

The concession stand will be open, and you are invited to attend the games and eat with the sponsoring organizations.


Open House Planned At Health Facility

The Plainview Branch of West Texas Home Health Agency has new facilities at 812 West Eighth Street in Plainview, and the public is invited to an open house to be held May 15 from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. This Branch Office has home nursing services available in Plainview, Tullia, Kress, Olton, Hale Center, Edmonson, Hart, Halfway, Floydada, Lockney, Silvertown, Quitaque, Turkey, Flomot and rural areas. The main office is at Lubbock, Briercroft Office Park No. 4.

This agency is a non-profit organization certified for participation by the Bureau of Health Insurance of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare upon the recommendation of the Texas State Department of Health. Nursing care may be given to a patient in the home with the approval and orders of their attending physician. Care received is on an intermittent basis and according to the needs of the patient. Medicare and Medicaid have reimbursement plans by which home health care may be covered. Also Private Pay, Veteran's or private insurance coverage is possible.

Services provided upon physician's orders are the following: surgical dressings, baths, enemas, catheterizations, catheter irrigations, physical therapy exercises and ambulation, injections, blood pressures, vital signs, observation of acute conditions and instruction of patient and family in home care. Licensed Physical Therapist evaluation is offered with doctor's approval. Equipment may be furnished with a physician's order and includes hospital bed with rails, trapeze bars, hoist lifts, wheelchairs, commode chairs, walker, bed pans, decubiti pads, oral suction, oxygen equipment and positive pressure breathing machines. Many supplies are also provided; however, medications are not.

There are three registered nurses and eight licensed vocational nurses. Supervisor-in-charge is Ginger Johnson, R. N. Supervisors are Karen Puryear, R. N. and Bobbie Dear, R. N. L. V. N.'s are Charlie Marie Whitacre, Joan Garrity, Chris McClendon, Joan Roehr, Es-

WIND EROSION IS AREA'S GREATEST CONSERVATION PROBLEM

Wind erosion is the greatest conservation problem in this area—it's a problem continually with us year after year. We need to keep in mind that wind erosion occurs anytime strong winds come in contact with dry, loose soils—regardless of moisture conditions. The worst effect that wind erosion has on soils is that of removing the silts, clays and organic matter. This leaves the soils more sandy, less capable of forming clods and less resistant to erosion. When the fine materials are lost, much of the fertility, water holding capacity and nitrogen are lost too.

However damage from dust storms goes much farther than just soil itself. Wind erosion also

damages crops, buildings and fences, and creates health problems and traffic hazards.

The best methods of reducing wind erosion is to carry out sound management practices on your farm.

Stubble mulching is one of the most effective ways to control wind erosion. Stubble mulching is the management of plant residues for year-round protection of the soil surface.

Cover cropping is a management practice that can be carried out to prevent soil erosion. It is usually planted for protection when regular crops are off the land.

Stripcropping can also be practiced. This is when crop strips are run straight and at right angles to the prevailing winds.

A system of crop rotations is commonly used to help reduce wind erosion also.

Shelterbelts affect wind erosion in two ways. First, they lower windspeed enough to keep the soil from moving. Second, they reduce field length and, consequently, soil avalanching.

Hauled-in-mulches can be used to control wind erosion also. Cotton burs applied at five tons per acre and manure at 6 to 8 tons can effectively control wind erosion.

Where soil erosion still persists emergency tillage can be performed. Emergency tillage helps create a rough, cloddy soil surface to resist the force of the wind.

Riley Harris, president of the 4-H Adult Leaders Organization, presided over the meeting which was held April 24, 1975 in the P.C.A. community room.

The June 6-7 rodeo was discussed by 4-H representatives, Calvin Shelton, who represented the Silvertown Young Farmers, and Bill Rappy, sponsor of the F.F.A. chapter.







4-H Finances Reviewed At Leaders Meeting

DELAYED FROM LAST WEEK

At the April 24, 1975 meeting of the 4-H Adult Leaders Association, it was recommended that a financial statement for a one-year

period be publicized for the benefit of those 4-H parents who are often called on to support fund-raising activities.

At this time there are three 4-H accounts at the First State Bank in Silvertown. These are the 4-H Adult Leaders Account, the 4-H Livestock Account and the 4-H Horse Club Account.

The following is an indication of some of the expenses involving the 4-H Adult Leaders Account. Clothing, \$30.00 (includes decorations, expenses for ribbons and awards for Dress Revue and gifts for judges); Food Show, \$45.00 (includes ribbons, awards, cafeteria clean-up and gifts for judges); General, \$610.60 (includes things like Electric Camp, Leadership Lab, Achievement Banquet, gifts, expenses of concession stands and insurance for 4-H members. There is also a \$500.00 obligation to be paid to the State 4-H Center at Brownwood. This Center is now open and Briscoe County will be represented at the 4-H Center at

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"Round-up" which will be held in June. Briscoe County pledged \$1,500.00 to the Center and this was to be paid in a three-year period. \$1,000.00 has been paid and the remaining \$500.00 is due by August, 1975.)

The 4-H Livestock Fund is self-sufficient and does not rely on the Adult Leaders Fund for financial support. The 4-H Livestock Fund is maintained by entry fees for the county show and concession stand during the local livestock show. Expenses of the Livestock Fund include ribbons and awards, stock show judge, building maintenance and improvements. The Silvertown F.F.A. is also supportive of the County Show Barn and is sharing the expense of the insurance.

The 4-H Horse Club Fund is also self-sufficient and does not rely on the Adult Leaders Fund for financial support. The 4-H Horse Club is financed by specific Horse Club fund-raising projects, such as the recent light bulb sale and entry fees to the horse shows. Expenses include meals for the trail rides, judges for horse shows, ribbons and awards for horse show contestants. This year the Horse Club is financing its first Invitational Horse Show.


