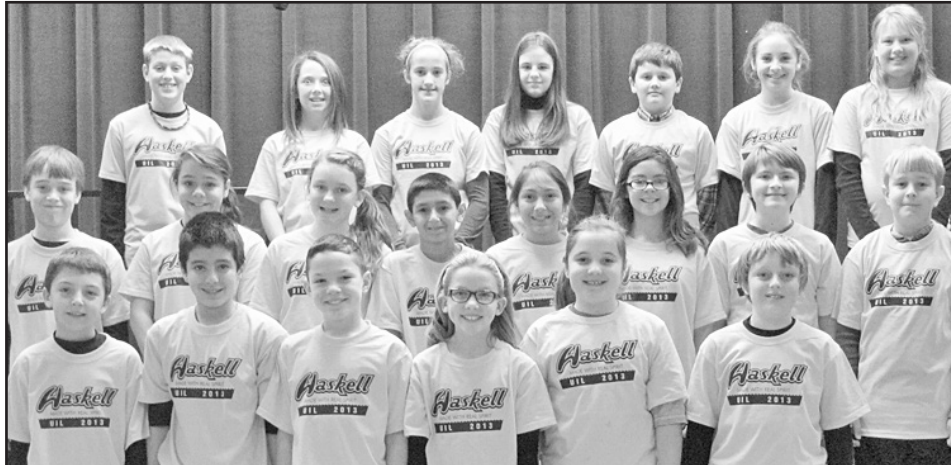

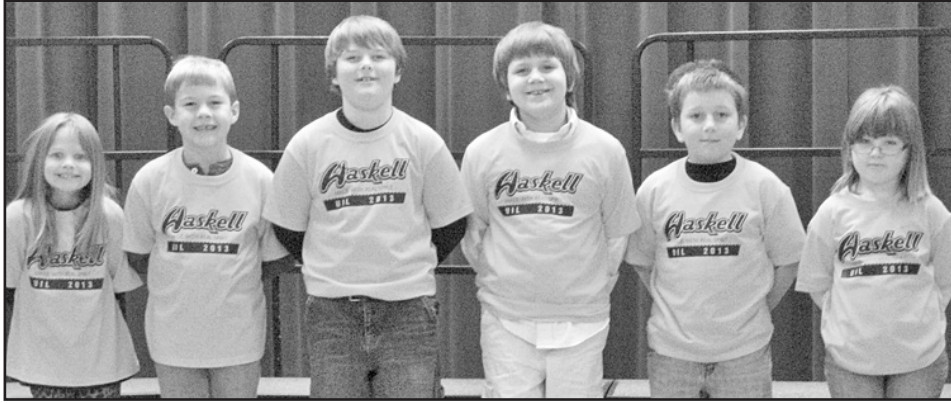

Filing for elections begins Jan. 29

If serving in public office is on your bucket list, then here is your opportunity.

The date for city elections, as well as school board elections has been set for May 10, 2014.

Filing for a place on the ballot begins Wed., Jan. 29, and will continue through Fri., Feb. 28 at 5 p.m.

In the city of Haskell, voters will elect a mayor and two aldermen. Council seats held by Jill Drusedow and Dan Hoover, along with Mayor

John Gannaway's position will be up for election.

On the Haskell CISD school board, place #2 and #3, currently held by Debbie Earles and Joey Thomas, will be on the ballot. Both are three year terms.

The city of Rule will vote on a mayor and two councilmen, now being served by Jerry Cannon, Patrick Pace and Bobby Robinson.

The Rule ISD school board has two positions up for election. Incumbents are Sam Grindstaff and Shane

LeFevre.

In the Weinert city government, places held by Mayor Donald Griffis, and councilmen Angie Kirkland and Bill Walker will be on the ballot.

Rochester does not have any city seats to be voted, at this time.

If you have not registered to vote, you may want to do so as soon as possible. More information on early voting, ballot by mail and polling places will be published at a later date.

 Happy New Year! We had a good Christmas with all the family and I trust you did as well. If the trash bulging out of the dumpsters is any indication, Haskell did indeed have a prosperous holiday. I also enjoyed a vacation from the newspaper deadlines I've been living with the past almost four years. Although I take a lot of flack from my readers when I don't have a column each week, it is nice to have a respite every now and then. I do have some good news for you!

A few days ago I received a letter from Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples concerning the Disaster Relief Fund grant request informing me that Haskell had received the much needed and prayed for grant of \$350,000 to help us with our water situation. A special thank you goes to Brandon Anderson and the folks at Jacob and Martin Ltd. for compiling all of the necessary data and submitting the application. Now, if the other cities who also applied got their grants, we're ready to go. It's always nice and important to have a back-up plan especially when it is as important as water; however, we're not giving up on prayer. God can send that gully-washer anytime He feels like it and we'll still be grateful.

I've been watching with great pleasure the new windows in Tribbey's building, the new color and progress on Wilcox's building (the Dulaney Abstract building), the completion

of Bill Jones' new facade, the remodeling of the Fouts building now owned by Carla Long and her mother. We're doing so much better than some years ago.

I received a question from a citizen regarding the lamp posts specifically those stretching from the by-pass to the square. The question was, "Who is in charge of these lamp posts and why haven't the damaged ones been replaced and why aren't the rest of them lighted?" There was one more damaged by the Henderson Book Store when someone ran into it and broke a window of their store. The lamp posts were initially a program of the Chamber of Commerce when Sally Rueffer was here. A few years ago the Chamber asked if the Civic Center would be interested in picking up the responsibility for these as they no longer wished to do so. When Haskell National Bank wanted to purchase two they were given the name of the company and they purchased their own. Since the Civic Center had no budget for that sort of thing, they denied it. The reason existing lamp posts leading to the bypass are not lighted is because the box which powered them was located in B&B's building which they tore down. AEP will have to be paid to put in another box and a suitable place will have to be found. At the end of the inquiry it was stated: "Or is this just another failed project like the crape myrtles?" I take umbrage at that. Granted we planted the crape myrtles in the middle of a drought,

but they are hardy plants and most of them have survived and I don't see that project as a failure. Another question from a store owner on the square concerned the lighting around the buildings around the square. The buildings on the south side have new LED lights—they need to be secured a bit better as some have blown down and are drooping a bit. The lights for the rest of the square have been purchased—what we lack is some volunteers to put them up. Some owners don't want people on their roof, but I think it could be done with little traffic on the roof—just around the front edges...other than that we'd need a bucket from some utility company.

You're all aware of our angst with the new computer and new Windows 7 program. We surely didn't want multiple grandchildren playing on it during the holidays. Got some excellent advice: "remove the power cord." Who would have thought of that; so simple yet so perfect. That's a solution we'll remember long after we've mastered the current computer problems—if that ever occurs.

It seems there's been quite a bit of flu in town plus a nasty stomach virus. My nurse wife says: wash your hands, keep your hands away from your nose. Most germs enter through the nose so that's why she's an ardent advocate of netty potting. That is a sinus rinse you can

The Hospital Administrator, Fran McCown, and the members of the hospital board are showing amazing insight into how to make positive changes for the healthcare system of the city of Haskell. It is something each of us will be very proud of.

Many changes have already occurred and many more are in progress. One such new change is a complete overhauling of our emergency medical system thanks to the EMS board and personnel. As you know, if you are in an emergency situation, every minute counts. They have hired several new staff members in order to better serve the community. In addition to newer, more modern equipment and additional staff, efforts are being made to get service to those in need even more expeditiously. The only way to do that, however, is to have people stay on the premises, rather than have to leave their homes and go to the ambulance facility before they can take off. The hospital and ambulance boards have gone to a great expense to obtain housing for the ambulance personnel, which will cut down service time tremendously. There will be somebody staying there 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. They may be there for several days at a time. The new facility, which is being made ready at this moment, still lacks many things that would be very helpful for the emergency personnel. They are working on furniture a little at a time, but one of the things they could really use would be a washing machine and dryer. 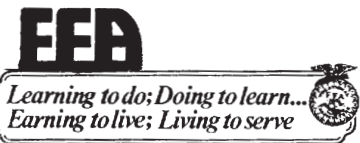

Shelton had 20 points, Klose 16 and Hadaway 12. Bassett and Pierce finished off the scoring total for the Maidens with 2 points each. Haskell also had three players finish with double digit rebounding. Shelton had 13, Hadaway 13, and Bassett 12. Klose had a team high 5 assists followed by Hadaway with 2, Bassett 1 and Shelton 1. Leading the

team in steals was Klose with 3 and Pierce 2. Jacie Klose was the Jayton Tournament MVP and Kenzie Shelton was named to the Jayton All Tournament Team.

"Overall, I was really pleased with how we played offensively and defensively in the Jayton Tournament. I thought all the JV and varsity kids played well in pool play and that allowed us to rest our varsity starters some for the championship game which proved to be very beneficial. It was a big non-district win for us over a very good Valley team in the championship game and I was so proud of all the girls throughout the tournament," Haskell head coach Blake Eddleman said.

Maidens fall to Lady Pipers 45-44 in District Opener

Rebounding is an area that we must continue to take a lot of pride in throughout district play," Eddleman said.

"Overall, I was proud of how the girls responded after being down big early in the game. We showed a lot of heart and determination. That being said, we were all disappointed that we lost the district opener at Hamlin. We knew going into the game that we would have to play and coach well for all four quarters. 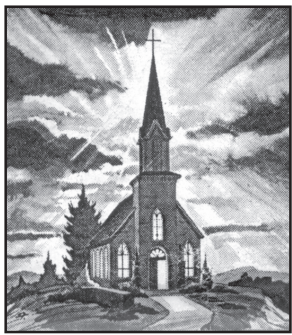

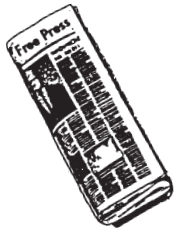

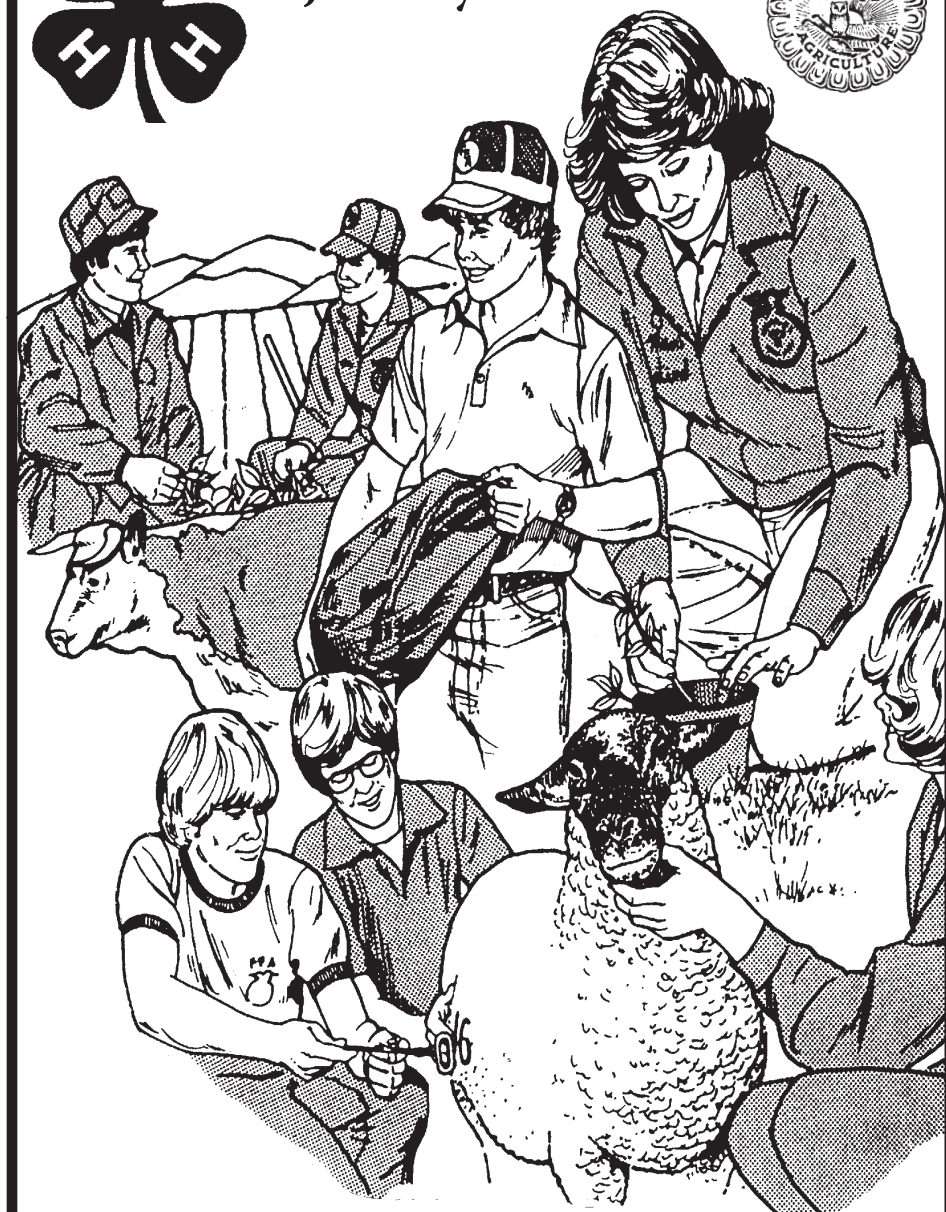
