### McCuistion to host cancer screening

In an effort to reduce the number of diagnosed cases of prostate cancer, several local physicians are joining with McCuistion Regional Medical Center and the Cancer Education and Prevention Project to offer a free prostate screening Saturday, September 23 from 8 a.m. until 12 noon in Pavilion I, 2850 Lewis Lane, Paris. No appointment is necessary. The screening includes a PSA blood test

and a digital rectal examination. If detected early, prostate cancer can be effectively treated. Most cases

of early prostate cancer have no

symptoms. The screening is encouraged for men who have never been screened, age 50+ who have no symptoms and are not under the care of a physician. Men over 40 with a family history of prostate cancer are recommended to undergo the screening.




Some courses at PJC are now being offered over the Internet, and several courses are available through an accelerated schedule approach where students can complete a course in five to eight weeks.

The Patriot JV football team defeated Wolfe City 15-8 in a comefrom-behind effort last Thursday, September 14, 2000 at Patriot Stadium.





COLLEGE STATION - Religion, as an institution, will change dramatically in the coming years, thanks to the communications revolution and an increased emphasis on tolerance, says a Texas A&M University philosophy professor who has studied religion for the past

Professor Richard W. Stadelmann said people are picking and choosing their religious ideals and beliefs from a variety of religions, customizing their own personal belief system, - resulting in what he terms "designer religion."


This change is occurring as people's preferences for stricter, fundamentalist beliefs systems shift to more tolerant and accepting beliefs

As people's religious beliefs become more accepting of other beliefs, they may find it easier to incorporate aspects of these different religions, becoming more eclectic as well as more tolerant, he explained.

The rise of designer religion has to do with the way people perceive religion, he said.

"There is not a sharp break where religion ends and the general feeling about that which is valuable begins; it's more of a gradation," Stadelmann explained.

Stadelmann believes the change is especially pronounced in America's youth.

Lamar held a 14-11 lead in the second game, but could not put the Cowgirls away. MSU's Anissa Parker



Parker hit .382 for the match and added 16 digs. Angela Eppers added 23 kills and 13 digs and dour other Cowgirls finished with double-figure digs.



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

ORDINANCE NO. 00-16

An ordinance of the City Council of the City of Bogata, Texas, amending Section 1 of the Code of Ordinances, Ordinance No. 95-05, by adding a new section to be entitled "Cross Connection Control Program", providing for inclusion in the Code of Ordinances; providing a repealer clause; providing a severability clause; finding and determining that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed is open to the public as required by law.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Bogata, Texas: SECTION I. AMENDING

ORDINANCE NO. 95-05 That Ordinance No. 95-05 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Bogata, Texas, be amended to add a new Section 1A. Each section shall read as follows:

Section 1A. Cross-Connection Control Program.

(a) General (1) No water service connection shall be made to any establishment where a potential or actual contamination hazard exists unless the water supply is protected in accordance with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission Rules and Regulations for Public Water Systems (TNRCC Rules) and this Ordinance. Water service shall be discontinued by the water purveyor if a required backflow prevention assembly is not installed, maintained and tested in accordance with the TNRCC Rules and this Ordinance.

(b) Backflow Prevention Assembly Installation, Testing and Maintenance.

(1) All backflow prevention assemblies shall be tested upon installation by a recognized backflow prevention assembly tester and certified to be operating within specifications. Backflow prevention assemblies which are installed to provide protection against health hazards must also be tested and certified to be operating within specifications at least annually by a recognized backflow prevention assembly tester. A test report must be completed by a recognized backflow prevention assembly tester for each assembly tested. The signed and dated original form must be submitted to the City of Bogata within (5) working days of the test.

(2) All backflow prevention assemblies shall be installed and tested in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions, the American Water Works Association's Recommended Practice for Backflow Prevention and Cross-Connection Control (Manual M14) or The University of Southern California Manual of Cross-Connection Control.

(3) Assemblies shall be repaired, overhauled, or replaced at the expense of the **Public Notices** 

customer whenever said assemblies are found to be defective. Original forms of such tests, repairs and overhauls shall be kept and submitted to the City of Bogata within (5) working days of the test, repair or overhaul of each

backflow prevention assembly.

(4) No backflow prevention assembly or device shall be removed from use, relocated, or other assembly or device substituted without the approval of the City of Bogata. Whenever the existing assembly is moved from the present location or cannot be repaired, the backflow prevention assembly shall be replaced with a backflow prevention assembly or device that complies with this section in accordance with The American Water Works Association (Manual M14), current edition, University of Southern California Manual of Cross Connection Control, current edition, or the current Plumbing Code of the City of Bogata, which-

ever is more stringent. (5) Test gauges for backflow prevention assemblies testing shall be calibrated at least annually in accordance with the American Water Works Association's Recommended Practice for Backflow Prevention and Cross Connection Control (Manual M14) or the University of Southern California's Manual of Cross Connection Control. The original calibration form must be submitted to the City of Bogata within (5) working days after calibra-

(6) A recognized backflow prevention assembly tester must hold a current endorsement from the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. (Commission)

(c) Customer Service Inspections (1) A customer service inspection shall be completed prior to providing continuous water service to all new construction, on any existing service when the water purveyor has reason to believe that cross-connections or other contaminant hazards exist, or after any material improvement, correction, or addition to the private water distribution facilities.

(2) Only individuals with the following credentials shall be recognized as capable of conducting a customer service inspection. (A) Plumbing Inspectors and Water

Supply Protection Specialists who have been licensed by the Texas State Board of Plumbing

(B) Customer service inspectors who have completed a Commission approved course, passed an examination administered by the Commission or its designated agent and hold current certification or endorsement as a customer service inspector issued by the Com-

(3) The Customer Service Inspection must certify that:

(A) No direct connection between the public drinking water supply and a potential source of contamination is permitted. Potential sources of contamination shall be isolated from the public water system by an air-gap or an appropriate backflow prevention device.

(B) No cross-connection between the public drinking water supply and a private water system is permitted. These potential threats to the public drinking water supply shall be eliminated at the service connection by the installation of an air-gap or a reduced pressure-zone backflow prevention device.

(C) No connection which allows water to be returned to the public drinking water

supply is permitted.
(D) No pipe or fitting which contains more than 8.0% lead may be used for the installation or repair of plumbing at any connection which provides water for human use.

(E) No solder or flux which contains more than 0.2 percent lead can be used for the installation or repair of plumbing at any connection which provides water for human use. A minimum of one lead test shall be performed for each inspection

SECTION 2. CONFLICTING ORDINANCES REPEALED.

All ordinances, resolutions, or parts thereof in conflict herewith are hereby expressly re-

SECTION 3. SEVERANCE CLAUSE. The provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared to be severable, and if any sections subsections, clause, phrase or provision of this Ordinance is for any reason held unconstitutional or void by a court of competent jurisdic-tion, such holding shall not affect any valid provision of this or any other ordinance of the City of Bogata, Texas.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED that this Ordinance shall take effect 30 days after pub-PASSED AND APPROVED BY THE

CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BOGATA, TEXAS, this the 14th day of August, 2000. Jack Crane, Mayor
