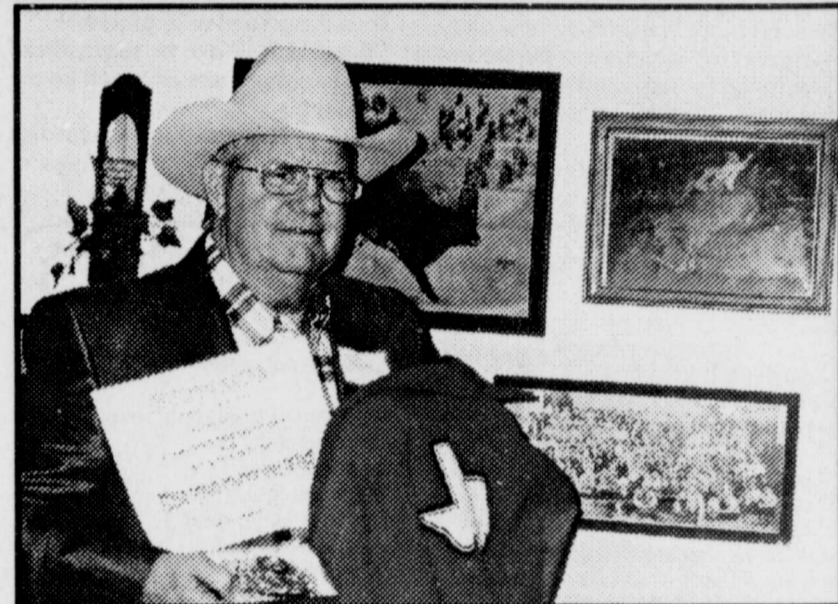
The current standings are based on the first tabulation of points and Prairiland is tied for fifth place in Conference 2-A

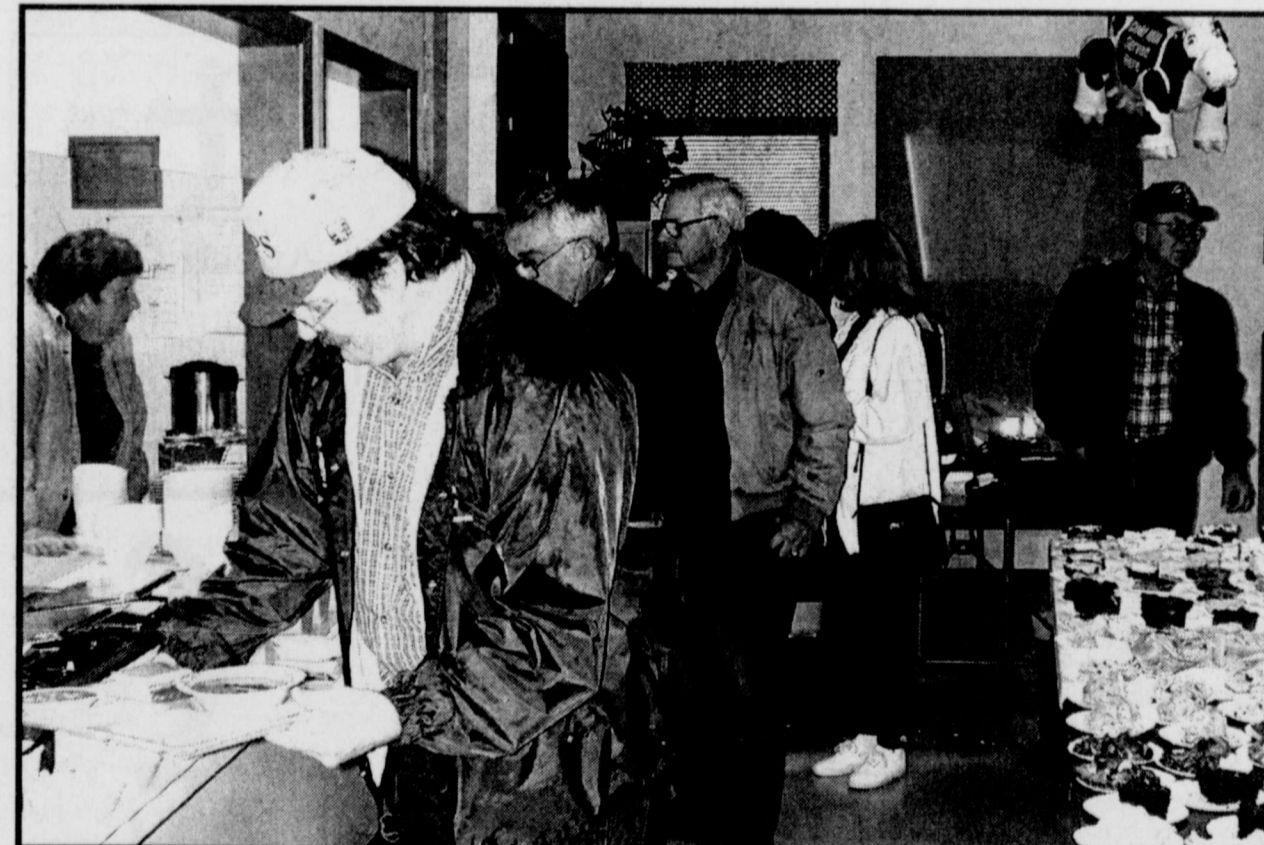

Prairiland ISD Board extends contracts, grants leaves

The Prairiland ISD Board met in regular session February 19 with Downs, Fendley, Bankhead, Basinger, Sessums, Miller and Patterson present.

Johnny Patterson called the meeting to order.

In old business, the December tax report was carried unanimously; bills and financial report for December were approved unanimously; the tax report for December was approved unanimously.

In new business, the bills, financial report and tax report for January were unanimously approved.

A Board election for May 5 to fill two full terms in Place 1 and Place 4 was approved. Patterson announced the Board members who have completed the required continuing education hours are Basinger, Bankhead, Downs, Patterson, Sessums, deficient Fendley and Miller.

Lesa Clarkson was named election judge and early voting judge, Kim Carlow and Lisa Martin were named

as deputy early voting clerks. Judge at Blossom Methodist Church is Sue Clarkson; Deport First Baptist is Gordon Isbel; Cunningham Baptist Church is Shelby Kennedy and Prairiland High School is Peggy Whitney.

The sale of property to David and Carolyn Davidson was approved.

The contracts of Buddy Freeman, Ronnie Baker, Sandra Burnett and Larry Salter were extended and the Resolution and Interlocal Agreement for Food Services with Region 8 were approved.

The Health Insurance Budget will be amended in the March meeting.

The board went into executive session at 10:45 p.m. and accepted the resignation of Mendy Nichols. A leave of absence for Brenda Bishop and Shelia Huffman were also approved.

Non-action items discussed were the sewer system, FEMA, legislative issues student and teacher recognition.

Christus St. Joseph's & McCuiston sign letter of intent

Christus St. Joseph's Health System and Texas Health Resources, the parent company of McCuiston Regional Medical Center, recently signed a non-binding Letter of Intent designed to consolidate the two organizations. This action follows an evaluation of a community benefits study commissioned by both organizations.

The LOI calls for Christus St. Joseph's to purchase the buildings, equipment and certain services of McCuiston from THR. After paying any outstanding debts and other liabilities, THR will reinvest the net proceeds from the sale in a not-for-profit foundation designed to improve the health of the communities served by the two hospitals.

The LOI provides that THR will maintain an affiliation with Christus St. Joseph's Health system in order that many of the relationships between patients and physicians in

Paris with hospitals and physicians in the Dallas area can continue uninterrupted.

Christus St. Joseph's has been a party of the Northeast Texas community for more than 100 years. McCuiston Regional Medical Center has served the health care needs of the residents of Paris and surrounding communities for 87 years. Both organizations say that their long standing commitment to meet the community's health care needs will continue and that this new arrangement will strengthen and stabilize health care services for the area.

Over the next several weeks, Christus St. Joseph's and THR representatives will work toward finalizing the transaction. They anticipate the transaction to be completed by this summer. Included in the final sale agreement will be a plan outlining how the two hospital campuses will coordinate services.

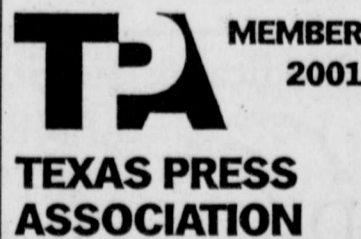

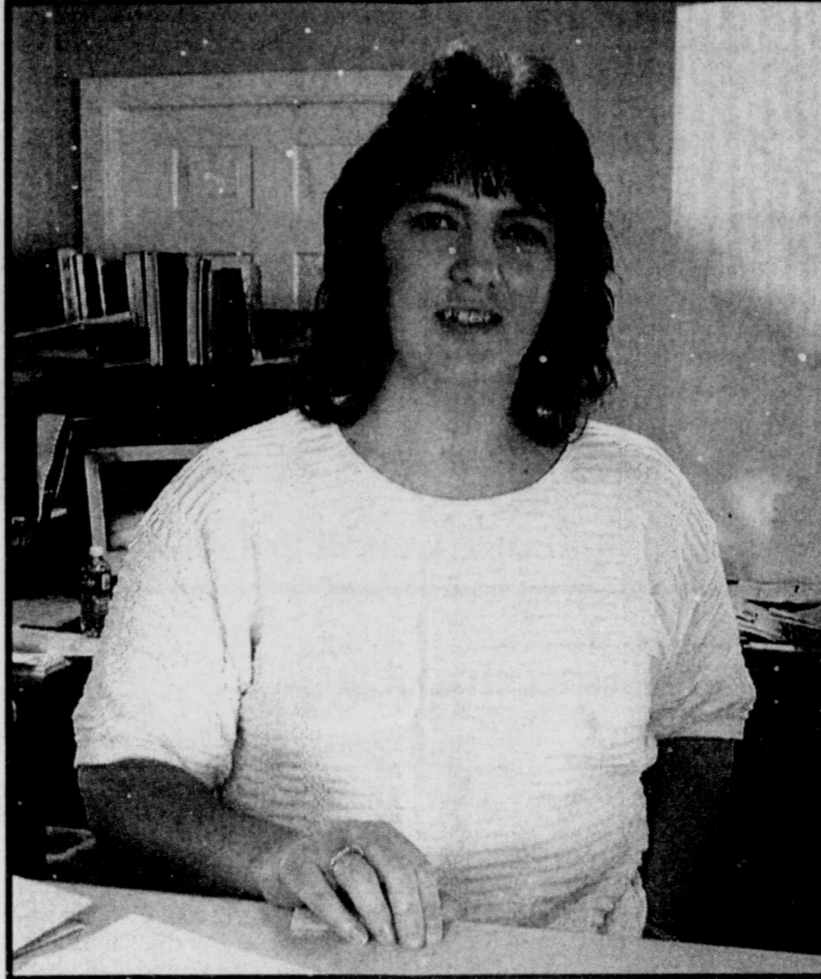

2 sticks butter
 1 cup 1 cup peanut butter
 1 cup crushed graham crackers
 1 box confectioner's sugar-sifted
 1 large package chocolate chips
 Melt butter and add peanut butter, graham crackers and sugar. Stir with wooden spoon. Spread onto cookie sheet. Melt chocolate chips and spread on top of butter mixture. Let cool and cut into squares.

Burritos

2 pounds hamburger
 1 onion
 1 can cream of mushroom soup
 1 can green chilis
 1 can pinto beans
 1 can refried beans
 salt and pepper to taste
 chili powder to taste
 cumin to taste
 2 cups picante sauce
 10-15 flour tortillas
 Cook hamburger and drain. Add chopped onion, chilis and seasonings to taste. Add soup and cook for 10 minutes. Mix together picante sauce, beans and refried beans and then add to hamburger mixture. Place meat mixture on tortillas, add cheese and rollup. Cover in foil and bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Top with lettuce and tomatoes.

Tortilla Roll-ups

2-8 ounce packages cream cheese-softened
 2 bunches of green onions
 2-3 packages of shaved ham
 picante sauce as desired
 Mix all ingredient together. Place spoonfuls of mixture on tortilla and roll up. Seal air-tight and refrigerate. Slice at angle to keep from unrolling.

1 can cherry pie filling

Privacy legislation is in the works

The Texas House of Representatives is preparing legislation to protect the privacy of Texan's medical records.

The Texas Medical Privacy Bill creates standards allowing an individual to exercise authority over the disclosure of his or her private health information. Currently, an individual's health information can be collected and transmitted to different entities without the individual's consent or authorization.

The bill prohibits health care providers, government entities, internet companies and others with access to medical records from disclosing, using or selling personal health information for marketing purposes.

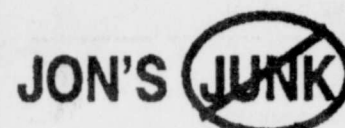
Texas included in the law suit. Briefing was received from new contractor for computer program for date information to be presented to the court.
