Hotly contested county attorney races result in incumbents being ousted

Lamar and Red River County Attorney incumbents were defeated in the most hotly contested races in local election action Tuesday, March

Lamar County incumbent Kerye Ashmore received 2,829 to challenger Mark Burtner's 3,702 votes, Burtner winning with about a 57 percent of the vote

Incumbent Jack Herrington in Red River County was defeated by challenger Val Varley losing 2,238 for Varley, 828 for Herrington.

Neither Burtner nor Varley have a Republican opponent this fall.

In Red River County the Sheriff's race had three contenders. Former Sheriff Bob Storey and current Sheriff Bob Edrington ran neck and neck with Storey coming out with 1506 votes, Edrington 1275 votes. Third runner George White captured 291 votes. This means that there will be a runoff election between Storey and Edrington.

In the Titus County Sheriff's race appointed Sheriff Arvel Shepard defeated his challenger, Jackie Stinson 2840 to 1207.

In the Titus County Tax Assessor-Collector race there will be a run off between Incumbent June Roach and challenger Judy Cook. Cook received 2,010 votes, Roach 1,302, and third runner Dianne Wilson Norris received

In Lamar County Sheriff B.J. McCoy had no problems returning to office, receiving 4,890 votes to challenger Steve Davoust's 1,589, taking 75% of the vote.

Precinct One Constable Randy Boren won over Mark Keys 428 to

McCoy and Boren have no opponent in the fall election.

Another interesting race in the primaries was the 62nd Judicial Judge Race. This will result in a run off between top democratic vote getters Scott McDowell and Jesse Nickerson.

The winner of that race will oppose Republican Jeff Starnes, who easily defeated his opponent, Mike Mosher, 1,149 to 471.

Democratic incumbent for State Representative Mark Homer had no trouble defeating his challenger, Patricia Blount, with 5,638 votes to her 733.

U.S. Representative Max Sandlin, again the Democratic incumbent, captured 5,073 votes to B.D. Blount's

District 2 State Representative Democratic incumbent Tom Ramsey defeated his challenger, Sarah Bailey King 8,127 to 4,953.

He will face Noble Willingham as the Republican vying for Sandlin's place this fall. Willingham defeated his challenger easily

On a national level there were very few surprises, with this area voting like the rest of the state, overwhelmingly for Al Gore for the Democratic presidential nomination and George W. Bush for the Republican presidential candidate.

Run off elections will be held on April 11th, 2000.

Arrests made in anhydrous theft cases

A Crime Stoppers tip Thursday, March 10, led to the arrest of a Lamar County man and two Red River County men for the possession of anhydrous ammonia.

Paris Department Narcotics Division officers arrested Larry Wayne Hicks, 32, at the residents after following up on information provided in the Crime Stoppers tip. Hicks was arrested and charged with unlawful possession of a firearm by a felon, possession of anhydrous ammonia and unlawful use of criminal instru-

According to police reports, officers found the suspected anhydrous ammonia and also a handgun, glassware, tubing and other items consistent with the manufacture of methamphetamine.

While enroute to Lamar County Jail, Hicks reportedly said "the gun belongs to frank Middleton, it's not mine.

Two suspects were arrested Saturday for attempting to steal anhydrous ammonia from a storage tank of Deport Farm Supply in Deport.

RCSAP Investigator Danny Powell and the National Guard detachment were watching the storage

tank after reports that individuals were stealing from the tank to produce methamphetamine.

Powell and Red River County Deputy Chris Phelps arrested Frank Middleton, 43, and Ronald Gene Mantooth, 38, at the scene. They were both charged with tampering with equipment designed to hold anhydrous ammonia, criminal trespass and unlawful use of a criminal instrument and were booked in Red River

County Jail. Due to the rise in "Nazi style" quick methamphetamine cooks, the Texas Legislature passed a law that went into effect September 1, 1999, making it illegal to possess, maintain or deliver anhydrous ammonia in a container not designed or manufactured to hold that chemical.

Anhydrous ammonia is a vital ingredient used in the cooking process of methamphetamine.

Surveillance of anhydrous ammonia tanks will continue and RCSAP officials expect more arrests.

RCSAP Commander Eddie Almond credits the success of the operation to the cooperation of all the agencies involved.

Petition presented to council concerning stray dog problem

Michelle Ford and a group of concerned citizens presented the council with a petition signed by over 100 residents of Deport asking for something to be done about the stray dog problem in Deport when the council met Monday afternoon.

A discussion of possible solutions to the problem was held, but no action was taken and this item on the agenda was tabled. The council will be gathering information from other cities and county officials for action at a later date.

Mike Doonan representing Hayter Engineering explained some overlapping work concerning Grant 2000. The council members approved replacing the master lift station at the waste water treatment plant and replacing the water main on south Pecan Street. Repaving of Pecan Street will be contracted independently of Grant 2000. These choices were made because the lift station is showing signs of severe corrosion and the many

water main breaks on Pecan Street. A waiver was granted to the Deport Homecoming Committee allowing a dance to be held at the new fire station building Friday, June 2nd during the Homecoming Celebration

The city has an ordinance banning public dances, thus the necessity of the waiver.

It was decided to assist the Baseball Association with their electric bill at the ball field again this year. The city agreed to pay \$1,000 again this year.

No action was taken on property

that needs major cleanup. The council approved buying a riding lawn mower for use on areas not accessible with a tractor and shred-

The council reviewed the city audit conducted by McClanahan and Holmes and voted to accept it.



Failte romhat! This means welcome in Irish which is where our cook comes to us this week from. Sine we will be celebrating St. Patrick's Day on Friday, March 17, 2000. May you each have the luck of the Irish with you!

St. Patrick's Day is celebrated on March 17th to honor Patrick, Ireland's patron saint.

Almost 1500 years ago the patron saint and national hero of Ireland was born to a Gaelic family who had migrated to Britain. The child was called Succat, which means "warlike". Since Britain was part of the Roman Empire and had become Christian, the child was baptized and called Patricius, meaning "noble". For 16 years, Patrick lived a normal life as the son of a prosperous landowner and magistrate.

Captured and forced into slavery, Patrick spent 6 years herding sheep. He made his escape and after a period of time, returned to Ireland to do

missionary work. On his return, Patrick worked 40 years in this field, preaching, baptizing and establishing churches, schools and colleges. History reports that he used shamrock leaves to explain the meaning of the Trinity. Although the date is not confirmed, it is reported that St. Patrick died on March 17, 493 after bringing the Christina faith to

The first Irish celebrations on the date of St. Patrick's death were noisy affairs. As the Irish emigrated around the world, they took the St. Pat's celebration with them and today parades are held in some very unlikely places as well.

The Irish heritage has had a profound influence on the nation. Nine of the people who signed the Declaration of Independence were of Irish origin. Nineteen of the presidents of the United States proudly claim Irish heritage and this included our first president, George Washington.

Hope you enjoy these Irish recipes and we will see you in the kitchen.

Irish Lamb Stew -- they say that this is just right after a night at the pubs and gets better as it gets older!

Irish Bangers-these need to be left overnight in the fridge before freezing and need to be fried until golden brown.

Strawberry Scones-Bake golden brown and serve with whipped cream! Irish Rarebit-a famous high tea

Crubeens-this is a Dublin favorite. Although I am not sure what trotters are, the recipe is self-explana-

Bacon and Egg Pie-this is eaten warm or cold, at home or on a country outing and is a most popular dish!



March 16, 2000 St. Patrick's Day Recipes



Irish Lamb Stew 1/2 pound thickly sliced bacon-diced 6 pounds boneless Lamb-cut in 2-inch l teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pep-1/2 cup ali-purpose flour

2 cloves garlic peeled-finely chopped l large yellow onion-peeled and chopped 1/2 cup water 4 cups beef stock

2 teaspoons sugar

4 cups carrots-l inch pieces 2 large yellow onions-l-inch pieces teaspoon dried thyme-whole

bay leaf cup dry white wine

garnish with parsley Saute bacon in large frying pan and eserve fat and bacon. Put lamb, salt, pepper, flour in a large mixing bowl and toss to coat meat evenly. Brown in frying pan with bacon fat. Put meat into 10 quart pan-leave 1/4 cup of fat in frying pan. Add garlic and onion and saute until onion begins to color. Deglaze frying pan with 1/2 cup water and add the onion-garlic mixture to casserole with bacon pieces, stock and sugar. Cover and simmer for 1-1/2 hours or till tender. Add remaining ingredients to pot and immer covered for 20 minutes until

egetables are tender. Irish Bangers 2 teaspoons ground white pepper teaspoon ground ginger teaspoon sage teaspoon mace

ounce s salt 6 ounces bread crumbs 10 pounds fat pork butt

if lean add I pound fat back cups ice water

Grind meat to half medium and half fine. Add spices and mix very well. Stuff into small casing links or make into patties. Leave overnight in fridge before serving. Fry until golden brown Strawberry Scones

cup strawberries 2-1/2 cup all-purpose flour 3 tablespoons sugar teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt tablespoons butter or margarine 2/3 cup milk

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Cut trawberries into 1/2-inch pieces and set aside. In large bowl, mix together flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. Add butter. With pastry blender cut butter until mixture resembles coarse meal. Stir in reserved strawberries and toss to coat well. Add milk all at once. With fork lightly toss together until mixture holds together. With floured hands gently form into balls. On floured board with floured rolling pin, roll out dough to V-inch thick. Cut dough into 2-1/2inch circles. Places on greased cookie heet and bake until golden brown about 2 minutes. Serve with whipped cream.

Irish Rarebit 2 tablespoons butter or margarine 2 tablespoons flour l teaspoon Dijon mustard I teaspoon honey 1/2 cup milk 1/2 cup Guiness Stout I cup grated cheddar cheese

salt and pepper Melt butter in heavy pan and stir in flour to make a roux. Cook on low hea for a further minute without allowing to brown. Remove pan and gradually beat milk into the roux. Return to heat and stir until the mixture thickens. Stir in mustard and honey and finally Guinness Cook fairly rapidly for 2-3 minutes and add grated cheese and stir over very low heat until all cheese is melted. Spread thickly on four slices of toast and brown under grill.



Lightly shape on a floured board and cut into two pieces. Grease a 10-inch pie pan and roll out half of pastry and line plate with this. Place rasher like the spokes of a wheel and break an egg into each of these spaces. Roll ou the other half of he pastry and carefully cover the filling with this. Crimp edges all around. Lightly mark segments with knife so that each person gets a rasher and an egg. Brush top with milk. Place

This week's query is from Donna Hansen, 4609 Chattahoochee Crossing, Marietta, CA 30067. She would like information about William Hayes Benton, born 1823 TV. According to a notice in the Northern Standard of Clarksville, dated 8 May 1844, W.H. Benton married Eleanor Jordan, daughter of Levi Jordan, on 14 April 1844 at Jordan's Mills. It is not known whether or not William H. Benton ever lived in Red River County or where Jordan's Mills was located. The family understands that he obtained land, possibly in Red River County, from a Jordan or Benton family. About a hundred years later, around 1945/50, there would have been a release signed by several members of William Benton's family. William supposedly left the property and paid no taxes on it. By the 1860's, William was living in the Gonzales/ Guadalupe County area.
