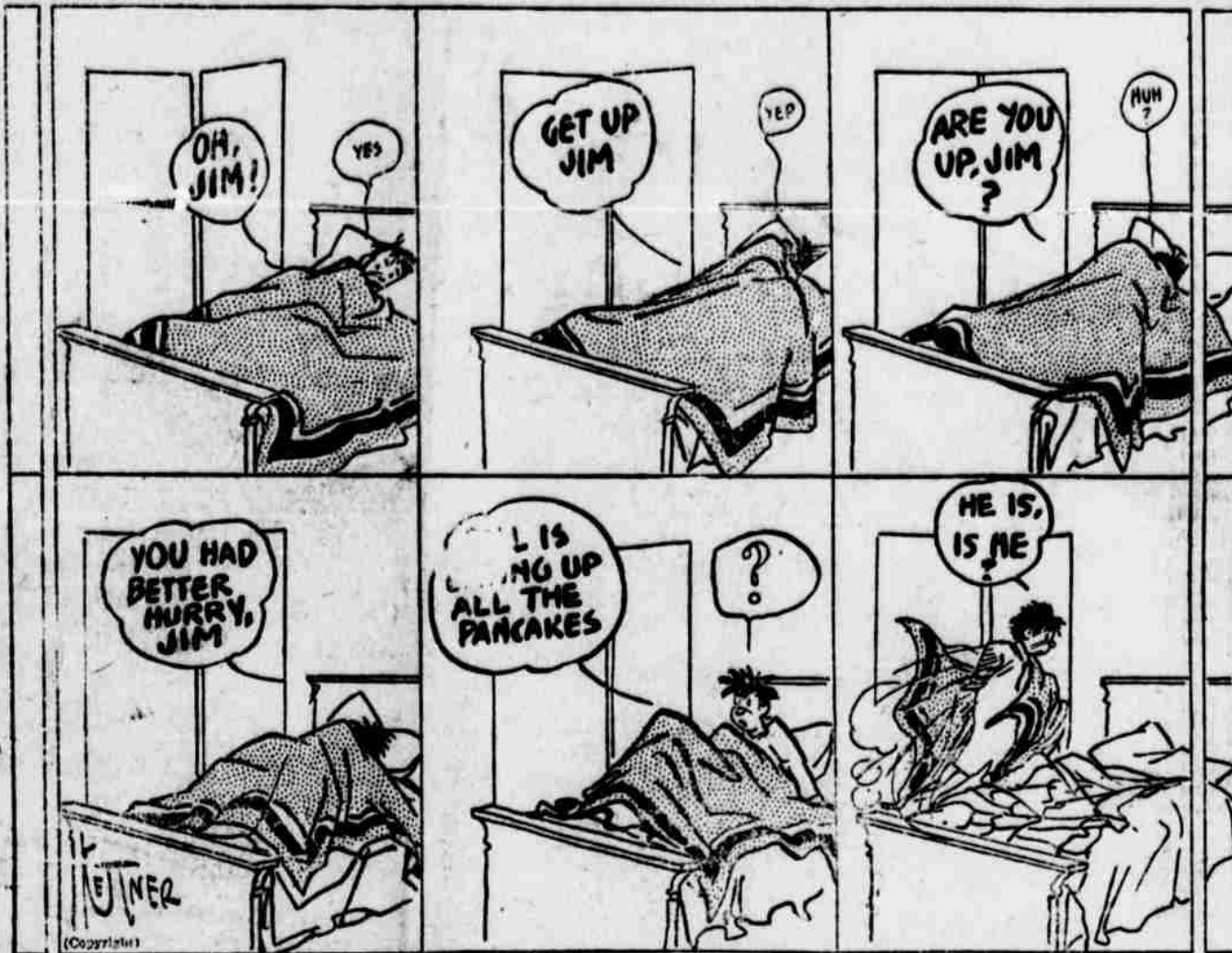
Practically every town in this section of the state that is as large as Haskell have already paved their square or are planning to do so this summer and we believe that Haskell will not fall behind her sister towns.

## SEMI-ANNUAL POULTRY TRADE DAYS BRING LARGE CROWDS

The Semi-Annual Poultry Trade Days were held in this city last Friday and Saturday, March 5th and 6th, which was a success despite the unfavorable conditions of the weather.

There was a fair turnout of the poultry breeders of the county with a good line of birds and eggs, and the visitors were very enthusiastic and astonished at the rapid advancement of the poultry industry and the excellent stock on exhibition in the show room at the Haskell Produce Company, where the show has been held every year since it started out two years ago.

The poultry industry is in its infancy and knowing that every industry in the beginning must meet with more or less failures and disappointments, we determined to meet them undaunted and profit by every mistake and reach in the end, the goal of our intentions. When we began the agitation of better poultry we found a few men and women over the county fighting the game singlehanded. Realizing in unity there is strength and co-operation is the road to success we have banded together and our efforts shall not fail.

The following breeders were on hand with stock and eggs:

E. I. Pearsey of Haskell Route Four was there with an excellent pen of Barred Rocks headed by a cockerel for which he paid a fancy price to a reliable breeder of Iowa.

Albert English of Haskell placed on exhibition a pen of White Plymouth Rocks that received the admiration of every visitor. He has kept up this breed for years by introducing new blood from the best breeders of the United States until he has the best White Plymouth Rocks in the county, and will make a good showing in the state.

T. C. Cobb of Haskell Star Route One, came in with the Buff Leghorns, a new breed of Leghorns he has been breeding two years, and he is going to improve his stock until he reaches the top in the Buff Leghorn line.

J. E. Pace Jr., of Haskell, a small boy, had a pen of White Wyandottes on exhibition. This is the second year Joe has made in the show ring and we are glad to see the boys take an interest in the poultry industry.

W. E. Stephens of Haskell, a fancier of the famous White Leghorns, was here with a pen of his beautiful birds. Mr. Stephens will stay with us and help put Haskell county over the top in the breeding of better poultry.

W. M. Free had on exhibition a pen of high class Buff Orpingtons from Wm. Cook of New Jersey, the originator of the Orpington breed of poultry.

F. J. Josselott of Weisner Route One had a pen of Rhode Island Reds on exhibition that were good ones, headed by an excellent cockerel of large bone and good color from a Waxahachie breeder who has won many prizes in the State shows.

J. M. Everheart of Haskell, who has been breeding Reds for years using the Hogan system for egg production, had two coops of Rhode Island Reds of the Alhart strain, who is a leading breeder and prize winner of Rhode Island Reds in Texas.

Mrs. J. M. Baker of Haskell has the Rhode Island Reds from the A. & M. breed, which are prize winners and standard bred in color, size, and egg production. She had a fine pen on exhibition in the show room.

Mrs. R. E. Lee of Haskell Route 3 had a pen of Light Brahmas on exhibition that was very beautiful. She has just begun with this famous breed and she like them, because of their size and egg production. She is getting results from these excellent birds.

W. J. Sowell of Haskell had a fine White Leghorn cockerel for sale, Ugly Billy, as he is called, is a fancier of this breed and has been breeding them for years.

A. J. Josselott of Haskell Route Three had a pen of fine Rhode Island Reds of the Bruce Meadows strain, who is well known in Haskell and his Reds have taken many premiums in shows over the state.

## MONEY PLEDGED TO CONTINUE SCHOOL FOR FULL TERM

The volunteer committee, headed by Mr. Daugherty, engaged in the work of raising the funds to continue an affiliated school, reports enough money pledged to carry the school on the full nine months. Not all the money has been paid in, however, and it is vitally important that the friends of the school pay their pledges in full at an early date.

The committee, school board, Chamber of Commerce and others who have contributed to the work of the campaign feel gratified over the results. They believe that the citizenship of Haskell has shown itself ready to pay the price for good schools. It is no small thing for a town the size of Haskell to raise \$5,500 for school purposes alone. Very few have refused to do their part in "putting over" the campaign—so few that their indifference or active opposition has been little felt. It is the unanimous opinion of the workers in the campaign that Haskell has shown herself to be less burdened with the indifferent and the unprogressive element than the average town.

So soon as all the pledges can be collected and the fund assured, the equipment demanded by the State Department will be purchased. This must not be long delayed, for even this week a letter from the Department warns us that the Committee on Classification and Affiliation is preparing to reduce Haskell's rating. The school authorities have dispatched a strong appeal to the Classification Committee urging that action be withheld until it knows what Haskell has recently done for its school and what more it is preparing to do.

Only one item of equipment has been bought thus far. Nelson's Encyclopedia has been purchased in order to save \$40 occasioned by the recent advance in price. The encyclopedia has been received and is adding much to the efficiency of our high school work.

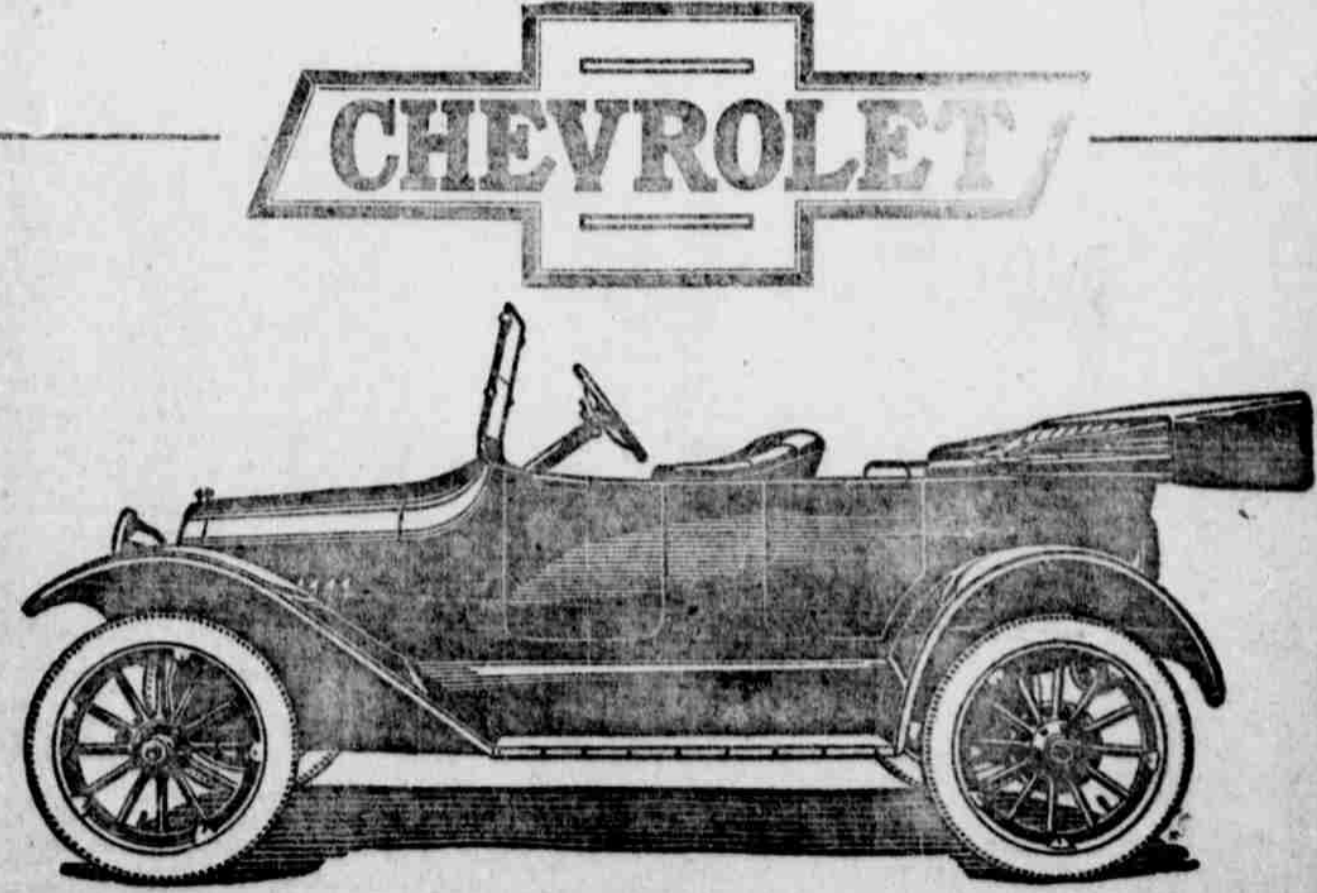

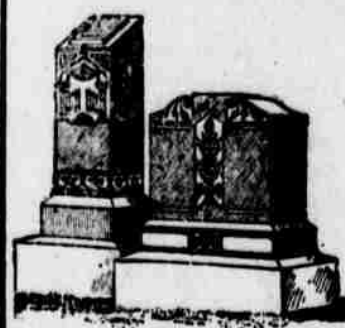

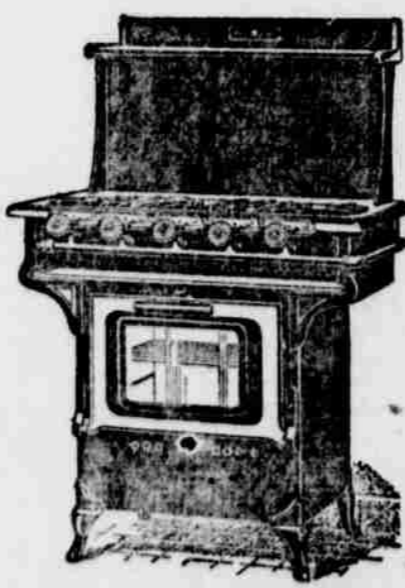
