Funding or not, that is the question

Will more funding be found, or will county residents be without some Judge Super of the services provided by the 19 volunteer fire departments? That was a question when Lamar County Fire Fighters Association President Ed Ring and fellow members met with Lamar County Judge Chuck Superville last Friday to discuss the need to increase funding for the volunteer fire departments.

Ring read a statement outlining the services the Volunteer Fire Departments provide.

For years, the volunteer fire departments have provided fire protection for county residents. Times have changed, Ring said, and the services provided have also changed. Now volunteers respond to Weather Watches, Amber Alerts and if a medical call is made in Lamar County outside of the city limits of Paris, members of the appropriate volunteer fire department will respond. In most cases the volunteers will have vital signs, lists of medications, and other pertinent information ready for EMS, and the patient on a backboard ready to transport when EMS arrives.

"I'm not telling you this to take anything away from EMS" Ring stated, "all I'm saying is that we provide that extra time saved in getting a patient to the hospital, or getting them on oxygen sooner. They get paid and we don't!"

Ring continued "Our volunteer fire departments have been trained to used the AED (also known as a defibrillator) Numerous lives have been saved by volunteers using these machines and CPR. Before the fire departments had them, patients had to wait for EMS to come from Paris before any real help could be rendered. All of them would not be alive today without the use of the AED promptly. Is it fair to give the EMS twice as much and not give us any more?" Ring asked.

Judge Superville asked for the total for expenses from the volunteer departments. Lamar County Fire Fighters Association Secretary Thomas Nichols reported that just over half of the departments reported their expenses for last year. "If I take , say, just three of the

departments expenses for last year it will amount to more than the \$82,000 the county paid to all 19 departments last year. The total for the department's expenses that reported to me totaled \$355,598.76.


Where does all that money come from ?" asked Judge Superville. He was told it came from fund raisers such as hamburger suppers, breakfasts, garage sales, stew and chili suppers, anything that can be done to raise money.

"Yeah, and we still have to take money from our pockets to keep equipment operating, and fueled. I donated over \$3,000 out of my own pocket the past 3 years" stated Ed Ring

After Judge Superville fielded questions and answers from all present concerning the need for more funding, Judge Superville stated "I won't and can't make any promises. Right now, there doesn't appear to be any funding available for an increase in funding to the volunteer fire departments.

"In the past five to six years, we have raised funding for the fire department from \$42,000 to \$82,000" the judge said.

"Yes," Ring replied, "but so have our services been increased too. We are asked to help with all 10-50s (vehicle wrecks), in the county, medical calls and fires, and have been asked to train with Rescue 8 so that we can help them at rescue scenes. Since Paris has cut back on personnel on Rescue 8 since building two new stations, they don't have enough personnel to man all the stations and equipment" a member of the audience reported. Judge Superville promised to take the figures to the upcoming budget planning meeting to be discussed. A public hearing is scheduled for some time in October an the budget will be presented at that time.

Tear tortillas in small pieces and layer 1/3 of the tortillas in bottom of a lightly greased 13x9 baking dish. Top with V3 of the chicken mixture and 2/3 cup cheese. Repeat layers twice. 
Don and Phylis Vaughn spent the weekend in Waco with their daughter, Donna and Hooter Johnigan and sons.
