Betty Puckett creates painted treasures China painting true art form with Bogata artist

Talent comes in many forms, and with Betty Puckett it has taken the form of an exquisite talent for china painting. Betty and her husband, Jeff, live in

a comfortable home decorated with treasures in porcelains on FM 909 in Bogata.

She began china painting about twenty five years ago, when she and Jeff were both teaching in Corpus Christi

"Jeff used to say then that I had a cheap hobby, because I would paint the china, wipe it off and start again, over and over" Betty smiles. That's not the case now, as a sheaf of blue and red ribbons from various competitions can attest.

Betty has a spacious, sunny work shop in which she conducts lessons, and paints several hours a day for her own pleasure. She will paint on a wide variety of things, including kitchen tiles, dishes, plaques and a wide variety of bisque and china.

He designs are different in many respects because she paints scenes of farmsteads, portraits of people and animals as well as the more traditional flowers, fruits and scroll work. Jeff and Betty are the parents of

three girls, two in Albuerque, one in Spring. They have four grandchildren, three boys and one girl. This has provided Betty with the

opportunity to create gorgeous heirlooms to hand down to them.

She is currently doing a portrait of her granddaughter on a plate. While she is not satisfied with the likeness yet, it is remarkable to anyone less of a perfectionist than Betty

Her kitchen is decorated with cus-

tomized tiles featuring various fruits and berries. Her walls abound with elegant designs on plates, plaques and other surfaces. There are delicate blossoms, blushing fruits and designs

of great beauty. A vase features couples in Victorian dress, a stand holds Christmas ornaments.

In addition to the beautiful china painted ware there are "babies". She has, in the spare bedroom dolls of incredible realism. Even the bodies are weighted so that they feel like real infants. An accomplished seamstress, Betty has made some beautiful clothing for them. In addition, two of them wear her granddaughter's baby clothes.

On the wall of another bedroom are her "Harrison Fisher Girls". Similar to the Gibson girls these elegant ladies are painted in wonderful de-

When asked, Betty says "Oh, painting has always run in my family. My grandmother painted, my great-aunts, mother and aunts painted. One sister was a true artist". She says this as if she was not an artist, but she most definitely is. A beautiful drawing created by her mother bears testimony to the talent in her family.

Betty attends seminars, and helped raise money for the fine arts building at the Four States Fair in Texarkana by painting special tiles which were sold to subscribers.

She and her husband have a camper trailer which they enjoy traveling in. She often loads up her china paints and small kiln to use when there are rainy days or when she has free time. China painting is an ancient art form. Powders are mixed with oil and applied to bisque (unglazed china) and then glazed or left with a matte finish, or applied directly to glazed china. Then it is fired, which glazes the paints.

"The secret is multiple firings. China paint needs to be put on in thin coats or else it doesn't sink into the glaze . That makes a raised surface that's not attractive." She explains.

In addition to the paints, Betty uses enamels to raise some designs, and French Acid etching as well as luster glazes to create some very unusual pieces of art work. Brilliant gold accents many pieces.

Betty does figurines, jewelry and various other items as well. Some she sells, many go as gifts. She teaches lessons to three women who come for two all-day sessions once a month. It's obvious they are learning from an expert.

Asked if she has done many china sets she smiles "No, I did one once and was bored to tears after the first few repetitious patterns". She delights in new and unusual designs. She pores through magazines and books, subscribes to china painting publications and takes photographs of beautiful clouds, flowers or whatever she finds pleasing to incorporate into her works of arts.

Betty isn't the only talented person in her household. Husband Jeff is an accomplished woodworker, creating outstanding furniture and wood items.

He also has a tidy vegetable garden. Jeff and Betty Puckett have found retirement to be a busy, happy time in their lives, and they epitomizes using their time for useful, artful purposes. It's a pleasure to see the exquisite



Her hometown is Tokuno-Shimo, but for the last thirty years she calls Blossom her home. She is married to Joe Rodgers and they are retired from the Navy.

The day I was there, she was cooking Adobo Chicken, which is a Philipino dish, but her favorite is Japanese dishes. She says that they have a better taste and more flavorful. A day never goes by that she does not have her rice. She uses a rice cooker and keeps it simmering constatnly. She says it keeps her going. From the looks of her home and gardens, she eats a a lot of it then. They were immaculate!

She and Joe have a dog named Chishai (which means little thing or tiny in Japanese) and he is their constant companion. He was given to them by a friend and he seems to be of no particular breed, but is much loved by these two.

They have five children that they see about once a year because they are spread out throughout the United States and beyond. They have a daughter, Akemi, who lives in Oak Harbor, Washington. Kenchin-Jiru or Vegetable Soupuses burdock root(long, thin root with reddish-brown skin, often used in simmered or fried dishes), daikon(long, white, Japanese radish with green-top leaves and is sweeter than American version), tofu or abura-

age-(usually available in refrigerator section of Oriental markets), dashi(basic Japanese soup stock made from water, dried kelp(konbu) and dried bonita(fish) flakes), sansho(shichimi togarashi)-coarsely ground, pungent blend of red cayenne pepper and 6 other seasonings that may include-poppy, mustard, hemp, sesame and shiso seed, sansho, pepper leaf, seaweed, dried orange, tangerine or lemon peel) powder and a variety of other vegetables. This dish is a very thin soup and topped with the seven-spice or sansho pow-

der. Toriniku Dango or Chicken Meatballs-ground chicken formed into meatballs and boiled in a mixture of dashi(basic Japanese soup stock), sake(Japanese rice wine) and mirin(sweet cooking wine) and served with fresh green beans also boiled in mixture


Kakitama-Jiru or Egg Drop Soup- is a favorite of many and used the dashi (basic soup stock) as the base and egg mixture is dropped into soup as mixture boils.

Lychees and Mandarin Ice is a Chinese dish with canned mandarin oranges sections and lychees(round fruit that ranges from 1/2 to 1-1/2 inches with rough, papery red skin and juicy, white flesh with a single brown seed from an evergreen tree grown in subtropical regions such as China). It is more of an ice sorbet dessert.


Lemon Chicken with Lemon Sauce-the chicken is stir-fried in a wok and then dipped or topped with the sweet-sour lemon sauce.

Barbecued Shrimp-other spices added to the American barbecue sauce and stir-fried in a wok



Scrape root with back of knife to remove all skin. Shave root diagonally into narrow, thin shavings, about l-inch long. Place shavings into mixture of 1 cup cold water and vinegar. Soak 3-4 minutes; rinse under cold running water and drain. Cut potato lengthwise into quarters; cut quarters crosswise into thin slices. Place in remaining water and soak five minutes. Drain. Cut daikon and carrot lengthwise into quarters; cut quarters crosswise into thin slices. Cut onions crosswise into l/ 2-inch lengths. Remove and discard stems from mushrooms. Cut caps into halves; cut halves into thin slices. Place tofu in strainer; using fork, break into pieces no larger than 1/2-inch; rinse and drain. Heat oils in 3-quart saucepan over high for I minute; add chicken. Saute, stirring constantly until chicken s cooked; about 3 minutes. Add root, potato, daikon and carrot to chicken. Saute, stirring constatnly for 2-3 minutes. Add dashi, soy sauce and salt to chicken mixture; heat to boiling. Reduce to medium-high; boil gently until vegetables are tender-about 5 minutes. Skim foam from soup is needed during cooking. Stir in mushrooms and tofu into soup; cook two minutes. Stir in green onions and remove from heat. Ladle soup into bowls and top with sansho powder.

Chicken Meatballs Toriniku Dango 4 ounces green beans-fresh pound ground chicken tablespoon plus 2 teaspoons sugar /4 cup soy sauce medium egg -1/2 tablespoons cornstarch 3 cups dashi -1/2 tablespoons sake 1/2 tablespoons mirin Cut beans crosswise into halves or thirds. Heat to boiling over medium-high and add carrots. Cook 2 minutes; drain. Mix eggs well with fork; do not beat. Place dashi in 3-quart saucepan; heat to boiling over mediumhigh. Add remaining 1/4 teaspoon salt, soy sauce and chicken. Reduce heat to medium; boil soup for 2 minutes. Slowly pour about 1/3 of egg mixture at a time into boiling soup, stirring constantly. Soup must return to boiling before each addition of egg. Turn off heat immediately after last egg "threads" form. Ladle into bowls and top with carrot slices

Lychees and Mandarin Ice 2 cups water

1/2 cup sugar

2 cans mandarin orange segments 1/4 cup lemon juice 2 tablespoons orange-flavored liqueur I can peeled whole lechees

Measure water and sugar into saucepan and cook over low heat stirring constantly until mixture boils. Boil and stir 3 minutes. Remove from heat. Place one can orange and syrup into 5 cup blender. Spoon fruit and lychee syrup into serving dishes. Remove frozen mixture and flake lightly with fork and spoon over fruit in each dish.



Calibrating hose-end Sprayers

According to Lynn Golden, Red River County Extension Agent, hoseend sprayers are one of the most widely used methods to apply fungicides, insecticides, herbicides and liquid fertilizers to turf and other areas around the home. Properly mixing and applying these products with a hose-end sprayer can be confusing however. Since hose-end sprayers operate off water pressure, they need to be calibrated at the water outlet from which they will be operated. Hoe-end sprayers should be calibrated on concrete where the spray pattern is clearly visible. Also, you can better judge how fast to move to thoroughly wet the turf without puddling

Add a pint or quart of water to the reservoir of the hose-end sprayer, open the water outlet and spray the concrete uniformly until the reservoir is empty. Them add enough product to cover the area we by a quart of water, fill the reservoir to one quart and make the application.

For example, homeowner wants to apply Ortho's Chickweed and Clover Control to his lawn with a hose-end sprayer. He determines the pint of water covers 300 square feet at his pace. The product label recommends 4 ounces of product per 1200 square feet. Thus, he adds 2 ounces of product and fills to 1 quart (2 pints) with water (2 X300 square feet equals 600 square feet). Each quart of his reservoir should cover 600 square feet of lawn.

A good tornado safety rule of thumb is simple, go low, get low. That means go to the lowest level of the structure you are in, crpouch in a low polsition, cover and protect your head.

This applies whether people are indoors or outdoors.

In schools, follow advance plans to a designated shelter area, usually an interior hallway on the lowest floor. If you are in a manufactured or portable building, go to a nearby building that is reinforced or take cover outside on low, protected ground. Stay out of auditoriums, gymnasiums and other structures with wide, free span roofs.






