They worked hard, killing hours. They went to church on Sundays, and it must have seemed a peaceful and welcome break.

Yet, Juanita has wonderful memories of her childhood. Her parents raised healthy, normal, productive citizens.

We all know people who come from families of six, eight, ten, even thirteen.

I have no doubt that they, and every mother, have wished at times they didn't have children to burden them. They must have put their heads down and wept in frustration, anger or despair.

Today's mothers do the same thing. Yes, I'm sure each and every one of them has days when they wish those children weren't there. I'm sure they have wished for just a few minutes of peace and quiet, without the demands of family.

But these mothers do NOT understand parents who kill their children.

I don't believe it. I believe that the majority of parents today love their children and would fight and die for their offspring...instead of asking their children to die for them!

## Grandparents home turned into special place for guests

There are well kept secrets in the world, and one can be found nestled among the trees, just off of Hwy. 271 in Pattonville. "Bed and Bath" is the dream of a young woman who taken on a challenge of creating a peaceful, pleasant place to stay that will be in keeping with the memories she has of her grandparents' home.

Betty Jo is the granddaughter of Barney and Earline Wilson, longtime residents and business people in Pattonville. They spent many years in a modest white frame house, then in 1959 they built a pink brick house next door to the frame house and moved in to it.

Betty Jo now lives in the brick home, but has turned the frame cottage into a bed and bath for visitors. She has used her imagination to make some charming touches to the place.

The little house rents to visitors for as little as \$50 per night. That rate is for the whole house, not per person! Guests will be greeted, once they enter the house, with spotless cleanliness, little nosegays of fresh flowers, and dozens of amenities.

If a visitor is looking for highly polished sophistication, they should look elsewhere. But if they are looking for peaceful country living, where the beds are comfortable, the bath tub is huge and the yard is a garden of delights, they are definitely at the right place.

The inside of the cottage has two bedrooms. One is the Honeymoon room, with a light, airy feel and a big bed draped in white gauzy fabrics. A chilled bottle of nonalcoholic cider or juice will welcome guests. The other bedroom is painted black. The twilight room has the constellations, authentically aligned as they are in the heavens, painted on the ceilings. This room steps out into the back yard, and overlooks a pleasant lily

pond. "I wanted to create a place that I would like to stay in if I were traveling" Betty Jo smiles.

The trim, attractive young woman recalls with fondness how magical her grandparent's home was to her as a child, and how opening a place for people to stay in the house was part of her dream of preserving their memory.

The kitchen is modern, and features a refrigerator with snacks in the freezer, a microwave, sink, washer and dryer and more. All the things for coffee are there, and plates, forks, dish towels and more.

The kitchen tub room has a huge bathtub, just right for relaxing, plus chairs and a pleasant decor. Bowls of floating candles are scattered around the home.

A basket of soaps, and other necessities, plus lots of big, fluffy towels awaits the visitor in the bathroom.

A game room has just been completed, complete with a pool table and the "totally tacky, but always necessary" prints of dogs playing pool on the wall.

The television comes with a VCR and a box of tapes for viewing.

A further exploration of the property reveals a small pond with two paddle boats, fishing rods, a small gazebo and the most recent addition, a concrete sand castle.

The just-finished castle and keep has a moat around it, and delights old and young alike.

Antique bricks form paths through the garden, and run to the back door of Betty Jo's home, where a parrot can be heard chattering away. Old-fashioned drainage ditches, patterned after the ones found on farms years ago, make sure that the paths stay dry and safe.

"The live entertainment here is the hummingbirds" Betty Jo points out,

as the little jewels flash and fly from blossom to blossom, feeder to feeder.

Swings dangle invitingly from trees, bird houses are surrounded by wire circles to keep the cats from getting near nestlings.

Bird baths abound, and there is a newly planted "secret garden" which Betty Jo hopes will grow into a totally private enclave with two seats and a seclusion from the world.

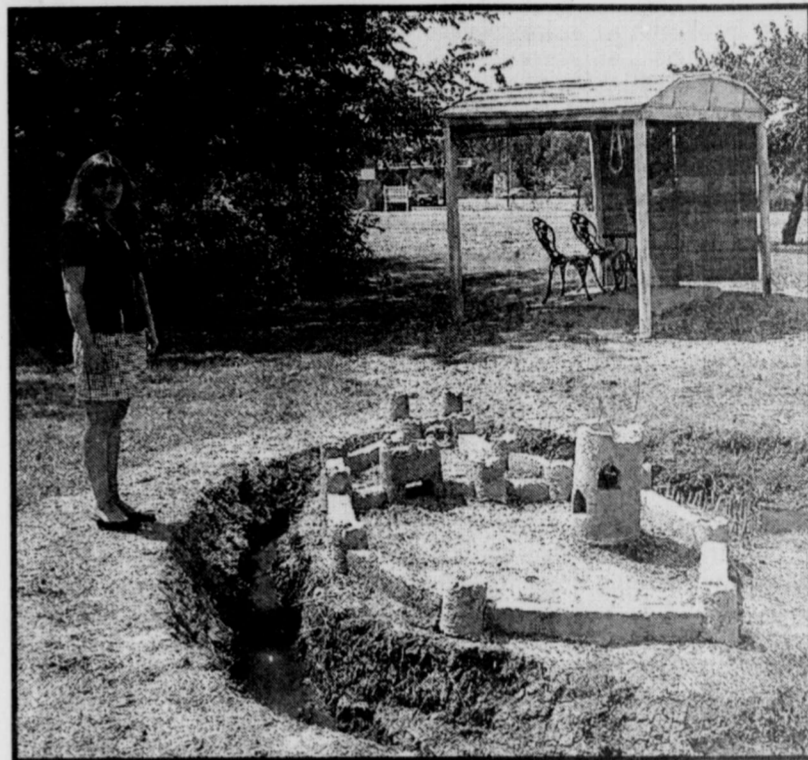
Old pear trees groan from the weight of their ripening fruit, butterfly bushes feed those fluttering marvels of nature they are named for, and even in the heat of summer the entire property is delightful. Most of the hedges, trees and plans are old natives, denizens of this area because they are hardy and suited to the climate.

"There's some misunderstanding about what this is" Betty Jo states. "I think people think it's in my home, but obviously it's not. It's totally private. Vehicles have their own drive way, they just need to check in here at my house or make arrangements with me ahead of time. I don't serve breakfast, so it's not truly a bed and breakfast. But, there are a few things for people in the ice box, and it's easy to wander over to M & M Food Mart or to lay in something to cook in the morning" she explains.

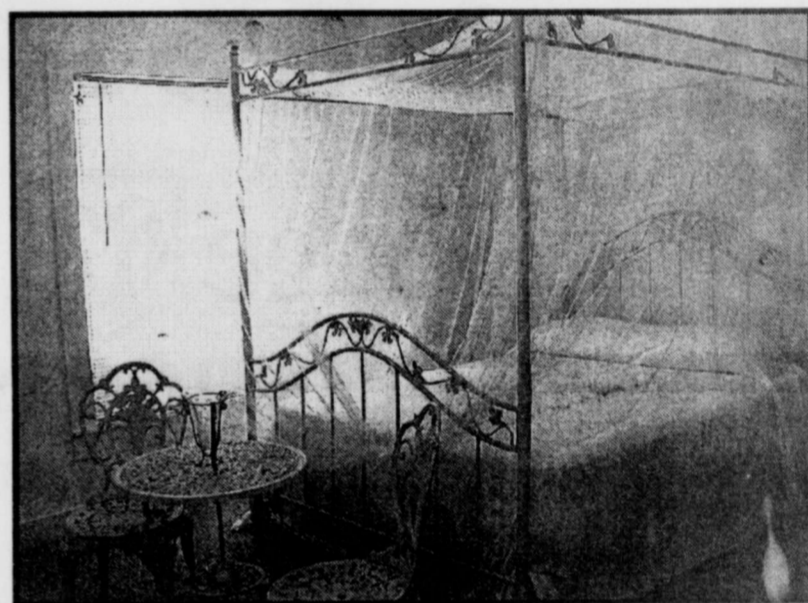
It's a surprising business to discover only a block away from a busy highway, in a town without true tourism. But it's a pleasant surprise, as is the friendly, eager-to-please enthusiasm of a young woman who wants to help preserve a little piece of a simpler, older lifestyle, and the memories of her grandparents and their warm hospitality.

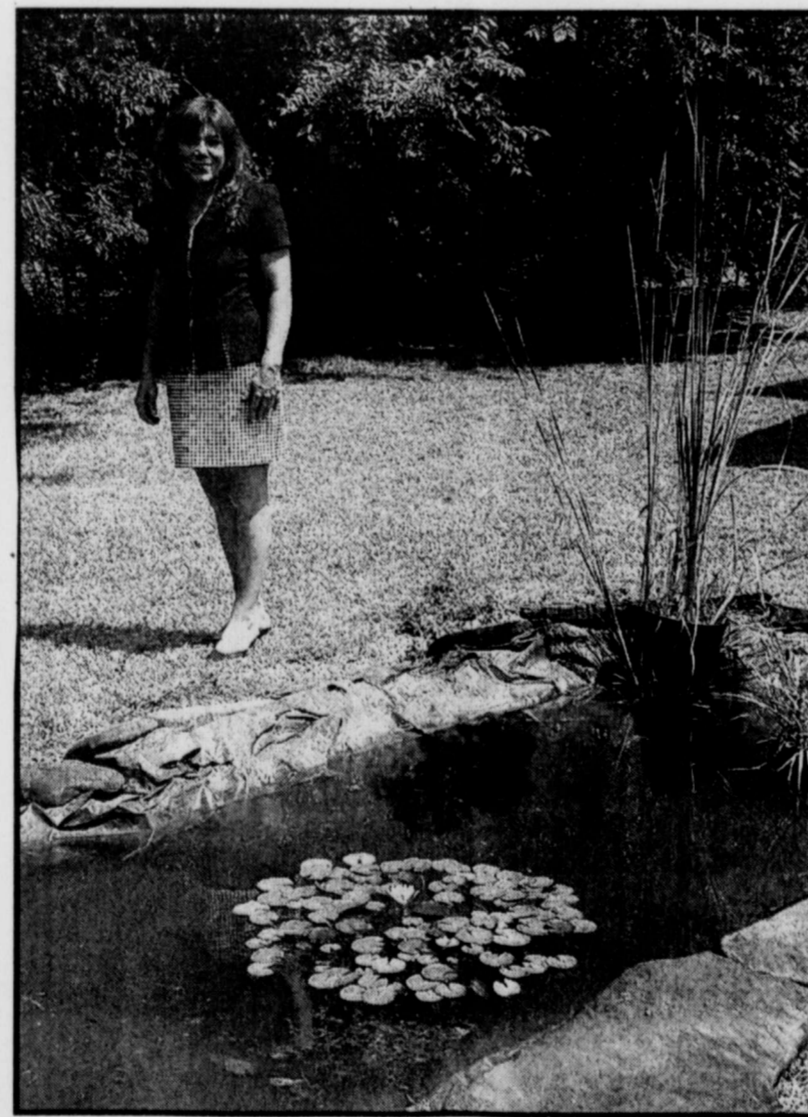

### Pattonville Church to host gospel meeting

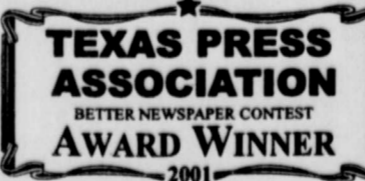
Everyone is invited to a gospel meeting, hosted by the Pattonville Church of Christ.

## Christus St. Joseph's to acquire hospital from Texas Health Resources

Christus St. Joseph's health System in Paris has signed a definitive agreement to purchase the buildings, equipment and certain services of McCuiston Regional Medical Center, also in Paris, from Texas Health Resources, effective August 5. With the acquisition, Christus St. Joseph's and McCuiston will consolidate services of the two Paris hospitals into one system.

"Our primary goal is to meet the health care needs of Northeast Texas and Southeast Oklahoma residents, patients, physicians and employees in the most efficient and effective way possible," Monty McLaurin, chief executive officer of Christus St. Joseph's said. "Like hospitals across the country, the Paris hospitals have been faced with an increase in the number of uninsured and underinsured patients and a decrease in reimbursement from the government and managed care plans. To continue to operate two hospitals separately in a community of 25,000 residents would not work long term and would not be in the best interests of the community."

"McCuiston is a valuable asset and resource for the community" said Douglas D. Hawthorne, president and chief executive officer of THR. "I am pleased that we have been able to complete this transaction with Christus St. Joseph's. This will enable the residents of Paris to continue to receive outstanding health care services in their community. Through a long term affiliation

agreement with THR signed with Christus St. Joseph's Health System, we will continue to work together to improve the health of those served by Christus St. Joseph's."

The two organizations announced their intent to consolidate in February and have spent the last five months working through the details of the transaction, according to McLaurin. "We have had teams of Associates working to ensure that the transition taking place today is as seamless and as smooth as possible. Our next step is to work closely with our physicians and clinical staff to determine how to coordinate and consolidate services to best meet the needs of our community while eliminating as much duplication as possible."

As part of the agreement between Christus St. Joseph's and THR, Christus will invest some of the proceeds in a not for profit foundation designed to improve the health of the communities served by Christus St. Joseph's.

"The Christus mission calls for us to reach out to communities in need to ensure that quality health care is available and accessible," said Thomas C. Royer, M.D., president and CEO of Christus Health. "We have been an important part of the Paris community for many years, but recent challenges in reimbursements, coupled with an increasing number of uninsured and underinsured patients, have made it increasingly difficult to remain viable there. The plan

to combine our health care services there into one system will be a great benefit for the community, and Christus is pleased to have the opportunity to work with THR to make that happen."

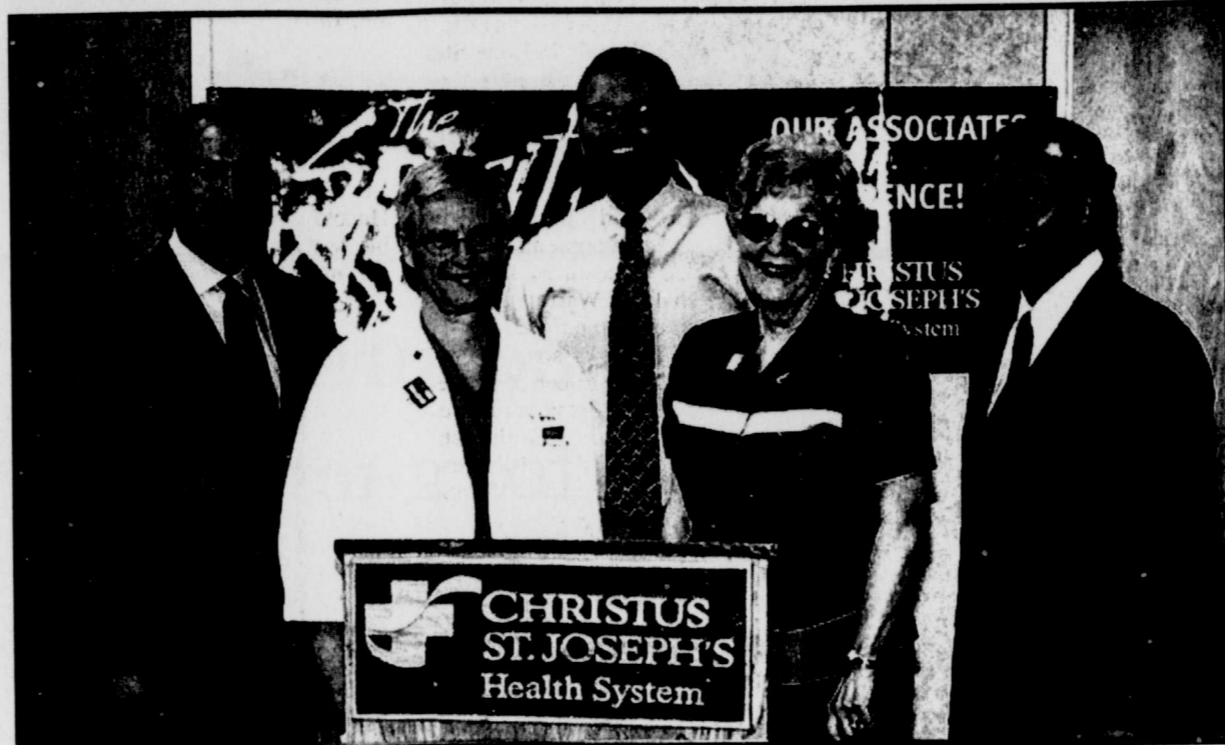
THR has committed to invest approximately \$3 million in the construction and operation of the Lamar Women's Health Center, a 4,700 square foot ambulatory surgical center located on the second floor of McCuiston Regional Medical Center. The center, which will operate as a separate, 5.01(c)(3) not for profit

corporation, will be licensed separately, governed by its own board of directors, managed by an independent management team and have its own separately credentialed medical staff.

Christus St. Joseph's has been part of the Northeast Texas community for more than 100 years. McCuiston Regional Medical Center has served health care needs of the residents of Paris and surrounding communities for 87 years.

Headquartered in Dallas, Christus Health is one of the largest Catholic health systems in the country, employing more than 25,000 people with total assets of \$3.4 billion. With a mission to extend the health ministry of Jesus Christ, Christus Health comprises more than 40 hospitals and long term care facilities, as well as dozens of other health services, in more than 70 communities in Texas, Arkansas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Utah and Mexico.

Texas Health Resources, based in Irving, serves 32 counties in North Central Texas and southeast Oklahoma with 12 acute care hospitals, two behavioral health facilities, a retirement center, senior health centers, a medical research institute, fitness centers, an air ambulance program and a transitional care facility. THR was formed in 1997 with the merger of Ft. Worth based Harris Methodist Hospitals, Dallas based Presbyterian Healthcare System and Arlington Memorial Hospital. THR employs more than 15,500 people and has more than 4,500 physicians with privileges on its medical staff.

Our recipes this week deal with something cool to eat that is light in calories and some others that will be good for lunches or after-school treats. School will be starting next week at all area schools and although students enjoy the nutritious lunches served, some still enjoy taking their lunch to school.

There is something about the first week of school that has everyone wanting a new lunchbox to take and having mom get up a little earlier so that she can pack all the "good stuff" in it! By the time rolls around, lunches are usually traded around, because someone else's always looks better. Stores are loaded with all types of displays that catch the eye (and the kids too) and urge parents to buy for their child's lunch, so that they can have a delicious and nutritious noon meal. **DPS reminds motorists to watch for those kiddos!**

As the school year starts, the Department of Public Safety reminds motorists to slow down around schools and to watch for children who may be exiting school buses. Drivers also should be aware that children may cross streets without watching where they're going.

"The first few days of school, it's easy to be distracted," said Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the DPS. "Make sure you're paying attention when you're driving, especially in and around school zones or near school buses. You don't want to become part of a tragedy."

More than 1.3 million Texas children a day ride school buses, which continue to be the safest form of highway transportation--fewer than 1 percent of traffic crashes in the state involve them.

The most common time for collisions is when school buses are loading or unloading students. According to the National School Bus Loading and Unloading Survey, most children injured or killed while getting on or off buses are under the age of 10. All students should be taught to follow safety rules and to watch for traffic

before crossing streets.

Texas law forbids vehicles from passing a school bus while its alternately flashing red warning lights are activated. Motorists can be fined up to \$1,000 for passing a school bus while the warning lights are activated. Subsequent violations can lead to suspension of a driver license for up to six months.

"Stopping for school buses is the law. DPS has zero tolerance for vehicles that pass stopped school buses; if you pass a stopped school bus, you will receive a ticket," Davis said.

In 1999--the latest year for which statistics are available--two children were killed in separate incidents when they exited school buses in Travis and Rusk counties.

In other incidents across the state, 1,348 bus drivers or occupants were injured in school bus crashes and 18 were injured while loading or unloading school buses.

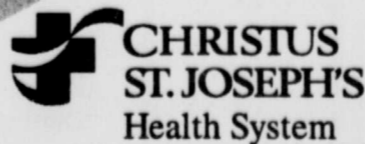

## Guaranty reports second quarter results

Guaranty Bancshares, Inc., the parent company of Guaranty Bank, reported net income for the second quarter 2001 of \$723,000, compared with \$688,000 for the same period in 2000. Net income for the six months ended June 30, 2001 was \$1.5 million or \$0.48 per diluted share compared to \$1.2 million or \$0.39 per diluted share for the same period of 2000.
