Deport has added new business, changes recently

Nothing ever changes in a small town like Deport...right? Wrong. Many changes have occurred in Deport this past year, and all to the good of the community.

One of the earliest changes this year has been the restoration of the old bank building at the south end of main street. Empty and decaying for many years, it has been completely restored and painted until it is an asset to the street. It is owned by Mike Francies.

It houses an antiques and collectibles business, and is being remodeled to contain an upstairs apartment

The old car wash and laundry, long virtually unusable, has been purchased by David Rozell. The carwash has been completely redone, and is now known as Deport Super Clean. It now has plenty of hot, soapy water and lots of pressure and both bays are in proper operating order. The laundry is also clean and functional, and more repairs are planned for it soon.

Wood Funeral Home, located on Monroe Street in Deport, is currently undergoing a complete remodeling, and will better able to serve the community after it's facelift.

They also purchased the building that formerly housed Lisa's Beauty Shop and will be converting it into a show room for their customers. There is even the possibility that the building formerly occupied by cabinet shop will house a counter top manufacturing facility. Lisa's Beauty Shop has moved to what was essentially an empty building next to Relics, the antique shop. A

facelift is planned for that shop in the near future. The Deport American Legion Post is expanding their facilities with the addition of a roofed pavilion in their park. It will soon be available for use by families renting the Legion Hall for reunions, for picnics and just to sit

under and catch a breeze for a few moments. Allen's Food Mart has had new front doors added, new fuel tanks, a paved parking lot and a new paint job done

in order to better serve customers. Blackland Prairie Gin, in the abscence of much cotton to store in their warehouse, has used their initiative and added a covered loading dock and is storing Campbell's Soup Products.

All of these improvements are welcomed. New businesses, paying taxes and bringing people to town are vital to the survival of a small community.


explained crease will bring \$127,000 to the district.


A tax increase is never welcomed. It is never something that Board wishes to do. However, educational mandates must be met and the only

Two charged in murder of man dumped in creek

Two Blossom men have been charged in the murder of Donald Ray Sanford, whose body was found in a creek on FM 194 Sunday morning, August 23. Sheriff B.J. McCoy said. Wednesday morning, August 26 that Joshua Garrison, age 18, and Bradley McClour, age 20 were arrested at approximately 4:30 a.m. Tuesday, August 25 at their homes, Garrison on Bois D' Arc Street in Blossom and McClour on Moore Street in Blos-

"They have been charged with murder at this point, but there is a possibility that the charges will be capital murder by the time it goes to the Grand Jury", McCoy stated.

Donald Ray Sanford, age 38, of Sugar Hill Road in Reno, was found floating in a creek by an eighteen year old Sunday morning, August 23.

According to Sheriff McCoy Sanford's light greyish-silver 1997 Toyata 4-Runner was spotted in woods near the old Blossom tool factory Saturday morning. Upon receiving the call about the vehicle the Lamar County Sheriffs Department began trying to locate the owner. They contacted Sanford's wife, who reported that he had left the house

Friday night and not been seen since. 'We still have a lot of investigation to do in this matter and more leads to follow, but it appears he may have been beaten and/or run over and perhaps drowned" McCoy said Wednesday.

'We have received a lot of media help and a lot of help from the public in this investigation and it has been of great assistance" McCoy said.

Volunteer Firemen use Maltese Cross as symbol In 1530, the island of Malta was given to the courageous knights. The symbol on their flag, the eight-point cross, became known as the "Maltese Cross." The cross, which had originally helped the knights distinguish between friend and foe, became the ultimate symbol of heroism and service. The cross, which is considered sacred, represents the principles of charity, loyalty, chivalry, gallantry, generosity to friend and foe, protection of weak and dexterity in service.

Today, firefighters wear the Maltese Cross to symbolize their willingness to risk their lives to save others from the ravages of fire.



Grandparents have rights provided by law Acetaminophen may help protect against

no rights under the law when it came to seeing their grandchildren after a divorce or the death of one parent. The law spoke of the rights and obligations of parents, children and other interested parties. Grandparents, however, were not even considered. That has changed. State family laws now make specific reference to grandparents' rights of access to their grand-

The Office of the Attorney General is prohibited by law from offering legal advice to private individuals. However, it can offer some basic information on grandparent visitation rights, including where to go for legal assistance.

Grandparents can play a vital and important role in the lives of their grandchildren. Spending time with grandparents may be especially important to a child who has lost a parent. Grandparents can provide love and a sense of family. Additionally, they can provide much needed support to a single parent trying to raise children on his or her own.

Sometimes when parents divorce or separate, the parent granted custody does not want the child to see the relatives of the non-custodial parent. This situation also arises when one

promptly.

cuts off ties with the family of the deceased spouse. Grandparents can be caught in the middle and denied access to their grandchildren.

State law now provides a vehicle by which grandparents can establish their right to visit their grandchil-

Who determines the right to see grandchildren? If the custodial or surviving parent does not want such visits to occur, only the courts are allowed to decide that issue. The law says that the courts can determine when grandchildren can be visited and if access to grandparents is in the best interest of the child.

The right to visit a grandchild is not automatic. If you are a grandparent and are denied access, you must sue the custodial parent in order to establish your visitation rights. The family law court will then determine if it is in the best interest of the child

Do grandparents always have the right to visit grandchildren? Not always. As a grandparent, you may lose your right to visit your grandchild if the child has been put up for adoption. For example, if the child is to be adopted by someone other than a family member, you may lose visi-

The Citizens' Assistance Center and Child Support Divisions of the Office of the Attorney General frequently receive questions on this topic from concerned grandparents. Having a student of a particular culture become the expert after a class reads aloud children's literature portraying life in that culture nurtures students' understanding and respect for other cultures, says Julia Geist Drew of Texas A&M University's English Language Institute (ELI). She says this reading activity is especially valuable for students from other countries studying English as a Second Language

"What helps the student most of all is that he or she takes the floor and answers questions about his or her culture," she said. "The person shares another culture and language with classmates and builds self-confidence in his or her own Englishspeaking ability.

changes leading to hardening of arteries

New research suggests that acetaminophen, a widely used pain reliever, may help protect the blood from changes leading to hardening of the arteries - - a condition that contributes to hundreds of thousands of deaths per year from stroke, heart attack and other forms of cardiovas-

Dr. Addison A Taylor, professor of medicine and pharmacology at the Center for Experimental Therapeutics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, presented the findings at today's session of the Thirteenth IUPHAR Congress of Pharmacology in Munich.

Taylor reported findings in 12 healthy human volunteers, suggesting an association between the use of acetaminophen at recommended doses and a significant inhibition of the oxidation of certain low-density lipoproteins which carry the form of cholesterol commonly described as "bad cholesterol.

The oxidation of cholesterol-containing, low density lipoproteins is one of the main processes involved in the formation of arterial plaque, which accumulates in the walls of blood vessels and contributes to hardening of the arteries, or atherosclerotic disease," explained Taylor.

While further study is required to make any definitive association between acetaminophen and a protective effect in patients at risk of cardiovascular disease, what we observed is promising and may suggest

a potential clinical role for acetaminophen as an antioxidant," said Tay-

Antioxidants are substances that counteract the damaging effects of oxygen in tissues. Vitamin E, which is among the more commonly known antioxidant agents, is believed to provide protection against certain forms of cancer, cardiovascular disease and other conditions.

The study conducted by Baylor and his associates was a randomized, blinded, placebo-controlled trial involving the administration of eight doses of acetaminophen (1,000 mg doses every six hours). Plasma samples from patients who received acetaminophen were then compared with those from patients who received no treatment.

Taylor noted that the results of this study support those reported by other investigators.

Although our research was the first to examine the effects of acetaminophen on low density lipoproteins in humans, other investigators have reported similar findings in laboratory settings," said Taylor. "The next step will be to confirm these findings in larger studies, both in animals and in humans."

Atherosclerosis is a major contributor to coronary heart disease and stroke. Coronary heart disease is the country's number one killer of both men and women, while stroke claims an estimated 150,000 U.S. lives each






