I'm sure there are people







It has very little moisture, only 12-17% by weight and that the rest is an assortment of simple sugars? Did you know. . . it takes about 12-13 pints of nectar to make one pint of honey? The bees put the nectar in open cell of a comb and fan it with their wings to drive off excess moisture, . It can be kept indefinitely because it does contain less moisture than yeasts and bacteria do. It is important to protect honey's

Committee studies

VFD needs

The House Urban Affairs committee met to study the needs of volunteer fire departments and evaluate their capacity to fulfill their mission of protecting the public. In addition, they also considered the advantages and disadvantages of manufactured housing as one means to alleviate affordable housing deficits. The committee was presided by Chairman Bill Carter. There was not a quorum at this hearing. Chairman Carter read for the record Representative Ehrhardt, Representative Najera, and Representative Burnam's e-mailed recommendations.

Representative Ehrhardt had no objections to the recommendations while Representative Najera mentioned the need for volunteer fire fighters who have undergone tests to be trained to deliver heart attack patients to certain hospitals. Representative Burnam wrote regarding the funding source on vehicle registration and the distribution of funding. Ken Campbell, representing volunteer fire fighters in Travis County, testified regarding the increase of ESD. He would like to add ESD to the existing ESD.

Another change that Mr. Campbell expressed is the Claims Act. Currently, the act protects employees of the governmental unit while driving the fire vehicles while volunteers are liable for all accidents. He would like the language cleaned up. Lad Otello, financial advisor to Travis County, testified as a resource witness. He discussed the advantages of financing equipments and properties over a longer period of time. With equipments, he would like to see ten years and with properties, he would like to see 20 years. Representative Fred Hill agreed with his proposal.

Ken Bailey, Texas State Association of Fire Fighters, requested that the language change to include all fire services and not just fire volunteers. Donald Warren, Texas Legislative Council, discussed both the manufactured homes issue and the fire fighters issue. The data that they gathered was adequate for the paid fire fighters while the data that they gathered for the volunteer fire fighters were not. However, the data may not represent accurate information due to the insufficient data collected scribing the issues surrounding ing several places in different states manufactured homes that he "expects including West Virginia them to self administer those issues and it is something to look into."

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

Boll weevil eradicated from southern rolling plains

A major milestone in the boll weevil reached Sept. 20 when Agriculture Commissioner Susan Combs declares the Southern Rolling Plains Eradication Zone to be functionally eradicated. The SRP is the first zone in Texas to attain this status, which indicates there is no evidence of reproducing weevil populations within the zone. The declaration will be part of a celebration held at the Saint Ambrose Parish Hall in Wall at 11 a.m. A barbecue lunch, provided by Rep. Rob Junell, D-San Angelo; Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock; Sen. Je R-San Antonio and the Southern Plains Cotton Producers Association will follow the declaration.

"The growers in the Southern Rolling Plains put an incredible amount of effort and dedication into achieving eradication in their area and are to be congratulated on having reached their goal," said Lindy Patton, executive director of the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation. "This would not have been possible without the leadership of the zone's steering committee, the commitment of the growers, a tremendous group of dedicated employees, and of course the support of our friends in Austin and Washington."

Cotton producers in the SRP took a leap of faith back in 1994 by being the first in the state to initiate an eradication program.

While the program was proven in other states, there were still doubts whether eradication could be achieved in Texas. Despite a brief shutdown in 1997 because of legal challenges, growers overcame the setback, and in 1998 weevil numbers had been reduced by more than 99.9 percent. The next year the area was closely monitored to confirm that it had indeed managed to eliminate the No. 1 cotton pest.

Monitoring continues in the area, and through the middle of September, foundation traps had only caught 22 weevils, a far cry from the more than 3 million weevils caught during the program's first full year in eradication. In the absence of weevil damage, cotton acreage has increased and pesticide use has been dramatically decreased. At a meeting with growers in Plainview, SRP grower Rodney Ripple said his fields had not been sprayed for insects, either by the foundation or by him, a single time during this growing season.

The SRP encompasses Coke, Runnels, Coleman, Irion, Tom Green, Concho, McCullough, Schleicher and Mason counties, along with a small portion of Taylor County.
