Deport water under boil order due to pressure drop

The City of Deport was put under a boil order Monday, August 12th as a precautionary measure after the water pressure dropped below an acceptable level. According to Deport Water & Sewer Superintendent Charles Reavis, calls began to come in that residents had no water, and upon investigation, the Lamar Co. Water Supply tower located on Hwy. 271 had a 0 pressure level. Lamar County Water Supply, which furnishes the city of Deport with water, had four major water leaks on Monday. According to Alton Dockrey head of LCWS, residents who are on Lamar

County Water Supply water are not under a boil order as the pressure on county customers did not drop below acceptable levels. The boil order was delivered house to house by Deport city employees Monday afternoon. The order reads: Due to conditions which have occurred recently in the water system, the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission has required the system to notify all customers to boil their water prior to consumption. To ensure destruction of all harmful bacteria and other microbes, water for drinking, cook-

ing and ice making should be boiled for two minutes. In lieu of boiling, bottled water may be purchased or water may be obtained from some other suitable source. At press time Wednesday morning test results to make sure that there was nothing harmful in Deport's drinking water were awaited. If the tests are clear, the boil order will be lifted and residents will be notified. Deport city water customers may call Charles Reavis or Sharon Francis at Deport City Hall at 652-3875 if they have questions.

Deport water rates to go up, park location sought

The Deport City council held a public hearing Monday night, August 12th to discuss what would have to be done with water rates. A small number of people attended the hearing. Dan Zachary expressed his opinion that an in-line pressure control valve could have been used while the Deport water tower was off line instead of "wasting water". Mayor Gilbert Arriaga said that the city had listened to experts on the matter, and had chosen to use the valve that has released water at the north end of Main Street. Alan Vanderburg of Hayter Engineering said that "if we had known how long the tower was going to be off line, or if we had decided to go a different route than refurbishing the existing tower, that type of valve might have done some good, but it's no use looking back and trying to say what if. We are looking now at where we are going to go." The current system, Vanderburg stated, is the simplest and easiest to maintain. A comment was made that a citizen didn't mind a rate increase but they resented being unable to drink the water. (Deport was under a boil order due to a pressure

drop in the system Monday). Councilman Mike Francis said "I understand that, but in reality drinking water is the smallest portion we use. We bathe in the water, wash clothes and cars, flush toilets with it, water with it and depend on it for fire protection. Of course we want good drinking water." Mayor Arriaga agreed that the city was working very hard to achieve an excellent water quality. Visitors were assured that what was happening with and to the water system would be carefully reviewed at least yearly. Mayor Arriaga said that "some problems haven't been addressed for a number of years, and we are trying to see that doesn't happen again". Hayter Engineering explained that a grant for \$250,000 is being applied for to replace the old cast iron water pipes on Monroe, Choctaw and N. Jeffus Streets, and have a dedicated line from the LCWS tower to the Deport tower. The original grant was larger, but a grant in that amount is not available, and water rate increases will be necessary to make up the difference, as well as absorb some of the costs for a chlorinator system. So far, every bid made for a chlorinator system has been al-

most double the amount the city can possibly spend, but an alternative system, a gaseous chlorinator, may very well be an option, and should be affordable. After the public hearing the council voted to increase water rates from \$10 for the first 1500 gallons of water to \$15 for the first 1500, and from \$4 for each additional 1000 to \$5 for each additional 1000 gallons. The rate increase will go into effect Sept. 1, 2002. Rick McMikel was sworn in by Mayor Arriaga to fill the position on the council vacated when long-time member Duane Glover resigned due to health reasons. An ordinance was approved concerning the gas company franchise fee from 2% to 4%. No action was taken on the proposed grant because none was necessary at this time. It was decided to send out letters on derelict properties and set up two budget workshops. The council okayed the creation of a Park Council consisting of Crystal Folse, Sue Shepherd and Tim Wood. A discussion on various locations for a park with playground equipment in Deport was held. Payment of bills and approval of the minutes were okayed.

No body, no drug lab located at Shadowland after tip

According to reports from the Red River County Sheriff's Department, a 48 hour vigil last week ended at a dead end investigation at the present time. Apparently, a "bad source" of information was passed on to the Sheriff's Office last week. The information claimed that a body was seen in an old silo located at Shadowland, between FM 410 and Deport. Also, rumors of a drug lab located at that same site were

passed along, but after an extensive search no evidence was found to substantiate either of the stories. A DPS dive team assisted the Red River County Sheriff's Department and the Drug Task Force in a search of the old silo, which as some water in it. Personnel worked around the clock until the investigation was concluded, with neither a body nor a drug lab being located.

cleaned and recoated, and the water samples taken have been excellent. Deport city officials have expressed their thanks to the citizens of Deport who have been patient during what has, at times, been a difficult situation.

Deport Methodist Youth to have car wash

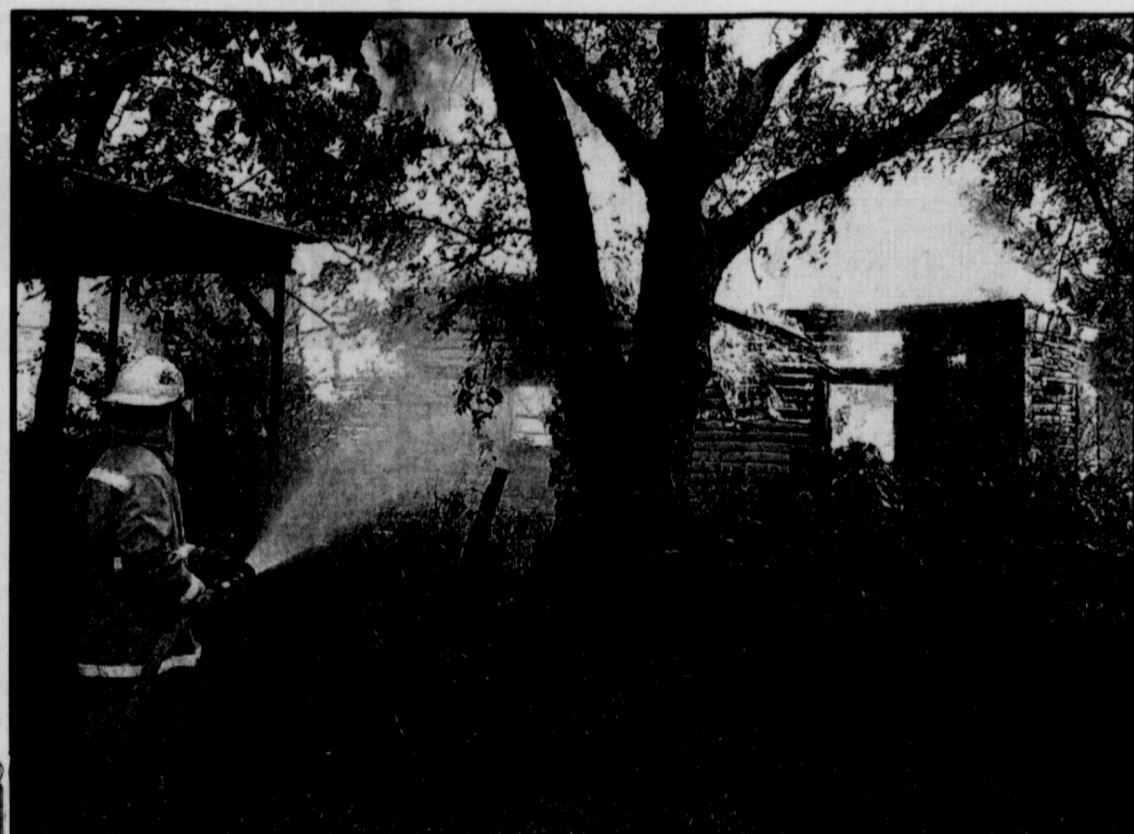
"Uh Oh! what have they done this time?"

Proceeds from the 2002 CHRISTUS St. Joseph's gala, "Some Enchanted Evening," will be used to establish a nursing scholarship fund for Lamar County residents who wish to pursue a nursing degree to become a registered nurse. Scholarship recipients will be required to sign

an agreement to work for CHRISTUS St. Joseph's Health System for a minimum of one year following graduation. Scholarships will also be offered to RNs working toward an advanced nursing degree and who are interested in teaching after completing the program.

"The nursing shortage is a problem that seriously threatens our healthcare system locally and on a national level," explained Dr. James Brunette, 2002 gala chairman. "We have cycled through shortages in the past; however, this shortage is viewed as more serious since it is occurring at a critical time when the "baby boomer" generation will need more intense, long term health care services, and the majority of nurses currently in the workforce will be retiring."

Almost 60 percent of the nation's registered nurses are over 40, and a decade-long decline in enrollment in nursing education programs has created a shortfall in the pipeline. According to government projections, another 450,000 nurses may be needed by the year 2008 to meet the demand.

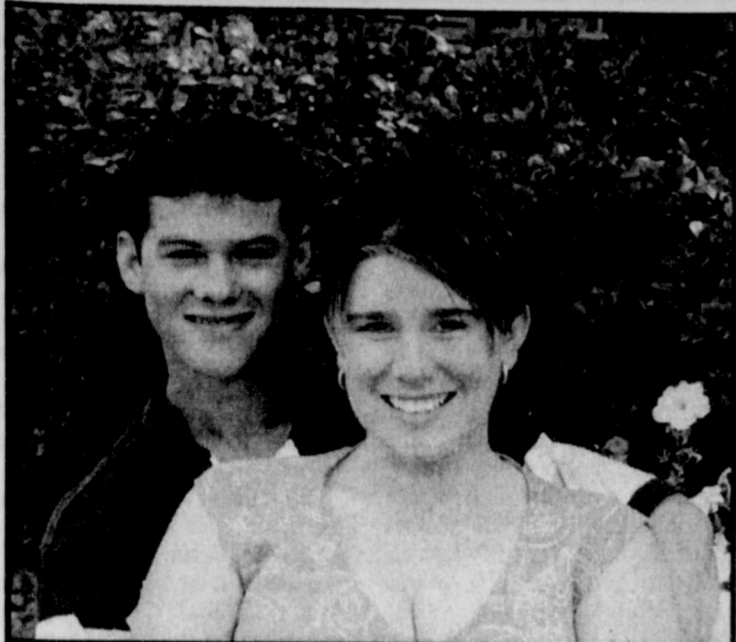
According to Paris Junior College officials, the total cost of tuition, books, fees, etc. for the associate degree nursing program is \$6,653, and many students require financial aid in order to make ends meet.

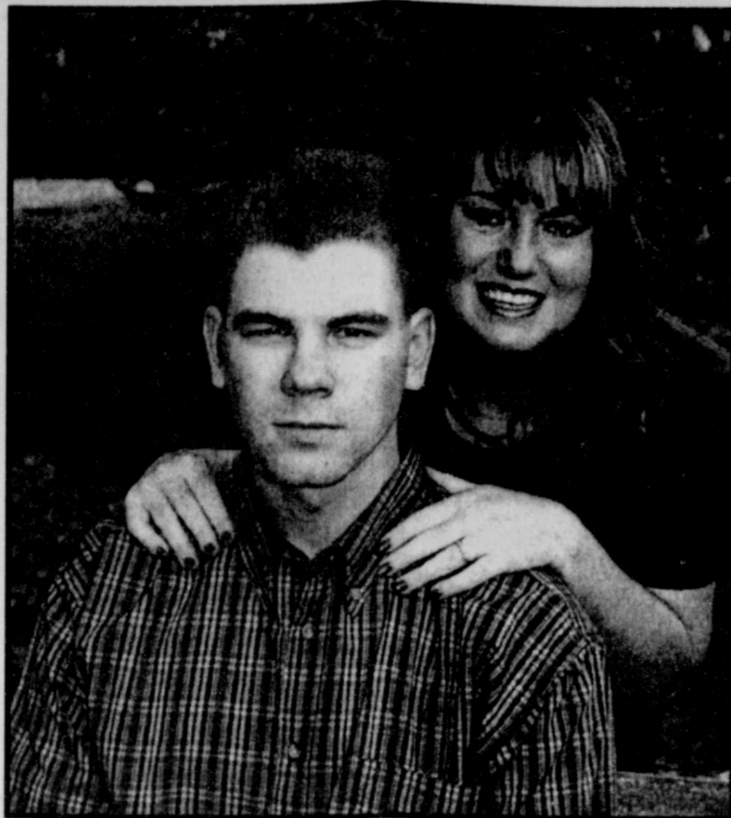

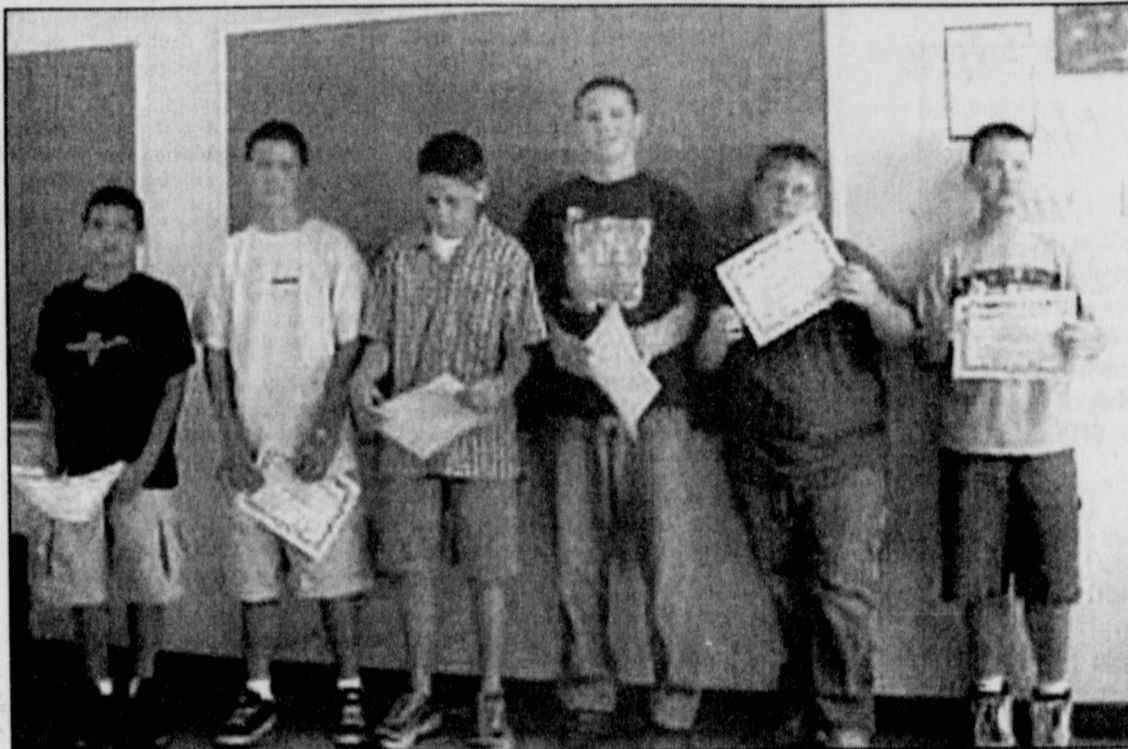

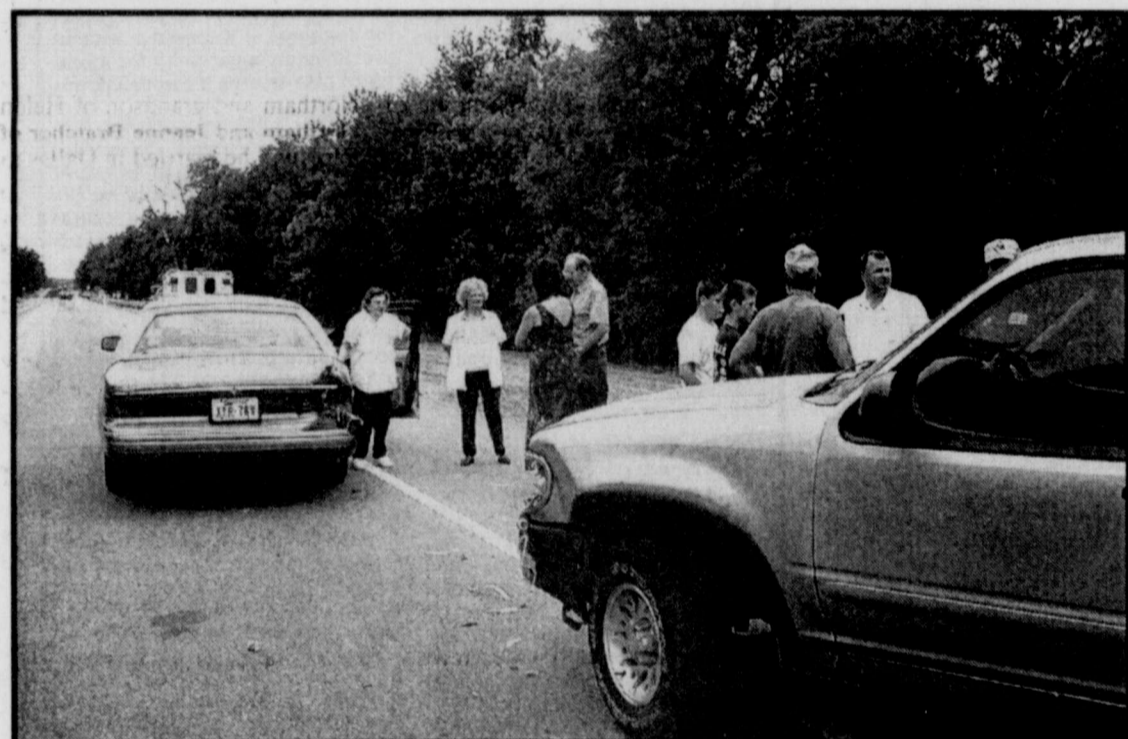

West Nile Virus case suspected in Talco

Donnette Parrot of Talco could possibly be the first case of West Nile Virus in the area, but she waits for a positive confirmation of her test results. Donnette and her family returned last Sunday from a trip to the Gulf Coast. While there she reported the weather beautiful with a breeze blowing every day except on Friday evening. She went out on the deck of the place they were staying and said her legs were instantly covered in mosquitos. Thinking nothing of it she brushed them off and went inside. Sunday on the trip home Donnette said she felt really tired.

On Monday she had to force herself to do some housework and by afternoon had a bad headache. She is prone to have migraine

type headaches so this was not unusual. By Tuesday the pain in her head was severe and she went to a local doctor's office, and was able to see the nurse practitioner. She was given two shots and a prescription.

By Wednesday morning the pain was much worse and Donnette returned to the doctor. He sent her straight to the hospital where she had a spinal tap. The normal protein in a human's spinal fluid should be 20-40, Donnette's reports that hers was 140. West Nile Virus also causes swelling of the brain so a brain scan was ordered and test results were sent to a lab to see whether she could possibly have West Nile Virus.

As of press time no confirma-

tion has been made as to whether Mrs. Parrot has the virus, which is affecting humans, birds and animals.

She is at home and is improving daily. On Tuesday when I spoke to her she stated the pain was much less but she is still having to take pain medication around every 6 hours.

The symptoms of Mrs. Parrot's condition started as a very tired feeling, headache which escalated, stiffness in the neck and finally down the spine.

Mrs. Parrot said she is not sure when her tests results will be in but will report the results when she receives them.

For now, she is wished a speedy recovery from whatever has made her ill.

Beware of mosquito borne illness

It's shaping up to be a virus kind of year, and Texans are being warned to take precautions to avoid mosquito-borne diseases, according to an entomologist with the Agriculture Program at Texas A&M University.

"The general public needs to be more aware of the local mosquito situation and take precautions against these insects," said Dr. Jim Olson. Precautions include cleaning up premises by removing all sources of standing water, mosquito-proofing dwellings, and, as much as possible, altering outdoor activities to times and places mosquitos aren't active.

"Wear loose, light-colored, long-sleeved clothing and apply a mosquito repellent of choice," he said. "Mosquitos tend to go for dark-colored, moving objects. If the clothing fits tightly, they can drill right through the fabric into the skin."

The recent rains across much of the state is a good-news, bad-news type of situation. With a capability of traveling up to 30-50 miles

from where they breed as larvae, these mosquitos may cause nuisance problems well away from where they were in their developmental stages. They are going to be a serious source of annoyance for the next 10 days to two weeks.

The first case of West Nile virus in a human in Texas was confirmed recently in a 50-year old Orange resident, who is in stable condition at the Houston VA Medical Center. Evidence of the disease has been found in birds or mosquitos in Harris, Jefferson, Fort Bend, Orange, Montgomery and Dallas counties, and several confirmed and unconfirmed cases of the virus have been found in horses in Southeast Texas.

Some horses have died while others are recovering. "The situation in East Texas is further confused by also having Eastern Equine Encephalitis activity," which has been confirmed in one horse each in Nome, Jasper and Tyler.

According to the Texas Department of Health, mild infections of mosquito-borne encephalitis in humans may occur with only a headache. More severe infections

may include headaches, high fever, neck stiffness, disorientation, coma and tremors.

With West Nile infections, flu-like symptoms include fever, headaches, sore throat, body aches, fatigue (often with a skin rash), and swollen lymph glands. It can be fatal, particularly in the elderly or very young or those with weakened immune systems.

Human symptoms of Eastern Equine Encephalitis range from mild flu-like illness to frank encephalitis (true inflammation of the brain), coma and death, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

In the United States, there have been 153 confirmed human cases of Eastern Equine Encephalitis in humans since 1964; up to 3,000 cases of St. Louis Encephalitis in humans since 1975; 639 human cases of Western Equine Encephalitis since 1964; and 152 human cases of West Nile virus confirmed since it first appeared in the U.S. in 1999, according to CDC information.

Migrating birds are the primary source of the West Nile virus and

Eastern Equine Encephalitis, which are transmitted by mosquitos to other birds, animals or humans. Eastern does not seem to kill birds (West Nile infections kills blue jays, crows and hawks), though birds are the reservoir for that virus.

There is evidence of St. Louis Encephalitis cycling in mosquitos in the Corpus Christi area and Western Encephalitis cycling in mosquitos in El Paso. Western Equine Encephalitis is vectored by Culex tarsalis. Since West Nile virus often shows up in the bird population first, the public is asked to contact the nearest office of TDH when dead blue jays, crows or hawks are found. Check for the nearest office at their website: <http://www.tdh.state.tx.us/>

As a final precaution, please report any dead crows, blue jays or hawks to City officials so notification to the Department of Health can be made. The best way to help is to control breeding sites for mosquitos in your area.
