taking pleasure in sharing time with their children. Only last week I saw a young man seated on the ground next to his little girl, who couldn't have been much over 5 years old. They sat by their mail box out in the country, talking happily while she waited for the school bus. I thought that made a neat picture, and wished for a camera. But there are some things parents shouldn't share with their children.

Saturday evening Thomas and I went to Paris. Just outside of town there was a young man on an open tractor running a shredder. He was operating the machine with one hand and in the other arm he clutched a baby. Yes, a baby. Perhaps this child was a year old, but probably not more than that.

We both were very upset. My first thought was "My God, doesn't he LOVE his child?"

One bump, one wiggle from the baby, one moment of inattention and that child would have fallen onto the PTO shaft, under the shredder or under the wheels of that tractor.

But, obviously, this man does love his child very much. He wants to spend time with him, to make him happy, to share in his growing up. This is not the way to do it though.

I know the man is self-assured. He really doesn't think anything could make him let that child come to harm. But he is wrong. There are way too many accidents of that nature every year, most of them fatal.

We spoke with a highway patrolman after seeing this and learned something rather mind boggling.

Because that tractor and shredder are "implements of

Tornados inflict heavy damage, kill one

Deadly tornados swept through managing the crisis. the area Tuesday, May 4, killing one woman and destroying a number of houses.

It was a day of tension and fear as storm spotters from all area volunteer fire departments were activated high winds, heavy rains and lightning hid rotation in clouds.

Bridges Chapel, located between Talco and Mt. Pleasant received the heaviest damage, and an elderly woman was killed there in her home. After the tornado swept through, there was little sign that a home had ever existed. A number of head of cattle were killed in the storm.

A funnel cloud was spotted over the Paris area, which proceeded towards Blossom. Wind damage is reported there, but the funnel apparently never touched down.

Significant damage was reported south of Avery and there was serious damage in DeKalb.

Schools put their children in places of safety, as did nursing homes. Many people sought shelter. Often people emerged from shelter to have to return within and hour or two, as the storms just kept sweeping through the area.

husbandry" in other words, farm implements, there is no law that says children cannot ride on an open tractor, no matter what it is doing.

Well, I think there should be a law against it! I've driven too many tractors not to know how a hidden hole or ditch can hurl a driver around, much less a rider.

I've seen what happens to things that go under the blades of a shredder, hay mower, baler or implement is behind a tractor.

One of the most pitiful letters I ever read was in Progressive Farmer magazine. It was from a dad whose 8 year old had begged and begged to ride the tractor while he mowed the field next to the house. He refused on grounds that it was dangerous. When he was through mowing he shut the shredder down and allowed the child to jump onto the tractor for the short ride back to the house. They hit a small bump and the boy was gone, the wheel crushed him.

People, think about what you are doing when you let anyone ride on an open tractor with you. It just isn't the place for infants, children or adults. And the momentary pleasure that comes from sharing things together can be shattered forever in a tragic accident that is horrible beyond belief.



Happy Mother's Day! Mother's Day is this Sunday, May 8 and is always the second Sunday in May. Area churches have special services for the mothers of the congregation and make a special point of honoring them with carnations. Many people follow the custom by wearing a white carnation if their mother has passed away and wearing a colored one if they are still living.

This day for honoring mothers began being observed many years ago in England. It was called Mothering Sunday and came in mid-Lent. Yugoslavs and people in other nations have observed similar days. Julia Ward Howe made the first known suggestion for a Mother's Day in the United States in 1872. She suggested that people observe a Mother's Day on June 2 as a day dedicated to peace. For several years, she held an annual Mother's Day meeting in Boston. Mary Towles Sasseen, a Kentucky schoolteacher, started conducting Mother's Day cel-ebrations in 1887. Frank E. Hering of South Bend, Indiana, launched a campaign for the observance of Mother's Day in 1904.

Three years later, Anna Jarvis of Grafton, West Virginia and Philadelphia, began a campaign for a nationwide observance of Mother's Day. She chose the second Sunday in May and began the custom of wearing a carnation. On May 10, 1908, churches in Grafton and Philadelphia held Mother's Day celebrations. The service at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton honored the memory of Ms. Jarvis' own mother, Mrs. Anna Reeves Jarvis.

At the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Minneapolis, Minnesota in 1912, a delegate from St. Andrews Church introduced a resolution recognizing Anna Jarvis as the founder of Mother's

Day. Mother's Day received national recognition on May 9, 1914. On that day, President Woodrow Wilson signed a joint resolution of Congress recommending that Congress and the executive departments of the federal government observe Mother's Day. The next year, President Wilson was authorized to proclaim Mother's Day an annual national observance.

Prairiland Patriot yearbook largest in county

The springtime season brings to mind the end of school, prom's reunions, planning summer activities, graduation and of course yearbook signings for the area students! This is a time where students gather to write down their special thoughts about their best friend and vow to stay in touch after everyone graduates. Have you ever taken the time to stop and think about how much time and energy goes into one of these yearbooks?

The Prairiland Patriot yearbook is the largest student publication in Lamar County. At 580 copies ordered and 240 pages, it outstrips even the annuals of the largest districts. It includes all classes in Prairiland ISD from kindergarten through seniors. The students who compose this book have a great task before them each August when they return to school and they perform it with skill, creativity and commitment. The following just gives you an idea of what is involved in producing the yearbook.

Each April, high school students apply for the journalism staff. Those who are selected are warned that they will work hard and steadily through the entire school year. The 1998-99 staff includes: Shasta Riley and Robert Sawyer-co-editors; Ashley Rhodes-business manager; Ashley Ball, Emily Burchinal, Justin Bounds,



Before the school year even begins, students head out to destinations all over the county to sell ads. Since this year's budget, with the cost of the actual publishing and production costs like equipment, film and developing, is almost \$20,000, the students must sell about 150 advertisements to make up the cost of the book. The ads help to defray the \$35 per book cost so that students this year only pay \$25 in the fall and \$30 in the spring. This year, the staff was surprised with a \$5,000 check from Heartland Cable as a donation for the organization's hard work.

The first big task during the year beside the ad sale is training. Students learn computer desktop publishing and word processing, photography, page composition and news writing. Then the staff, editors and sponsor work together to plant the layout for the book. They decide where each section will be placed and how many pages are needed for a section. Also at this initial stage, the staff selects the cover. For the last few years, the cover has been elaborate and therefore more expensive than in the past.

Each student is assigned a section of the book. One will take Blossom, another Deport, another high school sports and another academics. There are 12 sections of the annual. Those responsible for each section plan what order the pages for organizations, sports teams or classes will take, and then they plan each page, deciding how to lay out headlines, text, pictures and art.

After the pages are planned, staffers know how many and what type of pictures will go on each page. There ids quite a variety of types of pictures in the book, including; senior pictures, "mug shots" of students in all classes, candids taken around school, in-class pictures for academics, high school and elementary organizations and favorite and election snaps. Staffers travel to Blossom and Deport, go to sports events and make a trip to an interesting site to take high school favorite pictures each year. In all, more than 1,700 pictures go into the annual, most of them taken by the staff.

After all pictures are taken and developed, students compose each page. Some pages are taken from templates provided by the company, but for most, boxes must be drawn for headlines, text, captions, pictures and art. Mush of the text, headlines and art is desktop published by students on computers, printed and cropped for it's place on the page. This task is very tedious, but staffers are rewarded when they see each page they composed in it's final form.

Before it goes to the publisher, however, each page is checked by the student in charge of the section, the

editor, the composer of the index and the sponsor. This quality control measure helps to reduce the number of errors in the book.

The Patriot yearbook has five deadlines. The first was November 6 and the all was February 19. These are the most stressful part of yearbook compostion, since the publisher has to have our pages on time in order to produce a book by the date we need it in the spring. On the week of deadline, there is frantic activity in the yearbook room with everybody scrambling for last minute pictures and anxiously waiting in line to use computers. Staffers always breathe a great sigh of relief when the last page is packaged and labeled for shipping.

After pages are sent to the publisher, the yearbook staff waits impatiently for proofs to return from the company. Proofs are pages of the book with all elements placed and ready for production. Students and sponsor carefully check and correct proofs so that pages will be as perfect as possible. Usually, proofs must be returned to the publisher within 48 hours.

Most schools simply call students to the office to pick up their yearbooks when they are delivered, but Prairiland has a big assembly for the occasion. When the books come in, staffers separate them by campus and deliver the number ordered to Blossom and Deport. The books reserved for the high school are placed in four corners of the gym. All of the students, former students and people from the community come and the staff unveils the cover, (a closely guarded secret until the assembly)
