Stacked up against the number of grasshoppers my newest stray cat, Teddy, brings to the door, the bird was pretty fascinating.

One thing I did notice though, was that going around on an early morning with Thomas to rob the racks (get the money from the newsstands) has become a new and fresh thing. I see the world through eyes that enjoy the scenery more than they did before I spent several weeks as a virtual shut in. I enjoy the sight of kids riding bikes, old people sitting on their front porches, and squirrels scampering up trees as if they were exotic sights on an overseas vacation!

A new roof on the Bogata fire station, a new house being built in Blossom, a remodeling in Deport, a storm damaged sign in Talco all made the trip seem informative and interesting.

So, it's all a matter of perspective, and it is true that absence makes the heart grow fonder. I'mlooking forward to being out and about, gathering ideas and little stories to share. In the meantime, hey, have I told you about this bright orange bird that's feeding at my hummingbird feeders?

## Deport 1st Presbyterian Church will celebrate 125 years this Sunday

This Sunday the doors to the historic First Presbyterian Church of Deport will open to welcome everyone to a special service commemorating their 125 years of Christianity. The message will be brought by Rev. Sam Rice, who has the distinction of having served as minister of the church for nearly 25 years, the longest tenure of any minister in the churches' 125 year history. The current minister, Ed Dodson, will also be on hand.

The First Presbyterian Church of Deport was organized in 1874, making it a pioneer church in the area. At first the congregation worshiped at Old Union Church, which stood where Old Deport Cemetery is presently located, just south of Deport. A new building was built in 1882, but was destroyed by a tornado in 1908. Services continued in a tent until a new building was finished. In 1912, the church was moved to it's present location. The land was donated by D Stephen Grant and his wife. At that time the windows had steep arches at the top, and the roofline was steeper. In 1924, it underwent extensive remodeling, which gave the cedar-sided structure it's present look. Since then central heat and air have been added and the church has been modernized and made more comfortable.

It was originally a Cumberland Presbyterian Church, but became a member of the U.S.A. Presbyterian Church in 1906. It remained so until the U.S. and U.S.A. Churches united in 1983. The church is an ecumenical body, participating with other churches in special community services at Christmas, Easter, Thanksgiving, Vacation Bible School, revivals and other forms of worship.

Many excellent ministers have served the congregation throughout the years, the longest tenure by Sam Rice, who was pastor from 1964 until 1988. The first minister, back in 1894, were Ministers T.H. Skidmore and William Roach.. The Rev. Joe Everheart served the church in the 1950s. More recent pastors include Rev. Tom Foley and Rev. Betty Payne, who served as co-pastors for a number of years before retirement, and the current minister, Rev. Ed Dodson.

Current members, former members from near and far and many friends are planning to attend this 125th celebration. Thoughts will also turn to the many generations of Presbyterians who have helped make up the congregation, been active, vital members of the community, and have shared their faith in God and Jesus Christ.

It will be a very special Sunday for the church and it's members and all are invited. A catered meal will be held after services at the Deport American Legion Hall so that fellowship can continue.

The Duke University Talent Identification Program seeks to identify the very bright students at an early age, to facilitate the education of those students, to follow and nurture their talent through the critical middle and high school years and to develop and effective research effort to help understand the nature of the academically talented adolescent.

# County raises fire department payments


The New Lamar County budget brings changes in money received by County Volunteer Fire Departments.

The sun was setting in the West and we were bent over the cotton rows, picking cotton as fast as we could pick it.

It was late August, 1940 and I was

6 years old. The mood was festive because we were only 150 pounds away from having our first bale of cotton picked and ready for the gin that night.

My daddy, Phillip Humphrey, wanted to take that bale of cotton to the gin that night. My mama Ollie, my brother Harrell, my sister Margaret and my aunt, Pud Blevins, whose real name was Clyde, were all striving to get that 150 pounds of cotton picked and weighed up so we could head for the gin.

Now my aunt Pud was a champion cotton picker because she was only about 4 1/2 feet tall and didn't have to bend much to pick it. Daddy was another story. It seemed he always had somethign else to do other than pick cotton.....the big straw boss.

For most of the small cotton farmers around Pattonville, getting that first bale of cotton was perhaps a bigger event than Christmas or New Years.

In fact, the first bale of cotton usually resulted in the first cash money for the farmer since the last bale of cotton the previous year.

After sunset, we headed for the wagon and weighed the cotton, which amounted to a little over 150

pounds. Daddy already had the team of mules harnessed and ready to go. Daddy told me and my brother that we could go with him to the gin. Here we were barefooted and sitting in that pice suffer cotton.

nice fluffy cotton.

We arrived at Jess Short's gin and had to line up behind other farmers waiting to get their cotton ginned. Although it was 1940, there was not a single tractor or truck at the gin. All of the cotton was hauled to the gin with either mules or horses. The Depression was still on and the small farmers of our area cold not afford a tractor or truck.

A lot of farmers really tried to bring in the first bale of cotton to the gin. The gins gave a monetary prize to the farmer that brought in the first bale of cotton.

My Uncle Clayton Blevins got the first bale once and my cousin, Billy Blevins got it twice.

The Almanac was the key as to when we planted cotton but they all interpreted the Almanac a little differently. Uncle Clayton planted his cotton and about two weeks earlier than daddy; therefore, his cotton was ready to pick earlier than ours.

I still think about the happy times of getting that first bale of cotton and taking it to the gin. We lived about one mile from the gin and I still remember laying in bed at night and hearing that old cotton gin going thug-thug-thug, just like a heartbeat.

### Emergency farm loans being accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by extreme fire hazards occurring August 1, 1999 and continuing in Titus County are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency in Mt. Pleasant and Clarksville.

Titus, Morris, Camp, Franklin an Red River are included in the Texas counties recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Dan Glickman, eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from extreme fire hazards.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75%.

Applications will be accepted until May 1, 2000, but farmers should apply as soon as possible.


