


# \$316.7 million delivered in February tax rebates

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander delivered \$316.7 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,105 Texas cities and 119 counties, a 01.4 percent decrease compared to the \$318.2 million allocated to cities and counties in February, 1999. So far, sales tax rebates to cities and counties are up 6.6 percent compared to the first two months of 1999.

Local payments received include: Pleasant received \$326,199.87, a 9.11% decrease over last year's payment.

Talco received \$1,052.43, marking an 18.57% decrease.

Bogata received \$8,116.34 for a 59.14% decrease.

Thelma retired at the end of the school year of 1943. She had married Ben Warren at Christmas of 192, and was taking on a new role as the wife of a farmer, rancher and dairyman in the Fulbright community.

Mr. Ben had a daughter, Susie Lou, by his first wife, who had died. Susie Lou was married. Her husband was in Air Force Cadet Training. World War II was going on. Since they were being moved fro air base to air base the couple brought their son, Jim, to Ben and Thelma when he was only two weeks old. Living conditions for new born babies were not good, so Jim Kunkel spent his formative years with Ben and Thelma during the war. Jim called them Papa and Momma, and to this day he still calls Thelma momma. The lives in Houston with his family, and calls "momma" at least once a week.

After the war Jim became big brother to his sister, Valerie, who lives in Longview with her family. 'Back then his family lived in Clarksville. Every Friday, when he got out of school, Thelma was there to pick Jim up ad he spent the weekend with the Warrens. One Friday, after a heavy rain, the creek was out and water was across the bridge. Thelma was late to Clarksville to fetch Jim. She told him why she was late and asked him what he would do if she was later some other time, or could not show up.

Jim's firm replay "I'll sit on the steps and wait for you, Momma."

Thelma says that some of her students grew up to be her best friends. Some of these friends and others made up a traveling group of seven. They took several fun trips together in a van. Thelma, Virginia Grant Kirkland, Reba Griffin Temple, Ruth Grant Murrell, Ina Sparks, Nina Sparks and Mavis Sowards take off to places such Branson, Mo.; Gatlinburg, Tenn. (they also have been to Pigeon Forge

and Dollywood). A favorite spot going and coming from Tennessee is the Casey Jones Motel, where they go through the Casey Jones Home, now a museum.

Thelma's grandparents, Henry Clay and Amy Rebecca King were from Jackson, and she wondered what it had been like in Jackson in their day. In addition to these trips they went to Beavers Bend, Oklahoma in April and October for many years.

Thelma is a long time member of the First United Methodist Church of Deport.

"I am surrounded with friends I grew up with and many that I taught. They play the piano, the organ, Direct the choir and are Sunday School teachers...it's home" she smiles.

Thelma says that "four classes of former Deport Students go together and have homecoming often, and they always include me. One year they had as their theme "This Is Your Life Miss Thelma". Some are now 80, but they come home and enjoy being together and remembering their cherished school days, their cherished school days, and the teachers and friends they love so much. On another occasion they presented me with a long white paddle that reads 'From All Your Students, We Love You Miss Thelma'. It decorates one of my walls and reminds me of them daily.

Miss Thelma, as she is affectionately known, has a lovely apartment in the Deport Housing Authority. She is happy and enjoys the company of friends daily. She and the other traveling members have lots of stories to share.

Thelma says "The greatest thing about living in the apartments is being reunited with my friend of 70 years, Ruth Grant Murrell. We went to high school together, attended college together and never lost contact over the years that Ruth lived in Lufkin. We don't see each other every day but we do talk several times a day on the phone".



# Campaign signs not allowed on right-of-way

As the election season moves into high gear, candidates and campaign workers are reminded to be careful where they place campaign signs.

Such signs are not allowed on state highway right of way, which is reserved for official traffic control signs. Campaign signs erected on highway right of way will be removed by the Texas Department of Transportation and the owner can be charged for removal costs.

In addition, a person placing an unauthorized sign in highway right

As the election season moves into of way can be fined up to \$500 per


Campaign signs may be placed on private property, with the landowner's permission if they meet certain restrictions. Signs must be made on lightweight material and be no larger than 50 square feet. They can be erected no sooner than 90 days before an election and must be re-

moved 10 days after the election.

Signs within city limits may be subject to local ordinances.


