onsider fertilizing home lawns Warm season turfgrasses such a bermudagrass and St. Augustine ben efit greatly from spring time fertiizer applications. After exceetionally
mers of drought and an excer cold, rainy winter, lawns in our area need all the help they can get. Turfgrass experts with the Texa
Agricultural Extension Service rec Agricultural Extension Service rec-
ommend using a 3:1:2 ratio fertilizer on lawns on Texas. A 3:1:2 ratio in dicates the fertilizer contains thre parts nitrogen, to one part phosp
rus, to two parts potassium. rus, to two parts potassium.
The fertilizer should be applied a a rate of one pound actual nitrogen per thousand square feet. To achieve this rate, apply five pounds of $21-7$
14 fertilizer per thousand square feet 14 fertilizer per thousand square feet
or seven pounds of $15-5-10$ fertilizer per thousand square feet.
It is recommended that the 3:1:2 fertilizer application be made tw times per year. The first application should be between April 1 and April 15. The other should be made be
tween September 15 and October When possible, it is recommended to sue slow release fertilizers. These fertilizers are made to release some
of the nitrogen immediately, and some of the nitrogen later in the If the lawn begins to show a pa green color during June and July, may need a nitrogen boost. This can
be done by applying a $21-0-0$ or 34 $0-0$ fertilizer. Again, it is recom mended to supply one pound of ac feet. To do this, apply five pounds 21-0-0 per thousand square feet or 3.5 Over fertilizing can lead to an ex susceptible to disease problems in
