Then, just a day or two later I watched as a mocking-bird swooped down on one of my cats, literally yanking a wad of fur out of her back. The noisy birds have a nest in a tree not far from the house, but have defended it so diligently the cats now give that area a wide berth rather than deal with the shrieking, hair pulling sky-borne creatures.

Then, I went down to mow at the neighbor's again. As I made my first pass through the yard three tiny little brown forms flew up in front of me. It was a trio of wrens, each not over two inches in length. I got off the mower and chased them down, carefully taking each one into my hand. They were perfect little miniainy and just able to fly for short distances. They must have just left the nest. And each one was courageous enough to try and threaten me with it's little beak! I put them carefully in a safe place and kept an eye on them while I finished the yard.

Now these little birds all showed defiance and courage. They also showed fear. That fear was apparent, but didn't keep them from trying their best against forces that outweighed them much as an atomic bomb does a fire-cracker.

I know it is instinct, but what a wonderful instinct it is. There must be many times when these feathered warriors lose their battles. But for the Kill Deer, Mockingbirds and wrens I encountered each time their strength of purpose won. Is

A Generous Gardener...Shorty Ballard gives away more than he keeps

L.C. "Shorty" Ballard of Deport has been growing a garden for sixtyeight years, and his generosity with fresh garden produce is well known.

Shorty grew his first garden when he was 20 years old, and this year is his 68th year to plant and harvest garden staples such as corn, beans, tomatoes, okra and all the other "goodies".

Back when he and his wife, Flossie were raising their two songs the garden was more of a necessity than now. Flossie canned and put up preserves, jams and jellies. Later, the couple froze a lot of their produce. Shorty and Flossie were married in 1933 and that marriage endured until 1994, when she passed away. He has six grandchildren and twelve great-grandchildren now. After her death, Shorty kept right on gardening, and freezing some of the fruits and vegetables his bountiful ground produced.

"I didn't know much about canning" he smiles, "but I tried to make pear preserves. I didn't get a good seal on the first batch, and they spoiled." What did he do? What one might expect of him, he turned around and tried again, this time successfully.

A few years ago he planted his back yard in a small peach orchard.

"This year hasn't been a great year for fruits and vegetables" Shorty says, "there's been too much rain. This has caused plums and peaches to sluff off, and tomatoes to fall off with rot".

But it hasn't kept the generous gardener from sharing loads of the things that have done well. People all over the area will look up to see him coming with a sack of onions, potatoes, beans or corn. Peppers, peas, whatever is being harvested, Shorty takes to friends and neighbors.

It is always most welcome, as is his smiling face.

At age eighty-eight he still experiments with various varieties of vegetable

"I've never had any luck with watermelons" he vows, "I don't know if it's this black soil, or if it's me, but I've planted a few again this year".

He has a few cantaloupes planted and harvests some lovely blackber-

"I think Early Girl and Super Fantastic are my favorites tomato plants" he says, "some of the other kinds will split when it gets hot".

Any gardening advice the man gives should probably be heeded, because it's obvious that 68 years of experience are behind every statement

Gardening is not the necessity it used to be for him. In fact, he gives away more produce than he keeps for his own use. "I have to keep busy" he smiles, "and growing a garden is a sure fire way to do that". It's also a sure fire way to have friends who appreciate his hard work and generosity.



Happy 4th of July! We hope everyone has a safe and happy holiday! This is one of the most celebrated holidays of the year with cookouts. picnics, family gatherings and other special summer festivities.

Since the 4th is celebrated with fireworks, flags, food and fun. . . here are a few facts about our nation's flag that you may not know about.

Congress first authorized the United States Flag on June 14, 1777, the day we currently celebrate Flag Day in America. This date is also significant in that it qualifies our flag as the third oldest of the National Standards of the world, even older that Britain's Union Jack.

The flag was first flown from Fort Stanwix, on the site of the present city of Rome, New York, on August 3, 1777. The flag had a tumultuous beginning. It went through the Battle of Oriskany when it was only three days old on August 6, 1777.

The flag's original design called for a star and a stripe for each state, corresponding to the original thirteen colonies. In 1791, Vermont was admitted to the union, followed by Kentucky in 1792. The number of stars and stripes was accordingly raised to fifteen. As other states joined, it was clear something would have to be done about the ever expanding flag. An act of Congress in 1818 reduced and restricted the number of stripes on the flag to thirteen. A star would be added for each new state.

The individual stars depicting the states represent the power of our Federal Constitution, which reserves the States their individual sovereignty, except as to rights delegated by them to the Federal Government.

George Washington said of the flag's symbolism, "We take the stars from Heaven, the red from our mother county, separating it by white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes shall o down to posterity representing

Local telephone services for more than a quarter million Texas phone customers, most of whom live in rural or small communities, will be upgraded under an order signed on Thursday by the Public Utility Com-

Valor Telecommunications of Texas, L.P. agreed to buy 313,800 phone lines in 197 local exchanges scattered throughout west Texas, east Texas and the Texarkana area, from GTE Southwest. The sale is expected to close on September 1

In addition to maintaining at least the current level of service for customers, Valor plans to introduce the following improvements to its system when the sale is closed:

*Upgrade central office facilities to improve Custom Local Area Signaling Services such as caller ID, call waiting, three way calling, call forwarding, call return, call blocker and automatic redial.

*Provide CLASS to all exchanges within 18 months.

*Introduce high speed internet access or digital subscriber line service to at least 10 exchanges within 18

*Deploy DSL within 15 months to any exchange with at least 75 DSL requests from Valor subscribers re-

*Guarantee internet service to every local exchange within 187

Valor has agreed to pay GTE \$942 million, slightly more than \$3,000 per access line.

Valor has agreed to notify all customers of the opportunity to obtain DSL servies and will also advise local community leaders. The company also will-continue the current discount rate for providing broadband services to school libraries and hos-

All 320 GTE employees will keep their jobs at current salaries and receive comparable benefits. Valor also has committed to increase its work force by at least 10% within 18 months

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Unclaimed property auction is July 22

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander is taking her annual Unclaimed Property Auction to San Antonio and into cyberspace. Comptroller Rylander announced that more than 112,000 items from abandoned safe deposit boxes will be auctioned to the public on Saturday, July 22 at the Henry B. Gonzalez Convention Center in San Antonio.

Comptroller Rylander also announced that this year, for the first time, bidders can participate in the auction via the internet. The Comptroller has contracted with theauctionchannel.com to broadcast the Unclaimed Property Auction live on the web and convey bids from around the world to the auctioneer in San Antonio. Texa is the first state to conduct an internet simulcast of an unclaimed property auction.

Items up for bid are valued at more than a half million dollars. They in-

*95,381 coins/currency valued at

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*733 gold coins with an appraised value of \$69,068

*990 flatware/holloware items estimated to be worth \$16,268

*9,363 stamps/paper items valued at \$4,672

*179 wrist watched with an estimated value of \$15,272

*54 pocket watches appraised at

*193 bracelets valued at \$8,956 *388 necklaces worth approximately \$30,197

*241 brooches with an estimated value of \$31,687

*637 rings valued at \$100,807, and *1,228 loose stones worth an estimated \$107,839

The most valuable item in the sale is a 3.2 carat loose diamond with an appraised value of \$25,000. There are more loose diamonds and gemstones and more gold coins in this year's auction than in any previous sale.

The sale items come primarily from abandoned safe deposit boxes. After five years, banks turn the safe deposit box contents over to the Comptroller, who continues to hold the property for at least a year, and publishes the owner's names in

newspapers and on the internet.

If the property owners turn up after the auction, they receive the proceeds from the sale of their property In the meantime, money raised by the auction will be used to fund state programs, such as public education.




