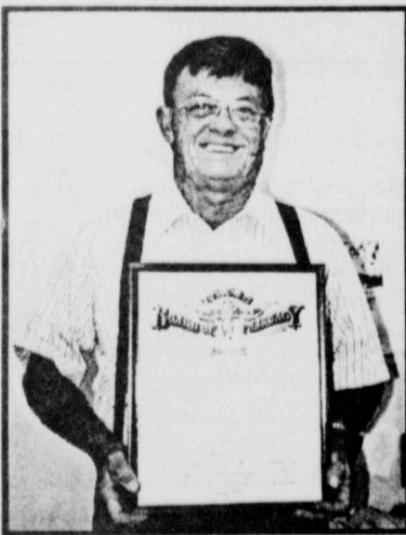
I didn't think too much about it, knowing the dog is cold natured like I am, until I realized that Thomas had gotten up and was closing the windows.

String of vehicle burglaries cleared up, property recovered

A series of vehicle burglaries have been cleared up since last week. Pct. 1 Constable Randy Boren and Lamar County Sheriff's Investigator Scott Cass report.

Two adults and two juveniles have been arrested and charged in the matter while one more adult is still at large.

Brad Lester and Jeffery O'Neal, of Paris were apprehended last week after a string of burglaries on various parking lots, including Prairiland High School.

Seven break ins occurred on the Prairiland parking lot, and one on the Pattonville Post Office parking lot,

and break ins at North Lamar High School and Paris High School also took place.

Constable Boren says that they have recovered all the stolen goods reported except for two CD players and 4 CDs. The stolen goods were valued at \$4,800.

Involved in the investigation, arrests and recovery of property were Constable Boren, Investigator Cass, Pct. 4 Constable Billy Foreman and Investigator Steve Hill.

All five of the perpetrators are reported to be on probation. Charges of Felony Theft have been filed on Lester and O'Neal.

Misuse of dumpster results in it's removal from County Barn

Misuse and abuse of the dumpster at County Bar Pct. 1 in Pattonville has led to the removal of the dumpster.

According to Commissioner Mike Blackburn County employees have to spend two to three hours a day picking up trash, lumber, sheet iron and building scraps before going out to perform their daily work duties.

"We have asked people to abide by the rules and not dump items other than appliances on the ground. If they would just bring items that could be thrown into the dumpster we wouldn't have to remove the dumpster," Blackburn said.

He continued "The purpose of having the large dumpster was to provide a place for residents of Pct. 1 to dispose of items in an environmentally safe manner. It also helped our people to not have to go out and clean trash out of ditches and creeks in Pct. 1."

"I regret having to remove the

dumpster, but the dumpster will be gone by Thursday of this week" Blackburn concluded.

According to Blackburn, on Monday of this week there was so much trash and debris on the group it actually spread from the dumpster to inside the equipment shed. It took three men two hours to clear the ground. The cost of the dumpster has laden the Pct. 1 budget with approximately \$1,200 per month, and that is expensive.

"I simply can't continue using county employees to clean up the mess left by people throwing things on the ground. If residents will come forth, and assure me they will help patrol the dumping, I might be able to put the dumpster back".

Blackburn concluded by stating that "I regret an inconvenience this poses for Pct. 1 residents who have used the dumpster properly".

Pharmacist has watched medicine come "from the dark ages" during fifty years in the business

Duane Glover of Deport is celebrating a rather unique achievement. This year he was presented with a certificate of achievement by the State Pharmacy Board observing the fact that he has been a pharmacist for fifty years! Duane received his pharmacy license in 1949, and returned to carry on a family tradition, working alongside his father, C.B. Glover at City Drug Store in Deport.

He and his wife, Martha, have three children, Marilyn, Betsy and David. Two of the three have also become pharmacists. Marilyn came into the pharmacy with her father in 1977, and David is with Eckerd's Drug Stores in Dallas. Betsy is a registered nurse.

Over fifty years Duane says that he has "literally watched medicine come out of the dark ages and into the light".

"When I first began working as a pharmacist there were so few drugs to choose from. Medicine was so limited. Now, there is such a tremendous choice of fine medicines for medical professionals to prescribe" he says.

Another major change he has observed is the addition of computers. "Computers have increased the efficiency and number of prescrip-

tions a pharmacy can fill tremendously" Duane explains. "It has improved just about everything, patient information, filling prescriptions, new information about medications, just everything", he continues.

He says that without the modern computer technology pharmacies could not handle the volume they can.

However, at City Drug in Deport high tech hasn't replaced friendly, personalized service. Like most smaller town pharmacies, everyone knows everyone else, and feels free to ask their pharmacist questions from how to use over the counter medicine for a cold to the what they think about new medicines.

In addition to working at City Drug, Duane is highly involved with the Deport Volunteer Fire Department. He served as Fire Chief for many years, before "retiring" and consenting to serve only as assistant chief, where his knowledge and experience continue to be of value.

He also enjoys his grandchildren, Ty and Peyton, who live near by, and serves on the Deport City Council.

Duane Glover has been a pharmacist for fifty years. He has also been a vital part of the community for every one of those years.

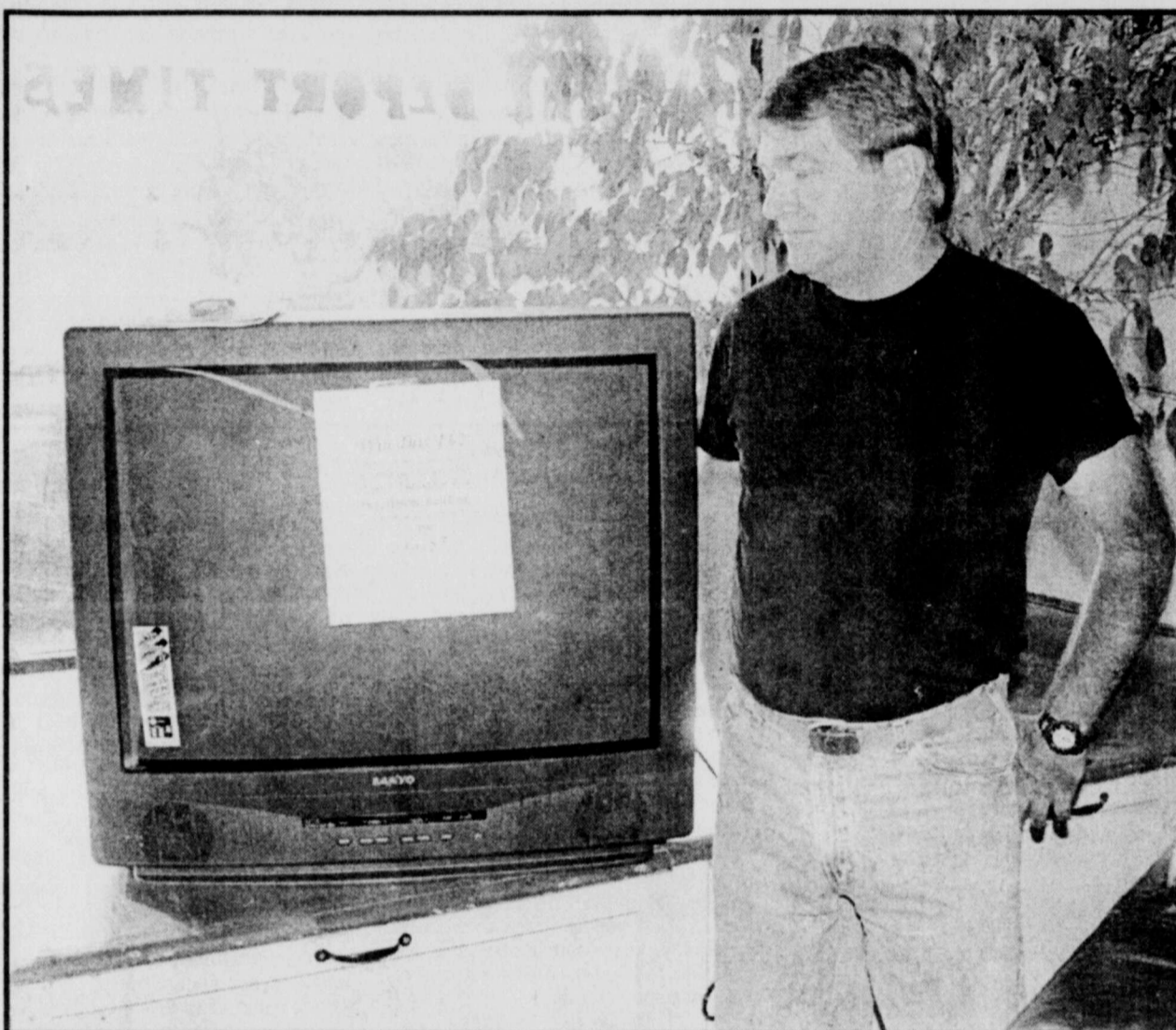

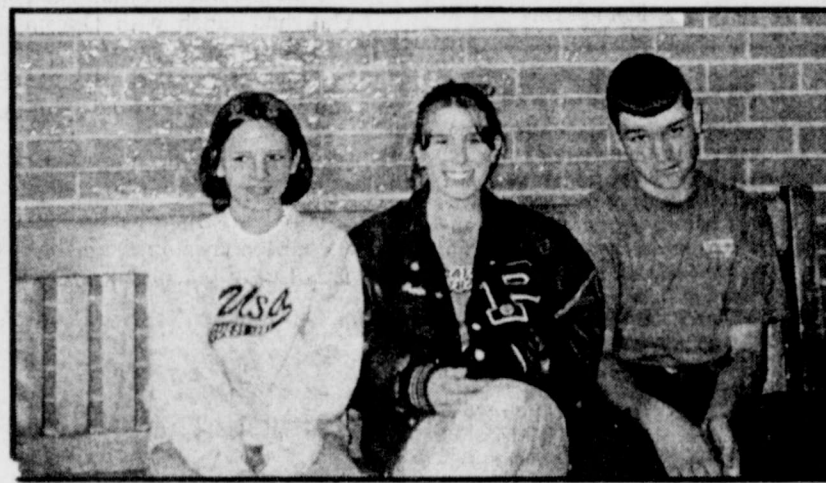

FOOT NOTES 

POSTERIOR TIBIAL NEURALGIA

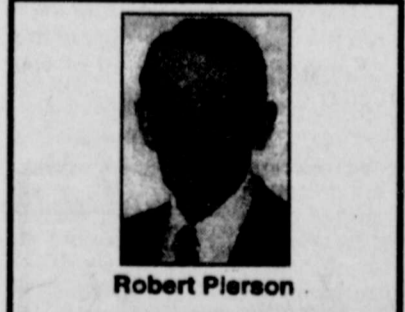

SAFE DRINKING WATER CONSUMER CONFIDENCE REPORT REPORT BLOSSOM, TEXAS

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires all community water systems deliver an annual consumer confidence report to each consumer by October 19, 1999.

The report for the City of Blossom developed from test data prepared by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) as a result of tests completed by the Texas Department of Health, has been completed and mailed to each consumer.

Test results show the drinking water from the City of Blossom water system is safe and that the City has met all health standard requirements.

The consumer confidence report and test documents are available to the public at the Blossom City Hall. Consumers who wish additional information may call the Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

The City of Blossom purchases all city water from the Lamar County

Water Supply District, which supplies water to communities throughout Lamar County. The water is delivered to the City by pipeline to the water tower reservoir located in the City Park. From this point, the water is delivered throughout the city by supply lines maintained by the City Public Works Department.

In addition to test results in the report, the City water is tested monthly by the Lamar County Health Department and monitored by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. Copies of all test results are maintained in the City Water Department and are available of public inspection during the normal business hours of the Blossom City Hall at 1240 West Front Street.

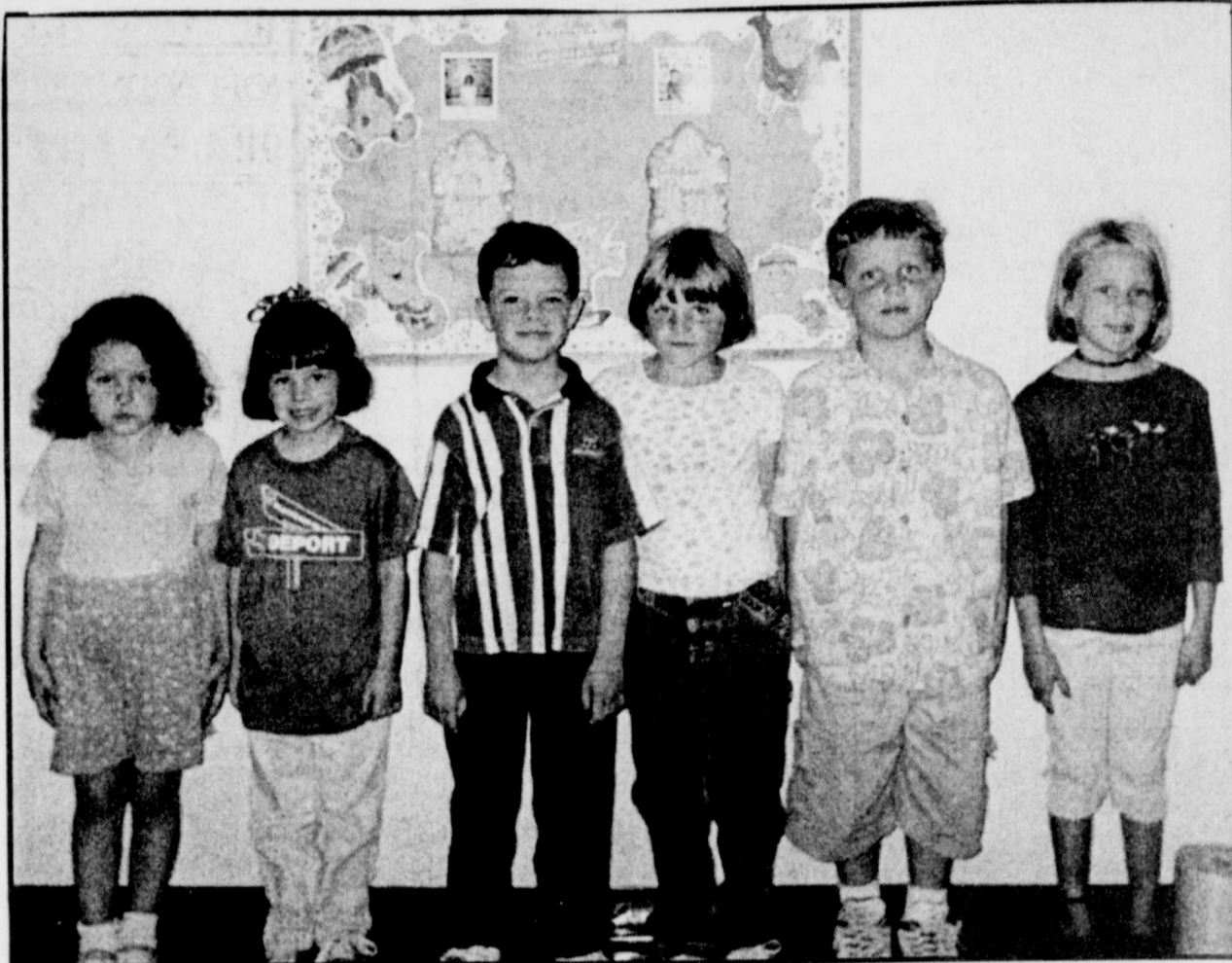
