expenses, and so on and so on.

All of this means less sales taxes, less money flowing in our local economy.

It's easy to say "well, but the price of hay (or milo or soy beans or whatever) is way up". It doesn't come near compensating for the scarcity of it.

One would think that with cattle cheap beef prices at the store would drop...it won't happen, because the major portion of your food bill goes to the middleman anyway!

So, while many of us suffer from the heat, suffer from the drought, we may not consider that it effects each and every one of us...it gets into our pocketbooks most obviously, but into our mental attitude, and even our hearts as we watch things slowly dying in the heat and drought. Hope for rain, even though it is too late for this year's crops. Because if it continues, the grass will be damaged, and the pools will be dangerously low, and this economic and emotional stress will continue into the years to come! And always remember, things like this effect each and every one of us, not just a few, because the consequences spread out like ripples from a thrown stone...or should I say dust in the wind?

Local Postmaster writes book on money orders!

Deport's Joe Thompson simplifies new machine instructions

Postmaster Joe Thompson has written the book on money order machines...literally! When the manual issued by the U.S. Postal Service wasn't as clear as beginning users would have liked instead of fretting about it Joe sat down with machine and manual and wrote a clean manual that anyone could use!

To begin at the beginning of this story, Joe Thompson is a long-time native of Deport, and has been Postmaster for the Deport Post Office for a little over four years now.

The Dallas District for the USPS was chosen as a test area for the new E-Mod (Electronic Money Order Dispenser) back in 1997. Only in this district were post offices of Level 13 or under (in other words, smaller offices) given the new computerized machine to test.

Joe is a trainer, this means that he travels around training people as Postmasters, machine operators or whatever kind of training they need.

But as time approached for him to go out into the field and train people on the use of the new money order machine he had one problem...his machine hadn't arrived! All the other trainers got theirs promptly, but his was missing. Finally he got part of the machine, but not all of it. When he finally did receive his manuals, and his full machine he discovered he had a little problem with the manuals being too technical. So, he boot-

ed up his computer and "out of self-preservation" sat down and began step by step to write an instruction manual that would be completely simple and would tell the operator exactly every step from the time they take the money orders out of the safe to the time they shut down for the day and put them back into the safe. He even went into trouble shooting and the reports that needed to be run...even what to do with each copy of a report. Many a troubled computer operator would kill for the chance to have a manual so carefully and clearly written!

He wrote this book, in order to make life easier for him, but of course it soon became the "hottest" thing going as more and more post office employees wanted copies of it.

The "Red Book" is now the unofficial manual of choice for everyone in the Dallas District.

In addition to this there were some printer problems with the new machine, and soon Joe had been put in touch with the CEO of the manufacturing company in California who had built the machine.

Before he knew it Joe found himself on a plane to Washington D.C., where he met with higher ups in the Post Master General's organization.

He and the Financial System Coordinator Janice Harris in Coppell, and Patti Robinson, Manager of Finance of the Dallas District met Rita Crawford in Washington and they set

up a FAT test. Fat Test? Yes, the prototype money order machine was subjected to an all day test of its abilities. After being satisfied with the machine's performance the go-ahead was given to install new computer chips into the printers so that they can operate smoothly.

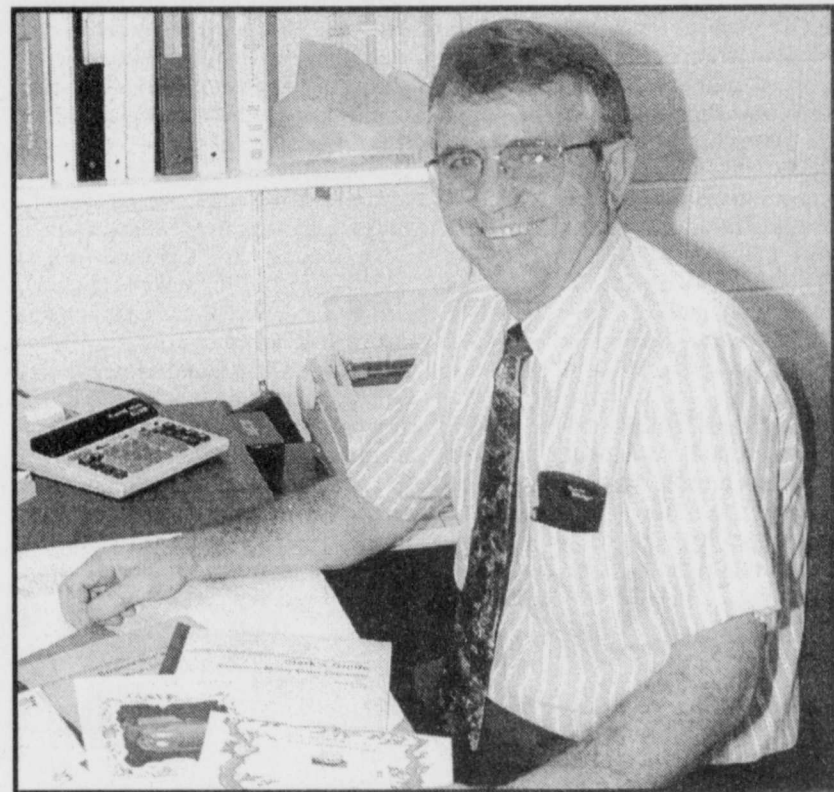
The trip to Washington was exhausting and strictly business, on one evening they received a very quick "drive around" tour of some of the major monuments but that was about it. The next day they checked out of the hotel and carried their bags to the post office headquarters so that they could leave for Texas directly from work.

Joe was welcomed back to Texas by his wife, Sharyl and daughter Anna. The family lives in Pattonville.

There is no extra pay for writing this manual, no extra pay for being a trainer.

When asked why he does it he grins and says "well, to help other people out. I've needed help before and had someone help me, everyone needs that. Besides, there's a real satisfaction to helping others".

He smiles happily as he displays a stack of birthday cards and thank you cards, each of which expresses gratitude from other postal employees who have found their lives made simpler and their service to the public better because one man took the time to write a manual for the ordinary person!

It can't have happened on a local level because they were mailed from different post offices! It has to have happened at a distribution point (where we seem to have frequent delayed delivery problems too).

It's a strange happening, and nothing like it has ever occurred on such a large scale before.

As I said last week, hang on, the Post Office has formed a committee to study the problems that periodical class mailing is experiencing. Hopefully, things will get better. For now, all we can assure our readers of is that we mail on Wednesday night, every week, without fail. We bag, bundle and tag to the best of our ability, and we hope for the best. Beyond that, it is out of our hands and in the hands of the United States Postal Service.

Countdown begins at FBC

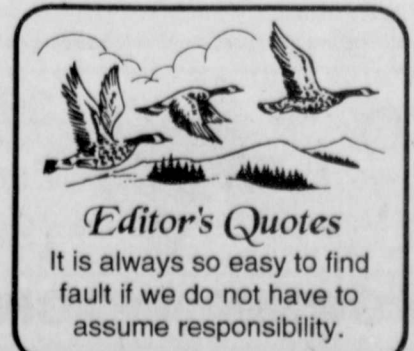
The countdown has started. StarQuest is preparing for liftoff.

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Country Cooking

Too hot to cook on these hot, hot days! These recipes are summer standards and great for picnics. They go well with both cold and grilled meats and can also make a meal by themselves. Can be readily packed for the road and actually improve flavor after standing for several hours. Be sure to follow directions for refrigeration of these recipes, due to the heat.

Our recipes this week are for popular summer salads. Most can now be purchased in deli cases at your local supermarket, but of course are better homemade. You have a choice of fresher ingredients, no preservatives and just the right combination of added spices and seasonings that your family prefers. Also saves money in the long run, by making yourself.

Caponata - this recipe is loaded with vegetables and lots of spices for a tasty dish.

Macaroni Salad - a wide variety of these salads can now be found in deli cases in most stores. They can be changed by adding different meats, veggies and other goodies! Resist the temptation to dump in bottled dressings. . . take the time to mix up

your own oil and vinegar for the best taste.

Fruit Salad - keep fruit in bite-sized pieces and not into a slush. Keep in fridge for a pick-me-up during the day or after a meal for a light dessert. If your fruit is not ripe when you buy it, place in a brown paper bag for a couple of days to help to ripen.

Potato Salad - there are many delicious ways to prepare this salad. This one uses hard boiled eggs and avoid overcooking the potatoes. Marinating the potatoes in oil and vinegar while they are still warm makes all the difference in flavor and use a good quality of mayonnaise.

Cole Slaw - again another variety of favorite ways to prepare this dish. . . everyone has their own recipe. . . added ingredient to make it special. . . celery seed. Shred your cabbage and carrot with a knife, a box grater or food processor, depending on the texture you prefer. Don't drown in dressing and keep it chilled for best flavor!

Three-Bean Salad - you either like this salad or not! Keeps well in fridge. Instead of parsley, try dill and top with crumbled cheese and chopped walnuts.

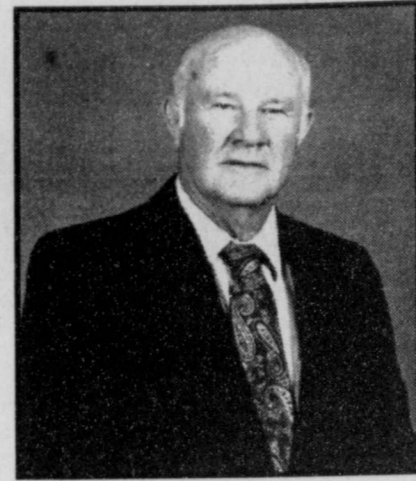

TNMP receives approval on plan for competition

The Public Utility Commission of Texas granted approval of Texas-New Mexico Power Company's proposed transition plan. This voluntary plan is the first that will result in competition in Texas. As a result of this approval, all of the company's Texas residential and commercial customers will receive refunds retroactive to January 1, 1998.

TNMP's plan includes residential rate reductions totaling 9% during the five year transition period. A 3% reduction will be effective immediately upon the signing of the final order, which will provide refunds of the company's Texas customers back to January, 1998. Commercial rates will be reduced by one percent over the same period. Customers will receive similar reductions in January 2000 and January 2001.

Other elements of the transition

plan include:

A five year transition period. In 2002, TNMP will formally request the implementation of the customer choice program and specify how any remaining straddle costs could be recovered.

Earnings capped at an 11.25% return. Excess earnings generally will be shared between customer refunds and stranded cost recovery.

Recovery of straddle costs related to the company's investment in its lignite-fueled power plant.

A reasonable cap on Operations and Maintenance expenses.

Provisions for a pilot program, for which a schedule is being drafted.

The PUC is expected to issue a written order in approximately three to six weeks, which will have an effective date of July 22, 1998.
