

The council had voted to go with SDI out of Oklahoma, which



Fruit Drink with Wiggle Worms 12 ounce can frozen orange juice 12 ounce can apricot nectar-chilled 2-12 ounce cans lemon-lime carbonated beverage-chilled 6 ounce can frozen pineapple-orange juice

chewy fruit-flavored worms

Prepare 6 ounce can can frozen pineapple-orange juice and arrange worms in bottom of 4-cup ring mold. Pour juice into mold until almost covering worms. Cover and freeze for one hour; allow no worms to float while freezing. Add any remaining juice to mold and freeze until firm. In small bowl prepare 12 ounce can frozen pineapple-juice and stir in nectar and carbonated beverage. Unmold ice ring and add to punch. Makes 10 eight ounce servings.

In large skillet, stir and cook sweet pepper and carrot in hot butter for 2 minutes. Add mushrooms and cook and stir about 2 minutes more or until veggies are tender. Remove from heat and stir in cream cheese, spinach and meats and Italian seasonings. On lightly floured board roll dough into a 12 x 9 rectangle. Carefully transfer to greased baking sheet. Spread the filling lengthwise in 3-inch wide srips down the center of rectangle to within 1-inch of ends. On both long sides, make 3-inch cuts from the edges toward the center at l-inch intervals. Moisten the end of each dough strip. Starting at one end, alternately fold opposite strips of>dough at an angle across fill-ing. Slightly press moistened ends together in center to seal. Cover and let rise in warm place until almost double. Lightly brush with milk. Spinkle with sesame seeds or cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 minutes or until golden brown. Makes 12 slices. Spider Cookie Wreaths 3/4 cup butter-softened 3/4 cup water 1/4 teaspoon baking powder egg teaspoon vanilla 1-3/4 cups flour 1/4 cup finely chopped pecans or almonds l teaspoon grated orange peel 1/4 teaspoon orange paste food coloring l cup sifted powdered sugar >milk red cinnamon candies or miniature candy-coated M&M's In large mixing bowl, beat butter with electric mixer or medium to high for 30 seconds or until softened. Add sugar and baking powder. Beat until combined, scraping sides of the bowl occasionally. Beat in egg and vanilla. Beat in as much of the flour as you can with mixer. Using wooden spoon stir in remaining flour. Place half of dough in small mixing bowl. Stir in pecans or almonds and set aside. To the remaining dough, knead in orange peel and food coloring. Cover and chill both portions of dough about 30 minutes or until easy to handle. On lightly floured surface, shape each dough portion into a 12-inch long log. Cut each log into twenty-four l/2-inch thick pieces. Rolll each piece into a 6inch long rope. If difficult to work with refrigerate for 10-15 minutes. Place and orange and white rope side by side and twist to form wreath. Pinch together ends to seal. Place on ungreased cookie sheet and repeat with remaining dough. Bake at 375 degrees for 8 to 10 minutes or until edges are lightly brown. Cool on cookie sheet. In small mixing bowl stir in enough powdered sugar and milk to form frosting. Tint with favorite Halloween colors. Pipe spiders on tops of cookies and place candies to make bodies of spiders. Makes 24 cookies.










