the daily challenges of long-term care in the year 2001 -forward" Hawkins said. Hawkins urges anyone interested


in joining their Volunteer Program.

This is an important meeting since plans for the March 3rd supper and auction will be formulated.



# Who must file a tax return?

There are some instances where you may not be required to file a tax return. But the IRS reminds you to keep a few things in mind. First, over 70 percent of all individual filers of federal income tax returns are due a tax refund, and it may be to your advantage to file, even if you are not required to. Next, the law requires you to file a tax return if your income is above a certain level. Please check the instructions for Form 1040, 1040A, or 1040EZ (under "filing requirements") for specific details that may affect your need to file a tax return with IRS this year.

Here are some general guidelines for anyone under age 65. Remember, these guidelines may change based on your particular situation. In general, once you have the following gross income amounts, the law requires you to file a Federal tax return with the IRS: \$ 7,200 Single

Head of Household \$ 9,250 Married Filing Joint \$12,950 Married Filing Separate \$ 2,800

Generally, a person who is "selfemployed" must file a tax return if his or her net earnings from self-employment for the year exceed \$400. Even individuals who don't earn enough to be required to file a tax return may be eligible for an earned income credit up to \$2,353 for a taxpayer with one qualifying child and \$3,888 for a taxpayer with two or more qualifying children. Some individuals who do not have a qualifying child may be eligible for a credit of up to \$353. However, you must file a return to receive the Earned Income Credit. You must also file a return if you received any advance payments of this credit while you worked during the year.

# Former band director indicted

Clayton Taylor, former Mt. Vernon and Rivercrest High School Band Director was indited January 18, 2001 by the grand jury on 12 counts of possession of child pornography according to Tom Kelly, a representative of the Attorney General's office.

Kelly stated, this is a 3rd degree felony and the punishment if convicted could be 2-10 years incarceration; up to 10 years probation and/or up to \$10,000 fine plus being added to the state's registered sex offender list.

The indictment comes possibly as a part of a year-long investigation that began in Ft. Worth. Taylor was arraigned by County Judge Kathy Cheyne and was released after post-

ing \$10,000 bond.

Rivercrest Superintendent, Dr. Gary Van Deaver stated Mr. Taylor resigned in November. He said, "Mr. Taylor gave no reason for his resignation. He said it was for personal reasons". Dr. Van Deaver discounted reports parents of band students were asked not to talk about the allegations. He confirmed there was a meeting of band parents to give the parents and students an idea of where the school would head with the program. Dr. Van Deaver also stated there is no indication Taylor maintained pictures on a school computer.

Taylor will be arraigned in 102nd District Court at a later date.

The other day, I came across the jar of mincemeat that I had bought to make pies with during the holidays. I enjoy fruit mincemeat and usually make one or two pies a year. For some reason, the time flew by and I did not get my mincemeat pie this year. . . can you believe that! Well, to

got thinking .... mincemeat .... what is mincemeat .... really!

Mincemeat dates back to the medieval English baking times, and came to America with the early settlers. Older versions of the recipe included cooked, minced (hence the name) meat...usually beef, but sometimes venison or other meats, along with chopped, dried fruits and brandy of some other alcohol, acting as a preservative only!

Modern recipes are likely to include chopped cherries, dried apricots, apples or pears, raisins and candied citrus peel, nuts, beef suet (this is the solid, white fat found around the kidneys and loins of beef, sheep or other animals), various spices, brandy or rum according to taste.

Ingredients are usually combined, covered and allowed to mature for a month before being used. A safer alternative, in today's world with food safety in mind, is to either bake the pies immediately, freeze the filing or

Venison Mincemeat 2 pounds cooked venison-chop in grinder can the mincemeat. One quart of mincemeat will fill one 8-inch or 9inch pie shell. But letting the ingredients set for a while will heighten the taste

But don't wait for the next holiday to roll around, but roll up your sleeves and bake one of these recipes listed below. See you in the kitchen!

**Brandied Mincemeat-this recipe** consists of only fruits and spices ... no meats!

Venison Mincemeat-uses venison along with a variety of fruits and spices!

English Mincemeat-this recipe suggests that you let the filling set for about three weeks, but not in the refrigerator!

Mincemeat Pie Filling-you can use venison or beef combined with sausage and cover all with apple cider!

Mincemeat Pie-basic "comefrom-the-store-mincemeat" recipe along with some apples, lemon and brandy added for that extra flavor!

Mincemeat Pie Filling-where the other recipes call for apple cider, this one calls for sweet pickle juice, pineapple juice, sorghum, fruits and beef broth, added to the meat!

Anybody out there remember making mincemeat...let me know!

#### Mincemeat Pie Filling 2 cups finely chopped suet 4 pounds ground beef or 4 pounds ground venison and I pound sausage 5 quarts chopped apples 2 pounds dark raisins l pound white raisins 2 quarts apple cider 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon

2 teaspoons ground nutmeg 5 cups sugar 2 tablespoons salt Cook meat and suet in water to avoid browning. Put meat, suet and apple:

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
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



Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by a severe winter and ice storm that occurred on December 25 and continuing in Oklahoma, which is contiguous to Bowie and Red River Counties in Texas, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency offices in New Boston, Clarksville or Mt,. Pleasant.

Bowie and Red River Counties are included in those in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture, Dan Glickman, eligible for loans to logs in processing and possibly over cove part of actual production losses resulting from a severe winter and ice

storm that occurred on December 25, 2000 and continuing.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75%.

Applications will be accepted until August 28, 2001 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create back-

"By law, firewood can only be sold by the cord or by fractions of a cord," Combs said. "Anything else and consumers may be getting burned.'

A standard cord of firewood is 128 cubic feet of wood, generally a pile measuring 8 feet long by 4 feet tall by 4 feet deep. The wood should be placed in a line or row with individual pieces of wood touching and parallel to each other. The cord of wood should be compact.

Other units, such as a "rick", "truckload", "face cord", "rack" or "pile" are not legitimate measurements and people have no way of determining how much firewood they are actually receiving.

If you think you have been shortchanged, contact your Texas Department of Agriculture regional office or TD's Weights and Measures Program at (512) 463-7483 or 1-800-TELL-TDA (835-5832).

TDA offers other helpful hints in buying firewood.

1) Only burn well-seasoned wood. If you try to burn green wood, the heat produced by combustion must dry the wood before it will burn,

2) To prevent the spread of oak wilt, only buy will seasoned oak firewood. Although the fungus that causes oak wilt is heat sensitive, storing contaminated, unseasoned wood may help spread the disease. The beetles that carry the fungus may fly off and infect healthy trees. Well seasoned oak firewood is dried to the point where bark is falling off and the wood is cracked. The fungus is no longer alive in well seasoned wood.

3) Wood should be stored off the ground if possible and protected from excess moisture when weather threatens. The ideal situation is a wood shed with a tin roof and open or loose sides for plenty of air circulation to promote drying.

4) Only burn a little pine, even construction scraps, as kindling.

5) Packaged natural wood offered for sale in quantities less than oneeighth cord or 16 cubic feet, must display the quantity in terms of cubic meters or cubic feet or any fractions of cubic meters or cubic feet and must meet RDA's labeling requirements for accuracy.

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



# February is American Heart Month

February is American Heart Month and these four tips can help you get and keep a healthier heart. 1) If you smoke or use other tobacco products, stop! If you don't use tobacco, don't start! 2) Measure your blood pressure at least every 2-1/2 years to make sure it is in the desirable range (less than 140/90 mm Hg). 3) Eat less than 30% of your calories from fat with less than 10% from saturated fats and less than 300 mg of dietary cholesterol per day. 4) Include at least 30 minutes of moderate physical activity per day on most if not all days of the week.

An average adult will consume about 2000 calories. TO have less than 30% of your calories from fat you would need to eat less than 600 calories from fat or under 67 grams of fat. The food guide pyramid shows you an easy way to eat healthier. It recommends 6-ll servings per day of whole grain breads and cereals (choose those without added fat) and 5 servings fruit and vegetables (most vegetables and all fruits are fat free). Then add 4-6 ounces per day of meat, poultry or fish. This is much less than most Americans eat. Sixteen ounces of low fat milk or 2 servings of other low fat dairy products round out the third level. Try to avoid the foods in the top of the pyramid as most of those are high in fat and calories and

SBA disaster loans available

nesses in some Northeast Texas counties affected by the severe winter ice storms that occurred December 12 through January 15 are eligible to apply for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration. The loans are available to individuals and businesses in Bowie, Cass, Lamar and Red River counties to cover ice storm damages to homes, personal property and business prop-

Small businesses in these counties and adjacent counties and parishes in Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Louisiana are also eligible to apply for SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loans to cover financial losses caused by the ice storm. The economic injury is designed to help small businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met as a result of the disaster. The loan can

Homeowners, renters and busi- help a small business stay current on accounts payable, notes payable and meet ongoing expenses until the business overcomes the financial effects of the disaster.

To apply for an SBA disaster loan victims must first register with FEMA by calling 1-800-462-9029 or 1-800-462-7585 (TTY). Those victims that are referred to SBA will be mailed a disaster loan application.

SBA can loan up to \$200,000 to cover uninsured physical damages to homes and up to \$40,000 for uninsured losses to personal property such as household contents and automobiles. Businesses can borrow up to \$1,500,000 to cover uninsured losses to business property and unmet financial needs caused by the disaster. The loans are direct loans from SBA and are offered at rates as low as 3.5% at terms of up to thirty years.

If you cannot use form 1040EZ or Form 1040A, you probably need a Form 1040. You can use the 1040 to report all types of income, deductions, and credits. You may have received a Form 1040A or 1040EZ in the mail because of the return you

filed last year. If your situation has changed this year, it may be to your advantage to file a Form 1040 instead. For example, you may pay less tax by filing a Form 1040 because you have enough deductions to itemize this year.
