## DPS issues Halloween reminder

With scary ghouls and goblins on the way, the Texas Department of Public Safety is reminding Texans to be safe and responsible this coming Halloween.

"Halloween is a fun time for both children and adults, but oftentimes people act or drive carelessly or are not aware of their surroundings," said Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the DPS.

On Halloween of 2000, there were 546 injuries and 11 fatalities in Texas. Motorists are urged to drive slowly in neighborhoods and to be on the lookout for trick-or-treaters.

Safety tips for pedestrians include:

- \*Look both ways before crossing roadways. Always walk, don't run.
- \*Cross the roadway at intersections and crosswalks when possible.
- \*Avoid toy guns and knives-- they

could be mistaken for the real thing.

\*Wear costumes that are light in color, and short enough to avoid tripping.

\*Reflective material of some kind on the costume is strongly encouraged.

\*Avoid masks- use face paint instead for better visibility and peripheral vision.

\*Travel in groups with adult supervision.

\*Do not enter the cars and homes of strangers. Avoid homes without visible porch lights.

\*Carry a flashlight and make sure an adult accompanies small children. Exercise caution when crossing streets.

\*Never trick-or-treat in unfamiliar areas.

\*Take all treats home for an adult to inspect before eating anything. Never eat unwrapped candy.

The TABS Policy update 68 passed as well as the calendar update.

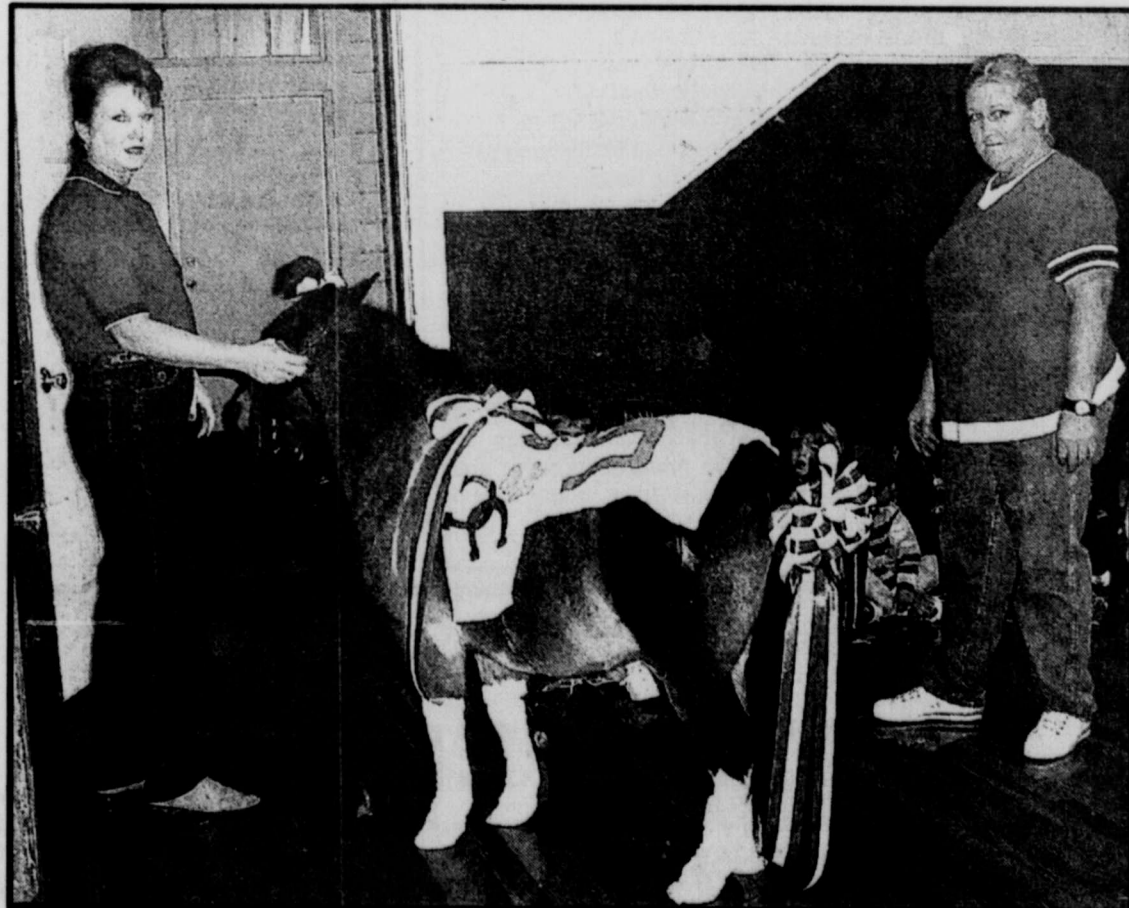
The request from TAC for En-

ergy Management Plan bids, reviewed time frame from TAC passed unanimously.

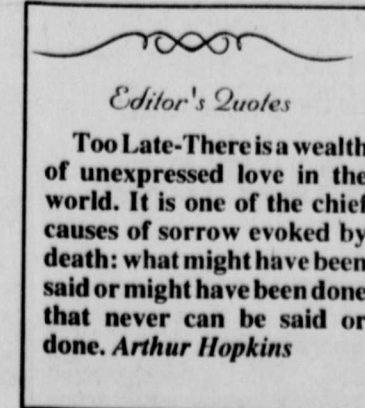
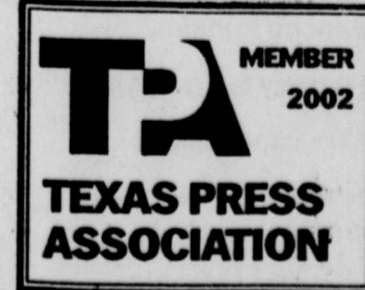
Application for TxDOT Safe Routes to school grant was also passed by the board.

## Test exemption policy instated

Prairiland ISD is excited to announce that a new semester test exemption policy has been instated. It will go into effect as of October 28, 2002. For the Fall Semester if students have no absences from now until Christmas with an average of 75 or above in every class, they will be exempt from semester tests. They will not be required to come to school on December 19 or 20th and will have two days extra holiday time.

Attendance will be taken every period of every day and students must be in their classes each day to qualify for this exemption. If you miss a class, for example: in 7th period to go to the dentist, you will not be exempt during last period and have to take that exam, however you could still be eligible

to be exempt 1st thru 6th periods. It does not matter whether it is excused or not, students must attend that class each day.

The Spring Semester will follow basically the same with attendance being taken each period with the following exemption policy: 3 absents and average of 90 or higher; 2 absents and average of 80 or higher; 1 absent with average of 75 or higher; and no absents with average of 75 or higher. Faculty will look at the student's average and absents in each class to see if they meet the requirements. Students will be dismissed from school for the year on the 27th with exemptions instead of on the 29th! If you have any questions, please contact the campus student attends.

**HAPPY HALLOWEEN!** Our cook's column this week deals with pecans. We have done columns on this before, but did you know that the pecan pie originated in New Orleans and pecans were introduced by the Native Americans. Small villages of Quinipissa and Tangipahoa Indians were located in the vicinity of present-day New Orleans. The site was first visited by a European explorer, Frenchman Robert Calvelier, sieur de La Salle, in 1682. Another French explorer, Jean Baptiste Le Moyne, sieur de Bienville, recognized the importance of the location and established a settlement in 1718 after he had become governor of the Louisiana Territory. He named it New Orleans for the duc d'Orleans, regent to France.

Today, Southern orchards produce 250 million pounds in an average year with four-fifths of the pecan harvest sold as shelled nuts. The nuts ripen from mid-September until December and are harvested after they fall to the ground. The discovery of fossil remains along with millions of native pecans trees found along most major streams and irrigation canals in Texas and the northern part of

Mexico indicate that this area is the original home of the pecans and that it spread north and east from this area. This also indicates that the pecan was here and producing long before Native Americans came to the scene.

PECAN RECIPES

**Reduced Fat Pecan Pie**

- 1 large egg
- 6 large egg whites
- 1-1/3 cups dark corn syrup
- 1-1/3 cup sugar
- 1-1/2 tablespoons reduced fat butter
- 1-1/4 teaspoons vanilla
- 3/4 cup pecan halves-slivered
- 9-inch pie shell-unbaked

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In large mixing bowl, whisk together the egg and egg whites until blended and frothy. Whisk in the syrup, sugar, butter and vanilla until sugar is dissolved. Stir in pecans and pour mixture into pie shell. Bake for 55 minutes or until mixture is firm in center. Cool before serving.

**Buttermilk Pecan Pie**

- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 2 cups sugar
- 3 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 cup chopped pecans
- 9-inch unbaked pie shell

Cream butter and sugar together. Add eggs one at a time. Blend in vanilla, flour and salt. Add buttermilk and mix gently. Sprinkle pecans in pie crust and pour custard mixture over pecans. Bake at 300 degrees in preheated oven for 1-1/2 hours or until center is done.

**Raisin Pecan Pie**

- 1-1/2 cups raisins
- 1-1/4 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup butter-softened
- 2 eggs-beaten
- 1 cup pecan halves
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 9-inch pie shell-unbaked

Boil raisins in water for 10 minutes until plump; drain and cool. Cream together butter and sugar. Stir in sugar, nutmeg,

cinnamon and vanilla and then add pecans and raisins. Pour filling into pie shell. Bake for 35-40 minutes or until the mixture is firm in the center. Cool before serving.

**Tabasco Pecan Pie**

- 3 eggs-slightly beaten
- 1 cup dark corn syrup
- 1/2 cup dark brown sugar
- 1/4 cup butter-melted
- 1 tablespoon Tabasco sauce
- 1-1/2 cups pecans-coarsely chopped
- 9-inch unbaked pie shell

Preheat oven to 425 degrees. For filling blend in all ingredients together except pecans. Place pecans in pie shell and pour filling over pecans. Bake 15 minutes and reduce oven to 350 degrees and bake 40 more minutes or until set.

**Mock Oatmeal Pecan Pie**

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup dark corn syrup
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup quick-cooking rolled oatmeal
- 9-inch pie shell-unbaked
- Mock Frito Pecan Pie
- 3 eggs-beaten
- 3/4 cups molasses
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 3/4 cup light corn syrup
- 2 tablespoons butter-melted
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 2/3 cup crushed Fritos
- 9-inch baked pie shell

Preheat oven to 450 degrees. Cream eggs, molasses, corn syrups, vanilla and butter. Mix flour and Fritos and stir into mixture. Pour filling into pie shell. Bake for 10 minutes and then reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake 35 minutes more or until mixture is firm in the center. Cool before serving.

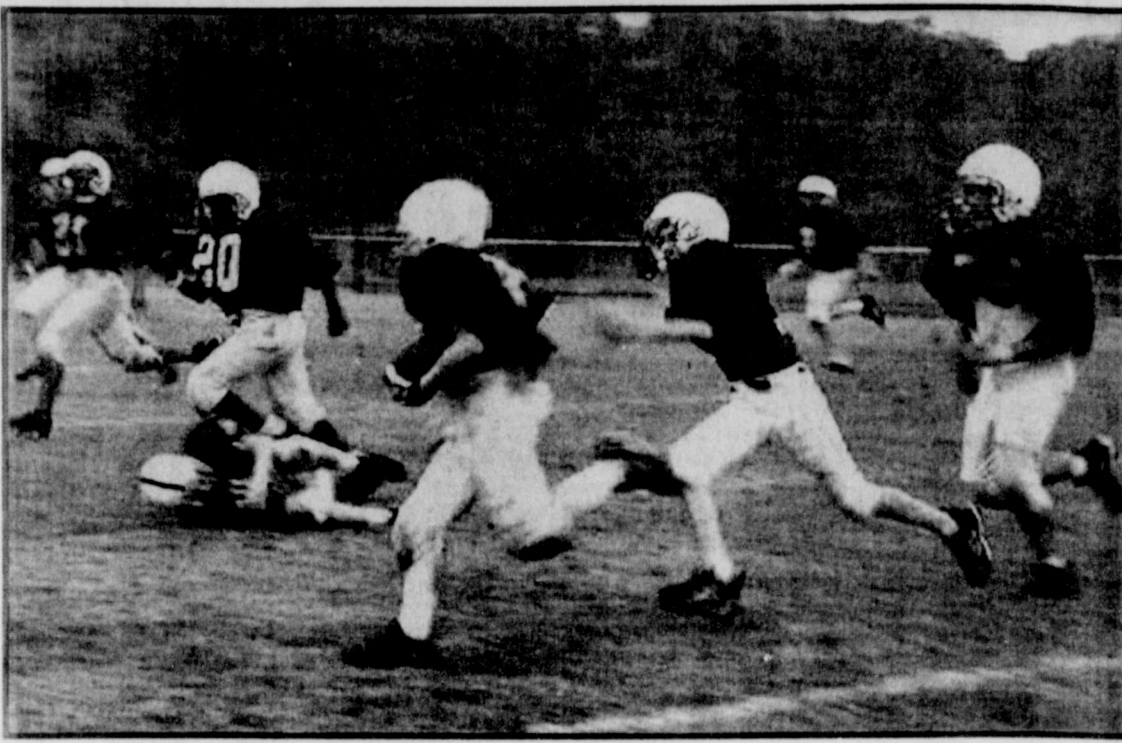

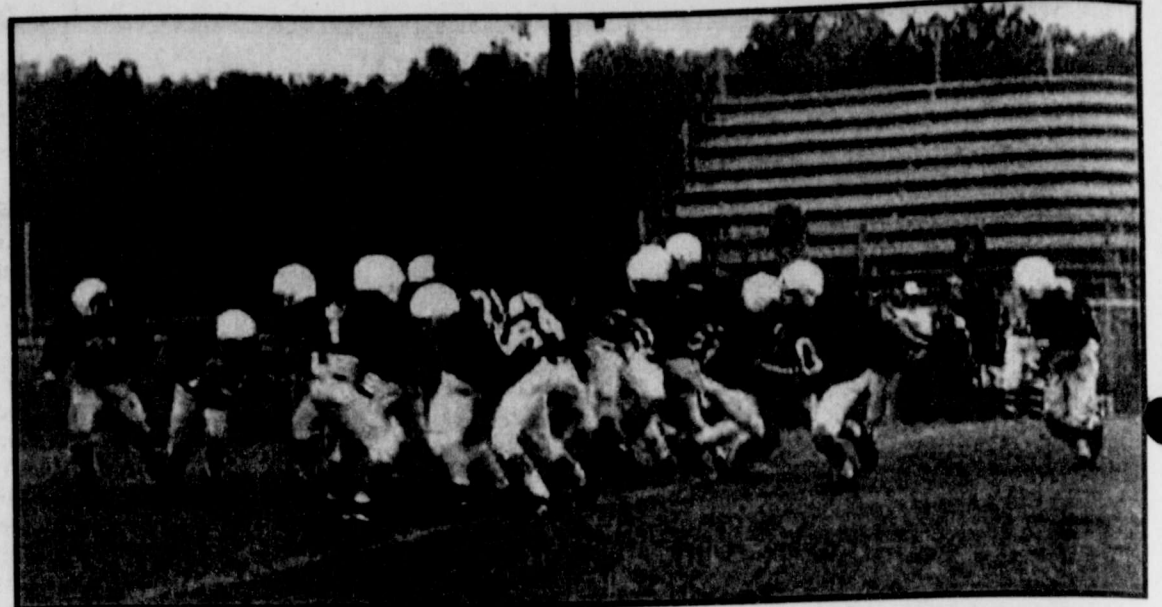

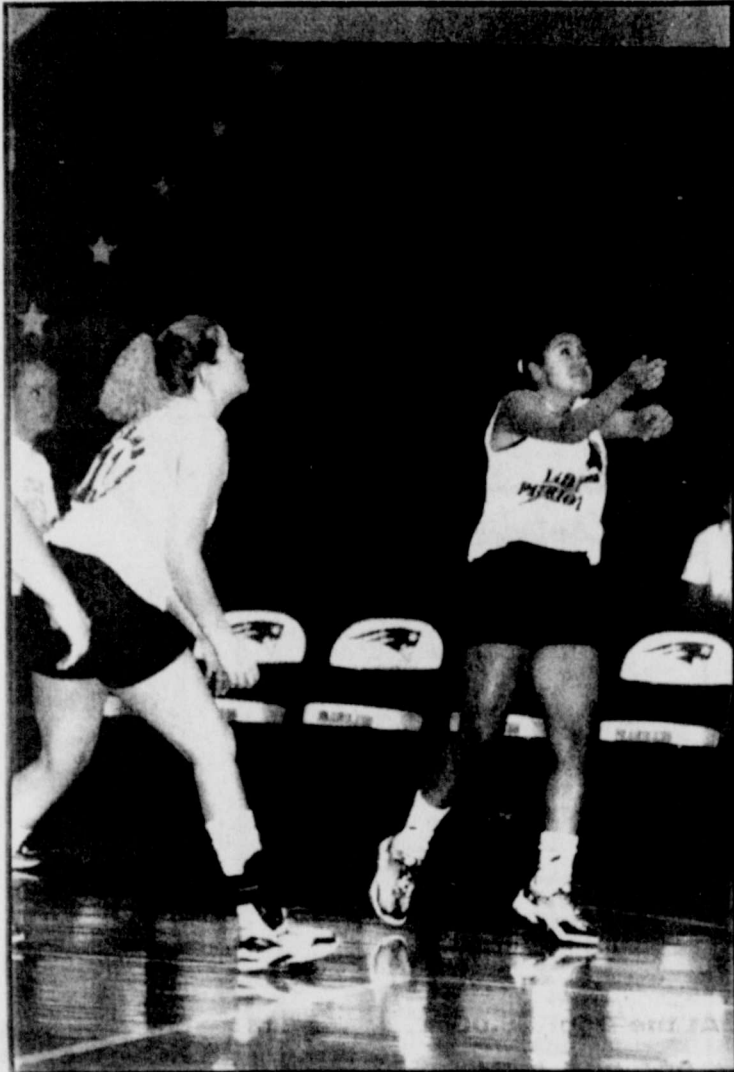

### Prairiland over Clarksville

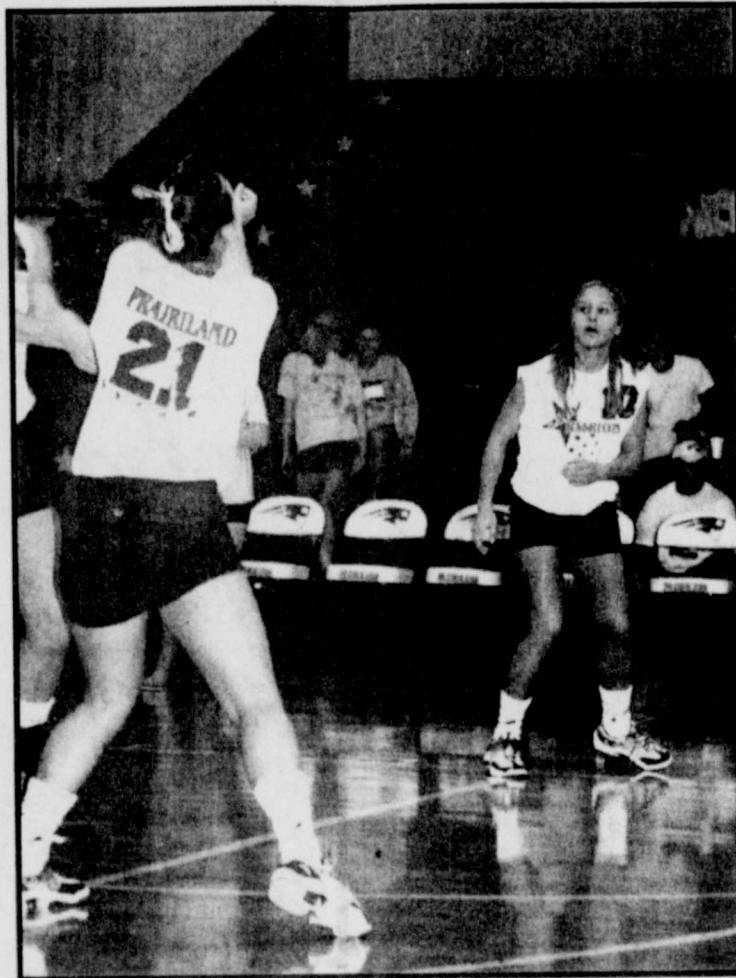

Blount of Paris all have voiced opposition to Marvin Nichols. This is quite logical: 99% of local people oppose these lakes. Where was Bill Ratliff on Aug. 2? Does that sound like a man who is trying to protect and represent his constituents, who have so generously elected him, time and again, in years past? We citizens deserve better than this! Ratliff has used a DFW dagger to stab Northeast Texas in the back!

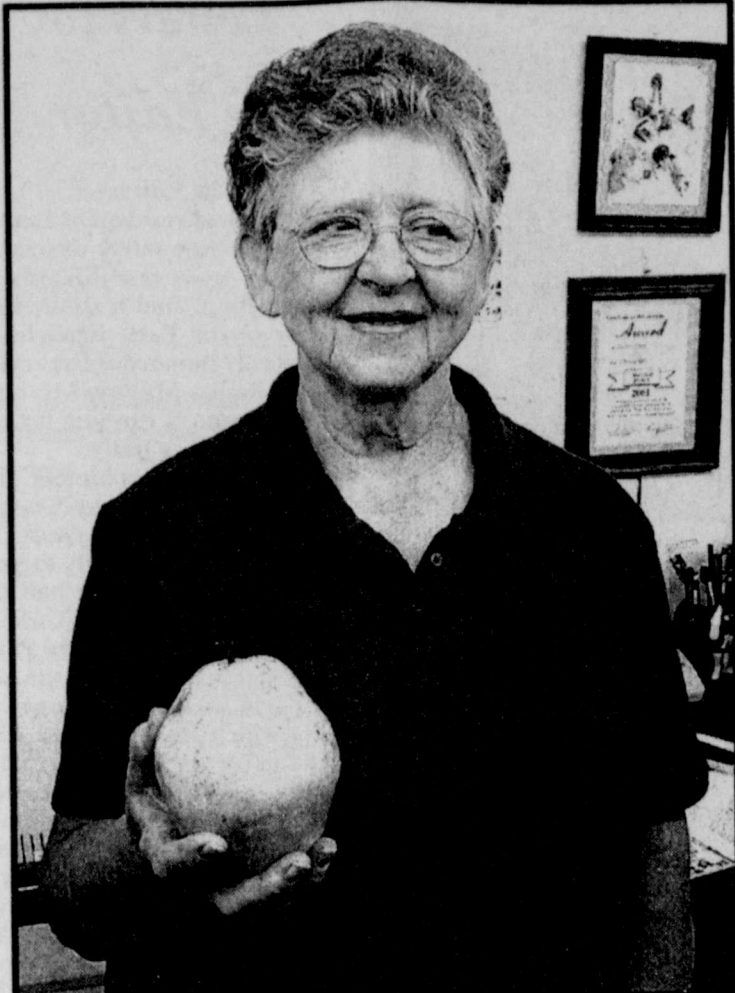

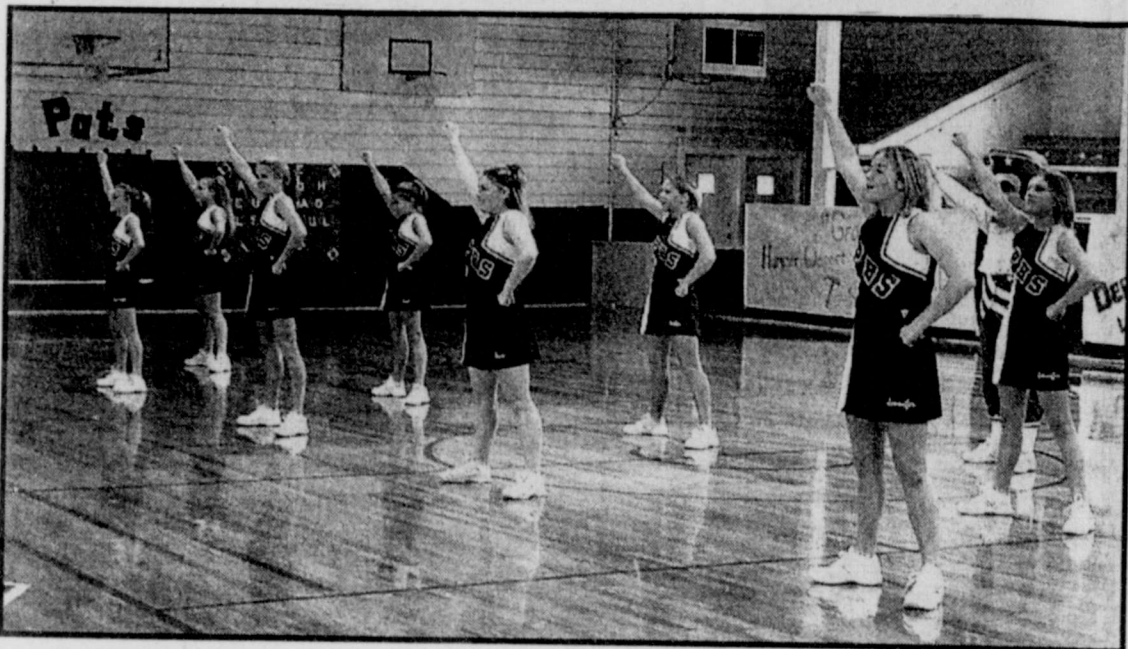

### Letter to the Editor:

As a rural resident of Lamar County whose safety is supposedly a concern of Judge Superville, I find it ironic that many of the Paris firefighters are openly supporting Superville over Paris Mayor Michael Pfister who is running for the office of county judge.

The nineteen volunteer fire departments in Lamar County get a paltry \$82,000 from the county budget annually to provide fire protection for half the population of Lamar County. Seventy-one percent of the Paris firefighters live outside the city of Paris in Lamar County, a City which just budgeted \$3.8 million for the fire department serving the other half of the citizens of Lamar County in Paris. It seems strange to me that Paris firefighters who have made such a "safety" issue about some small budget reductions in the Paris budget can support a county judge candidate who does so little for the safety of 71% of their families who must rely on the volunteer fire departments outside the city of protection.

It seems to me that Paris has been very proactive in building new fire stations, buying new equipment, adding additional firefighters, paying for training and compensating their personnel very well. If the Paris firefighters are so unhappy with their pay and can be paid so much more by leaving, then why aren't they leaving?

I will tell you who is leaving. There is a revolving door in the Lamar County Sheriff's Department. Living in the county I am well aware of this need. We need someone who will address the safety needs of those of us who live outside the city of Paris. Our volunteer fire departments desperately need support as do the men and women of the Lamar County Sheriff's Department.

### NOTICE OF REFERENDUM

In accordance with the provisions of the Texas Agriculture Code, Chapter 74, Subchapter D, and 4 Tex. Admin. Code, Chapter 3, Subchapter A, the Texas Department of Agriculture (the Department) will conduct a referendum on the proposition of whether or not cotton growers shall establish a boll weevil eradication program in the area designated by rule as the Northern Blacklands Boll Weevil Eradication Zone and pay a maximum annual assessment in the amount of \$13.25 per land acre of cotton each year until costs of the eradication program plus finance charges are paid off, which is anticipated to take up to 10 years, and a nominal maintenance fee thereafter. The initiation of a program at this assessment level is contingent upon obtaining financing and a minimum of 30 percent state and/or federal cost-share funding. If approved, the program and assessment are expected to begin in the zone on a date determined by the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Program Board of Directors.

The Northern Blacklands Eradication Zone consist of all of Montague, Cooke, Grayson, Fannin, Lamar, Red River, Bowie, Cass, Morris, Titus, Franklin, Hopkins, Delta, Hunt, Rockwall, Collin, Denton, Wise, Jack, Parker, Tarrant, Dallas, Kaufman, Rains, VanZandt, Henderson, Navarro, Ellis, Johnson, Hood, Somervell, Bosque, Hamilton and Hill counties; and those parts of McLennan and Limestone counties north of State Highway 84. If a zone program and assessment are approved by this referendum, growers in the zone shall vote again on whether or not to continue eradication efforts after four years of active program activities.

Also, as part of the referendum, a representative of the above-referenced zone will be elected to serve on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board of Directors. The board is charged with administering the boll weevil eradication program in Texas.

The referendum and board election will be held by mail balloting. Ballots will be mailed by November 19, 2002. All ballots cast by mail must be post-marked no later than December 9, 2002, in order to be valid. Any cotton grower having cotton production in 2002 within the zone defined above is eligible to vote, and if he or she resides in the Northern Blacklands Boll Weevil Eradication Zone and has at least seven years experience as a cotton grower, to have his or her name placed on the ballot as a can-

didate in the board member election. A cotton grower is defined as a person who grows cotton and receives income from the sale of cotton. The term includes an individual who, as owner, landlord, tenant or sharecropper, is entitled to share in the cotton grown and available for marketing from the farm or share in the proceeds from the sale of the cotton from the farm.

Any person eligible to vote in the referendum or board member election who resides in the Northern Blacklands Boll Weevil Eradication Zone and meets the seven-year experience requirement may place his or her name in nomination for election to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board by written application to the Department at the address provided below. The application shall be on a nomination form provided by the Department and must be signed by the applicant and at least ten other eligible voters. The nomination form must be received in Austin by November 11, 2002, and must provide the legal residence of the applicant. A nomination form may be obtained by contacting the Department office or any county agent located in the voting area.

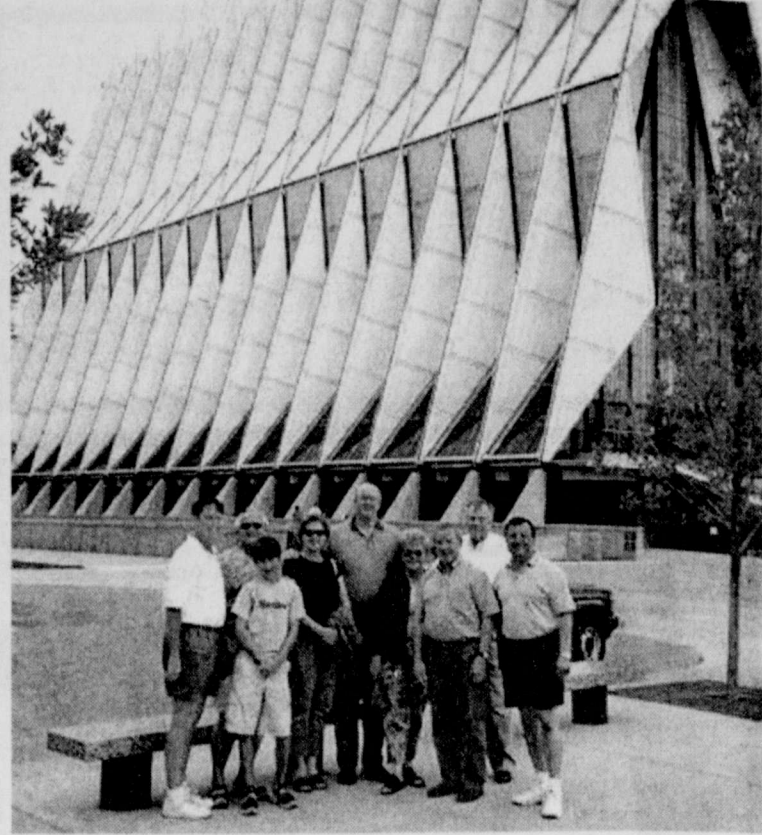

**Ballards visit Air Force Academy**

Probably the chief reason a tourist would visit Colorado Springs, Colorado is the opportunity to experience the grandeur of the Rocky Mountains. Yet, if you should make the trip to the beautiful city, don't miss a visit to the Air Force Academy. The Air Force Academy complex is over 18,000 acres nestled at the base of the Rocky Mountains on Interstate 25 just outside the city.

The Academy was authorized in 1954 by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The four-year college operates with approximately 4,000 Cadets each year. Of the major attractions for visitors on the Academy grounds, one would want to note the B-52 bomber displays, the famous flying Thunderbirds Airmanship Overlook, and Falcon Football Stadium.

Yet, the centerpiece of the complex is the Cadet Chapel. Soaring 150 feet toward the Colorado sky, the Cadet Chapel is an all-faith house of worship. It contains a

separate chapel for each of the three major religious faiths—Protestant, Catholic and Jewish—plus two all-faiths worship rooms. There are two main levels within the building with the Protestant Chapel on the upper level and the Catholic and Jewish Chapels beneath.

The Chapel was completed in 1963 after five years of planning and four years of construction. The aluminum, glass and steel structure features 17 majestic spires, or tetrahedrons. The spires form the walls and the 99-foot pinnacled ceiling of the Protestant Chapel. Stained glass windows form ribbons of color between the spires. The pews are of American walnut and African mahogany. They are sculptured so the end of each pew resembles a World War I airplane propeller. The backs of the pews are capped by a strip of aluminum similar to the leading edge of a fighter aircraft wing.

The focal point of the Catholic Chapel is the abstract glass mo-
