And, we must place our faith, to a certain extent, in our military, our government and ourselves.

Now that I've expounded on all of this, I confess that it's hard to do.

Once more, we need to ask God to help us "accept the things we cannot change, change the things we can, and give us the wisdom to know the difference"

Prairiland board accepts board member's resignation

The Prairiland ISD board met October 15th and attended to several items of business, including the resignation of Chet Downs as a member of the board and the appointment of shad Day to fill the unexpired term. David Basinger was appointed to replace Downs as secretary of the board.

The board accepted a bid from Jimmy Rogers on a Bush Hog Shredder and considered Resolution and Deed to Tax Resale Property.

They accepted the "Acceptable Use Policy for Computer/Network" and considered a request to sell a lot or acres of school property. That issue was tabled.

They considered the Texas School Technology and readiness (STaR) program and accepted an Aggregation Agreement with the Texas Local Government purchasing Cooperative for the calendar year 2002 as well as for a 30 month contract or a 48 months contract.

The board went into executive session at 8:10 p.m. and came out at 8:30 p.m.

They agreed to grant a leave of Absence to Shirlene Owen, LaDonna Turner, Kay Wright and Rhonda Dockray.

They board okayed the minutes, payment of bills and financial report for September and adjourned.

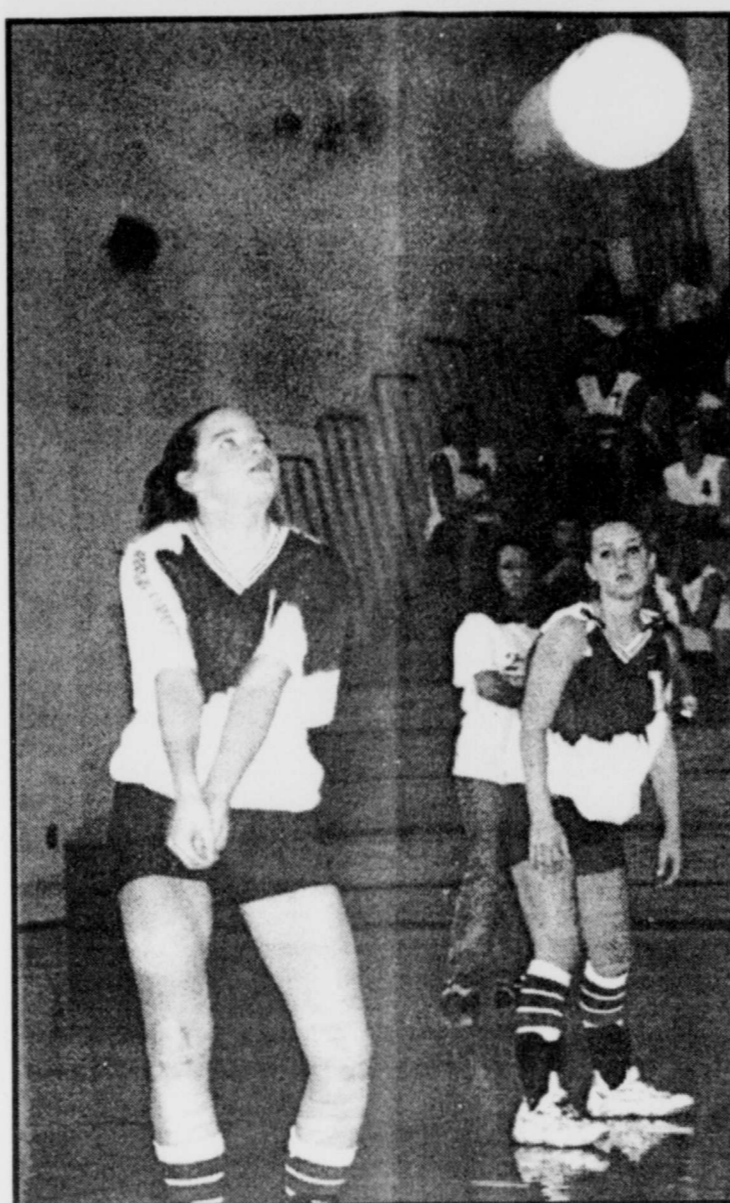

fourth down they missed a 32-yard field goal try. 7-6 at the half.

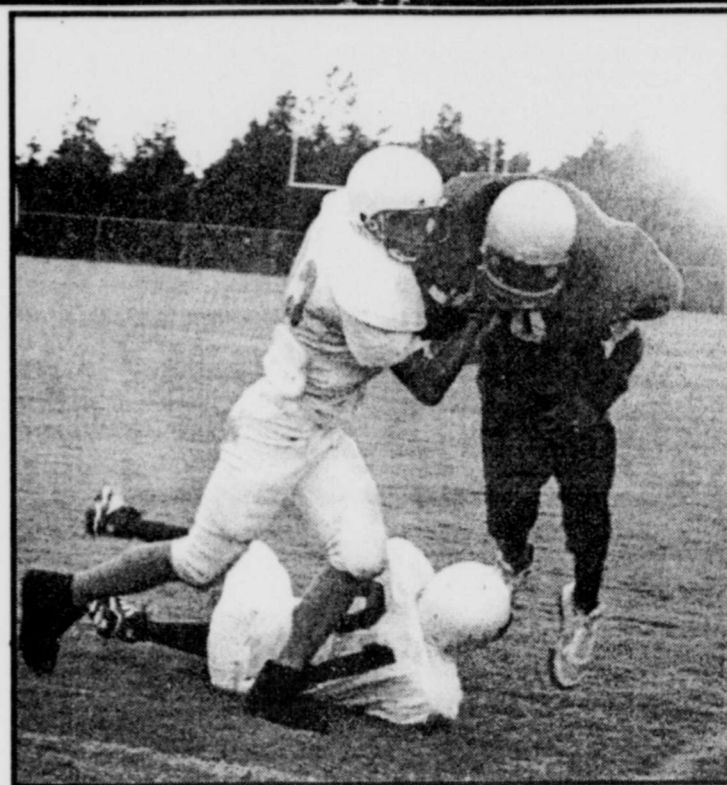

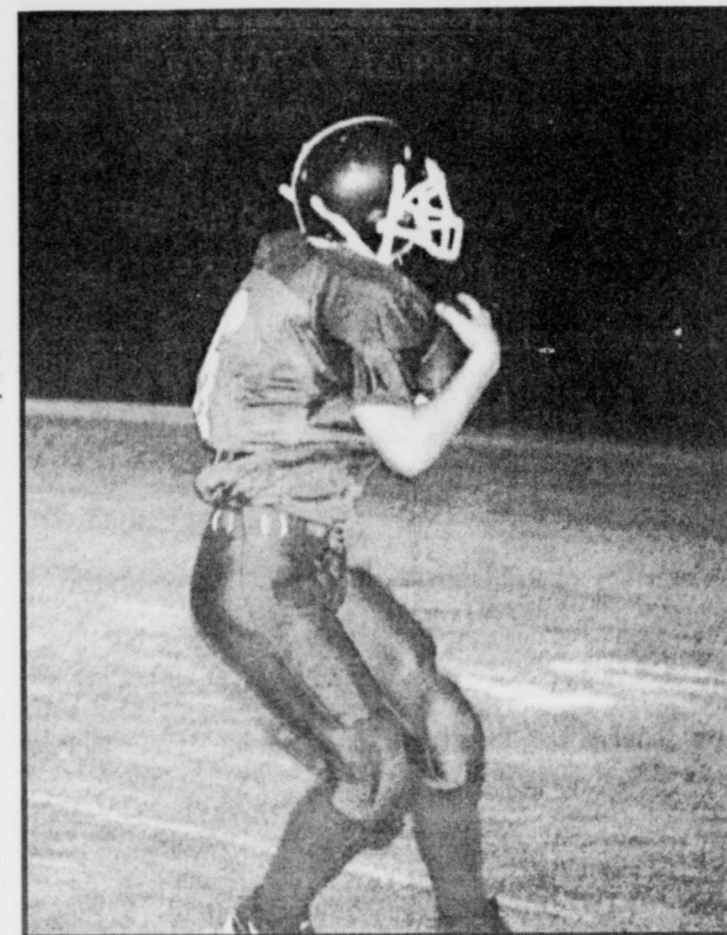

The meeting closed with the Mizpah benediction and refreshments were served by the hostess.

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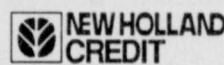
