There were also no vacations, nor were their "Mother's Day Out" programs. They did not expect a break from the duties of raising their family.

They also had to grow gardens, can, and preserve, and frequently did all this after a full day in the fields of cotton or other crops.

They worked hard, killing hours. They went to church on Sundays, and it must have seemed a peaceful and wel-

come break Yet, Juanita has wonderful memories of her childhood.. Her parents raised healthy,

normal, productive citizens. We all know people who come from families of six. eight, ten, even thirteen.

I have no doubt that they, and every mother, have wished at times they didn't have children to burden them. They must have put their heads down and wept in frustration, anger or despair.

Today's mothers do the same thing. Yes, I'm sure each and every one of them has days when they wish those children weren't there. I'm sure they have wished for just a few minutes of peace and quiet, without the demands of family.

But these mothers do NOT understand parents who kill their children.

I don't believe it. I believe that the majority of parents today love their children and would fight and die for their offspring....instead of asking their children to die for them!

The kitchen is modern, and features a refrigerator with snacks in the freezer, a microwave, sink, washer and dryer and more. All the things for coffee are there, and plates, forks,

dish towels and more. The garden tub room has a huge bathtub, just right for relaxing, plus chairs and a pleasant decor. Bowls of floating candles are scattered around the home.

A basket of soaps, and other necessities, plus lots of big, fluffy towels awaits the visitor in the bathroom.



Christus St. Joseph's health System in Paris has signed a definitive agreement to purchase the buildings, equipment and certain services of McCuistion Regional Medical Center, also in Paris, from Texas Health Resources, effective August 5. With the acquisition, Christus St. Joseph's and McCuistion will consolidate services of the two Paris hospitals into one system.

"Our primary goal is to meet the health care needs of Northeast Texas and Southeast Oklahoma residents, patients, physicians and employees in the most efficient and effective way possible," Monty McLaurin, chief executive officer of Christus St. Joseph's said. "Like hospitals across the country, the Paris hospitals have been faced with an increase in the number of uninsured and underinsured patients and a decrease in reimbursement from the government and managed care plans. To continue to operate two hospitals separately in a community of 25,000 residents would not work long term and would not be in the best interests of the community.'

"McCuistion is a valuable asset and resource for the community" said Douglas D. Hawthorne, president and chief executive officer of THR. "I am pleased that we have been able to complete this transaction with Christus St. Joseph's. This will enable the residents of Paris to continue to receive outstanding health care services in their community. Through a long term affiliation

agreement with THR signed with Christus St. Joseph's Health System, we will continue to work together to improve the health of those served by Christus St. Joseph's."

The two organizations announced

their intent to consolidate in February and have spent the last five months working through the details of the transaction, according to McLaurin. "We have had teams of Associates working to ensure that the transition taking place today is as seamless and as smooth as possible. Our next step is to work closely with our physicians and clinical staff to determine how to coordinate and consolidate services to best meet the needs of our community while eliminating as much duplication as pos-

"The Christus mission calls for us

"We have been an important part of the Paris community for many years, but recent challenges in reimbursements, coupled with an increasing number of uninsured and underinsured patients, have made it increasingly difficult to remain viable there. The plan

to combine our health care services there into one system will be a great benefit for the community, and Christus is pleased to have the opportunity to work with THR to make that happen."

THR has committed to invest approximately \$3 million in the construction and operation of the Lamar Women's Health Center, a 4,700 square foot ambulatory surgical center located on the second floor of



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



DPS reminds motorists to watch for those kiddos!

As the school year starts, the Department of Public Safety reminds motorists to slow down around schools and to watch for children who may be exiting school buses. Drivers also should be aware that children may cross streets without watching where they're going.

"The first few days of school, it's easy to be distracted," said Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the DPS. "Make sure you're paying attention when you're driving, especially in and around school zones or near school buses. You don't want to become part of a tragedy.

More than 1.3 million Texas children a day ride school buses, which continue to be the safest form of highway transportation--fewer than 1 percent of traffic crashes in the state involve them.

The most common time for collisions is when school buses are loading or unloading students. According to the National School Bus Loading and Unloading Survey, most children injured or killed while getting on or off buses are under the age of 10. All students should be taught to follow safety rules and to watch for traffic before crossing streets.

Texas law forbids vehicles from passing a school bus while its alternately flashing red warning lights are activated. Motorists can be fined up to \$1,000 for passing a school bus while the warning lights are activated. Subsequent violations can lead to suspension of a driver license for up to six months.

"Stopping for school buses is the law. DPS has zero tolerance for vehicles that pass stopped school buses; if you pass a stopped school bus, you will receive a ticket," Davis said.

In 1999--the latest year for which statistics are available--two children were killed in separate incidents when they exited school buses in Travis and Rusk counties.

In other incidents across the state, 1,348 bus drivers or occupants were injured in school bus crashes and 18 were injured while loading or unloading school buses.
