# Storm produces winds, hail

June 1st did not mark an end to storm season as a large cell swept

into Lamar County Tuesday night. Volunteer fire departments went out on storm watch all over Lamar and Red River Counties, and there was large hail, high wind and heavy rains, plus a spotted funnel cloud

that apparently did not touch down. The storm built across Red River in Oklahoma, and would bulge down into the northern parts of the counties.

Electric power was lost in parts of Blossom and Post Oak, as well as other parts of the area.

Two inch hail pounded the East Post Oak area, doing damage.

The storm then moved on into Red River County, and continued on it's eastward path.

# Deport applies for water improvement loan

called session recently to work on applying for a \$350,000 for water system improvements.

The application is made through the Texas Water Development

The Water System study conducted in 1992 as part of a TDHCA Comprehensive Plan found that basic fire protection should be extended to all areas within the city limits, and that many of the existing water lines are either old, cast iron pipe that inhibits the flow or water, or undersized PVC or galvanized iron pipe. These undersized lines are not large enough to handle the number of customers along their route. There are also numerous areas in the city that do not have sufficient flow rates at their hydrants during peak demand periods. This is caused by undersized lines and not enough looping.

The study shows that large areas of the city are without basic fire protection. According to the Rules and Regulations for Public Water Systems, adopted by TNRCC and the Texas State Board of Insurance Key Rate Schedule, no structure shall be more than 500 feet away from the nearest fire hydrant. Most of the areas lacking basic fire protection lie on the outer boundaries of the City. Two major areas in need of fire protection are the eastern and southwestern sections of Deport.

According to the 1992 Comprehensive Plan, the city is operating a water distribution network designed to meet the needs of a 1930's com-

The proposed project consists of upgrading many of the old outdated water lines. The existing mains under Grey Street and Depot Street in the east-central section of the city are constructed of 6: diameter cast iron pipe. They will be replaced with new, PVC pipe to allow greater flow rates. The main under Grey Street

The Deport City Council met in a will also be extended to the north, across Monroe Street, where it will tap into an existing 8: cast iron main that originates at the 63,000 gallon elevated storage tank. The new main under Depot will be extended to the east along Nobles Street to Hays Street at the north end of the line and to the west along Hwy. 271 South and will replace an undersized 2" PVC line, while the extension along Highway 271 South will replace an undersized 1 1/4" galvanized iron line. This will extend fire protection to the east end of Nobles St. and to the intersection of Main Street and US Highway 271.

In the southwestern section of the city there is no existing fire protection. To extend this the existing 2" PVC line under Kelsey Street and Milton-Minter Road will be upgraded to a 6" line to handle fire flows during peak demand periods. The existing line dead ends east of FM Hwy. 1503 and must be flushed often. The new line will be extended north along FM Hwy. 1503 and east along US Hwy. 271 South, where it will tap into an existing 6" PVC main that runs along Bevill Street to form a new loop.

Other undersized 2" PVC lines will be replaced with 6" or larger diameter PVC lines along Bell Street between Dewey Street and Trail Street and along FM HWy. 1149, east of Lamar Street

A new PVC line will also be added along Dewey Street between Main Street and Bell Street. Currently, there is no existing line along Dewey Street between Main Street and Depot Street, so in order for the northeastern part of the City to receive water, it has to flow an extra 750 feet south along Main Street before turning east along Choctaw Street and then north along Depot. This 8" line will connect the existing 8" cast iron main running south along main street to the new 6" PVC main running north-south along Depot. By adding this line, flow to the

northeastern portion of the City will be shortened, and a loop will be created that will allow for sufficient fire flow during peak demands. Additionally, to extend fire protection to the east end of Dewey Street, a new 6" PVC main will be installed which will also connect of the new 6" PVC main on Bell street.

New fire hydrants will be added along these new lines and at various points in the city so that no structure will be more than 500 feet away from a fire hydrant. All customers will be transferred to the replacement mains, with new service lines installed on the property lines and all existing mains replaced by new mains will be abandoned.

The council considered alternatives, saw projected water usage charts for the future, and a proposed work plan and schedule.

The proposed Project Cost Estimate for these water system improvements is as follows: Construction-\$265,000 Basic Engineering-\$33,000 Design Surveying- \$7,550 Environmental-\$750

Financial Advisor & Bond Attorney-\$13,040 SRF Origination Fee-\$7,590

Additional Technical Services (Permits, Bid & Award, Part Time Inspection)-\$9,320 Construction Testing-\$500 Contingencies-413,250

Total Project Budget-\$350,000 If the loan is approved the project will be financed by an addition of \$1 per month on the basic water rate on water bills. This financing will last for approximately 20 years at ap-

proximately 24,000 per year. Whether the loan has been approved or not should be known in July of 1999 and construction should begin in July of 2000 if the loan is approved.

earned. The primary student winners are Molly Minter, first grade; Layton Norwood, second grade; and Meghan Counts, third grade.


Amanda Mathews, fourth grade and Caralyn Corso, firth grade, had the highest points in the intermediate

seventh grade; and Stefani Wilson, eighth grade. Ms. Corso accumulated the high-


est number of points in the school with a total of 264 points for the 1998-99 year. Stefani Wilson was second with 240.




