I had my hair fixed up in one of those hideous "bee hive" creations that made me cringe even back then. For once, though, I joined the crowd.


I had on nearly white, iridescent lipstick (cutting edge, that) and was about as dressed up as I have ever been, before or since.

Can this be the reason that the LEC Board of Directors are violating the by-laws of the Co-op, which states that an "annual meeting of the members shall be held between Aprill and August 1 of each year, beginning with the year 1978"? For a candidates name to appear on the official ballot for a position as a director of the co-pop, his or her name must be on the ballot not less than 60 days nor more than 90 days before the date of the annual meeting. Notification of the filing dates shall be by mail or by publication in Co-op Power at least 90 days prior ot the annual meeting.

Ninety days before August 1 has already passed, and yet the Board has failed to notify its members of an annual meeting. Has the LEC Board of Directors decided to ignore the by-laws, and not have an annual meeting? Does the Board fear they might possibly lose about \$80,000.00 if they held an annual

ACHILLES TENDINITIS

The Achilles tendon connects the wo major calf muscles to the back of the heel bone. Achilles tendinitis occurs when this tendon becomes inflamed, usually due to excess stress. Over time, the inflammation can produce a layer of scar tissue that is less flexible than the tendon. If an inflamed Achilles continues to be stressed, it can tear or rupture. People with Achilles tendinitis feel a dull or sharp pain along the tendon, usually close to the heel. They have limited ankle flexibility and redness or heat in the area. 


Old clipping recalls busy days at Post Office

Monday wa a big day at the Deport Post Office, according to Postmaster Clarence H. Nobles. The increased business is due largely to the 700 Mexican Nationalists who are here picking cotton.

Figures show 142 airmail registered letters were handled along with money order sales of \$900 and stamp sales exceeded \$110 Monday, according to Postmaster Nobles.

Nobles and his cler, Miss Brodie Bell, kept the post office open Saturday afternoon to help take care of the increased buisiness. Ordinarily the office closes at Saturday noon.
