In Executive Session, the council hired Charles Reavis of Deport as an assistant to the Superintendent in the Sewer Department.

1908 tornado devastated Deport

(The following is reprinted from Snell, W.L. Baughn, Geo. P. Baughn, the Paris News in April, 1908, following the most destructive tornado in the history of the county, leaving death and destruction in its wake.)

The details received yesterday of the tornado which swept over the town of Deport Thursday evening show that it was much more destructive than was at first reported as regards the loss of property and that the injuries sustained by some of its citizens were more serious than they were thought to be. One person was killed outright, two were expected to die last night, and one or two more were thought to have probably received fatal injury. Twenty-three homes and thirteen barns were blown entirely away, 62 houses and 25 fami-

Sam Bell, Mrs. Bettie Morgan, Geo. I. Terrell, T. S. Bryson, John Cheails, Gene Sullivan, Eli Wright, R. Isbell, J.P. Hood. Other buildings totally destroyed were the Presbyterian parsonage, the Methodist parsonage, the Baptist church and masonic hall, the oil mill and a dwelling on the oil mill lot, the Presbyterian church and the schoolhouse

While Will Isbell, the druggist, was the only person killed, a message from Deport last night stated that Mr. Sullivan, who is an old man, and Mrs. Wright, were not expected to live through the night. It was also reported that Mrs. Terrell's injuries might prove fatal. Mr. Sullivan's shoulders were broken and Capt. and Mrs.

It is estimated that the total loss was between \$125,000 and \$150,000. Several cows, hogs and horses were killed and nearly all of the household goods were a complete loss. W.L. Baughn had a fine piano blown across the street into a ditch. A large part of the oil mill machinery can be used again, but about 6500 gallons of oil, 200 sacks of meal and thirty tons of seed were blown away. A brand new \$700 hearse just received by the Deport Burial Association and a lot of buggies and other vehicles were also blown away.

About 300 people from Blossom, Detroit and the surrounding country visited Deport during the day, most



Area campuses link up with fiber optic network

On Monday, April 26, students in Charles Price's 8th grade History class on the Blossom campus and Pam Norwood's 8th grade American History class made school history by being the first classes to simultaneously be linked and taught a lesson at the same time. This was done by the process of the internet and a helping hand from Buford Television out of Tyler. Buford is a parent company of Friendship Cable.


Buford Television/Friendship Cable has made a unique commitment to education. This is evident in their allowing Prairiland ISD and Red River County school districts to use their fiber network free of charge. In November of 1997, Mrs. LeeAnn Pittard, Director of Education and Public Relations for Buford, the parent company of Friendship Cable, and Marianne Bogy, Area Manager for Friendship Cable, met with representatives from Prairiland ISD, Detroit ISD, Talco-Bogata CISD, Clarksville ISD and the cable companies in Blossom, Deport, Detroit, Clarksville, Bogata, Talcoand Avery. Instead of operating each community as a separate cable system, they connected the communities with a fiber optic network making a larger cable company being operated from Clarksville. While installing the fiber optic network, Friendship Cable installed the fiber as close as possible to each school campus in the communities mentioned above. The following campuses are now connected via a high-speed ATM fiber optic network: Blossom Elementary, Deport

On Monday, April 26, students in harles Price's 8th grade History class to the Blossom campus and Pam orwood's 8th grade American Hisry class made school history by eing the first classes to simulta-

Kyle Caps, owner of Capco, Inc. and a native of Clarksville, worked with the school districts to light up the fiber once it was installed. The equipment used to light up the network was purchased through a TIFF grant. Here are the statistics about the network. It is the largest multidistrict fiber network in the state of Texas and consists of 88 miles of fiber. It operates at a speed of 155mbs/sec. Ninety-nine percent of the schools in Texas access the Internet through a T1 connection through local telephone companies. The speed of a T1 connection is 1.54 mb/sec. So our network is 100 times faster than a T1. The network is also upgradable to 622 mbs/sec in the future if the need arises. One MB (megabyte) of information would be equivalent to approximately 500 type written pages of data. So you can see that this network can transmit a huge amount of data including video and audio data at blazing speed. If the school districts involved took bids to get this network constructed and paid for it; the cost would have been between \$3.5 and \$3.8 MILLION dollars. There would be annual maintenance fees of \$60,000-\$100,000. If the area schools leased a network of this magnitude, the cost would be approximately \$5000-\$6000 per campus per month. So you can see the commitment Friendship Cable made to the schools in our area by letting the schools use their fiber network free of charge. They are also responsible for maintenance of the network. The network allowed Prairiland ISD to complete its Wide Area Network connecting all three of its campuses. Currently the Deport and Pattonville campuses are connected via wireless equipment also purchased through a TIFF grant. The wireless is not as good as the fiber, but it will transmit data providing the connection to the high Internet school.

The network was used Monday to transmit the very first distance learning lesson for Prairiland ISD. Mr. Charles Price, a Prairiland history teacher on the Blossom campus, taught a lesson to his eighth grade history class on Civil War slang. At the same time, he was teaching the lesson to Pam Norwood's, 8th grade history class on the Deport campus. This was a unique experience for everyone, but it will become more common place during the next few years. Mrs. Pittard was present at the time of the distance learning lesson.

Clarksville ISD has seen the importance of the network also. Recently GTE was not able to supply a T1 circuit for their schools to access the Internet. So Clarksville is sharing T1's with other districts over the Friendship Cable network, providing their students with access to the Internet.


