10-digit dialing begins

Residents in the 903 area code will be required to dial 10-digits (area code plus seven-digit number) to make local phone calls in the near future.

The new 430 area code will have the same geographic boundaries as the current 903 area code. This overlay area code eliminates the need to split the existing area code into a smaller area to create new phone, fax and internet connection numbers and allows residents and businesses to keep their current numbers. The new area code is needed to meet the growing need for phone numbers in the area.

The Texas Public Utility commission last year assigned the new 430 area code as an overlay to the existing 903 area code.

Phone numbers for current 903 area code customers will not change. The new 430 area code will be assigned, starting in April 2003, to customers who order a

new phone service or an additional line for phone, fax or internet connection purposes.

Dialing long distance calls within the 903 area code region will not change. Callers will continue to dial "1" plus the area code, plus the seven digit number. Creation of the new area code will not affect rates or local calling areas. Calls that are local and long distance today will continue to be local and long distance after 10-digit dialing goes into effect February 15, 2003. There will be no change in calls to 411 or 911 emergency services.

Counties in the overlay include Anderson, Bowie, Camp, Cass, Cherokee, Delta, Fannin, Franklin, Freestone, Grayson, Gregg, Harrison, Henderson, Hopkins, Hunt, Lamar, Leon, Marion, Morris, Navarro, Panola, Raines, Red River, Rusk, Smith, Titus, Upshur, Van Zandt and Wood.

Committee appointed to study playground feasibility

Mayor Gilbert Arriaga has appointed a committee to explore the feasibility of obtaining public park and playground. The Committee consists of Deport Councilperson Crystal Folse, Sue Sheppard, Tim J. Wood, and Tim Peimann.

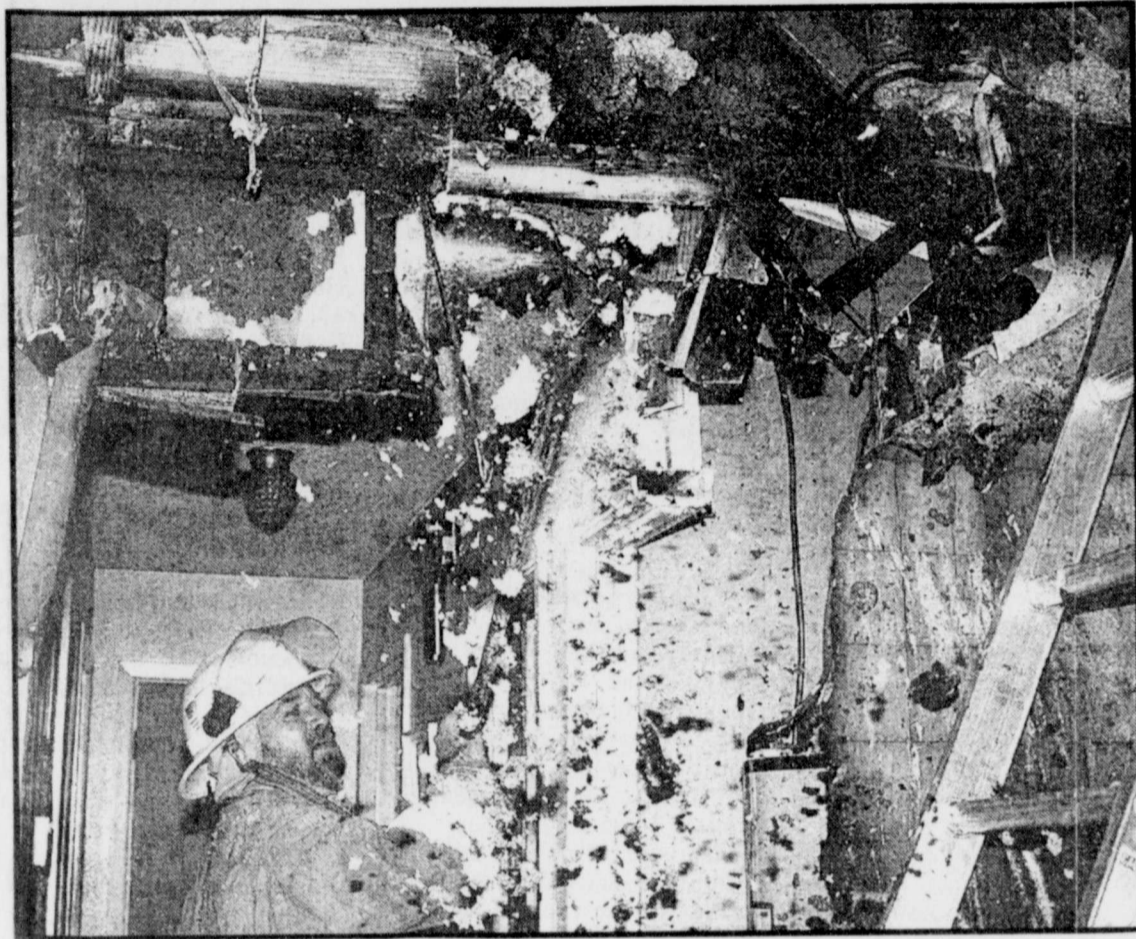
Over the next several months, the committee will be scouting locations within the city limits of Deport and looking into federal and state funding. In addition to funding, the committee has been commissioned to formulate a design, address long-term maintenance concerns, and comply with federal and state safety and environmental guidelines.

It is estimated that the planning process will take between 8-10 mos. before designs can be presented to the council. The Mayor has encouraged the committee to seek feedback from the public as to suggestions, opinions, and concerns. This will be done in a series of public meetings in the upcoming months, and can be started immediately using the city's e-mail address: cityofdeport@neto.com. There

will also be a suggestion box placed at the Deport City Hall.

Councilperson Folse will serve as liaison between the committee and the City Government and will be updating both the Mayor and the Council as to the progress made. Folse originally brought the issue to the Council prior to her being elected. The council at that time gave support and she was encouraged to begin the planning process. Several organizational type meetings have already been had and she has accumulated a lot of feedback from other parents and citizens on this project. The formation of this committee by the Mayor is the next step of this process.

"This park will give the "small"-citizens of Deport--a place to play, and the "large" citizens of Deport a place to be proud of," said, Mayor Arriaga "Parks and Playgrounds are things that industry and residential developers often look at when deciding to come to an area, so this can only be a good thing for our City."

Water running at end of Main Street is from a relief valve

By now most people in Deport have noticed the water pouring from a valve on the fire hydrant on the north end of Main Street, directly in front of the water tower.

There have been many questions asked about what appears to be a waste of water.

The reason for the valve and the water pouring out into the gutter is simple. Because the Deport water tower is lower than the Lamar County Water Supply tower lo-

cated on Hwy. 271 outside of Deport, when the city had to switch to that the LCWS tower water pressure became much higher.

This means that without the relief valve on the north end of town, water lines would blow out, causing water leaks. In fact, even with the valve, there have been some water leaks.

This is the reason for the water running at the end of Main Street.

CORN DUMPLINGS-much like chicken dumplings.....gotta try these!

Corn

Corn Dumplings
1 can whole kernel corn-drain
1 cup flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
2 teaspoons salt
3 tablespoons cornmeal
1/4 cup shortening

Grate corn in a blender and combine flour, baking powder, salt and cornmeal. Cut in shortening and add milk to form soft but not stiff dough. Drop mixture by spoonfuls into stew. Cover and simmer for 15 minutes.

Skillet Corn
2 tablespoons vegetable oil
8 large ears corn-remove from cob
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup flour

Heat oven-proof dish in 425 degree oven for 20 minutes and pour oil into dish. Stir together all ingredients and pat into even layer. Bake until nice and brown for about an hour. Remove and invert onto serving plate and cut into wedges.

Southwestern Corn Stuffing
6 cups crumbled cornbread
17 ounce can cream-style corn
2-4 ounce cans chopped chilis
4-1/2 ounce can chopped ripe olives
3/4 cup shredded Jack cheese
1/2 cup finely chopped onion
1/2 cup red or green peppers
1 tablespoon chopped cilantro or parsley
1 egg-beaten

In large bowl combine all ingredients except cornbread, mix well. Add cornbread and toss gently to mix. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees for 50-60 minutes.

Scalloped Corn
1 can cream-style corn
1/2 cup milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup cornflakes or cereal crumbs
1/4 cup cheddar cheese
onion powder to taste

Combine corn, milk, egg, onion powder and cereal crumbs. Place in casserole dish and bake at 350 degrees until done.

Fresh Corn Fritters
2 cups grated corn
2 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon salt
2 eggs-lightly beaten
1 teaspoon baking powder
ground pepper

Mix all ingredients together. Drop the batter by generous tablespoonsful onto a lightly greased nonstick pan. Cook like pancakes, about a minute on each side.

Country Fried Corn with Bacon
4 slices smoked country bacon
1/2 small onion-chopped fine
8 ears fresh sweet corn
salt and pepper to taste

Fry bacon until crisp and drain on paper towels. Cut into small strips or crumble. Add onion to 2 tablespoons reserved bacon fat and fry until soft. Cut corn from cob and add to onions and cook 2-3 minutes. Add bacon and season to taste.

Cornmeal-Peanut Butter Cookies
1 cup roasted salted peanuts
1-1/2 sticks butter
1 cup dark brown sugar
2 eggs
1 tablespoon molasses
1 teaspoon vanilla
1-1/2 cup all purpose flour
1/2 cup cornmeal
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup rolled oats

Chop and reserve 1/2 of nuts and set aside. Add butter and sugar to 1/2 of the nuts in food processor and process until well mixed. Add eggs, molasses and vanilla and process until smooth. Mix together flour, baking soda and powder, pepper and salt to processor. Pulse until dough is just mixed. Place mixture into bowl and fold in oats and remaining nuts. Place walnut-sized dough onto a greased cookie sheet about one inch apart. Press sugared fork on top and press down lightly. Bake for 15-20 minutes at 350 until done.

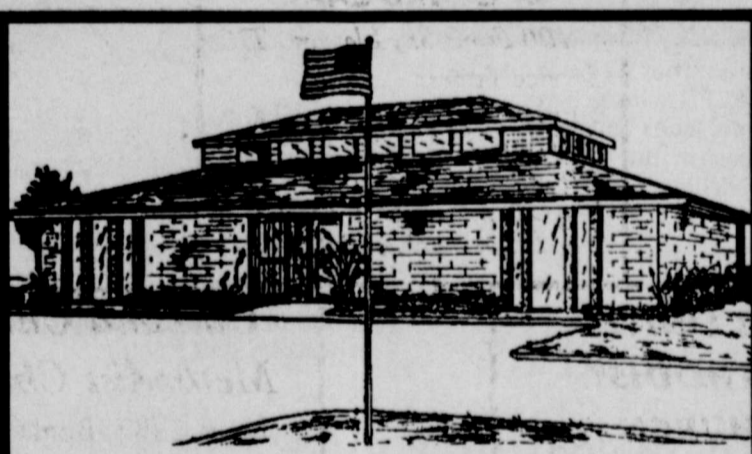

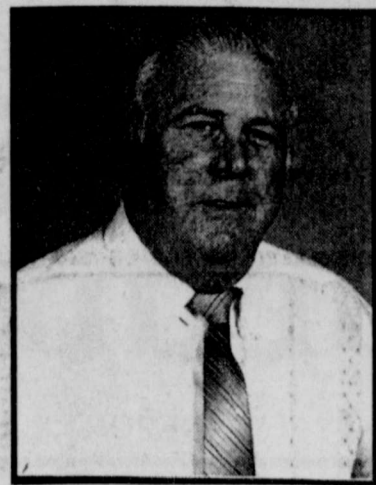

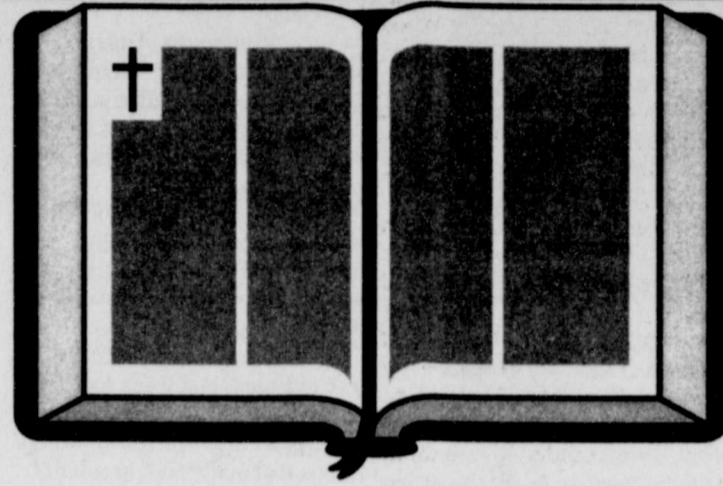

West Nile Virus update

The West Nile Virus has now been detected in Orange, Jefferson, Fort Bend, Harris and Montgomery counties in Texas. Any dead birds, particularly blue jays, crows and hawks or suspected equine cases of West Nile virus infection need to be reported to the proper agencies.

The only domestic animals adversely affected by West Nile virus are equine. If you suspect your horse, donkey or mule has West Nile virus infection, contact your veterinarian for a diagnosis. Equine owners may want to vaccinate their horses against the disease.

West Nile virus is commonly found in Africa, eastern Europe, West Asia and the Middle East. It was first reported in Texas in mid-June, having been found in two dead blue jays in Harris County. Most people who are infected with the virus show no symptoms. Those who do typically develop mild symptoms of disease, includ-

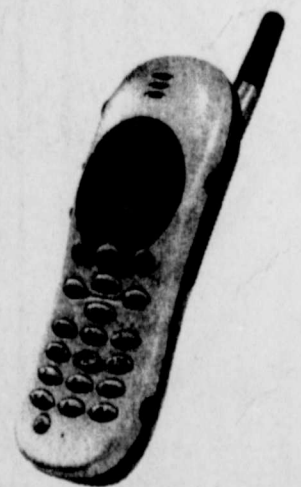
ing fever, headache, body aches and skin rashes. Less than 15 of those infected will develop more severe symptoms that included meningitis or encephalitis, an infection of the brain. West Nile virus has killed 18 people along the East Coast since it was first detected in New York in 1999. Last summer was the most severe so far, with 66 human infections and 9 deaths.

The first human case of West Nile virus this year was reported in early July in which three men in Louisiana were hospitalized. All lived in towns east of Baton Rouge.

Mosquitoes spread the virus from infected birds to humans. Humans cannot pass the virus to each other. As a preventive, mosquito breeding sites should be eliminated. Anything that is collecting and holding water for longer than three days needs to be either filled in, thrown away or turned upside down.

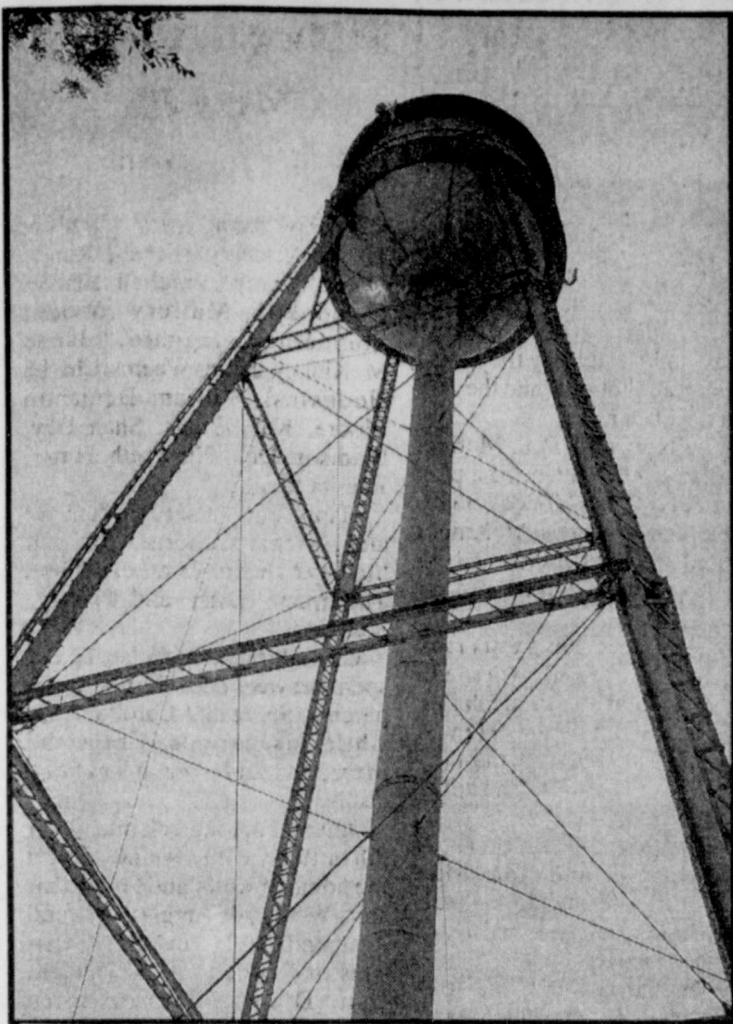

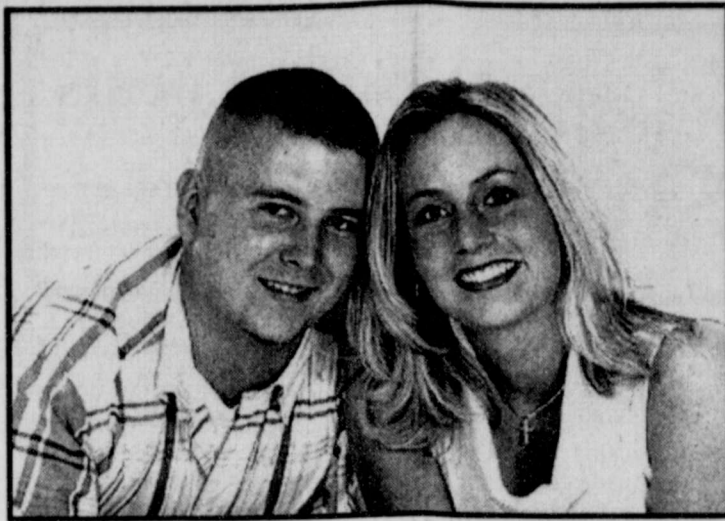

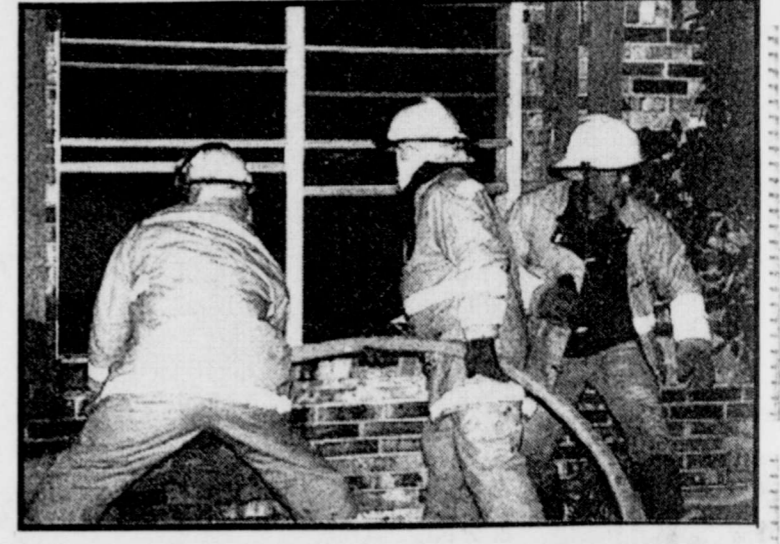
