



#### How Year 2000 Fraud works

The first thing a con artist often does is persuade consumers that Year 2000 computer problems will create havoc on our economy. They may describe frightening scenarios of banks shutting down, leaving account owners empty handed and unable to recover funds from their accounts or investments in IRAs and Certificates of Deposit.

Con artists may also warn about problems affecting other sources of income such as government assistance or investments in the stock market. Fearing the elimination of social security, Medicare, or their hard earned retirement dollars.

#### Common schemes con artist use to swindle money:

\* Convincing consumers that the dire predictions regarding loss of financial security due to Year 2000 problems are true.

\* Persuading consumers to invest in "special" or "secret" products, companies, or accounts that will generate tremendous profits.

Advising individuals to withdraw their money out of banks, credit unions, or other financial institutions and turn it over to them for 'safekeeping"

#### Tips and warning signs to guard against fraud

\* NEVER give out account information or credit card numbers to someone unless you're certain they are trustworthy. Thieves can appear very sincere and friendly. And they can be very persuasive. All they need is your account number to empty all the money out of your account.

\* Don't enter into a deal if you're being pressured to act immediately.

\* Be wary of people posing as bank officials, police officers, or other government agents who ask you to assist them in an investigation or audit of your financial institution. You may be asked to withdraw cash or give out your account information. No legitimate official would ask a consumer to participate in this type of investigation.

# ICA testifies against Canadian cattle

Chuck Kiker, President of the Independent Cattlemen's Association of Texas testified recently before the International Trade Commission in Washington, D.C.

The hearings before ITC were the result of a Countervailing Duty and Antidumping Duty petition filed last year by the Ranchers-Cattlemen Action Legal Fund and ICA against the Canadian cattle industry.

"We are here because our industry is in great trouble and because dumped cattle from Canada, in excess of one million head and nearly \$1 billion dollars annually, are sig-

nificantly contributing to our industry's troubles," said R-CALF President Leo McDonnell, Jr.

Since petitions were filed last October, live cattle imports from Canada are down by more than 25% and prices in the market are up pretty strong.


The U.S. Department of Commerce has issued a prelimianry ruling in favor of R-CALF and ICA and has been collecting tariffs on Canadian cattle since July 1. The final ruling by the ITC is expected on November 8, 1999.




