Letter asks for school zone at Pattonville in hopes of preventing further accidents

The following letter is being prepared to send to the Texas Department of Transportation. Signatures are being collected from those who feel a school zone through Pattonville would, hopefully, make it safer. Anyone wishing to may sign at M&M Food Mart in Pattonville or at Prairiland High School. The letter reads

Dear Mr. Keisler,

I am making a request to the Texas Department of Transportation to extend the Prairiland High School Zone to include an area that runs down Highways 271 through the Pattonville area. At the current time we have a school zone on Farm Market Road 196 in front of the High School

Over the past years we have had several accidents, near accidents, and now a student fatality just this past Thursday, August 22, at the point where Farm Road 196 intersects with Highway 271 in front of the M&M Grocery Store.

If we could get a designated school zone on Highway 271 with yellow flashing lights, and a slower speed limit, it would provide greater safety for our students and public. It would also help the sheriff's department and constable in their attempts to enforce speed limits.

I am sending this letter to you with the signatures of many students and citizens of our area who urgently ask you and your department to install this School Zone as soon as possible. Thank You,


Minter Homecoming set for this Saturday





Grilled New Potatoes with Parsley-Chive Pesto

1/2 cup parsley sprigs 1/2 cup minced chives

tablespoons lemon juice

1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese 1/3 cup olive oil

ground pepper

2 small red new potatoes-scrubbed For pesto, puree parsley and chives in food processor to make paste. Add lemon uice and cheese and process again. With machine running, pour olive oil through tube until thoroughly incorporated. Season with salt and pepper and transfer to two bowls. Slice each potato at 1/8" ntervals to crate accordion-like slits; not slicing all the way through. Use pastry brush and brush half of pesto generously in between slices and over the outer skin. Make packets from foil and wrap potatoes in foil to grill until tender about 25-30 minutes. Remove from foil and brush with remaining pesto.


Regional water planning ready for public review September 13

Two sisters, Lucy Flippo and Veta Scottie and two brothers, Claude and Dennis Pearce, preceded her in death.


Ona Fincher

ORDINANCE FOR ADOPTION OF A DROUGHT CONTINGENCY PLAN

ORDINANCE NO. D-08-00 An ordinance of the City of Talco, Texas, adopting a drought contingency plan; establishing criteria for the initiation and termination of drought response stages; establishing restrictions on certain water uses; establishing penalties for the violation of and provisions for enforcement of these restrictions; establishing procedures for granting variances; and providing severability and an effective date

WHEREAS, the City of Talco, Texas recognizes that the amount of water available to the City and its water utility customers is limited and subject to depletion durg periods of extended drought;

WHEREAS, the City recognizes that natural limitations due to drought conditions and other acts of God cannot guarantee an uninterrupted water supply for all

WHEREAS, Section 12.1272 of the Texas Water Code and applicable rules of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission require all public water supply systems in Texas to prepare a drought contingency plan; and WHEREAS, as authorized under law,

nd in the best interests of the citizens of

Talco, Texas, the Talco City Council deems it expedient and necessary to establish certain rules and policies for the orderly and efficient management of limited water supplies during drought and other water supply emergencies;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT OR DAINED BY THE CITY OF TALCO,

SECTION 1. That the City of Talco, Texas Drought Contingency Plan attached here to as Exhibit "A" and made part hereof for all purposes be, and the same is hereby adopted as the official policy of the city.

SECTION 2. That all ordinances that are in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance be, and the same are hereby repealed and all other ordinances of the City not in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance shall remain in full force
