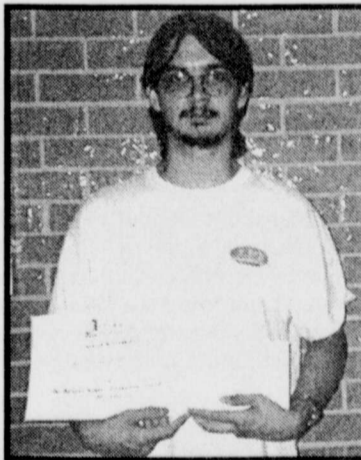
Taylorstown VFD to have Spaghetti, entertainment

The Taylorstown Volunteer Fire Department will have a Spaghetti Supper fund raiser on October 13, 2001, at the Fire Department.

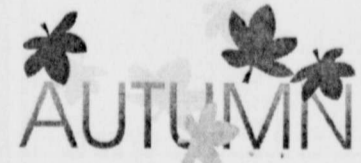
The meal will be served from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. Adult tickets are \$4, children, \$2 and under 5 years eat free.

Robert Robertson, Receives National Hispanic Recognition



Robertson receives national recognition

Robert Robertson, a member of the senior class at Prairiland High School, has been recognized as a scholar in the National Hispanic Recognition Program, as announced by Principal Ronnie Baker.

The National Hispanic Recognition Program, established in 1983, is a College Board program that provides national recognition of the exceptional academic achievements of Hispanic high school seniors and identifies them for post-secondary institutions.

Students enter the program by taking the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) at high school juniors and by identifying themselves as Hispanic. From more than 200,000 students nationwide, approximately 4,900 highest scoring students were initially identified as semifinalists. Based on further evidence of their academic achievement, a select group of 4,200 students have been recognized as a Scholar or Honorable Mention students who have been recognized as a Scholar in the recognition program.

The names of all Scholars and Honorable Mentions are listed in the NHRP Publication, which has been released to colleges and universities to encourage them to seek out these talented Hispanic students as potential candidates for admission.

Founded in 1900, the College Board is a nonprofit membership association of schools, colleges and other educational organizations. The College Board's mission is to be the number one organization in preparing, inspiring, and connecting students to college and opportunity-committed to equity and excellence.

They live in Phoenix, Arizona with their dad, Larry Wood. Their mother Teresa Swain. Of Paris.

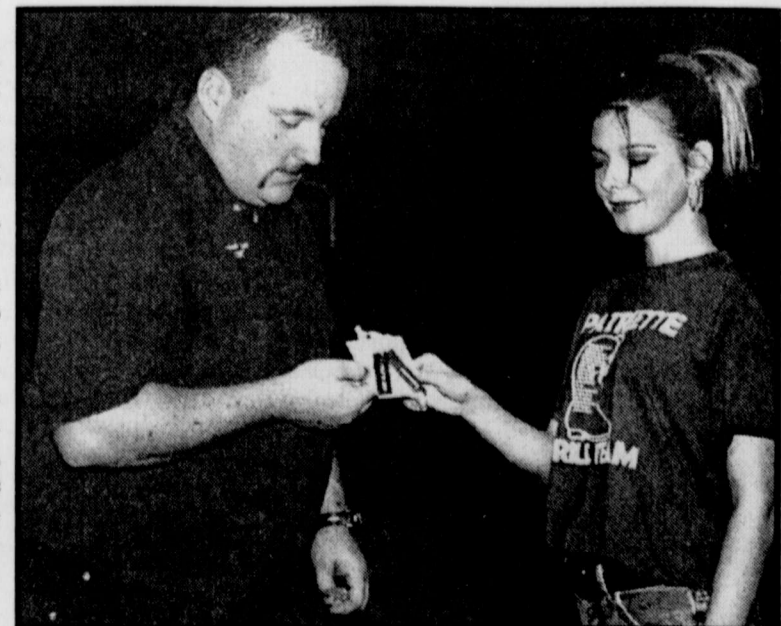
Jennings community to hold 19th reunion

Country Cooking

This week's cook deals with the wonders of yeast breads. Most people won't even attempt yeast breads because of the time it takes to mix, set, rise and roll out. Most things that are good, do require some time in preparation. Well, I found this great recipe and there is no kneading involved.....just mix, let rise and shape into rolls or whatever takes your fancy! They do work.....I tried them!

There are a variety of recipe out there.....some easy and some not! Try some of these and see where you end up! Light up that oven since the weather is getting chilly and try your hand at one of these recipes! See you in the

kitchen!

No-Knead Yeast Rolls-these are great and really work using eggs and very little time! Guaranteed and let me know how they turn out!

Jiffy Rolls-this recipe uses a box of Jiffy White Cake Mix!

Butterhorn Rolls-cut these into pie shape wedges and roll into butterhorns! Yummy!

No-Rise Rolls-self-rising flour and 1 package of yeast does the trick for these rolls!

Coffee Can Bread-bake in a coffee can for a little different flair!

Golden Egg Bread-this recipe uses eggs also and is braided for a wonderful look!

Thursday, October 4 Breads-Quick & Easy

No-Knead Yeast Rolls
2 large or 3 small eggs
2 teaspoons salt
3/4 cup sugar
1/3 cup shortening
1/3 cup butter
3 cups warm water
2 packages dry yeast
8-10 cups flour

Mix together eggs, salt, sugar, shortening and butter. Dissolve yeast in water and add to above mixture. Add two cups flour at a time and stir well; don't get dough too stiff. Add just enough for easy handling. Place in greased bowl and let rise. Punch down and shape into rolls, loaves, cinnamon rolls or dinner rolls. Bake at 375 degrees until nice and golden brown.

Jiffy Rolls
1-1/4 cup warm water
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 package dry yeast
1 box Jiffy White Cake Mix
2-1/2 to 3 cups flour

Place warm water in bowl and add salt. Mix yeast in cake mix before emptying box. Then add to water mixture. Add flour and mix well. Cover and let stand 1 hour. Shape into rolls and let stand 2-3 hours. Bake at 425 degrees until done.

Butterhorn Rolls
1 package dry yeast
1-1/4 cups warm water-divided
2 eggs-beaten
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup Crisco
1 teaspoon salt
4 cups flour

Dissolve a package of yeast in 1/4 cup warm water. In large bowl, combine eggs, sugar, Crisco and salt. Alternately add 1 cup warm water, the yeast mixture and flour. Mix thoroughly. Place a warm, wet towel over the bowl; put in wet place and let rise 1 hour. Punch down and cover with towel; place in refrigerator overnight. About three hours before cooking, take out and divide dough in half and roll on lightly-floured board in round pie shape. Cut into pie-wedge shapes and roll from large side to the point and place on greased sheet. Repeat with the other half of dough. Place in warm place to rise and cook at 375 degrees for 15 to 20 minutes. Easier to cut with pizza cutter.

No-Rise Rolls
4 cups self-rising flour
1/4 cup sugar or to taste
1 package yeast
2 cups lukewarm water
1 egg-slightly beaten
3/4 cup shortening-melted

Combine flour and sugar. Dissolve yeast in water. Add egg, shortening and flour mixture; stir well. Spoon into greased muffin tin about half full. Bake at 425 degrees for 12-15 minutes. Unused portion may be stored in refrigerator up to 2 weeks.

Coffee Can Bread
1 package dry yeast
4 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup warm water
1 tall can Pet milk
1-1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons cooking oil
4 to 4-1/2 cups flour

Mix yeast, 1 tablespoon sugar and warm water in small bowl. Cover with towel; let stand 15 minutes. Mix together milk, salt, 3 tablespoons sugar and oil. Add yeast mixture and flour; stir well. Divide into two equal parts in 2 greased coffee cans. Spray cans and lids with Pam. Put lids on cans and allow to rise until lids pop off; about 3 hours. Remove lids and place upright in 350 degree oven for about 35 or until golden brown.

Golden Egg Bread
2 packages dry yeast
2 cups warm water
3 eggs-slightly beaten
save 1 tablespoon for glaze
1/4 cup sugar
1 tablespoon salt
1/4 cup salad oil
7 cups flour
poppy seeds or toasted sesame seeds-optional

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Blend in eggs, sugar, salt, oil and about half flour. Beat until smooth. Add remaining flour to form a soft dough. Knead until smooth. Place in greased bowl and turn dough over. Let rise 1 to 1-1/2 hours until doubled. Punch down. Divide into thirds. For each braid divide braid into thirds. Roll each part into a 14-inch strand. Beginning in center, braid dough to each end. Place on sheet and let rise until almost doubled. Brush tops with reserved beaten egg and sprinkle with poppy or sesame seeds. Bake at 375 degrees for 35 minutes. Cool on rack.

Serving as pallbearers were David Brown, Robert Mickens, Clifton Ellis, Jerry Simpson, Ernest Mason and Chad Robinson.

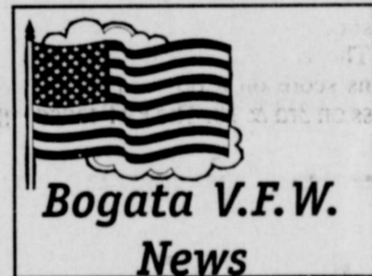
Charles Nolan Rowe dies September 30

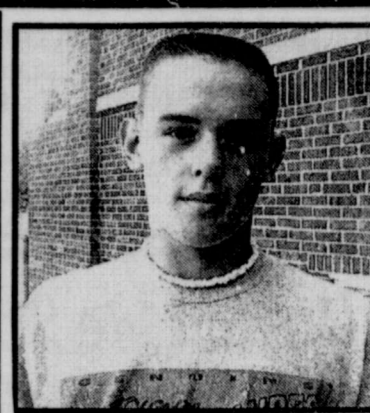

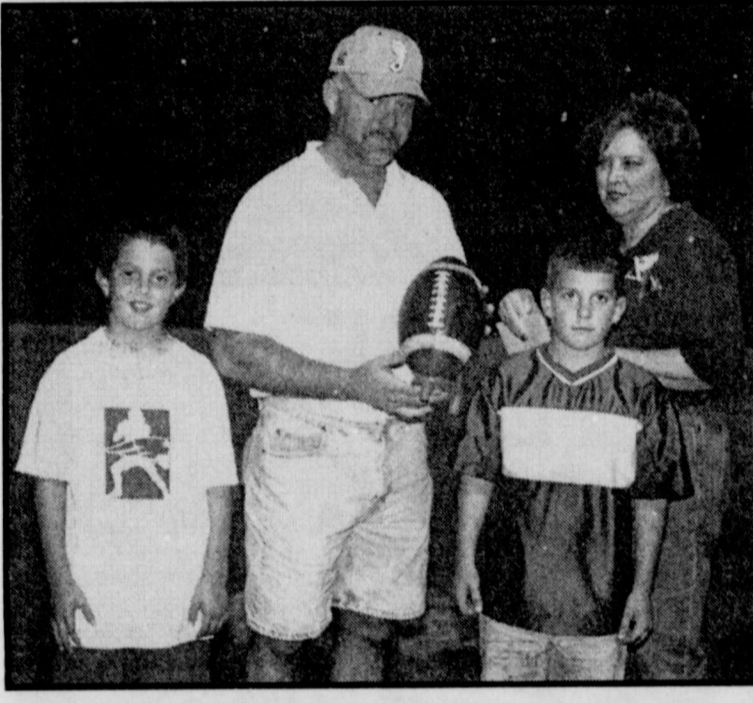

Prairiland will be at home Saturday morning with freshman action beginning at 10 a.m.


