Don't pass over this editorial as just another "our volunteer fire departments deserve appreciation" statement. That isn't what it is. Of course, they do deserve appreciation, but this time I want to talk about something else. Please keep reading until you reach my point.

Something has come to my attention, and I am going to endeavor to help correct it, and urge other people to do so too.

Volunteer fire fighters, especially now when they are called out for every medical emergency that is called in through 911, spend an incredible amount of their personal time being a volunteer. They spend hours and hours in training, attending schools and in meetings being prepared for emergencies and learning the best way to fight various types of fires, from a simple grass fire to a hazardous chemical incident on a highway. They take medical training and wear beepers 24 hours a day.

That is only the beginning, for the amount of time that they spend under difficult conditions mounts up into the hundreds and even thousands of hours rather quickly. Contrary to what some people may think, most of them don't enjoy this! Instead, they do it out of a sense of pride in the community, a sense of civic duty and a very real desire to help others.

Then, after donating all of these hours of time, hard work and dedication what are they asked to do? Raise their own money! Wait a moment now ... why do the people protecting us have to do their own fund-raising for new trucks, equipment, bunker gear, defib machines and medical equipment? Isn't there something a little wrong with this picture?

When I mentioned this to a fireman the other day he said "well, it's just always been that way". Just because it's always been that way doesn't mean it always has to be that way. I am not alone in feeling that if these people can go to wrecks, perform CPR, fight fires from raging grass fires to tragic house fires for hours, get up in the middle of the night to come help us in virtually ANY crisis they shouldn't have to raise the money that allows them to do so! They do their part, and it is time for us to begin doing ours. Of course, there are always dedicated people who attend any fund raiser, donate liberally at auctions, and assist the fire departments dependably. Without them it would not be long before volunteer fire departments could not operate. The funds that come from the counties and cities are not large enough to purchase all that is needed.

Here in Deport I am beginning efforts to form an auxiliary to the Volunteer Fire Department. It is NOT a women's auxiliary made up of firemen's wives, but a group of people (both men and women) who are going to try and expand fund raising efforts while at the same time taking some of the burden of fund raising off of those volunteers who are already doing more than their share. I understand that some departments already have these type of organizations, and want to extend my congratulations to them for doing something that really needs doing.

Now I want to urge every citizen to consider what the volunteer fire departments in their area do for them ... how they serve us all. That doesn't even go in to the fact that they save all us with insurance policies quite a bit of money every year by providing their protection free of charge. Then, think what YOU can do to help. Form an auxiliary and help them raise money with suppers and drawings and competitions. Give what you can, time, money or support. If you are already doing so, feel good about it. If you aren't, please begin to. Because somehow, I just can't believe that we are selfish enough to actually ask these people to raise the money when they are already doing all the work!


## Bogata woman listed as missing Lucy Burruss, of 4th South West "She is a white female, age 32, about

All plants must be entered Monday morning, August 25 between 8:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m.


National Council Accredited Flower Show judges will do closed judging.



# Gardeners graduate

The Texas Master Gardener program has just graduated 14 individuals from Franklin, Morris, Titus and Woods counties. This program is designed to train volunteers to assist the county extension agents with plant related problems in their counties. While this program has been offered for over 10 years in Dallas, this is the first time it has been offered in the area.

To become a Texas Master Gardener this group went back to school and had ten days of intense training over a ten week period. Although many in this group were already a self-made master gardener they now have the official Texas Master Gardener diploma to prove it.

They were taught about all the latest research being done at Texas A&M university on what plants need in the way of soil, light and air requirements. They learned about the newest varieties of vegetables, fruit trees, plant an turf grasses that not only survived but thrived in the East Texas test plots. They also learned when and why to use insecticides, fungicides and mildicides. The one thing none of them had to be taught was the love of plants.

If you need help with your plants or have questions about them, you may reach the master gardeners through your county extension office.



# 1940 story features John Nance Garner as presidential hopeful

Polly Sherling of Denton sent an article from the Ft. Worth Star Telegram dated Sunday, February 25, 1940. It was found among her grandmMinnie Norris Lyle of Detroit's keepsakes.

She copied the article thinking (correctly) that it would be of interest to area readers.

The article featured a huge layout of photographs, some of which we have tried to reproduce here with some success.

The article was written by Robert E. Hicks.

It was titled "Garner's town eyes campaign".

The possibility that one of its native sons may become the nation's thirty-third President so far has not noticeably disturbed the peaceful teno of this Red River County town of 1,200.

It was in a log cabin near here that Vice President John Nance Garner was born Nov. 22, 1868. What purports to be the building inwhich the event occurred is still standing in a section of the county known as Blossom Prairie, not far from the dividing line between Red River and Lamar Counties.

Situation about six miles south and west of Detroit, the cabin has not yet become a mecca for tourists. Four miles of the road are about like they must have been when Garner left these parts nearly 50 years ago. Only the most hardy sight-seers brave its bumps and ruts and then only in dry weather. After a heavy rain the road is all but impassable in an automobile.

More accessible and usually pointed to as the Garner home is the spacious two-story house near the business district of Detroit, where the Vice Presidnet lived for a time before moving to Clarksville to begin practicising law.

The house is still owned by the Garner family and is occupied by the Vice President's sister, Maud Blair.

Garner's father bought this house when John was about 16. Mrs. Blair said "It was here that their father and

mother died" the father about 20 years ago, the mother in 1932, six weeks before her son's election to the Vice

Presidency.

They an other members of the family are buried in a massive brick vault in the Detroit cemetery. The vault bears evidence of having been built many years ago, but there are no external markings to indicate that it is the final resting place of the parents of one of the states most distinguished sons.

Another sister. Mrs. John R. Wright, wife of a retired hardware merchant and a brother, Jess Garner, a farmer and trader, also live in Detroit.

Mrs. Wright has been dangerously ill lately, and is not yet sufficiently recovered to receive callers.

Jess Garner permitted us to interrupt his domino game in the back end of a store long enough to take his picture but he had no time for talking politics.

Mrs. Blair said she hadn't given the possibility of her brother being elected President much thought.

"I would like to see him get it if he wants it" she said, adding "and I guess he wants it or he wouldn't have come out".

All of the old-timers around Detroit remember Garner as a young man, but they're too accustomed to seeing him climb the ladder of fame to get unduly excited over ht epossibility of his stepping up another rung, even though that step would land him in the White House.

His bid for the nomination, however, and politics in general are giving the town plenty of conversational material this Winter. Five snows since Christmas and prolonged seiges of cold weather have made the big wood stoves in the Rear of the stores and cafes more than usually inviting. And it isn't long after two or more meet at the heater before the talk turns to politics.

W.E. Bledsoe, who has known Garner all his life, said there is no doubt his abilitiy to handle the job

properly, if he is elected.

"This town's mighty proud of him" he declared.

J.A. Robinson, another old friend is optimistic abouthte Garner candidacy.

"He's never started anything yet that he didn't finish"." he declares. As for Garner's qualifications for th epost Robinson said "he'd make a good one, and I'd like to get a chance to vote for him for President".

Around the stove at the W.T. Norris store, Thomas Crittenden and George M. Sharp were discussing not only Garner's chances of landing the Democratic nomination, but the caliber of the Texas leadership in Congress at this time.

It's the first time Texas has ever had the honor of having the No. 1 man in both the House and the Senate at the same time." Crittenden pointed out, referring to Sam Rayburn of Bonham, majority leader in the House and Garner, presiding officer of the Senate.

Sharp acquiesced and added that

the district was fortunate in having such men as Senators Sheppard and Connally and Congressman Patman to represent it in Congress.


C.D. Bourne, Jr., attorney and representative of Red River County in the Forty-third and Forty-fourth sessions of the Legislature said nearly everybody in Detroit is watching with keen interst the political developments from day to day and carefully weighing the significance of every move made.

Postmaster General FArley's entrance into the Massachusetts primary was interpreted here as almost conclusvie proof that President Rooevelt will not be a candidate for a third term. It also gave rise to speculation over the possibility of a Garner-Farley ticket being nominated at

the Chicago convention. As we know, Garner did not receive the nomination, and FDR went on to serve once again. We really appreciate Polly for sendin us this fascinating article.



Three portable buildings have been constructed at the high school campus to provide needed space for additional classrooms.




Some repair work is being done on the 29 year old High School gym roof. The Board is considering the feasibility and cost of covering the main building and gym at the High school campus with a metal roof.

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

### Chilling method may make eating raw oysters safer

GALVESTON - As recent outbreaks of illness from Galveston Bay area oysters show, eating raw shellfish during the summertime can be risky. A new method to rapidly chill oysters after harvesting may greatly reduce this risk, said Dr. John Schwarz of Texas A&M University at Galveston.

The Food and Drug Administration requires harvesters to store oysters at 45 degrees Fahrenheit or below, but oysters placed in cold storage may take hours to reach this temperature, allowing bacteria to continue to reproduce.

Schwarz found that chilling oysters in an icewater slush for 15 minutes before storing eliminates as much as 90 plus percent of Vibrio vulnificus bacteria, which can cause illness or death among those with poor immune systems, liver disease or diabetes.

"It's just rapidly cooling them as opposed to letting them slowly cool," Schwarz said. "It's not a process that should have to go through regulation."

No studies have been completed on how rapid chilling affects Vibrio parahaemolyticus - the recent cause of illness among those eating Galveston Bay oysters.



### Understanding El Nino helps predict climate changes

**COLLEGE STATION - Scientists** cannot control a phenomenon as vast and powerful as El Nino, but being able to predict its occurrence would enable people to prepare for the erratic climate conditions it brings, said a Texas A&M University researcher.

El Nino, a warming in the tropical Pacific, can cause heavy rainfall and occasional flooding, often followed by drought. In some countries, such as Peru, farmers deal with these seasonal variations by planting crops that can withstand heavy moisture during the El Nino season and crops requiring drier climates during the drought months. But because El Nino is difficult to predict, this can be a game of Russian roulette. Guessing incorrectly can lead to heavy crop damage or loss.

Dr. Benjamin Giese, an assistant professor of oceanography at Texas A&M, is studying how El Ninos have changed over time in an effort to understand the processes that control them. This may someday help scientists to predict El Nino events, Giese said.


