The Texas Senate recently passed a law that provides for school districts to issue high school diplomas to certain veterans.

An eligible veteran under the legislation is one who: is honorably discharged member of the armed forces of the United States; was scheduled to graduate from high school after 1940 and before 1951; and left high school before graduation to serve in World War II.


Grant fit all of these requirements, and Monday, July 16th, Prairiland Principal Ronnie Baker and Superintendent James Morton happily presented Grant with his long-delayed diploma.

Inside the Deport Campus of Prairiland School system (Prairiland being a consolidated district formed from Blossom, Cunningham, Deport and East Lamar) Grant and his brothers eagerly looked back through the class photos from the 40s.

Wayne located classmates, and took good natured ribbing that he "remembers ALL the girls but not so many of the boys".

Ever ready with a quip, when asked what branch of the service he entered he responded "The Navy...the United States one". He admits he saw plenty of the German Navy soon enough.

Still, it was evident that this diploma meant a great deal to him, as it must to many, many other veterans whose high school days were ended when their nation called them.

Residents are urged to help bring this senseless destruction to a help by reporting what they see.



Bread and Butter Pickles
25-30 large cucumbers
8 large white onions
2 large sweet peppers
1/2 cup salt
1/2 teaspoon cloves
5 cups cider vinegar
5 cups sugar

2 tablespoons mustard seed

teaspoon tumeric

Wash cucumbers and slice as thin as possible. Chop onions and peppers. Combine with cucumbers; add salt and let stand for three hours; drain. Combine sugar, vinegar and spices in large pan; bring to boil and add drained cucumbers; heat thoroughly, but do not boil. Pack while hot in clean jars and seal. Yield 16 pints.

Sweet Pickle Sticks

medium firm fresh cucumbers boiling water 3-3/4 cup vinegar 3 cups sugar 3 tablespoons salt 4-1/2 teaspoons celery seed 4-1/2 teaspoon tumeric 3/4 teaspoons mustard seed Use firm fresh medium size cucumbers. Wash and cut them up into sticks. Pour boiling water over them and let stand overnight. Next morning pack solidly into jars. Boil solution for 5 minutes. Pour boiling hot over cucumbers in jars. Process in boiling water bath for 5 minutes. Solution fils 6 pint jars.

Sweet Pickles

large dishpan of cucumbers sliced 1/2 cup salt
4 quarts water
28 ice cubes
1-1/2 cup vinegar
3-1/2 cups sugar
1 tablespoon mustard seed
1 teaspoon celery seed
1 teaspoon ground tumeric

Pour salt, water and ice cubes over cucumbers and let set for 2 hours; drain. Combine vinegar, sugar, mustard seed, celery seed and tumeric; dissolve in large dishpan and let come to boil. Add drained cucumbers and stir in until cucumbers are hot. Place in clean jars and seal.

Corn Relish
8 cups cooked fresh corn from cob
1 cup chopped seeded green pepper
1 cup chopped seeded red pepper
2 cups chopped onion
1/2 cup brown sugar
1 cup white vinegar
2 tablespoons dry mustard
1 tablespoon mustard seed
2 tablespoon salt
1 tablespoon celery seed

quart cider vinegar

Combine corn, peppers and onion.
Add remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Bring to boil and simmer uncovered for 15 minutes. Pour at once to overflowing into clean, hot preserve jars. Adjust covers and process for 30 minutes cold pack. Yiled 5-6 pints.

Ripe Tomato Relish
10 medium onions-chopped
4 sweet bell peppers-chopped
l bunch celery-chopped
8 quarts ripe, peeled tomatoes
l quart vinegar
3 cups sugar
l tablespoon cinnamon
l tablespoon allspice
l tablespoon dry mustard

2 tablespoons salt

Core and chop tomatoes coarsely and bring to boil along with onions, peppers, celery and simmer for 2 hours. Stir frequently. Add remaining ingredients and continue to simmer for 1 hour. Pack in clean warm jars.

I/2 gallon cabbage
I quart onion
I teaspoon tumeric

Combine tomatoes, peppers, carrots, cabbage, and onions. Grind and cover with l cup salt. Let stand one hour. Drain. Pack in jars. Bring to boil the vinegar, sugar and spices. Pour boiling mixture over packed mixture and seal.

Heat is increasing wildfire risk

Baking summer heat is bringing a growing threat of damaging wildfires to northeast Texas residents, particularly those living within or adjacent to forested areas damaged by the winter ice storm. Fire control leaders say the continued presence of storm debris increases the danger to lives and property in Lamar, Red River, Bowie and other heavily impacted counties.

As summer heat continues to sap moisture from downed trees, branches and other storm debris, the likelihood of accidental fire starts and the potential for severe wildfires will increase, according to Alan Pruitt, regional fire coordinator for the Texas Forest Service in Gilmer. People who live adjacent to or within areas of storm-damaged timber need to be extremely cautious with outdoor burning and with all other outdoor activities that could spark a wildfire, said Pruitt.
