Star Spangled manners

Demand for American flags is high and people have renewed interest in displaying them at home. The United States Flag Code contains specific instructions on how the flag should and should not be used. Here are some examples:

display of the

flag when

in a window.

a wall or

**Unless illuminated at night, flags displayed outdoors should only be flown from sunrise to sunset.

**The flag should not be flown on days when the weather is inclement, expect when an all weather flag is

**The flag should not be draped over the hood, top, sides or back of a vehicle or of a railroad train or a boat. When the flag is displayed on a motorcar, the staff should be fixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the right fender.

**When displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall, the union should be uppermost and to the flat's own right, that is, to the observer's left. When displayed in a window, the flag should be displayed in the same

**When used on a speaker's platform, the flag, if displayed flat, should be displayed above and behind the speaker.

**The flag, when flown at halfstaff, should be first hoisted to the peak for an instant and then lowered to the half-staff position. The flag should be again raised to the peak before it is lowered for the Day. day. On Memorial Day the flag should be displayed at half-mast until noon only, then raised to the top of the

**The flag should never be displayed up side down, except as a signal of dire distress instances of extreme danger to life or

property.

**The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor,

water or merchandise. **The flag should never be used as wearing apparel, hanging flat on bedding or drapery. It should never be festooned, drawn back, not up, in folds, but al-

ways allowed to fall free. **The flag should never be

used as a covering for a ceiling. **The flag should never be used as a receptacle for receiving, holding, carrying or delivering anything

**The flag should never be used for advertising purposes in any manner whatsoever.

**The flag, when it is in such condition that it no longer is a fitting emblem for display, should be destroyed in a dignified way, preferable by burning. Contact your local American Legion or VFW post for information on flag-burning ceremonies, which are often held on June 14, which is Flag

Dear Jerry Nell, Dear L.C. How to tell you? How to describe what we felt?

I was listening tot he radio when I heard of the plane crashes on the World Trade Center. First, I could not believe my ears. It seems os unreal. Then I went to turn the TV on and when we saw the burning towers on the

screen, we could barely breathe. We got the feeling we were watching a "live" movie...but it Roach. was nota movie.

It was 3:30 P.M.. In France, and I think I will remember this day all my life.

We've been in New York, in April of 1996, and I can still remember the wonderful moment we spent at the top of the Twin Towers, enchanted by this magical view of the city.

Yesterday, we've been struck by pictures, of course, but also by the tremendous pain of a city, a community, a nation.

My family and I want you to know that we think of you and your country. Some say that time can cure pains and sufferings. Not in this case. Someone has to be punished for those crimes.

May the victims and their families find peace and the courage to accept.

Those events could happen to other countries all over the world, that's why, in this great moment of sadness and unbearable pain, American people need to know they have friends thinking of them and sharing their

Meringue (muh-rang) is the white, stiffly beaten substance that goes on top of cream pies! Or so it is supposed to be! Sometimes it does not always work out that way. I love to see a pie with the meringue piled high and just waiting for the slice of a knife! Not so in many cases....it seems like more often than not, it is flat, sad looking and has a grainy texture to it!!!!!! Does anyone out there know the secret to meringue??????? If so, let me know!

Meringue is very simply a mixture of stiffly beaten egg whites, (I got this part right!) and granulated sugar (and I have this part right)!!!!!! But, I am missing something! Directions say in order for the sugar to dissolve completely ad therefore produce "an absolutely smooth meringue", it must be beaten into the whites one tablespoon at a time; spread on top of the pie and baked until golden brown. Just how many times has this came out right for you?

There are several different varieties of meringue......did you know that? Soft meringue is used as a swirled topping for pies, pudding and other desserts. It is baked until brown and the valleys are golden. Hard meringues begin by being piped onto parchment paper and baked at a very low tem-

perature around 200 degrees for as long as 2 hours and left in the turned off oven to dry. They sometimes have a center depression and are filled with ice cream, custard, whipped cream, fruit, etc. Italian meringue is made by gradually pouring hot sugar syrup over stiffly beaten egg whites, then beating constantly until the mixture is smooth and satiny. This can be used to create either soft or hard meringues.

So, get in that kitchen, break a few eggs and get to "cracking" for that perfect meringue! Here are some pie recipes I thought you might like, one is from a reader looking for a Key Lime Pie and some are just meringue recipes! See you in the kitchen!!!!

Marshmallow Meringue-this one uses marshamallows along with egg whites!

Meringue Topping-egg whites, vanill and sugar...what else could Lemon Meringue Pie-compare

the two lemon meringue recipes and see which one you like! Luscious Lemon Meringue

Pie-this one uses Butter Buds and Egg Beaters!

Key Lime Pie-this is for the special reader who requested it! Two-Minute Hawaiian Pie-easy and simple...can't be beat!!!



Thursday, September 20 Meringue & Pie Recipes

Marshmallow Meringue 1/2 pound marshmallows tablespoon milk

2 egg whites 1/4 cup sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Heat marshmallows and milk together; folding over until marshmallows are half melted. Remove from heat and continue folding untile mixture is smooth and fluffy. Beat egg whites and add sugar gradually and continue beating until stiff and smooth. Add salt and vanilla. Blend into marshmallow mixture and spread over pie. Bake at very hot oven temperature (450 degrees) about 1 minute or until light brown

Meringue Topping

2 egg whites 4 tablespoon sugar 1/2 teaspoon vanilla or other flavor-

Beat eggs until frothy. Add sugar gradually and continue beating until stiff. Add flavoring and spread on pie and bake at 350 degrees for 10-15 minutes.

Lemon Meringue Pie 3/4 cup fructose cup water 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup cornstarch 3/4 cup water 4 egg yolks-slightly beaten

1/2 cup lemon juice 2 tablespoons margarine l teaspoon lemon peel-dried 4 egg whites 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar

2 tablespoon fructose 2 tablespoons granulated sugar

Combine 3/4 cup fructose, I cup water and salt in saucepan. Stir and cook until boiling. Combine cornstarch and the 3/4 cup water in small bowl and mix thoroughly. Stir in cornstarch mixture slowly into boiling fructose mixture. Cook until thick and clear. Remove from heat. Combine beaten egg yolks and lemon juice. Stir into thickened hot mixture. Return to heat and continue cooking, stirring constantly until mixture boils rapidly again. Remove from heat; then stir in margarine and lemon peel. Pour into pie shell. For meringue: com-




Lady Patriots earn District wins
