New Council attends to business

A newly elected Deport City Council attended to business Monday night during a regular meeting.

Mayor Foster swore in Nancy Gresham, Carlys Denison and Mike Francies to serve two year terms.

Foster advised the council that the city has some major steps ahead to deal with in the upcoming year.

After the votes from the May 1 election were canvassed, the results were: Mike Francies, 45 votes; Carlys Denison, 61 votes; Nancy Gresham, 63 votes; Eric Pearson, 36 votes.

After the minutes and financial reports were read and approved and all bills paid, the council moved into taking care of business.

Bill Hayter of Hayter Engineering,

Inc. discussed the need for the city to retain a financial advisor to help apply for a low interest loan from the state to install new water lines and new fire hydrants in the city.

The council is considering a \$250,000 loan from the state at an interest rate of 4.18% with a 20-year payback. The council unanimously agreed to grant Hayter Engineering permission to proceed with action to retain a financial advisor and apply for the loan.

No action was taken on the Fireman's Pension Review Board.

In Executive Session, the council hired Charles Reavis of Deport as an assistant to the Superintendent in the Sewer Department.

Prairiland Board installs new board members

The Prairiland ISD School Board accepted the canvas of votes and administered the oath of office to newly elected board members on May 6. Johnny Patterson was elected as President of the Board. Clyde Bankhead was elected as Vice Present and Chet Downs as Secretary.

They heard a request for Project Graduation from Sherry Blanton.

The financial statements were approved and they approved the tax report. They took no action on paying bills and there were no budget amendments.

They approved a contract for services provided by Region VIII ESC.

They discussed curriculum changes with Principal Ronnie Baker and heard from Roy Gwinn concerning school health insurance.

They took no action but discussed Student Handbook changes.

They approved three year student insurance proposal and went into executive session at 9:00 p.m. They came out by 10:15 p.m.

They accepted the resignation of Cherie Murdock.

They approved coaching assignments and stipends.

Taxes lowered on some homes in Deport area

Tax statements from the Lamar County Appraisal Office have been mailed to area residents in the Prairiland School District last week.

Some residents have been puzzled by a reduction in the appraised value of their homes. Some values reflect a decrease of hundreds of dollars in value.

According to Kathy Jackson of the Lamar County Appraisal District, the new values are the result of property in the Prairiland, Roxton and the City of Paris areas being reappraised.

This is a practice that is done to

set up-to-date market values. Some homes in the county haven't been reappraised in approximately 12 years. Over the past three years, the Lamar County Appraisal District has been doing the reappraisals in North Lamar, Chisum, Prairiland and Paris School districts.

Many of the home have depreciated in value with age, and many of the newer homes have been increased in appraised value.

For the most part, land values have not changed but homes have either appreciated or depreciated in value.

1908 tornado devastated Deport

(The following is reprinted from the Paris News in April, 1908, following the most destructive tornado in the history of the county, leaving death and destruction in its wake.)

The details received yesterday of the tornado which swept over the town of Deport Thursday evening show that it was much more destructive than was at first reported as regards the loss of property and that the injuries sustained by some of its citizens were more serious than they were thought to be. One person was killed outright, two were expected to die last night, and one or two more were thought to have probably received fatal injury. Twenty-three homes and thirteen barns were blown entirely away, 62 houses and 25 families were rendered homeless.

The residences of the following were totally destroyed: W.W. Redd, L.P. Hayes, W.R. Isbell, R.O. Story, J.R. Westbrook, Dick Grant, E.L.

Snell, W.L. Baughn, Geo. P. Baughn, Sam Bell, Mrs. Bettie Morgan, Geo. I. Terrell, T. S. Bryson, John Cheails, Gene Sullivan, Eli Wright, R. Isbell, J.P. Hood. Other buildings totally destroyed were the Presbyterian parsonage, the Methodist parsonage, the Baptist church and masonic hall, the oil mill and a dwelling on the oil mill lot, the Presbyterian church and the schoolhouse.

While Will Isbell, the druggist, was the only person killed, a message from Deport last night stated that Mr. Sullivan, who is an old man, and Mrs. Wright, were not expected to live through the night. It was also reported that Mrs. Terrell's injuries might prove fatal. Mr. Sullivan's shoulders were broken and Capt. and Mrs. Terrell and Mrs. Wright received internal injury. Capt. Terrell was blown 40 or 50 feet across the street in the Isbell yard and Mrs. Terrell was found fifty yards from home in the

Cumberland Presbyterian parsonage yard.

It is estimated that the total loss was between \$125,000 and \$150,000. Several cows, hogs and horses were killed and nearly all of the household goods were a complete loss. W.L. Baughn had a fine piano blown across the street into a ditch. A large part of the oil mill machinery can be used again, but about 6500 gallons of oil, 200 sacks of meal and thirty tons of seed were blown away. A brand new \$700 hearse just received by the Deport Burial Association and a lot of buggies and other vehicles were also blown away.

About 300 people from Blossom, Detroit and the surrounding country visited Deport during the day, most of whom were sightseers, who went to see the work of the storm, but many also went to help care for the wounded and homeless and to assist in any way they could.

Just Recipes!

Turtle Cheesecake
2 cups chocolate wafer crumbs
1/4 cup sugar
1/3 cup butter-melted
3 (8 ounce) packages of cream cheese-softened
1-1/4 cups sugar
4 large eggs
1 (8 ounce carton) sour cream
1 tablespoon vanilla extract
1/4 cup butter
1 cup (6 ounces) semisweet chocolate morsels
1 (12 ounce jar) caramel topping
1 cup chopped pecans

Combine first three ingredients; stir well. Firmly press mixture into bottom and 1 inch up sides of a lightly greased 9-inch springform pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 10 minutes. Cool in pan on wire rack. Beat cream cheese at medium speed until creamy; gradually add 1-1/4 cup sugar, beating well. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition and scraping sides and bottom as needed. Stir in sour cream and vanilla. Pour batter into prepared crust. Bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour and 5 minutes. Center will not completely set. Turn oven off; partially open oven door. Leave cheesecake in oven for 1 hour. Remove to wire rack to cool completely. Cover and chill at least 8 hours. Carefully remove sides of pan; transfer cheesecake to serving plate. Melt 1/4 cup butter in small heavy saucepan; add chocolate morsels. Stir over low heat just to chocolate melts and mixture blends. Spread warm chocolate mixture over cheesecake; chill 15 minutes. Combine caramel topping and pecans in a small saucepan. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Boil 2 minutes. Remove and cool 5 minutes. Spread over chocolate, cool completely. Serve immediately or cover and chill.

Peanut Butter Apple Dip
1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese-softened
1 cup peanut butter
1 cup packed brown sugar
1/4 cup milk
3-4 apples cut into wedges

In a mixing bowl, combine first four ingredients; mix well. Serve with apples. Store in refrigerator.

Creamy Fruit Dip
1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese-softened
3 tablespoons orange juice concentrate
1 jar marshmallow creme

In mixing bowl, beat cream cheese and concentrate until smooth. Fold in marshmallow creme. Serve with fruit.

Double Chocolate Bars
1 package (16 ounce) cream filled chocolate sandwich cookies crushed
3/4 cup melted butter or margarine
1 can sweetened condensed milk
2 cups miniature semisweet chocolate chips

Combine cookie crumbs and butter pat onto bottom of ungreased baking pan. Combine milk and 1 cup of chips in microwave-safe bowl. Cover and allow chips to melt; stir until smooth. Pour over crust. Sprinkle with remaining chips. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-12 minutes or until chips are melted.

Homemade Chocolate Pudding
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup baking cocoa
1/4 cup cornstarch
1/2 teaspoon salt
4 cups milk
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 teaspoons vanilla
M & M's-optional

In a heavy saucepan, combine sugar, cocoa, cornstarch and salt. Gradually add milk. Bring to a boil over medium heat; boil and stir for 2 minutes. Remove from the heat and stir in butter and vanilla. Spoon into individual cups. Chill and sprinkle with M & M's or your favorite candy treats or toppings.

Peach Cake
3/4 cup cold butter or margarine
1 package yellow cake mix
2 egg yolks
2 cups sour cream
1 can sliced peaches-drained
1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 carton Cool Whip

In a bowl, cut butter into dry cake mix until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Pat into greased baking pan. In another bowl, beat egg yolks and add sour cream and mix well. Set aside 6-8 slices to garnish. Cut remaining peaches into 1 inch pieces. Stir in sour cream mixture. Spread over crust; sprinkle with cinnamon. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes or until edges begin to brown. Cool of rack and spread with topping garnish.

Fruit Medley
1 can peach or apricot pie filling
2 cans fruit cocktail-drained
1 can pineapple chunks-drained
1 can mandarin oranges-drained
2 medium firm bananas-sliced

In large bowl, combine pie filling and canned fruits. Cover and refrigerate. Stir in bananas just before serving.

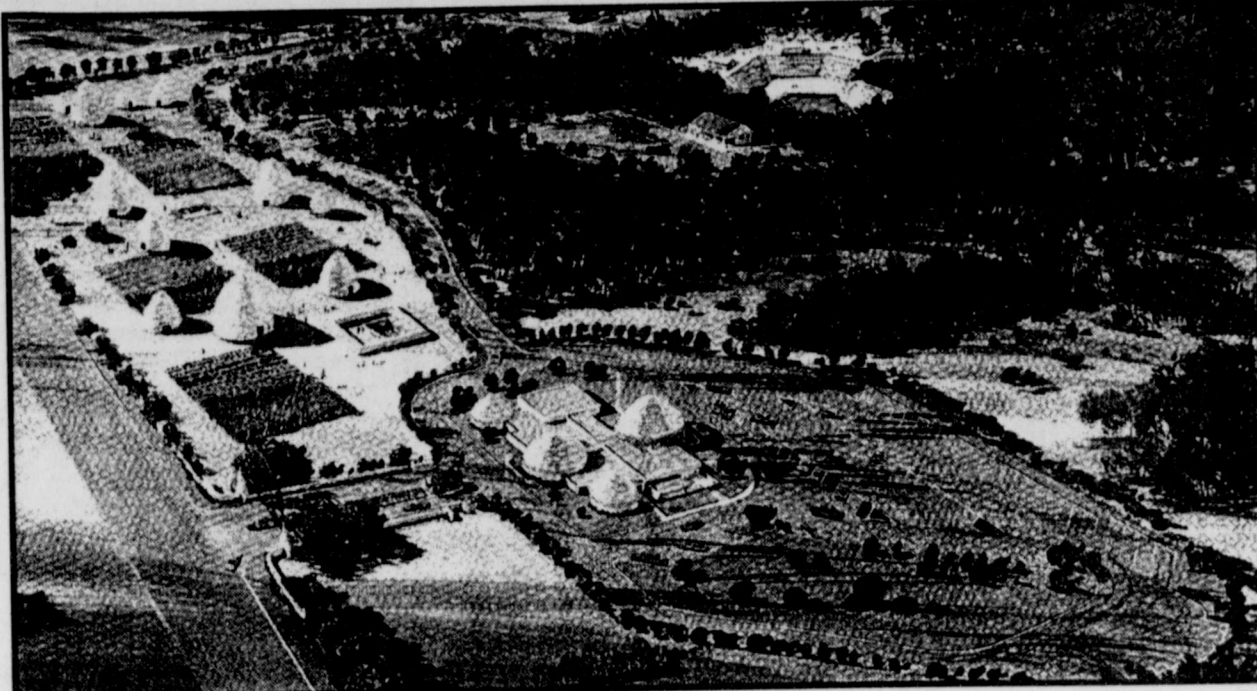

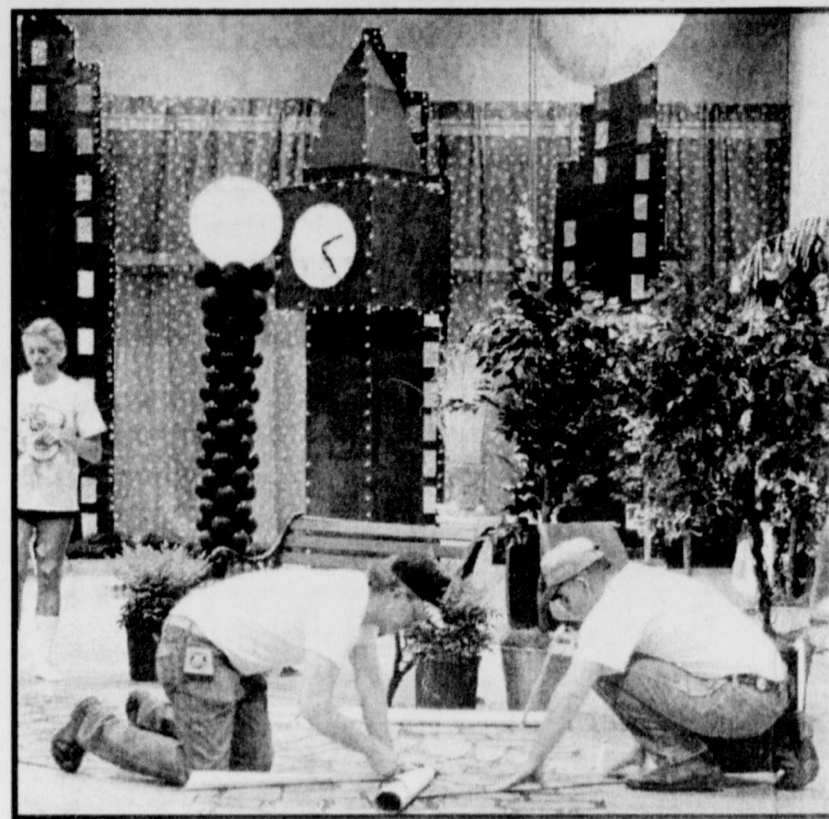

FOOT NOTES



KOHLER'S DISEASE

The tarsal navicular is a bone located in the foot's midarch. Kohler's disease, which mainly afflicts children between the ages of three and eight, is a degeneration of this bone caused by diminished blood supply that is the result of rapid bone growth. This disease is seldom seen in children ten years of age or older. The main symptom of Kohler's disease is pain above and slightly to the rear of the midarch, though there may also be some redness and swelling in the painful area. Once the problem is properly diagnosed, treatment calls for the use of arch supports and rest. Kohler's disease usually is self-limiting in duration, and it does not damage the foot permanently.

Pain is often the first sign of a foot or ankle condition for patients of any age, but pain doesn't always reveal the cause of an injury. The best way to determine the exact cause, location and seriousness of an injury is to have a podiatric evaluation including medical history, examination and tests. Area campuses link up with fiber optic network

On Monday, April 26, students in Charles Price's 8th grade History class on the Blossom campus and Pam Norwood's 8th grade American History class made school history by being the first classes to simultaneously be linked and taught a lesson at the same time. This was done by the process of the internet and a helping hand from Buford Television out of Tyler. Buford is a parent company of Friendship Cable.

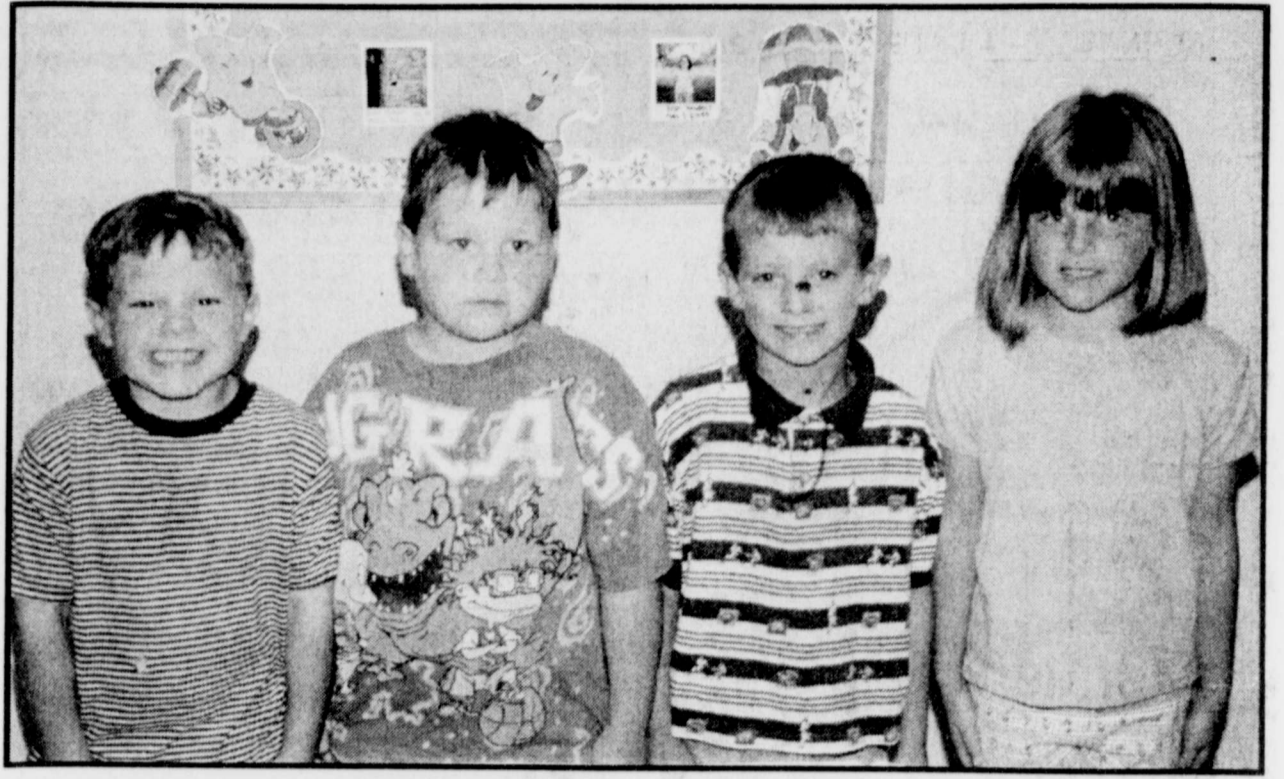
Buford Television/Friendship Cable has made a unique commitment to education. This is evident in their allowing Prairiland ISD and Red River County school districts to use their fiber network free of charge. In November of 1997, Mrs. LeeAnn Pittard, Director of Education and Public Relations for Buford, the parent company of Friendship Cable, and Marianne Bogy, Area Manager for Friendship Cable, met with representatives from Prairiland ISD, Detroit ISD, Talco-Bogata CISD, Clarksville ISD and the cable companies in Blossom, Deport, Detroit, Clarksville, Bogata, Talco and Avery. Instead of operating each community as a separate cable system, they connected the communities with a fiber optic network making a larger cable company being operated from Clarksville. While installing the fiber optic network, Friendship Cable installed the fiber as close as possible to each school campus in the communities mentioned above. The following campuses are now connected via a high-speed ATM fiber optic network: Blossom Elementary, Deport

Elementary, Detroit Elementary, Detroit High School, Bogata Elementary, Talco Elementary, Rivercrest High School, Avery High School, and the five campuses of Clarksville High School.

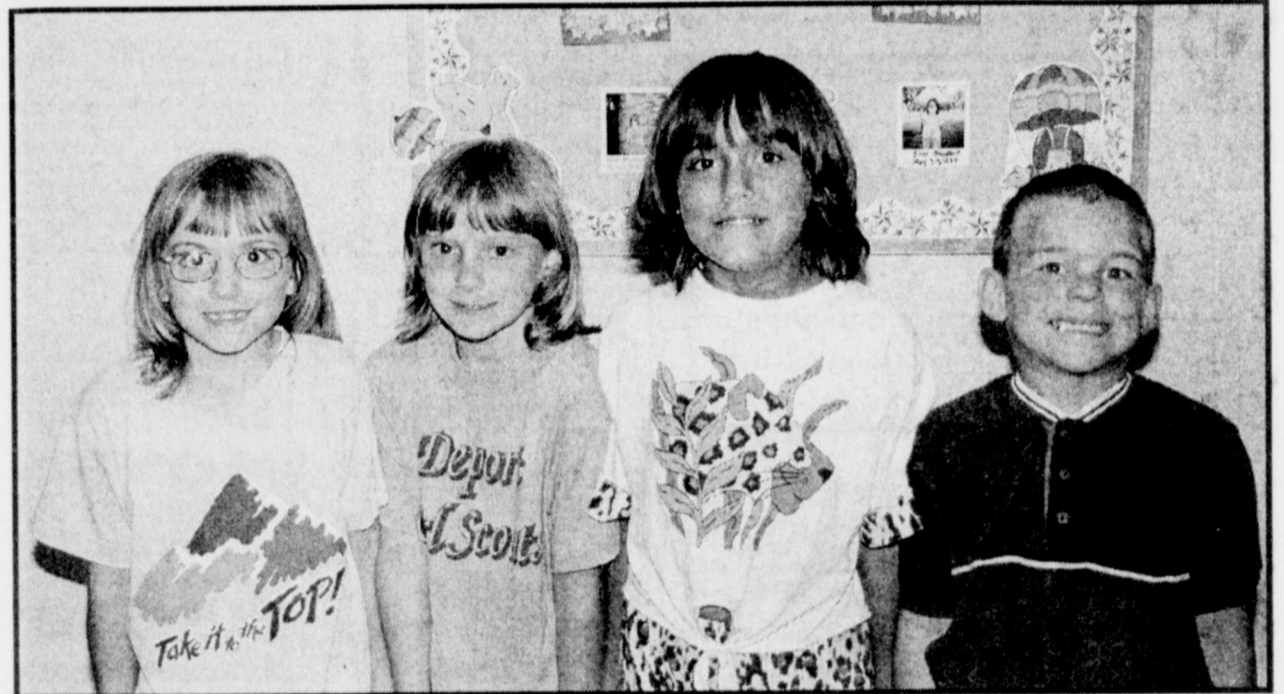
Kyle Caps, owner of Capco, Inc. and a native of Clarksville, worked with the school districts to light up the fiber once it was installed. The equipment used to light up the network was purchased through a TIFF grant. Here are the statistics about the network. It is the largest multi-district fiber network in the state of Texas and consists of 88 miles of fiber. It operates at a speed of 155-mbs/sec. Ninety-nine percent of the schools in Texas access the Internet through a T1 connection through local telephone companies. The speed of a T1 connection is 1.54 mb/sec. So our network is 100 times faster than a T1. The network is also upgradable to 622 mbs/sec in the future if the need arises. One MB (megabyte) of information would be equivalent to approximately 500 type written pages of data. So you can see that this network can transmit a huge amount of data including video and audio data at blazing speed. If the school districts involved took bids to get this network constructed and paid for it, the cost would have been between \$3.5 and \$3.8 MILLION dollars. There would be annual maintenance fees of \$60,000-\$100,000. If the area schools leased a network of this magnitude, the cost would be approximately \$5000-\$6000 per campus per month. So you can see the commitment Friendship Cable made to the schools in our area by letting the schools use their fiber network free of charge. They are also responsible for maintenance of the network. The network allowed Prairiland ISD to complete its Wide Area Network connecting all three of its campuses. Currently the Deport and Pattonville campuses are connected via wireless equipment also purchased through a TIFF grant. The wireless is not as good as the fiber, but it will transmit data providing the Internet connection to the high school.

The network was used Monday to transmit the very first distance learning lesson for Prairiland ISD. Mr. Charles Price, a Prairiland history teacher on the Blossom campus, taught a lesson to his eighth grade history class on Civil War slang. At the same time, he was teaching the lesson to Pam Norwood's, 8th grade history class on the Deport campus. This was a unique experience for everyone, but it will become more common place during the next few years. Mrs. Pittard was present at the time of the distance learning lesson.

Clarksville ISD has seen the importance of the network also. Recently GTE was not able to supply a T1 circuit for their schools to access the Internet. So Clarksville is sharing T1's with other districts over the Friendship Cable network, providing their students with access to the Internet.

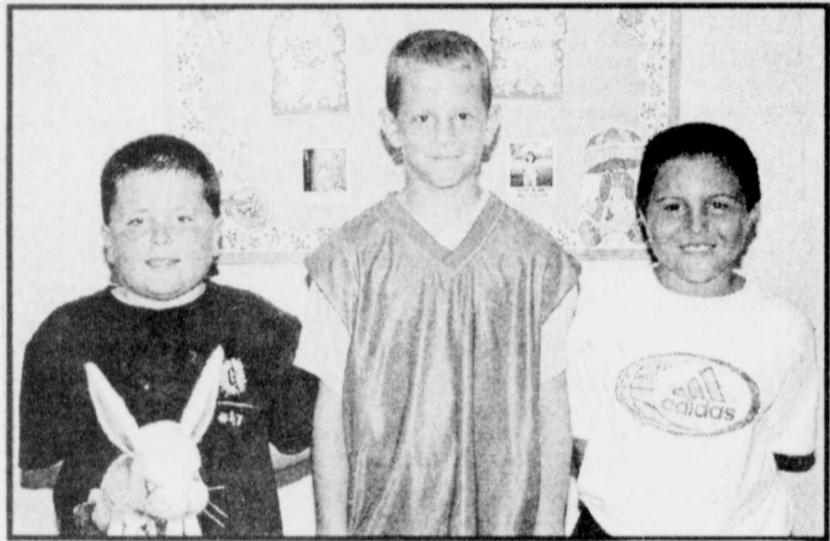


DEPORT STAR STUDENTS in Kindergarten are Koleon Stephens, Steven Melvin, Dalton Spears and Brittany Black.
