
Sales of tickets on a Remington .22 rifle will begin that night. A \$1 donation could result in winning the rifle. May 1 the rifle will be given away in a drawing.

Peanut Butter Ham Squares-Serve very hot on toothpicks for a savory appetizer!


Peanut Loaf-A main dish rice loaf that can be served with a celery soup sauce.
