His heart was pounding, but he let me carry him to the back pond, where I freed him into a

sheltered environment. All day he rested, staying near the far edge of the pool. About dusk he showed signs of reviving, and swam out looking for food. The next day, he was

gone, rested up, I suppose. But I am still in awe at the beauty of this wild creature. I hope I did him a favor. I know, that by staying quietly in my hands while I looked at his incredible beauty, he did me a favor. Sometimes we fail to appreciate from a distance the small beauties that exist all around us.




Deport Methodists to hold Revival

His own animals flock around him in a happy, tail-wagging group, obviously as devoted to "daddy" as he is to them.


Jake attended the American Boarding Kennel Association's training course to become a Petcare Technician, and takes the responsibility of caring for other people's "Furry kids" seriously.

MAP stand sfor Motivation for Academic Performance and is aimed at students who possess high academic ability. The program strives to assist with the developement and support of talented fourth and fifth graders.

It functions as an informational resource program by supplementing efforts in the participants' homes, schools and communities. MAP program provides information about enrichment opportunites and encouragement for gifted students. Each student whpo signs up will receive the newsletter The Navigator, which features articles and activities that MAP hopes will help studentskkk develop new interests, learn about new opportunites and enjoy academic

Participants receive the newsletter twice a year through sixth grade. Participants will also receive a resource book listing a variety of summer and year-around educational programs geared toward elementary

and middle school students.

Another benfit is the Student Coun seling Guide, which provides parents and students with information on a variety of topics pertinent to the education of high ability students, as well as resource suggestions. These students also have the choice to take the EXPLORE test, developed for eighth graders by American College Testing. (a fee is required.)

In order to qualify for the program, a current fourth grade student must have a TLI score of 91 or higher on the math portion of the last year's third grade TAAS or 94 or greater on the reading section. A current fifth grader would qualify with a fourth grad TAAS score of math TLI 88 or greater or reading TLI of 96 or greater.


