Thomas and I made our yearly pilgrimage to Amarillo to visit with my cousin, Medora, and her husband Bob.


And, as usual, it was up bright and early to go bargain hunting at garage sales.



Ray Price was born in Perryville, Cherokee County, Texas on January 12, 1926. He worked on the family farm before leaving the rural East Texas area for Dallas as a teenager. Although he had cultivated an interest in music, the early days of World War II found him studying veterinary medicine at North Texas Agricultural College in Abilene. It wasn't long before he joined the Marines and was shipped out to serve in the Pacific.

In 1946 he resumed his studies, playing music on the side, most notably on Abilene's KRBC Hillbilly Circus radio show. Already billing himself, "The Cherokee Cowboy", he let veterinary studies take more and more of a back seat to his music. In 1949 her returned to Dallas and landed a spot on the prestigious Big D Jamboree. His first national exposure came when portions of the jamboree were broadcast over the CBS Radio Network.

Price also discovered Jim Beck

was a brilliant electronics engineer who built much of his own equipment from scratch. The studio was so popular with the Columbia Studio in the 1940's that it even briefly threatened Nashville as a country record-

's recording studio in Dallas. Beck


Our final installment from the Lamar County Extension Service on canning and making jams and jellies is proper preservation of Summer fruits. With the dry weather around, crops are dwindling, but local markets still offer fruits and vegetables in abundance

The most enjoyable place to start your home canning is with fruits. Not only do they bring you the delicious, sweet flavors of summer, but fruits require simple boiling water processing. Start with the gfinest fruits you can find. Look over each piece carefully to make sure there are not soft spots, bruised or mold. Cut as desired.

Use only firm fruits naturally high in pectin. Select a mixture of about 3/ 4 ripe and 1/4 under-ripe fruit. Do not use commercially canned or frozen juices. Their pectin content is too low. Wash all fruits thoroughly before cooking. Crush soft fruits or berries; cut firmer fruits into small pieces. Using the peels and cores to add pectin to juisce during cooking. Add water to fruits that require it. One pound of fruit should yield l cup of clear juice.

Wash and rinse all fruits thoroughly before cooking. Do not soak. For best flavor, use fully ripe fruit. Remove stems, skins and pits from fruit; cut into pieces and crush. For berries, remove stems and blossoms and crush. Seedy berries may be put through a sieve or food mill.

Fresh fruits and juices as well as commercially canned or frozen fruit juice can be used with commercially prepared powders or liquid pectin. The order of combining ingredients



of jellies and jams. Sweet spreads are a class of foods with many textures, flavors and colors. They consist of fruits preserved mostly of means of sugar and they are thickened or jellied to some extent. Fruit jelly is a semi-solid mixture of fruit juice and sugar that is clear and firm enough to hold its shape. Other spreads are made from crushed or ground fruit.

Jam also will hold its shape, but is less firm than jelly. Jam is made from crushed or chopped fruits and sugar. Jams made from a mixture of fruits are usually called conserves, especially when they include citrus fruits, nuts, raisins or coconut. Preserves are made of small, whole fruits for uniform-size pieces of fruits in a clear, thick, slightly jellied syrup. Marmalades are soft fruit jellies with small pieces of fruit or citrus peel evenly suspended in a transparent jelly. Fruit butters are made from fruit pulp cooked with sugar until thickened to spreadable consistency.

We hope you enjoy these recipes and we will see you in the kitchen!

Apple Rings-spiced apple rings may be made by adding stick cinnamon, whole cloves or other whole spices, tied in a spice bag, to syrup during preparation. Remove bag before canning rings. Green food coloring may be substituted for red color. Use a variety of eating apples good for cooking to help maintain shape and texture.

Applesauce-spiced applesauce can be made by adding ground spices, such as cinnamon, nutmeg or allspice, to sauce during the last 5 minutes of cooking. For chunky sauce, core and peel apples before they are cooked. Coarsely crush half of coked apples with a potato masher; press remaining apples through a sieve or food mill. Combine crushed and sauced apples mixture and continue as for applesauce. Use a sweet variety eating apple, this may lessen the addition of more sugar.

Brandied Peaches--peach brandy is used for this recipe and these are great for the upcoming holidays.

Brandied Pears-use white brandy for a clear syrup; however, any brandy will flavor the fruit.

Honey Spiced Peaches-uses honey for these delicious canned peaches.

Mixed Fruit-if fruit is to be used for salad or desert, leave in large pieces; cut fruit into small pieces for cocktails

Pear Mincemeat-this is a fruit mincemeat and is great for those holiday pies and dishes!

Peach or Pear Chutney -- a spicy sauce or relish great for topping many dishes.



Red River county is formulating studies for a proposed prison and a 48-unit assisted living complex which might be built locally.


The commissioners authorized Commercial Resources, LLC to formulate studies for these projects.

There is also the possibility of building a 48-unit assisted living complex. This would employee from eight to 12 people locally and would provide a useful service to the area.


