







Ear mites can be mighty problems, says A&M vet

COLLEGE STATION - Tiny ear mites can be mighty big problems to a pet.

Mites are just one of several irritating factors that can affect your pet's hearing and lead to discomfort if left untreated says Dr. Christine Rees, a veterinarian in the Small Animal Clinic at Texas A&M

Mites - the correct term for them is Otodectes - feed on the skin's surface and the ear canal can fill with wax, blood and mite debris, producing a coffee ground appearance. Mites are not hostspecific, so they can feed on another animal, Rees explains.

"Young animals - especially kittens can get mites very easily," says Rees. "Unlike fleas, mites tend to stay in one area, usually the ear, and they can cause a lot of discomfort to the animal."

Excessive scratching and itching of the ears is usually a sign that a dog or cat has mites, Rees adds. Treatment often involves droplets into the ears, she says.

Another problem involving ears: allergies. Allergies can affect your pet just as they can people, and allergies can result in a hearing nightmare. Allergies can be caused by pollens, plants, molds or even food, and they can affect your pet's hearing.

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

I will represent the 19 Volunteer Fire Departments of lamar County at a meeting with County officials concerning the budget.

Here is what I want the Commissioners, and the citizens of this county, to hear.

In regards to the financial assistance we receive from the County, we appreciate the funds we receive at this time, but our cost of operation has increased enormously. We are no longer just a fire department, but we are trained First Responders Medical Technicians. This has saved many lives in Lamar County, because we are able to be there before the Paris EMS can arrive. All the training and additional equipment necessary to comply with the State of Texas regulations is a large additional expense to the volunteer fire departments.

In addition to being the Fire Department and First Responders, we are also the weather spotters and responders to the Amber Plan.

Times have changed. The county has grown and it takes more equipment and training for the Volunteer Fire Departments of Lamar County to help the people of Lamar County from loss of life or personal property.

Judge Superville and the County Commissioners have brought to our attention that there are grants available from the state of Texas and the Federal Government. These grants would be helpful in some situations. Most Volunteer Fire Departments do not have the luxury of a full time staff to meet all the requirements set forth in

the grant applications. Many Fire Departments cannot afford a grant writer. Most don't have the funds to operate within the budget that is required by the grant applications. Also, grants will not help the day to day operation of a Volunteer Fire Department.

We believe that the men and women of Lamar County, that have made a commitment to give of themselves and their time, to respond to any emergency that arises at any time of the day or night, to leave their families unprotected to spot for bad weather, to risk their lives going into a burning building. or risk their life, or possibly terminal disease, to save a life during a medical emergency, should not have to reach into their own pockets or spend time away from their families at fund raisers, to finance the cost of operating the Fire Departments.

The county has averaged between \$3000 and \$4000 per department. As an example, Pattonville's expenses were \$23,000 in 2000 and we received \$3,000 from the county.

Inclosing, the lamar County Fire Fighters Association, representing the 19 Volunteer Fire Departments in Lamar County, would like to ask the County Commissioners fora across the board cost of operation increase for all 19 volunteer fire departments. The Commissioners control the tax dollars paid by the citizens of Lamar County, which are the same people that we have made a commitment to help.

Warnings empower people to resist persuasion, prof says

COLLEGE STATION - Outrageous late night infomercials, superstar-endorsed tennis shoes, cleverly crafted political speeches - just some of the snagging vines in an ever-growing jungle of influence constantly vying for people's money, votes and support. Though the jungle may be dense, research by one Texas A&M University psychologist is showing people how to clear a path through it and think

Psychologist Wendy Wood says people have the best chance to resist influence and maintain their own opinions when they receive a warning beforehand.

Wood, who studies the interaction of thoughts and behavior, says warnings are a valuable tool because they stimulate a person to critically evaluate - not automatically resist - the upcoming attempt to influence them more so than a person who hasn't received a warning.

"As a society, we want people to be able to resist unwanted attempts to influence their opinions from advertisers and the media, but we don't want them to be closed-minded and reject all information because openness and willingness to learn are important for education," says Wood, who has conducted her research with help from graduate student Jeffery M. Ouinn.

Resistance to persuasion, she notes, has received considerably less attention than persuasion techniques, themselves. However, Wood believes resistance techniques shouldn't be overlooked, considering that a variety of resistance strategies exist in everyday settings.

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

Sales tax holiday to be August 3-5

Texas comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander has announced the dates of August 3rd, 4th and 5th for the Sales Tax Holiday in Texas this year. On these dates no state or local sales tax will be charged on most clothing and footwear priced under \$100 providing much needed tax relief for hard working Texas families.

This year, the Sales Tax Holiday is expected to save Texans \$31.2 million in state sales tax and 4 8.4 million in local sales taxes. Cities have the option to not waive local sales tax during the tax holiday, but no community has opted out of the event this

The rules for the 2001 Sales Tax Holiday are the same as in previous years. They include:

Most children's and adults' clothing and footwear priced under \$100 are exempt from sales taxes. Customers may purchase as many tax exempt items as they wish.

Clothing and footwear used primarily for athletics or protective wear, such as golf cleats or football pads are not tax exempt. However, tennis shoes, baseball caps, jogging suits and other athletic clothes that are commonly worn on the street are eligible for the tax exemption.

Accessories, jewelry, watches, handbags, wallets and briefcases are not tax exempt.

Items previously placed on layaway may be redeemed tax free during the Sales Tax Holiday, and items placed on layaway during the Sales Tax Holiday may be redeemed tax free later.

"Earlier this year, I asked the Legislature to expand the list of tax exempt items to include backpacks, school supplies, sewing supplies and safety gear such as bicycle helmets and car safety seats," Comptroller Rylander said. She also proposed expanding the holiday to five days to avoid the three day traffic jams. However, the Legislature did not make the Sale Tax Holiday a priority, and the proposal died. Next session, Comptroller Rylander said, "I will again urge the Legislature to make Texas families and the Sales Tax Holiday expansion a top priority.
