That simple sight sent me back to my grandmother's kitchen, hanging on the pullout bread board on her cabinet while she deftly rolled pie crust, sliced it into strips and made the basketweave top look easy.

As I grew older she tried to teach me the trick. I would slice my crust into strips, and make a fair beginning, but before it was over, I would have lost the thread of what I was doing and end up begging for help. I never did fully get the knack of making a basketweave pie top.

It wasn't for lack of trying, but there was a definite lack of talent!

The other talent grandmother possessed was fluting the edges of a pie crust. And, again, I fell short of her expectations, (and mine) by not having a knack for making the perfectly even, ruffled

I still remember her fingers, twisted with arthritis, the joints much enlarged, the skin thin and wrinkled, moving just incredibly fast as she ruffled that pie crust.

My crusts....I resort to using a fork to imprint the edge and seal it.

I don't do basketweave, I cut out stars and a crescent moon or clover leaves, autumn leaves or apple shapes instead.

So, I can't pass that little bit of decorative food artistry on to anyone, at my end of the family it is lost.

I hope others still take the time to do these things, especially younger people. For some reason it is a childhood memory that is beautiful to me, and it was a time when my grandparent and I did some

I love the idea of little girls today learning to this from their mom or grandmom.

Of course, there is something else I have to confess. Neither my mom nor grandmother would be really thrilled to know that I usually buy a frozen package of pie dough, thaw it and slap it into that pie pan!

Oh well, I suspect I've failed the pie baking rather miserably! It wasn't for lack of trying....although these days lack of time has something to





lead quickly 12-1 before Harmony could get their bearings.





PET TALK

Your pet may not need a wake-up call, room service and amint on its pillow for a pleasant overnight stay, but boarding could require a little homework.

Each year, about 30 million pet owners board their pets forat least one night, according to figures from the AmericanBoarding Kennels Association. And since there are more than 9,000 boarding kennels in the U.S. and Canada, there is probably one near you.

Fees can range from \$8 to \$30 a day, depending on the facility, the type of services offered and other factors.

While boarding a pet may seem like a simple procedure, there are still some questions you might want to ask, says Dr. Alice Blue-McLendon of Texas A&M University's College of Veterinary Medicine.

A good way to find out who the best boarders are is usually by word of mouth. People tend to be picky about their pets, and they know who the good boarders are and which ones to avoid.

Look to see if the facility is clean. Is there adequate lighting at the facility, and is the bedding for the animal sufficient for its needs?

If the owner is to be away for an extended time, It's a good idea to ask how often the animals get exercise or some form of entertainment. Dogs will usually enjoy a brisk walk but some facilities may not have the manpower for such activity.

Parasites can often be a problem for some boarding facilities, and the diseases they carry can be harmful to your pet.

A common ailment associated with boarding of animals is bordetella, commonly known as "kennel cough." Although usuallynot serious, the ailment can be a nagging problem and is caused by the pet's close proximity with other animals. Vaccinations are available to prevent it.

Once the animal has been picked up at the boarding facility, you may want to see the log kept during its stay. Most facilities keep daily records of how often the pet was fed, exercised or groomed.

"The best solution is usually to keep the animal at home and have someone care for it in its own environment. But if that isn't possible, boarding is necessary and that's when the owner needs to do a little homework. Most facilities are properly run, but it's always best to do a little checking around before you board your pet."


