Pct. one dumpster must go if usage abuse continues

The big dumpster at the Precinct One County Barn -Pattonville, in Lamar County may have to be removed if misuse of it continues.

Pct. 1 Commissioner Mike Blackburn provides the big dumpster for people to use free of charge, but people are not bothering to put their trash into the dumpster. Instead, they are dumping mounds and mounds of it in front of the dumpster. County employees must spend several hours a week cleaning the mess up.

"I fell 85% of people using the dumpster appreciate it being available and use it properly," Blackburn says, "the remaining 15% continually abuse the service, which costs tax payers approximately \$1,000 monthly."

If people do not begin to abide by the guidelines, the service will have

to be abandoned.

The following rules should apply:

No tires
No brush
No metal
No lumber
No furniture
Absolutely NO TRASH ON GROUND. It is not the county employees job to pick up trash from the ground each day.

Appliances may be placed on the ground at the east end of the dumpster.

A sign will be placed at the dumpster noting the above restrictions. If there is no improvement within 60 days, the service will be stopped.

Blackburn also says "I would like public input and help to monitor this problem. License numbers or vehicle identification would be very helpful".

ley Fair Grounds in Paris Exhibit Building. The dinner will be a no-host "Home Cooked" dinner.

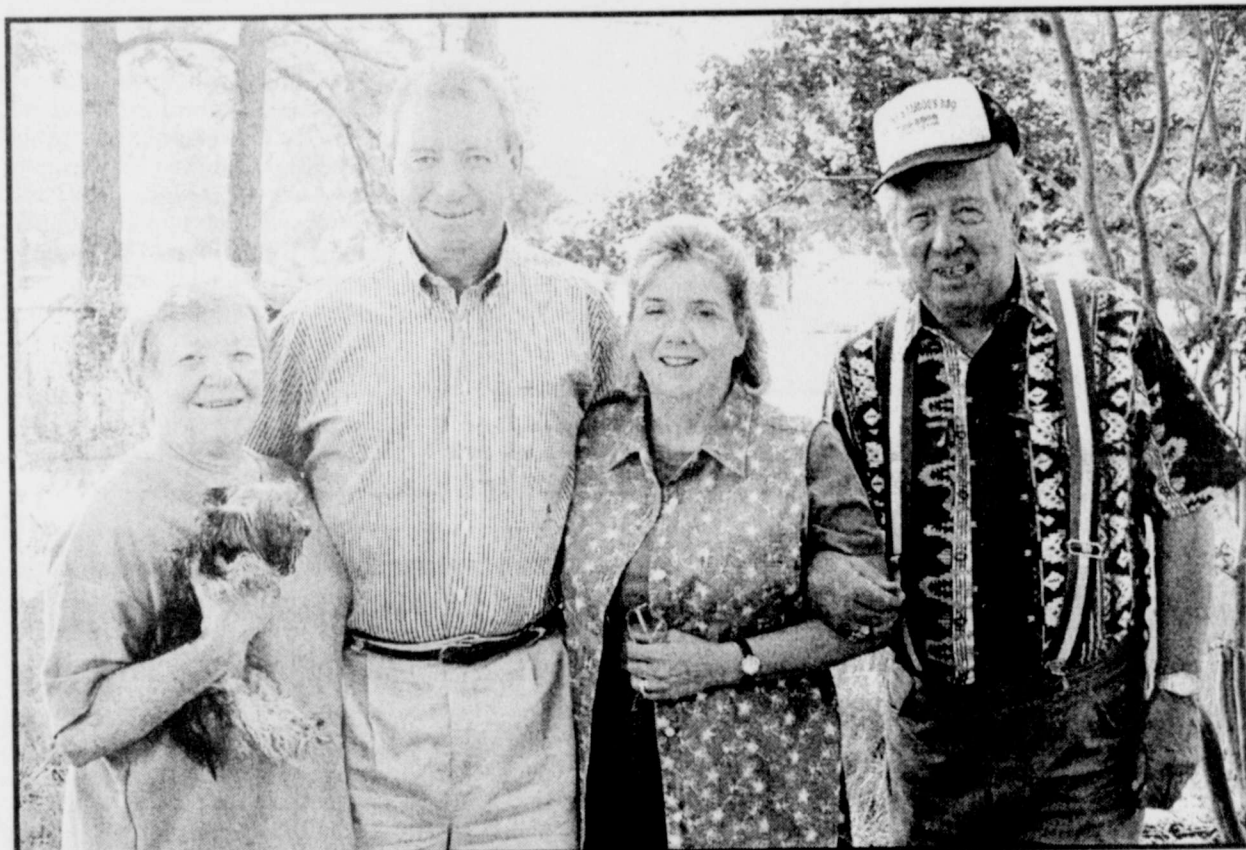
Mr. Pratt will speak on "Three Secrets for Success".

Netherland visitors take hold to American soil

Acclimatizing to a new mate can sometimes be a harrowing experience. . . you know. . . you think you know all of their little quirks, strange habits, etc! But what if they come from another country. . . say a Britian and an Oklahoman decide to tie the knot? I'm sure it could make for strange bed fellows! Well, in this case, it turned out to be the perfect match. . . read on!

Tommy Scroggins, of Tommy's Famous Barbecue fame, anyway, his daughter Lana worked in the Netherlands as a civilian in the Department of Defense as a teacher. She met Andy, an British Air Force officer stationed at the NATO Base in the Netherlands and they fell in love, married in 1990 and have been together ever since.

I had the opportunity to meet these lovely people at the home of Tommy and Lila Scroggins on Monday. Tommy has called me the last few years to set up an introduction and it has been first one thing and then another that kept us from meeting. Anyway, on Monday before Andy and Lana were to leave to go back to Oklahoma to visit friends, I did get to meet them. What a pair!

Andy is an avid golfer and takes the game serious, checking out the various greens in the area and scouting out the fairways. He has reservations to come back in October for the World's Finals. Lana on the other hand loves to spend quiet time preparing her lesson plans and psyching herself up for her students. They are quite the match!

On questioning them further, it seems that Andy has this problem with the speed limit in the United States and Lana has to keep reminding him that he is driving in Oklahoma and Texas and not in the Netherlands. It is not uncommon for

them to drive 90-100 miles an hour and over! So much for the double nickel! He states that they are however, very skillful and conscientious drivers and have very few accidents.

Teenagers are relegated to bicycles as their mode of transportation, after all gasoline is \$4.00 a gallon. Can you imagine?

Lana works as a Special Education teacher to the school which houses Canadians, Americans, British and Germans. The Department of Defense is the headquarters for the AFCMT and the school is titled the Department of Defense of Dependent Schools or DODS. The school teaches four year olds on up to high school with an enrollment of around 1400. The facility is a beautiful structure with outreach buildings from the center pod and color-coded for the sections. Along with the military, the school also serves the heads of corporations and business that might be located there.

They have purchased a home in Jabweek, "free standing" it is called because it is not attached to any other structure. Many of the buildings are combined to make up a block of buildings. Since Andy retired two years ago, he has become the *hausfrau* and Lana keeps her sanity by teaching. She enjoys him being home because she can be assured of his having dinner ready (he is quite an accomplished cook) when she returns from a day of school and loves the many remodeling jobs he has done on the house. He has since installed a dishwasher as one of his first projects. Can you imagine why? Some of them were quite funny, but she doesn't complain, as he is quite the handyman. He also maintains the yards and does an excellent job of this.

The housing for the military is different from the United States. The military will lease from a landlord for say, 10 years and do all of the upkeep and maintenance and pays him a rental fee. When the lease is up, the building is returned to him in the same shape as when then lease began. This insures that the personnel have adequate housing and is easier for them to deal with the American government, because of language barriers, etc. It is called "gruiping" in their language.

There is also a portion of the city set aside as "Little America". This makes the enlisted feel more at home and it caters to their needs. They have shops where the money exchange is in American dollars. They have their own bank, restaurants, stores and are even in the process of bringing in a Wal-Mart. Can you imagine, a Wally- World in the Netherlands!

They have also purchased a condo in Oklahoma and can you guess where it is located. . . that's right, next to a golf course. Andy just loves it. Although, what he doesn't love is the tornadoes. The first order of business will be the installation of a storm cellar.

The day that the tornado hit Oklahoma, they found out during the news broadcast and were a little unnerved until they had made contact with all of their relatives and friends to find out if they were okay. Lana's mother lives in Muskogee and their property is around that area.

Andy will be coming back in October and bringing one of his friends, Derrick for. . . what else but a golf tournament. He has promised me some of his "famous" recipes and more stories, so we will look forward to that visit! Oh, and Andy, be sure to stay on top of things!

Yellow Squash Puffs-these are delicious!

Old Fashioned Tea Cakes-always can use another cookie recipe and this one is no exception. Instead of rolling these though, Madell drops them from spoonfuls.

Vernon's Sweet Pickles

5 pounds cucumbers
1/2 cup pickling lime
5 cups vinegar
7 cups sugar
pickling spices

Wash and slice cucumbers. Combine lime with enough water to cover the top of sliced pickles. Allow to set for 24 to 36 hours. Crispiness is determined by length in solution. Pour off lime solution and wash thoroughly. Add to the pickles vinegar, sugar and pickling spices secured in cloth bag. Bring to boil and lower to a simmering boil for 45 minutes or until cucumbers turn green. Seal in jars.

Pecan Pie

3 eggs-beaten
1 cup brown sugar
1 cup Karo syrup
dash salt
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup chopped pecans
1/2 stick melted oleo

Combine all ingredients and pour into 9 inch unbaked pie shell. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

Fresh Apple Cake

2 cups sugar
3 eggs
1-1/2 teaspoon soda
1 cup oil
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 teaspoon salt

1 cup pecans-chopped
2 cups diced fresh apples
Mix oil and sugar. Add beaten eggs one at a time; blend well. Add flour and other dry ingredients. Then last, add vanilla and nuts. Bake in 9x13x2 pans or bundt pan at 350 degrees for about an hour or until done. Glaze if desired.

Squash Dressing

2 cups squash-cooked and mashed
1/2 pound sausage-cooked and crumbled
1 package corn bread mix
2 eggs
2 heaping tablespoons minced onion
salt and pepper to taste

Mix ingredients and pour into casserole dish. Bake in 350 degree oven for about 45 minutes or until brown and done to touch.

Yellow Squash Puffs

3/4 pound squash-sliced
1 egg-beaten
1/3 cup all purpose flour
1/3 cup cornmeal
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 medium onion-grated
vegetable oil

Cook squash, covered in boiling water 10-15 minutes. Mash enough squash to measure one cup. Combine egg to squash and stir well. Combine flour, meal, baking powder and salt. Stir well. Add squash mixture and onion; stir until blended. Drop mixture by level teaspoonfuls into hot oil. Cook until golden brown and turn once; drain.

Old Fashioned Tea Cakes

1 cup butter or shortening
1/4 teaspoon salt (if butter is not used)
2 cups sugar
4 eggs
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon soda
1/2 cup buttermilk
2 teaspoons vanilla
5 cups sifted all-purpose flour

Cream sugar and butter. Add one egg at a time and beat. Add buttermilk and combine all dry ingredients and sift into creamed mixture. Add vanilla. Roll out 1/4 to 3/8 inch thick. Cut with cookie cutter and bake at 400 degrees for 8-10 minutes.

Spiced Pecans

1 egg white
1 tablespoon water
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon sugar
4 cups pecans

Beat egg white and water until foamy. Add sugar and cinnamon. Stir in pecans, coating evenly. Place in shallow cookie sheet and bake in 300 degree oven for thirty minutes, stir after the first 15 minutes.

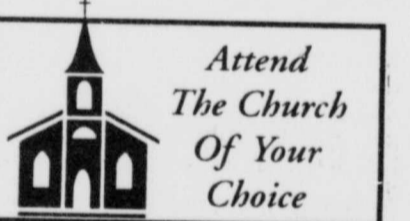

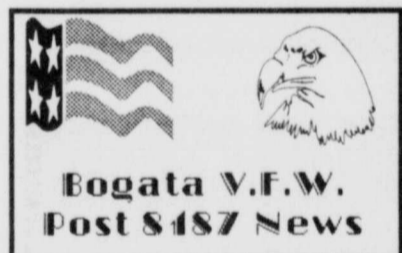

**Sam the egg crazy
terrarin still remembered today**

A regular ready, June Nichols East, has sent us a clipping that ran in the Tyler Morning Telegraph back in July of 1972. The article deals with 'Sam' the terrarin, who lived in Blossom.

It reads:
Blossom, Texas-Sam is a dry-land terrarin who goes ape over fried eggs.

Mrs. John Shores is a Blossom housewife who is a soft touch for day-land terrarins.

So every morning for three years, Sam has waddled up to the Shores' front step and Mrs. Shores has invited him in for egg. Not too well done. With the yellow just a bit runny.

After breakfast, Sam passes the time of day, then heads back to the pasture for a snooze in the sun.

"It started three years ago-July 1, 1969, when we bought this place and moved in," Mrs. Shores explained. "There was Sam loafing around the porch. I fed him cornbread. He ate it. One morning I had some scrambled egg left over. He loved it."

"Sam got into the habit" she recollects, "I began frying him an egg. Now he never misses a day-just crawls up at 7 a.m., and waits for me to take him in the house. He eats almost a whole egg every morning."

Terrarins look a lot alike, but there's no chance for mistaken identify here. Shores carved an "F" for wife Faye on Sam's bottom shell very early in the game. And that's how they tell Sam from the rest of the terrarins in the neighborhood!

We decided to give Mrs. Shores a

follow up call on Sam, and learned that she fed him for a lot longer than three years.

"I loved that terrarin" she says, "I would take him with me to the post office and everywhere and he would never put his head in at all."

She remember that they got up late one Sunday morning, and Sam had already gotten tired of waiting and was crossing the driveway heading back to the pasture.

"I took him in and set him inside the living room door and went back to scramble his egg. The next thing I knew he had found his way through the house and was waiting at my feet by the stove" she laughs.

He suffered a cracked shell once when Mr. Shores accidentally backed over him, but it never kept him from arriving every morning for his tasty treat.

Eventually, though, a housing development began in the neighborhood, and the land was bulldozed. The Shores think he must have been bulldozed under, for they never saw him again.

"I received letters from all over, after the article went out on the AP wire" Mrs. Shores says, "one man wrote that feeding him eggs was feeding him racing food".

She misses Sam the terrarin, but even today, feeds stray terrarins or turtles on the edge of the patio with cornbread. There has never been another faithful, regular breakfast guest like Sam, though.

APPLICATION: City of Detroit, P.O. Box 180, Detroit, Texas 75436-0180, has applied for renewal of an existing wastewater permit. The applicant has an existing National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit No. TX0055581 issued on October 31, 1992 and TNRCC Permit No. 10724-001. The draft permit authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 108,000 gallons per day. Issuance of the proposed Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. 10724-001 will replace the existing NPDES Permit No. TX0055581 issued on October 31, 1992 and TNRCC Permit No. 10724-001.

The plant site is located approximately 1200 feet south of U.S. Highway 82, approximately one mile southeast of the intersection of U.S. Highway 82 to Farm-to-Market Road 2573 in Red River County, Texas. The treated effluent is discharged to Scatter Creek; thence to Curthand Creek; thence to the Sulphur River/South Sulphur River in Segment No. 0303 of the Sulphur River Basin. The classified receiving water uses are no significant aquatic life uses for Scatter Creek. The designated uses for Segment No. 0303 are high aquatic life uses and contact recreation.

The Executive Director of the TNRCC has prepared a draft permit which, if approved, will authorize the conditions under which the facility must operate.

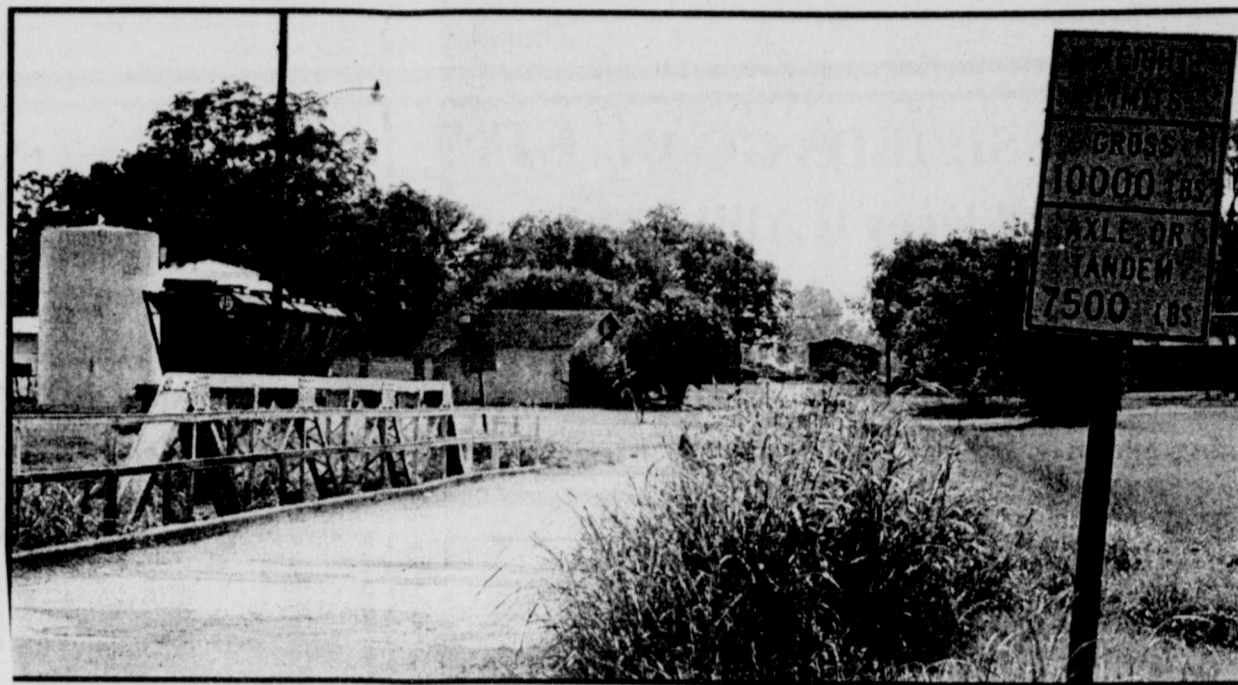
